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Itinerary

NB. Please note that the itinerary below offers our planned programme of excursions. However, adverse weather and other local considerations can necessitate some re-ordering of the programme during the course of the tour – though this will always be done to maximise best use of the time and weather conditions available.

Day 1 In flight

We depart London Heathrow mid-morning on board a British Airways scheduled flight bound for Nairobi. On arrival we will be met and transferred to our comfortable hotel in time for a good night's sleep.

Days 2 – 3 Lake Naivasha

After an early breakfast we will leave the bustle of the city behind us and after an hour or so, catch our first breathtaking view of the Great Rift Valley. As we leave the Eucalypt trees behind and descend the escarpment onto the valley floor, we get closer to Mount Longonot, a young volcano which rises to 2,776 metres above sea level. Its sides have attractive V-shaped valleys and ridges which make it an imposing sight as it rises from the Naivasha basin. Looking carefully, we may catch our first glimpses of zebra or gazelles amongst the scrubland on the roadsides. Approaching Lake Naivasha, an oasis on the valley floor, the habitat is striking with its yellow-barked Acacia trees and Candelabra Euphorbias. We will spend the next two nights at Elsamere, once home to Joy Adamson. Joy was an author and accomplished artist, but perhaps most well remembered for the film 'Born Free' and the raising of Elsa the Lion cub. The house is now a private lodge, conservation centre and museum and is packed with fascinating memorabilia and photographs of the life of Joy and George Adamson. The colonial style house is set in stunning peaceful gardens which slope down to the tranquil shores of Lake Naivasha. The dense trees surrounding the gardens contain a wealth of bird life including many colourful starlings, wood-hoopoes, lovebirds, rollers and hornbills. The most popular regular visitors are a troop of beautiful black and white Guereza Colobus, a species of monkey which is very successful around the shores of the lake. This group have become partially habituated to human presence and often join guests on the lawn for afternoon tea! Optional excursions from Elsamere will be available which include a boat trip on the lake and a walk on Crescent Island (approximately US\$30 per person payable locally).

We will drift to sleep listening to the grunting of hippos and the cry of the Fish Eagle, against the background of cicadas buzzing all around.

Day 4 Maasai Mara National Reserve

Awakening to another true African dawn chorus of croaking monkeys and a crescendo of bird song, we will enjoy a final breakfast at Elsamere before heading off to the world-famous Maasai Mara. En-route, we will drive past open plains and steep hills, passing through the busy Maasai market town of Narok – a riot of colour as the red cloaks of the men and the bright colours of the women's

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clothes mingle with the many shop fronts, goats and piles of fruit and vegetables for sale. On reaching the Mara we will drive to our base for the next five nights at Basecamp Masai Mara, a very comfortable permanent bush camp on the northern edge (but just outside) of the Maasai Mara National Reserve, overlooking the Talek River and located only a couple of kilometres downstream from the Talek Gate

Whilst at camp we will explore the surrounding area of the Maasai Mara by vehicle although optional wildlife walks are also available. Mammals are abundant and include Elephants, Lions, Leopards (very elusive), Warthogs, Black-backed Jackals, Spotted Hyenas, Burchell's Zebra, Wildebeest, Thomson's and Grant's Gazelles, Eland, Topi, Maasai Giraffe, Hippo and many many others.

The birdlife is equally diverse. Huge Ground Hornbills and elegant Secretarybirds stride across the grasslands along with Kori Bustards, Grey Crowned Crane and smaller species such as Temminck's Coursers, Wattled Lapwing, Rosy-breasted Longclaw, Yellow-shouldered Widowbird and Capped Wheatear. Lone bushes or dead trees provide lookout perches for a variety of bee-eaters and

rollers, including the beautiful Northern Carmine Bee-eater, whilst above them soar Martial Eagles, Lappet-faced, African Whitebacked, Hooded and Ruppell's Vultures, the latter four always on the lookout for a recent kill.

In the camp grounds and acacia woodlands we should be on the lookout for a plethora of barbets, finches, weavers, turacos, go-away-birds, glossy starlings and kingfishers.



Days 5 – 8 Maasai Mara

The Maasai Mara is probably the most famous wildlife reserve in Africa. It is a rising grassland, watered by the Mara River and covering an area of 1,500 square kilometres. The Mara region has been inhabited by man for at least 2,000 years, the last 200 years by the Maasai. The area is part of what is now referred to as the Serengeti – Mara Ecosystem, being joined to the huge Serengeti National Park in Tanzania. In the local (Maa) language Mara means spotted, which is a reference to the patches of bush and trees on the plains.

Our next four days will be spent game viewing and enjoying the Maasai Mara. Early morning game drives generally leave camp around 0600 hours (with a packed breakfast) and return approximately four and a half hours later. After lunch we can relax during the heat of the day, and appreciate the silence, punctuated only by strange and exotic birdcalls. Afternoon game drives depart around 1530 hours and return at sundown, after which we can freshen up and gather for pre-dinner drinks. Dinner is usually served in the dining tent. We also include one full-day game drive that departs around 0800 hours (after breakfast at the camp) and returns at sunset.

There will also be plenty of time during our stay to learn about the Maasai culture and to get a feel for this fascinating area of Africa. Basecamp Masai Mara is a bush camp, which means that the wilderness and all its attractions are very much part of everyday camp life and as the area is unfenced, we may see animals in the grounds at any time. Local Maasai guards are always on hand to escort you at night.

Day 9

Mara to Nairobi (in flight)

Sadly, today we will leave the Mara and travel back to Nairobi, which will take around 5-6 hours. Arriving in Kenya's busy capital around mid to late afternoon, there will be time for a last evening meal in Africa before boarding our late evening scheduled British Airways flight home.

Day 10 London

We will arrive back into London Heathrow early this morning.

Tour grading

Grade A - This is a traditional African safari, and therefore suitable for anyone of any age, without any great necessity for extreme fitness. Walks will be over flat terrain and at a very leisurely pace, stopping frequently to look at natural history along the way. The group size will not exceed 16 clients and the tour will be led by fully qualified local naturalist guides who will meet the group at Nairobi airport.

Focus

This is a traditional African safari, covering all aspects of general wildlife including both mammal viewing and bird watching. You will spend seven nights in Kenya in a truly spectacular game viewing area, surrounded by traditional flat-topped acacia trees, thorny scrublands and the bright red-cloaked Maasai people dotted across the plains. Whilst the vast herds of Blue Wildebeest and Plain's Zebra will be enjoying the grasslands of the Serengeti in June and November, huge numbers of game animals and birds remain in the Maasai Mara throughout the year making a visit to Kenya a delight at any time.

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Vehicles

We use customised 4WD Land Cruisers on this holiday each holding six people. These vehicles will be used for transfers between lodges and game drives into the Maasai Mara. They have excellent visibility, an opening 'pop-top' and all group members will have access to a window seat. Please note that game viewing can be disrupted by heavy rain.



Weather

In October/November the daytime temperatures average around 25°C, although they can be higher. Kenya enjoys a pleasant climate all year round thanks to its altitude, except the coastal regions which can be humid. There may be the chance of an occasional rain shower or thunderstorm.

Tour inclusions & additional expenses

The tour cost includes:

- Flights (unless booking on a land only basis)
- All transport
- Two game drives per day in the Mara
- Park fees for the Maasai Mara
- All accommodation
- All meals except dinner on Day 1 and lunch and dinner on Day 9.

It does NOT include:

- Drinks
- Tips
- Visa fees
- Personal expenses such as postcards and souvenirs
- Additional excursions at Elsamere as detailed in the tour itinerary above, and additional
 excursions (other than the two game drives each day) in the Mara. A boat trip on Lake Naivasha
 can be arranged for approximately US\$30 per person and a tour of a Maasai illage can be
 arranged for approximately US\$20 per person.

Food & Accommodation

We spend two nights at Elsamere, once home to Joy Adamson. Rooms are en-suite and have private verandahs facing the lake. We then spend five nights at Basecamp Masai Mara, which is a very comfortable, eco-friendly, permanent bush camp on the northern edge (but just outside) of the Maasai Mara National Reserve, just a couple of kilometres from the Talek Gate. This small

secluded camp accommodates guests in 17 tents, set under the shade of trees with direct views across the Maasai Mara itself. All tents are en suite (with bio-flush toilets and solar-heated showers) and equipped with proper beds, linen, bedside tables, luggage racks and rugs. Meals are prepared by the camps chefs, offering hearty breakfasts, alfresco lunches and candlelight dinners.

Entry requirements

All nationalities require a full passport to enter Kenya, containing at least two blank pages, and valid for at least six months beyond your date of entry into Kenya. British citizens also require a visa to enter



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Kenya, and further information on how to apply for your visa will be sent on booking. Citizens of other countries should check requirements with their nearest Kenyan Embassy. Various vaccinations and malaria prophylactics are also recommended; full details will be sent to you on booking.
