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Tour Report Bolivia - Lowlands

Tour participants: Jose Antonio Padilla and Gustavo Cañas (Leaders) with nine Naturetrek clients

Summary

This was an wonderful tour in the lowlands of Bolivia with 9 participants, all very keen birders. We travelled through this beautiful country starting at Viru Viru airport, which is set in an amazing grassland habitat home for many birds, including very attractive Burrowing Owls and magnificent Greater Rheas. Next we went to the home of one the most range-restricted and endangered birds in the whole world, the Red-fronted Macaw and finally we went to the Refugio Los Volcanes, a beautiful eco-lodge located in the Southern Part of Amboro National Park, home to the Military Macaw and the magnificent Andean Condor.

Day 1

Sunday 28th October

Our Air Europa flight from Gatwick to Madrid arrived in plenty of time for us to catch our overnight connection to Santa Cruz where we met up with our tour leaders.

Day 2

Monday 29th October

Eight of the group arrived in good time via Madrid with Air Europa, the other member having arrived one day previously to be more rested for the start of the tour. So, after arrival the group got their binoculars out and we began birding right away. Here at the airport we saw some magnificent birds like Burrowing Owls, Southern Lapwing, Chopi Blackbird, Red-winged Tinamous, Campo Flicker, Rufous Hornero, White-tailed Hawks, Forktailed Flycatchers, Chotoy spinetail, Greater Thornbird, Sacaya Tanagers, White-browed Blackbirds, Grassland Sparrows, Wedge-tailed Grass-finch, and many others.

After an outstanding start to the holiday we went to the hotel to drop our luggage and then to have lunch in Casarao, a nice Brazilian, buffet style restaurant, where we had our first taste of Brazilian and Bolivian Cuisine. After Lunch we headed to the Lomas de Arena State Park, a unique habitat, with some open grassland and shrubby forest. Here we saw things like Red-capped Cardinal, Purple-throated Euphonia, Rufous-fronted Thornbird, the fantastic White Woodpecker, Saffron Finches, Thrush-like Wrens, Buff-throated Woodcreeper, Blue-winged Parrotlets, Spotted Sandpiper, etc.

After a fantastic first day, we went back to the hotel for dinner and a rest, as tomorrow was going to be a very long day.

Day 3

Tuesday 30th October

Today after an early breakfast at the hotel, we went west of the city to the Botanical Gardens of Santa Cruz which is probably the only remaining natural protected area left in the whole city. We arrived very early so we could take advantage of the quiet first hours in the morning before locals start to arrive.

We first went to the artificial lake by the parking area and here we started with some excellent birds like Black-crowned Night-Heron, Cocoi & Striated Heron, Great & Snowy egrets, Picazuro Pigeons, Greater Anis, Guira Cuckoos, Rufous Hornero, Hauxwell's Creamy-bellied & Black-billed Thrushes, Variable Oriole, Streaked

Flycatcher, Black-tailed & Black-crowned Tityra, Purplish Jay, Shiny Cowbirds, Chopi Blackbirds, Great Kiskadee, Little Woodpecker, Straight-billed & Buff-throated Woodcreeper, Bare-faced Ibis, Sayaca & Palm Tanagers, Eastern & Tropical Kingbirds, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Yellow-chevroned Parakeets, Ringed Kingfisher, Wattled Jacamas, Red-capped Cardinals, Crested Oropendula, Yellow-rumped Caciques, etc etc.

After some excellent birding at this first spot, we started heading into the wooded area, where there is a trail system which is very productive and we found some forest birds like: Bolivian Slaty Antshrike (our first Bolivian endemic) Buff-breasted Wren, Golden-crowned warbler, Chestnut-fronted macaws, Scale-headed Parrots, Amazonian Motmot, Narrow-billed Woodcreeper, and the very common, sometimes elusive, but very nice Ferruginous Pygmy-owl, all giving very good views this morning.

After birding at this fantastic place and finding great birds for this part of the country, we went back to the city for lunch, and then travelled west, taking the old road to Cochabamba for about 224 kms to a missionary school called Monte Blanco. This is a quiet place used by young Bolivians as a place of spiritual retreat at certain times of the year, and it would be our home for the next three nights. On the way we found a nice White-throated Hawk perched on a branch of a tree and some Plush-crested Jays alongside the main road....nice!!!

Monte Blanco and the Comarapa area are located in a very dry Inter-andean valley, dominated especially by cactus trees, and many small bushes and shrubs, and it is also home to one of the most beautiful, range-restricted and endemic birds in the country, the fantastic Red-fronted Macaw, as well as many other birds which are hard to see anywhere else in Bolivia.

We arrived after a very long drive in time for dinner. Over dinner we talked about our plans for next day and very secretively we had some beers, as drinking is not allowed in this place!

Day 4

Wednesday 31st October

We had a very early breakfast right after which we jumped in the van and went to the Valley of Saipina where we were hoping to find the macaws and other specialties like White-tipped Plantcutter and another species of endemic parrot, Cliff Parakeet. We were In the valley by 7 am and started birding, finding Small-billed Elaenia, Green-barred Woodpecker, Ringed, Black-capped and Black Warbling-finches, Great Pampa Finch, Rufous-capped Antshrike, Greater Wagtail- Tyrant, more than 70 of the fantastic Red-fronted Macaws, Turquoise-fronted Amazon, Blue-crowned Parakeets, Blue & Yellow Tanagers, the very range-restricted White-fronted Woodpecker, Striped Cuckoo, Southern Martin, Tawny-headed Swallow, Sooty-fronted Spinetail, many Saffron Finches, Double-collared Seedeaters, and many more.

The temperature was increasing and by the middle of the morning it got really hot, so we returned to the van and went south west to try to find Cliff Parakeets. Things looked different as a new road was just finished few months ago, and we almost missed the spot for the parakeets. However we found it and few minutes later Edith found the parakeets on the other side of the Valley on the side of a big cliff. We had excellent views through the scopes, and then it was back to the van as it was time to head back to Monte Blanco for lunch.

After lunch, and a small break until 3:30 pm, we went to look for another Bolivian endemic, the very localized Bolivian Earthcreeper which we have previously found in a small, dry river a few hundred yards behind the

missionary school. We took the van and 10 minutes later we were at the spot. Here we left the vehicle behind and started to walk into the dry river, finding Striped-crowned Spinetail, White-bellied Tyrannulet, Plain Tyrannulet, Glittering-bellied Emerald, White-bellied Hummingbird, Red-crested Finch, and after a lot of trying we finally got a Bolivian Earthcreeper, thanks to Peter who found it moving at the top of a small cliff....excellent, another great bird for the trip. Tonight, we decided to go back out to look for Scissor-tailed Nightjars and other nocturnal creatures.

So, before dinner we went for a walk behind the centre. It was a fairly quiet but after a while we finally found the Nightjars flying over our heads, and some were also perched at a distance, so using strong flashlights we were able to see them well. Then it was dinner and off to bed.

Day 5

Thursday 1st November

Today we had another early breakfast before heading west towards Cochabamba, as we were going to spend the day in La Siberia Cloudforst at an altitude of up to 2,800 metres in the eastern slopes of the Andes. About an hour after setting off we had our first stop of the day, looking for the fantastic Olive-crowned Crescentchest, a bird that we eventually saw in the middle of a grassy area and luckily everyone was able to see it. Another 15 minutes later, we stopped in an area known as Torrecillas, where we had some excellent birds like Brown-capped & Spectacled Redstart, Spot-breasted Thornbird, Red-tailed Comet (female), Chiguanco & Great Thrushes, Highland Elaenia, Grayish Baywing, House Wren, Yellow-billed Tit-Tyrant, and the Rusty-vented Canastero (the creamy-breasted form), White-winged Black-tyrant, Bolivian Warbling-finch, Rufous-sided Warbling-finch, Golden-billed Saltator, Black-backed Grosbeak, and many more.

At the next stop, another 15 minutes up the road, we went for a short walk and had: Rufous-browed Warbling-finch, Streak-fronted Thornbird and many Rufous-collared Sparrows.

It was time to keep going up the road and we reached the highest point in this tour at almost 3,000 meters in elevation. Here we also had some excellent birds like Blue-and-Yellow Tanager, Rust-and-Yellow Tanager, Swallow-tailed Kites, Roadside & Variable Hawk, Rufous-breasted Chat-tyrant, Tyrian Metaltail, Long-tailed Sylph, Blue-capped Puffleg, Violet-throated Starfrontlet, Gray-breasted Wood-wren, Buff-browed Foliage-gleaner, Slaty & Sierran Elaenia, White-throated Tyrannulet, White-banded Tyrannulet, Cinnamon Flycatcher, Blue and White Swallows, Azara´s Spinetail, and the fantastic Fulvous-headed Brushfinch. Rufous-bellied Thrush, Hooded Siskins, Pale-legged Warbler were also seen today.

We had a short break for lunch, and then we moved on a little and we found Pearled Treerunner, Masked Flowerpiercer, Chestnut-collared & White Collared Swifts, Scale-naped Parrots, Blue-crowned & Mitred Parakeets, Light-crowned Spinetail, Rufous-faced Antpitta (briefly), Trilling Tapaculo, Barred Becard, Andean Slaty Thrush, and many more.

Eventually, and with some reluctance after a brilliant day, it was time to start heading back to Monte Blanco. We made a brief stop at the town of Comarapa to refuel the vehicle (and to buy some ice creams) and 25 minutes later we were back at the centre for dinner, the check-list and then off to bed.

Day 6

Friday 2nd November

Today we left the centre and headed towards our final destination of the tour, the beautiful ecolodge at Refugio Los Volcanes. This is located in the most southern part of the Amboro National Park, a fantastic place at the base of the mountains, surrounding by forested hills and not too far from the city of Santa Cruz. We took packed lunches with us, as we were planning to spend as much time as possible birding on the way, hoping to fill in a few gaps in our holiday list.

Our first stop in this dry forest valley delivered Brown & Andean Tinamous, Turkey & Black Vultures, Squirrel Cuckoo, Burrowing Owl, Dot-fronted & Golden-olive Woodpeckers, Southern-crested Caracara, Variable Antshrike, Ochre-faced Tody-flycatcher, White-bellied Tyrannulet, Cliff Flycatcher, Fuscous Flycatcher, Yellow-browed Tyrant, Variegated Flycatcher, Tropicial Parula, Rufous-browed Peppershrike, Orange-headed Tanager, Red Tanager and the stunning Ultramarine Grosbeak.

We had our picnic lunch on the way and we had a short stop at Samaipata where we had bought ice-creams and snacks to keep us going on our journey.

As we were getting closer to the lodge we saw birds such as Wattled Jacanas, Two-banded Warbler, Short-tailed Ant-thrush, Grey-crested Finch, Sacaya Tanager, Saffron-billed Sparrow and Shiny Cowbird

We switched cars at the main gate and took small 4 by 4 vehicles, to get down to the lodge, and we arrived at this beautiful spot well before dark.

We had dinner today at 7:30 pm and It was a Rodizio of homemade Pizzas, which was very welcome after our long journey today.

Day 7

Saturday 3rd November

This morning we decided to have a pre-breakfast birding walk in the grounds of the lodge, and we found new birds like Blue-throated Piping-Guan, Plumbeous Pigeon, Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl, White-tipped & Andean Swifts, Blue-headed Parrots, many Turquoise-fronted Amazons, Western Wood-pewee, Masked Tityra, Purplish & the beautiful Plush-crested Jay, Dusky-green & Crested Oropendulas, and Palm Tanager.

Breakfast was very good and straight afterwards we set off again, but this time we went for a longer walk on the main jeep Trail.

We started our walk and soon began finding some really good birds, including Buff-bellied Hermit, Andean Condor, Plumbeous Kite, Red-billed Parrot, Green-checked Parakeets and the greatest number of Military Macaws Jose had ever seen here. We also had Slaty Gnateater, Buff-fronted Foliage-Gleaner, Oliveceous Woodcreeper, Plain Antvireo, the rare Black-capped Antwren, Squirrel Cuckoo, Mitred Parakeets, Ochrecheeked Spinetail, Swainson's Thrush, Riverbank warbler, Black-goggled Tanager, and many more.

We returned to the lodge in time for lunch, and around the main rooms we found a nice pair of Thick-billed Euphonias, and after lunch, we had time to relax before setting out again at about 3:15 pm. This time we went to

the other side of the property, finding excellent birds like Yungas Manakin, White-necked Thrush, Chestnut-eared Aracari, Channel-billed & White-throated Toucan, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Black-chested Buzzard-eagle, and a lifer for Jose, the Gray-throated Leaftosser....great!!! We also heard Tawny-breasted Screech-Owl, but unfortunately we never saw it. Anyway, it had been an excellent afternoon, and we went back to the Lodge very happy.

We had another excellent dinner at the Refugio and off to bed.

Day 8

Sunday 4th November

Today we had to return to Santa Cruz, but not until after lunch, so this morning we tried to find some birds that we hadn't previously seen so it was off again into the forest, and we saw Squirrel Cuckoo, Channel-billed Toucan, Blue-headed Parrots, and Tourquise-fronted Amazons, Military Macaws again, Mitred Parakeets, Ochrechecked Spinetail, Great-rufous Woodcreeper, Plain Antvireo, Black Phoebe and Crowned-Slaty Flycatcher. We also heard Moustached Wren although we didn't see it, but we did manage to see Hauxwell's Thrush, Hooded Siskins, Riverbank Warbler, Two-banded Warblers, Black-goggled, Palm & Silver-beaked Tanagers, Black-faced Dacnis, (female), and more. We had a pleasant walk in the forest, but with a slight problem; the water in the stream had risen because of the rain we had in the morning, so we had to take the long way to get across. Finally, we were able to get back and get ready for an early lunch and then to set off to Santa Cruz.

After organizing our luggage, we boarded the small 4x4 vehicles to take us up to the main gate of the lodge. There we had to change cars to our van for the journey to Santa Cruz, but upon arrival at the main gate, we went for a short walk as our van hadn't yet arrived. On this walk we saw Chestnut-backed Antshrike, Black-capped Antwren, Crested & Dusky-green Oropendulas, Rufous-bellied thrush, Green-checked Parakeets, and more.

Our van finally arrived after having some problems on the way, and eventually we were on the main road heading back to the city.

On the way we had briefs views of American Kestrel, Tropical Kingbirds, House Sparrows, and the introduced Rock Doves.

At the Lido Hotel we had some time to relax before meeting up again to go through the final checklist and dinner.

Day 9

Monday 5th November

Today we went to the airport for our flights back to the UK, saying goodbye to the members of the group who were flying to Cochabamba with Jose to start another tour in the Bolivian Highlands.

Day 10

Tuesday 6th November

Our flights from Santa Cruz, via Madrid, landed at Gatwick this morning and after clearing immigration we said our goodbyes and went our separate ways home, after a wonderful holiday in the wildlife-rich Bolivian Lowlands. The exotic birds and stunning landscape would remain in our memories for a very long time.
