Day 1

Tuesday 4th February

The majority of the group left London's Heathrow airport in the afternoon, arriving for an overnight stop in Miami.

Day 2

Wednesday 5th February

Our morning flight from Miami to Belize City arrived slightly early where, Peter met all the clients and headed for the Black Orchid Resort arriving at 13:45. After lunch (rice and beans and chicken with potato salad), we left for the Baboon Sanctuary at 15:45 meeting Robert who was our trail guide showing us a few birds, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Acorn Woodpecker, Red-lored and White-fronted Parrot, Grey-breasted Martin and more. On our way we stopped at Mussel Creek where we saw Bare-throated Tiger-heron, Neotropic Cormorant, Green Kingfisher and Mangrove Swallow.

We then headed back to the hotel at 17:30, meeting an hour later for our daily briefing and bird list. We saw 49 species of bird today.

Day 3

Thursday 6th February

At 06:00 we started with coffee and tea, as the dark morning started to light up. Peter could hear a Laughing Falcon calling from across the Belize river which he managed to pick out on the treetops in the distance, so the group all managed good 'scope views. One of the group then noticed a fruiting fig tree that was providing breakfast for many species of birds like, Plain Chachalaca, Masked Tityra, Tropical Kingbird, Black-headed Trogon. Ringed Kingfisher, Little Blue Heron and Mangrove Swallow were also seen.

At 07:00, we had breakfast and then headed towards Belize City. At Marins Dock, we met Christian the Captain and Tyrel the assistant and boarded the boat. Tyrel spotted some dolphins that we tried to get a better view of. We then went to the Belize river mouth where we saw a few Manatees and some birds such as Double-crested Cormorant, Brown Pelican, Magnificent Frigatebirds and Laughing Gulls.

After half an hour, we went to South Gallows Point for some snorkelling followed by lunch. On our way back the captain spotted a pair of Manatees which gave excellent close up views. We then headed back at the dock and then drove to Birds Eye View Lodge for 15:30, We birded around the lodge grounds before dinner, briefing and the bird list. Today we saw 66 species of birds.

Day 4

Friday 7th February

We were up for coffee and tea and an amazing sunrise. We then birded the access road before breakfast. At 09:00, we birded the Limpkin trail to the visitors' center where we met the head warden Steve who gave us a talk on the Crooked Tree Wildlife Sanctuary and then birded our way back on the same trail. We saw Boat-billed Heron, Black and White Warbler, Yellow-billed Cacique and a pair of Barred Antshrike.

After lunch, we stayed close to the lodge in the heat of the day looking at birds and butterflies while some of the guests took this time to rest and relaxed. At 15:00, we loaded up the van and headed to the pine savannah and around the village to look for Yucatan Jays, which we saw at our first stop! We spent almost an hour taking pictures, observing and enjoying around 30 birds. When then went to look for Yellow-bellied Sapsucker which was unsuccessful but we did see Grace's Warbler and Summer Tanager.

We met at 18:00 for dinner and then went through our checklist. After this, we went to look for Pauraque which was not hard to find thankfully, taking us to 74 species for the day.

Day 5

Saturday 8th February

After our 06:00 breakfast, we went on a boat birding trip with our guide and captain Lenard. On this trip we saw many species of bird including close up views of Mangrove Vireos, American Coots, several species of heron, Green, Belted and Ringed Kingfisher and many more. We returned to the lodge just after 10:00, giving everyone enough time to pack and check out before an early lunch to leave for Lamanai Landing. Once there, we met Ruben and Alex who were our guide and assistant. Down the river we saw Bat Falcon, Lesser Nighthawk, Ringed, Green and Belted Kingfisher before we arrived at the Lamanai Outpost Lodge at 15:00.

At 15:30, we had a quick briefing before taking a birding walk around the village. Here we saw Red-legged Honeycreeper, Yellow-winged Tanager, Blue Grosbeak, Morelet's (White Collared) Seedeater, Golden-fronted Woodpecker to name a few.

At 18:00, we met for the bird list and briefing. After dinner we did a night spotlighting with Ruben, when we saw a Sungrebe, Northern Potoo, Yucatan Nightjar and American Pygmy Kingfisher. Today we saw 88 species of birds.

Day 6

Sunday 9th February

At 6:00am after coffee and tea, we birded around the hotel grounds and around the village before breakfast. We then left for the ruins where Ruben guided us for the morning, arriving back at the hotel for lunch before being dropped off at the Lamanai dock, stopping at the Sugar mill on route where we saw Tody Motmot, Worm-eating Warbler, Grey Catbird and more. On the way back we stopped at the old Indian church. Back at the hotel, we met for dinner and briefing. We saw 71 species of birds today.

Day 7

Monday 10th February

We met for coffee and blueberry muffins at 06:00, and then went to the pine savannah where we birded for almost two hours seeing Aplomado Falcon, Yellow-headed Parrot, Bottori's Sparrow and Northern Beardless Tyrannulet before returning for breakfast at 08:30. Next we took a walk on the Airstrip Trail seeing Northern Schiffornis, Squirrel Cuckoo and Black-headed Trogon.

After lunch, some of the group went around the village to look for butterflies and birds, noting Banded Peacock, Black Skipper and Yellow Sulphur. At 16:30 we went on the sunset cruise before meeting up for checklist and dinner. A total of 66 species were seen today.

Day 8**Tuesday 11th February**

Breakfast was at 06:00 and we left the lodge at 07:00, reaching Lamanai Landing at 08:30. While we were there, we saw an Altamira Oriole which everybody was pleased with. We then drove to the Zoo making a rest room stop at Black Orchid Lodge.

After touring the Zoo, we had lunch and then headed to Pooks Hill where we took a walk in the Meadow before dinner. We saw 64 species today.

Day 9**Wednesday 12th February**

At 06:00 we met and did a pre-breakfast birding walk in the Meadow. After breakfast we birded the River Trail seeing Dusky Antbird, Thick-billed Seed Finch, King Vulture Dusky-capped flycatcher and more. We also saw many species of butterflies before arriving back at 12:30 for lunch. We took another walk at 15:00 along the long trail at the meadow. We saw 54 species today.

Day 10**Thursday 13th February**

We started birding around the lodge at 06:15, noting Short-billed Pigeon, Red-capped Manikin, Ochre-bellied Flycatcher, Yellow-winged Tanager. Most of the group then went to Barton Creek Cave with Miguel Choco as the guide, arriving back at 16:00 and doing a little more birding in the Meadow.

After dinner, Ray set up a light and a sheet for us to look at moths and other insects.

Day 11**Friday 14th February**

We started with pre breakfast birding in the Meadow again. After breakfast, Ray did a talk on the Pooks Hill Maya site before we left the lodge heading for lunch at Benny's Kitchen. We then drove to the boarder meeting Alex our Guatemalan driver.

We crossed the border and set off for Tikal arriving at 17:00. We took a short birding walk at the entrance of the hotel where there was a flowering Cieba tree that was quickly named "The Magic Tree" by the clients. We saw 66 species today.

Day 12**Saturday 15th February**

After a 06:00 coffee and tea, we went birding in the park parking lot before breakfast. Venicio was our guide for our morning in Tikal. After lunch back in the hotel, we went out again at 15:00 to the old air strip. Before dinner, we watched a documentary on the Maya that was offered by the hotel, followed by checklist and dinner. We saw 48 species today.

Day 13**Sunday 16th February**

A few of the group went to the Magic Tree for a short time before breakfast and then our journey back across the boarder. Once across, we drove to Hode's Place in San Ignacio for lunch. We then drove to the Blue Hole

National Park and did some birding where we saw Golden-crowned Warbler, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Band-backed Wren, Yellow-bellied Flycatcher White-necked Jacobin and others. We then drove to the Pelican Beach Resort arriving at 17:30 and checking in. We saw 65 species today

Day 14

Monday 17th February

After the usual coffee and tea and a beautiful sunrise at 06:18, we headed to the Dangriga cemetery and the coastline for birding, where we saw Willet, Sanderling, Painted Bunting, Common Black Hawk, Yellow-crowned Night Heron to name a few.

After breakfast, the group split with some going to South Water Caye and others to Cockscomb Basin Wildlife Sanctuary. At the Sanctuary we hiked the river trail and birded around the river where we had good views of Golden-hooded Tanager, Red-legged Honeycreeper, Wedge-tailed Sabrewing and more. We had a packed lunch at the sanctuary that was provided by the hotel (Shrimp salad with bread rolls and watermelon).

After lunch, we went to Hopkins Wetland for some shore birds where we saw White Pelican, Roseate Spoonbills, Blue-winged Teal and more. We returned to the hotel at the same time as the other half of the group. We saw an impressive 80 species today.

Day 15

Tuesday 18th February

It was our last day. We had a few issues actually leaving this morning but we all managed to have breakfast and leave just after 08:00 and reaching the airport by 10:45 to drop off some of the group. The remaining group on another flight, visited Captain Hook's shrimp farm where we added five more species to the trip list. We then returned to the hotel for their flight to Miami at 12:35. Our early evening flight from Miami brought us to London's Heathrow at 07:45 on the 18th February.
