

# Ecuador - Cock-of-the-Rock

## Day 1

## Sunday 18th March

I met the group at 6 o'clock at the Charles Darwin Hostel and that was the beginning of our amazing week of birding. We travelled in the direction of Yanacocha but without knowing that the road was so bad. We got stuck in the mud and we had to push the van. Luckily we made it and we arrived to the reserve to watch the birds. Our expectations were to see the hummingbirds and we were very pleased to observe 12 species until we left the place, the most exciting ones were Sword bill Hummingbird and Rainbow bearded Thornbill. We were accompanied by Golden crowned Tanager, Scarlet-bellied and Black chested Mountain Tanagers whilst walking. Afterwards we had lunch lower down along the Nono Mindo road.

In the afternoon we started on our way to Maquipucuna and we did several stops along the way. The idea was to stop more but the rain was very bad so we kept going, picking up some birds along the way like Lemon rumped Tanagers and Pacific Hornero. We arrived at the lodge at around 4 pm and did a little wander around the lodge and managed to see a Torrent Duck flying along the river.

## Day 2

## Monday 19th March

We had breakfast around 6am and the birding started from the dining room of the lodge with Black Phoebes, Golden-crowned Flycatcher and House Wren. Near the lodge there was a tree full of tanagers, with a beautiful display of colours, including Swallow, Silver-throated, Bay-headed, Golden and Lemon rumped. Also present were Thick billed Euphonia, Buff throated Saltator and of course the Bananaquit.

We started to walk up the main trail with beautiful birding weather. The birding went on well for the whole morning with the most exciting time when we saw a couple of Toucan Barbets and Pale mandibled Aracari, also the quite elusive Plain Antvireo. Coming back from our adventure we saw Barred Puffbird. After all the excitement we went to have lunch to get some energy to keep going in the afternoon.

By group agreement we left at 2.30pm straight after lunch and we walked along the road out of the Reserve in the direction of Santa Lucia, looking for any birds that we hadn't seen in the morning. We had to work to get to see one very shy bird, and our endeavours were rewarded with great sightings of White-whiskered Puffbird through the scope, what a beauty!

Higher up along the road some of the other Tanagers were showing off beautifully, Bay headed, Blue necked, Metallic Green and a big group of Swallow again. A big group of Red billed Parrots in flight gave us a show. But the 2 birds of the day were Black billed Cuckoo and Rose breasted Grosbeak. We had to give up around 5 as the rain was too hard and so headed back to the lodge.

## Day 3

## Tuesday 20th March

We left Maquipucuna after breakfast with the final destination of that day being El Mirador del Rio Blanco. Our first stop was good with Ecuadorian Thrush and Yellow Tyrannulet present. As it was good weather on the way out we were able to stop at the fish farm. From there we saw Ringed Kingfishers, Spotted Sandpiper and different kinds of Seedeaters. In our minds we were determined to get to Sachatamia to see the Hummingbirds and when we got there it was the most fantastic display of colours. It was so stunning to see the Choco endemics such as Empress Brilliant, Velvet purple Coronet, Purple-bibbed Whitetip and Brown Inca in particular. All of this was accompanied with delicious tropical juices.

We left there ready to have lunch in the Mirador Lodge but before that we got into Milpe and there we saw Golden collared Chlorophonia, Crimson rumped Toucanet and other beautiful birds. We arrived for lunch at 1pm.

After lunch and checking in we left to Silanche to look for the lowland birds. At the beginning of the gravel road we saw a big group of Pacific Parrotlets. We kept going but near the reserve we got stuck in the mud again and it took us an hour to get out of there. Unluckily when we arrived to the reserve and went to the tower, very heavy rain started, so the birding wasn't as successful in the afternoon.

We came back to the lodge around 6.30 pm to have an early dinner so we could rest a bit before the early start planned for the next day.

## Day 4

## Wednesday 21st March

This was to be our hardest day as we had a long journey ahead. Breakfast was at 4am and we departed with our final destination being Quito at the end of the day. On the way to Quito we stopped at La Paz de las Aves, a reserve where we hoped to find the main attraction of the trip, the famous Cock of the Rock. From where we left the car (at 5.30am) we walked half an hour to the Cock of the Rock Lek. There were not many of them but there were around 8 and we had beautiful views of them especially when they were very close to us in good light and a spectacular display.

Afterwards he showed us 2 species of Antpittas (Yellow-breasted, and Moustached). They were fed with worms so they came very close and some people managed to take good pictures of them. We were going back to the house they have for coffee, when Angel found Dark-backed Wood Quail and they were stunning. We were incredibly fortunate as we saw them very close and with chicks. After all these thrilling birds we were ready for coffee and the traditional Bolon de verde (plantain with cheese in the middle).

We left around 10am and we went in the direction of Bellavista to look for some other target birds. We found several flocks on the way with Grass green Tanager and Dusky bush Tanager. The main attractions were Plate-billed Mountain Toucan and Streaked Tuftedcheek.

We left this place in the direction of Quito but before reaching the city we did a last stop and saw the very rare White-tailed Shrike Tyrant along with Tufted Tit Tyrant and Sparkling Violet Eared. We arrived to Quito around 6.30pm in preparation for the highlands the next day.

## Day 5

## Thursday 22nd March

We left Quito very early again, very much prepared for the Highland birding, heavy coats, gloves etc. Our first stop was 45 minutes away from Quito and there we managed to see nice birds, Tropical Mockingbird was exciting, followed by Vermillion Flycatcher and some others. Our second stop at a place called Casa Vieja (old house) with no house actually (!) was where the serious birding started. Shiny Sunbeam and Streak throated Bush Tyrant were present, followed by Black tailed Trainbearer, and this was just the beginning. We kept going up and we managed to see two species of Cinclodes, Many striped Canastero, Ecuadorian Hillstar and Blue mantled Thornbill.

After that we went to look for the Seedsnipe place and thank goodness we were very lucky. We saw them very close to the road with fantastic light and good sightings. I have to say we saw all the targets there so it was a successful morning for the list.

After lunch, we did the 200 m walk to have a look at the ducks and there were Andean Teal, Yellow billed Pintail, Andean Ruddy Duck and Silvery Grebe. We continued in the direction to Guango Lodge but the altitude was a little hard so we didn't stop too many times. We arrived at the lodge around 3pm.

During our coffee time we identified all the hummingbirds there, including the Long tailed Sylph, Chestnut breasted Coronet etc. At 4 o'clock we did a wander around and we saw the beautiful Grey breasted Mountain Toucan and stunning views of Tyrannine Woodcreeper so we were very pleased with these.

## Day 6

## Friday 23rd March

Breakfast started as early as usual and we had to leave in the direction of San Isidro as we were going to have lunch there. The first hour of driving it was raining so we didn't stop in the regular place and we went further down instead and got onto the gravel road in the direction of Santa Lucia de Bermejo and thank goodness it turned out to be the best decision as there we had the most exciting morning of the whole trip. Two Solitary Eagles flying nearby followed by White rumped Hawk and a display of various tanagers, flycatchers, caciques etc. The weather was beautiful and the birds kept showing off and they were good ones like Powerful Woodpecker, Cock of the Rock, Sickled winged Guan and Saffron crowned Tanagers. After all this excitement we were quite hungry and we headed to San Isidro lodge for a delicious lunch.

After lunch we did the road going towards Las Caucheras and the first bird we saw was Barred Hawk, followed by Highland Motmot eating a snake! We were looking for the Quetzal as our target and we were very lucky as we had a great view of the Golden headed Quetzal. We left the area and we headed back to Guango Lodge around 5pm.

## Day 7

## Saturday 24th March

Today we were aiming for the birds that we hadn't seen yet and again we were lucky. We got to see the Black capped Hemispingus, Lacrimose Mountain Tanager and the Grey-breasted Mountain Toucan again. After around 9.30 we drove up to Papallacta and we saw a couple of new birds such as Agile Tit Tyrant and Blue backed Cornbill. We came back to have an early lunch and put our bags in the van preparing for our return trip to Quito in time for the International flights some people were on.

Along the way we did some stops to look for some of the things we didn't see on the way in and we were very fortunate as we saw 3 major birds for the list, Red rumped Bush Tyrant, Giant Cornbill and last but not least Andean Condor. We left Andy and Jon at the airport for their flight and Simon went back to Charles Darwin Hostel for his onward trip.

## Comments

During the trip we saw around 300 species, not counting heard ones. I think we did very well bearing in mind the weather. I would like to say thank you very much to all the people on the trip, also to the guys in Maquipucuna, El Mirador, and Guango Lodge.

To finish, I am going to attach the checklist of the birds we saw.
