## Day 1

**Saturday 1st December**

Depart London Heathrow on flight to Hong Kong.

## Day 2

**Sunday 2nd December**

The flights from Heathrow ran more or less to time and we arrived in Hong Kong early morning. We then boarded our flight onwards to Chengdu, arriving about 13:30. Immigration was swift and we were through in less than 30 minutes.

Sid was waiting for us by the exit and we were soon driving down to Dujiangyan. En route we spotted a few birds, the most conspicuous of which were many flocks of White-cheeked Starlings, Eastern Buzzards and Long-tailed Shrikes.

We arrived at our hotel to have a little rest or do some local birding, and later, after an excellent traditional meal in a local restaurant we headed out with lamps but only heard a Northern Boobook. We were then really ready for our beds.

## Day 3

**Monday 3rd December**

We set off from our hotel at 6.30am, going up the hill for a pre-breakfast birdwatch. We saw Chestnut and Dusky Thrushes, Blue Magpies, White-browed Laughingthrush, Green-backed Tits, Black-chinned and Stripe-throated Yuhina and heard a Collared Owlet. We also saw several Pallas's Squirrels.

We then had breakfast and set off towards Labahe. We stopped at Tienshuan to view the lake and managed to find a possible Baer's Pochard, plus Common Pochard, Great Crested Grebe, Little Egret and a few Coots. Siberian Stonechat, Hodgson's Redstart and Long-tailed Shrike were in the rough ground nearby.

We then continued into town where we had a lunch of noodles, then it was straight on to the reserve. We stopped to watch a Wallcreeper before checking in to the hotel.

A little orientation walk added Dipper, White-capped and Plumbeous Water-redstarts on the river and after dinner we headed out with the lamps and saw several Red and White Flying Squirrels, many Chinese Gorals, several Muntjac, a Himalayan Palm Civet, Serows plus, best of all, several Forest Musk Deer! Not a bad mammal list for the first full day.

## Day 4

**Tuesday 4th December**

We had an early breakfast cooked by Sid so we could get a prompt start in Labahe and we were heading up to the misty mountain tops (c2,800m above sea level) soon after 8am. On the way up we spotted a beautiful male Lady Amherst's Pheasant followed by at least another 10 females !!!! It was still misty when we reached the top but it slowly cleared as we walked slowly down.

After only a few minutes we were watching our first Red Panda feeding atop a Rosehip tree, giving us all very good views. As we walked down we soon found another Red Panda giving excellent views and many photo ops.

Walking further down the road we found many new birds that included Black-faced Tits, Grey-hooded Fulvettas, Blue-fronted Redstarts, Black-faced Laughingthrush, Hodgson's Treecreeper, Chestnut-vented Nuthatches, the crested form of Coal Tit, and both Three-toed and Fulvous Parrotbills.

We then returned for lunch at "Sid's café"

After lunch we headed upriver, checking the bat cave, but all we found were numerous hibernating Tissue Moths. On the river walk we found many Finchbills, several Blue-fronted Redstarts, Hodgson's Redstart, Brown Dippers, Water Redstarts, and we also encountered our first group of Tibetan Macaques.

After dinner we went spotlighting again. Gorals, Muntjacs and Flying-squirrels were common but we also saw Serows, Chinese Leopard Cats plus a Niviventer.

## Day 5

## Wednesday 5th December

After breakfast we headed up the mountain and quickly found a Red Panda in the same area as yesterday. We watched it for a while feeding on the red berries, sleeping, feeding again and finally slowly wandering off in the bamboo.

We drove to the cable-car station at the top and walked down from there. Birds were thin on the ground but we added a good selection of Tits, Laughingthrushes and Treecreepers to the list. After lunch we were gathering at the cars when we spotted a Wallcreeper on the hotel, which seemed to vanish into thin air.

We then headed down the valley and saw a few good birds; Himalayan Bluetail, Crimson-breasted Woodpecker, Buff-throated Warbler and a Perney's Long-nosed Squirrel.

After dinner we headed out on yet another night drive. We saw many Sambar Deer, several Gorals and Red and White Flying-squirrels, plus a Chinese Ferret Badger, Masked Palm Civet and a Greater Asiatic Yellow House Bat hanging under a bridge.

## Day 6

## Thursday 6th December

We did a short walk in the drizzle this morning but did not see much except the common Water Redstart and a few Large-billed Crows. We then left our hotel and drove the long way back to Duijingyan, then on to Wolong. It was grey and overcast most of this travelling day but we did stop at the lake at Tien Shan and saw a large variety of ducks.

After a rice and/or noodle lunch we headed towards Wolong, stopping to look at a rehabilitating Giant Panda high in a tree beyond Wolong, a Green Sandpiper in the river and a smart Lammergeier overhead.

We arrived at the hotel at 4pm and after a coffee, headed out for a walk above town seeing a couple of Chinese Babax. We then returned for an excellent local meal.

## Day 7

## Friday 7th December

We set off at 7am in the dark on the 90km journey to Balang Mountain. On the way up we saw Giant Laughingthrushes and also several Temminck's Tragopan, including several males only metres away - wow, what a beautiful bird - to some of us the bird of the trip!

As we continued up the mountain we stopped several times and found more Tragopans and a male Chestnut-throated Partridge feeding under the bushes but finally giving good views.

We continued up the mountain and walked along the old road for a while, with the mist clearing from time to time, and soon we found a group of Blue Sheep, many Alpine Chough, a nice male White-throated Redstart and Himalayan Vultures Overhead.

We then drove through the tunnel, and emerged into beautiful sunshine on the north side. We were greeted by a nice flock of new birds including White-browed and Great Rosefinch, Rufous-breasted Accentor, Rufous-vented Tit, Chinese Fulvetta and a small group of Blood Pheasants.

After our picnic lunch we drove down to the viewpoint admiring the tall mountain peaks all around us. On the way back we were enchanted by the amazing sight of several hundred Grandalas commuting between pylon wires and some berry-laden Buckthorn bushes. The males were the richest blue imaginable but the brown females had a subtle beauty with scaly underparts and a white wing bar. These beautiful, blue birds in such great numbers was one of the highlights of the trip. Gradually the flock came closer and closer until they were feeding only metres away at eyelevel...another birding highlight for all of us !

Sadly, all too soon, it was time to head back and leave these magnificent birds in a splendid setting behind.

## Day 8

## Saturday 8th December

Today was a long travelling day as we had to drive from Wolong to Ruoeregai. The weather was snowy on the tops so we tried to make as much progress as possible in case snow on the high road delayed us, meaning our birdwatching was mainly en route, with several brief stops. We found many Goosander, Pintail, a female Wigeon, Teal and Mallard on a nearby river.

We stopped for a meal at Songpan with attendant Water Pipits by the river, and then headed up to the plateau where the road became icier. We found several Snow Pigeons and White-browed Tit-warblers before reaching the summit at 3,900m. The plateau was about 500m lower, yet it was still a treacherous, slow journey to Ruoeregai.

We eventually arrived at our hotel and after dinner we did a short spotlighting session just outside town. Best of all were our first Woolly Hares and Red Fox .

## Day 9

## Sunday 9th December

As we set off at 6am from Ruergai the stars were incredibly bright, as was the planet Venus. We drove off into the vast Tibetan plateau grasslands to the north stopping at a quarry where we waited for first light. With the light also came the first mammals, Tibetan Foxes were seen hunting the many Pika and Hares, four distant Wolves walking along a ridge and many Red Foxes kept us occupied and our minds away from the bitter cold.

The place was also full of birds. We saw large flocks of Rufous-necked Snowfinches plus many White-rumped Snowfinches. We then drove on one of the sideroads and had breakfast in the field. Here we had great views of Steppe Eagles, Black and Himalayan Griffon Vultures, Saker Falcons and Upland Buzzard.

We then continued up the pass but were stopped by a very snowy and icy road so scanned the surrounding mountains for a while. Several Blue Sheep and Lammergeier were seen well, before we drove back for lunch at Rourgai, stopping en route to photograph the many birds of prey perching on telegraph poles close to the road!

Late afternoon we went back to the quarry and after a long cold wait, just as dusk fell a Pallas's Cat showed itself very well in the spotlight and scope. Laying on top of a rock we could study all the details of this unique Cat in the scope for as long as we wanted! What a sighting and one of the top sightings of the trip for sure!

Spotlighting later that evening we found several more Red Foxes and finally, to round off a fantastic day, a Chinese Mountain cat!

## Day 10

## Monday 10th December

After breakfast we set off for the primeval conifer forest of Baozuo (pronounced Baxi). We stopped en route for a White-tailed Eagle flying low overhead before going down the pass. Here in a scrubby area we found a good flock of birds that held White-browed and Pink-rumped Rosefinch, Robin Accentor, a rare Bull-headed Shrike, Plain Laughingthrush, Crested Tit-warbler and a Siberian Weasel for some.

A bit lower down we stopped for a coffee and found a mixed Pheasant flock holding at least 15 Blue-eared and several Common Pheasants. Scoping the nearby hillsides we found a nice male Serow and some Sika Deer.

We then went further on into the forest where we took a walk uphill and saw many interesting birds including Sichuan Tit, Przewalski's Nuthatch, Grey Crested Tit and Red Crossbill. A Thomas Pika was seen briefly by some.

We spend the afternoon near the Black River road. Here we found a mixed species flock that held many Twite, Rock Sparrows and Snowfinches. On the wires we found a nice Tibetan Shrike, a very close Upland Buzzard and some playful Choughs.

After dinner spotlighting produced a very nice Siberian Roe Deer, several Woolly Hares and Red Foxes. A single Chinese Mountain Cat rounded off a fantastic day in the field!

## Day 11

Tuesday 11th December

After breakfast we left Rourgai and the plateau behind stopping briefly at some roadside scrub to admire some Daurian Jackdaw and several White-browed and Crested Tit-warblers. We headed down through some of the most spectacular scenery of the trip, driving through a narrow, high sided gorge, pickin up our first Collared Crows.

We arrived at our hotel in Pingwu late afternoon and after checking in we drove up into the hills for some birding. Best was a female Golden Pheasant feeding close to the road, many Brown-breasted Bulbuls, a male Vinaceous Rosefinch,, groups of Mountain Bulbuls and a Rock Squirrel.

## Day 12

Wednesday 12th December

We spent a few hours after breakfast on the mountain at Pingwu where we saw and heard many new birds; Rufous-faced Warbler, Spot-throated Parrotbill, Chinese Wren-Babbler, Vinaceous Rosefinches, Streak-throated Scimitar-babblers, David's, Dusky and Spectacled Fulvettas, White-collared Yuhina, White-throated Laughingthrush, Chestnut Thrush and Yellow-throated, Little and Slaty Buntings. We also had a couple of sightings of Perney's Long-nosed Squirrel.

We left the mountain for a visit to the temple in Pingwu. The beautiful temple gardens also held some good birds including Brown-flanked Bush-warbler, Chinese Blackbird and Chestnut-vented Nuthatch.

After a fried rice or noodle lunch we set off towards Tangjiahe and spotted many Collared Crows by the river, plus an obliging Barred Owlet and Mandarin Ducks. We then continued to the hotel spotting several Muntjacs, a Tufted Deer, several Golden Takin with young, a Crested Kingfisher and our first Tibetan Monkeys.

After dinner we set off on a lamping session and saw more Takins, Muntjacs, Gorals, a nice Porcupine, a Tawny Fish Owl and both Plumbeous and White-capped Redstart in their night time roost.

## Day 13

Thursday 13th December

An early morning spotlight produced a Snub-nosed Monkey right by the roadside for some, unfortunately it moved of before the other car could see it. We then walked up to the Heroes Ridge were we scanned the valley floors for wildlife. A Tufted Deer gave good views and a few Monkeys were spotted.

On our way down we found a nice flock of birds that included the minute Speckled Piculet and the rare Grey-headed Woodpecker!

We then walked a side road in search of our next quarry. A Fish Owl was a good find, Dippers were common and our quarry finally showed! A pair of beautiful Snub-nosed Monkeys were moving through and feeding in the Rhododendrons - superb!

After a fried rice lunch some went for another birding session near the river and saw a nice male Collared Grosbeak, White-browed Bush-robin and another single Snub-nosed Money!

After dinner we had another spotlighting session and in addition to the usual Takins, Gorals and Muntjacs, we had two super Otters fishing in the stream below us and a Tawny Fish Owl, complete with fish!

## Day 14

## Friday 14th December

After breakfast we drove to the Heroes Pass and walked down towards the museum seeing several beautiful Crested Kingfishers, a Bamboo Partridge perched in a bush which gave great scope views and a Yellow-throated Marten for some was unexpected!

As we walked on we found a Takin with young, a nice male Blue-fronted Redstart, Dusky and Black-bibbed Tit, Crimson-breasted Woodpecker and a very, very close White-crowned Forktail giving unsurpassed views. Up the valley we found a Tufted Deer.

After lunch some of the group birded the area near the hotel while the rest visited the Old Town of Qinxi doing some Christmas shopping (spices) or just admiring the old city wall and the picturesque buildings.

After dinner we had our final lamping session and in addition to the usual ungulates we saw an Oriental Scops Owl perched just above our heads, a Tawny Fish Owl, a Porcupine and a Leopard Cat!! Not a bad finale for our spotlighting sessions.

## Day 15

## Saturday 15th December

After breakfast we had a long drive back to Chengdu to an airport hotel, stopping en route for a couple of Mandarin Ducks and Collared Crows. After lunch at a local restaurant we stopped by a river where we saw Long-billed Plovers, Spot-billed Duck, Lapwing and Slender-billed Gull. At another stop nearby we found many Goosanders, Black-tailed Gull, Little and Great Crested Grebe and Sand Martins.

Then we continued to Chengdu where we bade farewell to Sid and Fugui, but not until we'd had another sumptuous meal in a local restaurant.

We thanked Sid for organising such an excellent holiday, delivering almost everything that could be delivered, and catering for our different needs and tastes in his "café".

## Day 16

## Sunday 16th December

We were up at 5am to catch an 8:15 flight to Hong Kong. All went according to plan and we arrived at Hong Kong with plenty of time to catch our connecting flights home after a memorable holiday in this wild region of China, with its stunning scenery and fascinating, varied wildlife.
