## Day 1

Sunday 9th November

### Arrival in Quito

Five UK clients arrived in different flights to Quito where they were greeted by tour guide Iris, and Franklin, the driver throughout the tour. Sadly, three clients had missed their flight due to a delay, so the short briefing at dinner took place with only two-thirds of the group, including a client from the US, before everyone went to bed early.

## Day 2

Monday 10th November

### Zuroloma – Alambi Valley – Guaycapi Restaurant – Sachatamia Lodge

At 6.00am the tour started out from Quito into the Pichincha highlands, with some roadside birding along the way to our first major stop at Zuroloma reserve, at 3200m. Here we got our first impression of Andean birds such as Chestnut-naped and Equatorial Antpittas (fed by the local guide), Sword-billed Hummingbird, Mountain Velvetbreast, Green-tailed Trainbearer and many others on the hummingbird feeders, and as a special treat two White-throated Screech-Owls at their roost.

After some extra kilometres on the bumpy road, as the normal connection was closed due to roadworks, we drove down Alambi valley to arrive at our lunch spot, Mirador Guaycapi, where the birds distracted our attention from our food. We saw more than a dozen hummingbird species, such as White-booted Racket-tail, Purple-bibbed Whitetip and Purple-throated Woodstar, and some tanagers including Black-capped, White-lined, Swallow and Golden.

It started raining, so we drove straight to our hotel for the next few nights, Sachatamia Lodge, where we were greeted by a very special welcoming committee of four Yellow-throated Toucans in the parking lot. We spent a very productive afternoon, with sightings of Velvet-purple Coronet, Empress Brilliant, Brown Inca, Rusty-margined Flycatcher, Dusky Chlorospingus, Choco Brushfinch, Ecuadorian Thrush and a colourful array of tanagers.

## Day 3

Tuesday 11th November

### Sachatamia Lodge – Mindo Valley – Frutti Tour Gardens

Today, we finally met up with our delayed colleagues, and started off with a very active visit to the local moth trap and grounds, getting fine views of furnariids like Streak-capped Treehunter and Strong-billed Woodcreeper, flycatchers such as Choco Tyrannulet and Marble-faced Bristle-Tyrant, a Golden-headed Quetzal, and migratory species like Broad-winged Hawk, Swainson's Thrush and Blackburnian Warblers, among many others.

After a comfortable breakfast, where we had another short briefing for our new tour members, we headed to Mindo Valley, where we birded along the road and saw Crested Guan, White-throated Quail-dove, Red-headed

Barbet, Cryptic Becard, and Bay-headed and Silver-throated Tanagers. The highlight of the day was surely a well-hidden Stygian Owl in the centre of Mindo village, which drew the attention of several enthusiastic locals.

In the afternoon, we drove down to the Pedro Vivente Maldonado area, to bird in the small, but very productive garden of Frutti Tours, at 600m the lowest point on our exploration of the western slopes and Andean foothills. Memorable birds here included Bronzy Inca, Purple-chested and Violet-bellied Hummingbirds, Orange-fronted Barbet, Yellow-tailed Oriole, Black-winged Saltator and a very nice Masked Water Tyrant. A Pacific Pygmy-Owl was close by, but we could only guess its hiding place from the dozen of songbirds which mobbed it in its tree.

## Day 4

Wednesday 12th November

### Paz de las Aves Reserve – Upper Tandayapa Valley – Choco Birds Reserve

Today we had an early start to visit the famous Paz de las Aves Reserve, where the owners, Angel and Rodrigo Paz, were the first local guides who actually tried to acclimate shy antpittas to human presence, and have done their great work for more than twenty years. On a good day, as many as five species can be seen due to their constant efforts.

Of course, there were more birds in this forest than the enigmatic antpittas, and when we arrived at dawn to walk to the Andean Cock-of-the-rock lek deep in the valley, we got great views of a hunting Rufous-bellied Nighthawk. The lek wasn't visited by any females this day, so the males were relatively calm and came close to the hide.

After a short period having the hide to ourselves, a big group of observers arrived at, so we decided it was time to move on. On a small forest trail, we were able to get brief views of Olivaceous Piha and Blue-winged Mountain Tanagers.

Then it was time to follow the Paz brothers to the various antpitta feeding stations inside the forest. The first try (for Moustached Antpitta) did not work out, but after a steep downhill hike into yet another valley, we got great views of Giant Antpitta on its nest (!), with a bonus male Golden-winged Manakin at the same spot. At the roadside we got a much easier sighting of two Yellow-breasted Antpittas (one adult, one juvenile), but then we ran out of luck; according to the owners, the other species were incubating and therefore not visiting feeding stations.

Nevertheless, during our waiting time we got Black-chinned Mountain Tanagers, Flame-faced and Golden Tanagers, Red-headed and (distant) Toucan Barbets, White-throated Daggerbill and Spotted Barbtail. On the way back, we also got some very nice views of a pair of Zeledon's Antbirds.

In the afternoon, we decided to bird on the roadside at the high ridge over the Tandayapa valley. Things were exceptionally quiet, but we still had lovely views of two of the big targets in this area: the brightly coloured Gorgeted Sunangel and, after much trying in thick fog, a family of five Plate-billed Mountain Toucans.

**Day 5****Thursday 13th November****Mashpi Amagusa Reserve – drive to Puembo**

Once again, we started very early for our last day on the western slopes. Before we even left Sachatamia at 4.30am, we got our first bird, a beautiful Black-and-white Owl.

At Mashpi Amagusa, we had a fantastic morning with Sergio, who helped us connect with many specialties like Dark-backed Wood-Quail, White-tipped Sicklebill, Rose-faced Parrot, Orange-breasted Fruiteater, Glistening-green, Rufous-throated and Moss-backed Tanagers, Indigo Flowerpiercer and Black Solitaire, among many others. To be successful in achieving great views of several of these rare and range-restricted species at once at Mashpi Amagusa was truly mindblowing!

On the way back to the main road to Quito, we had some nice birding moments, with Pacific Tuftedcheek, Black-crowned Tityra, Yellow-faced Grassquit and Choco Toucan showing up.

The group stayed overnight in Puembo Birding Garden, as we had to leave early next day for our flight to Coca.

**Day 6****Friday 14th November****Flight to Coca – Sacha Lodge**

After breakfast in the company of numerous birds like Scrub, Blue-gray and Blue-and-yellow Tanagers, Croaking Ground-dove and Saffron Finch, we headed off to the airport for our flight to Francisco de Orellana, better known as El Coca. At arrival we were greeted by our local guides, Oscar and Shanshu, who were fantastic company in the forest for the next days, together with the local guides/canoeists, Eddison and Jerry.

The transfer from airport to office, for a short refreshment and briefing, and then to the motorized canoe on the Napo River is so well-choreographed that it doesn't feel stressful at any point. After a ride of about an hour and a half, we arrived at the Sacha Lodge docks, from where we walked for another twenty minutes to get to some smaller canoes, in which we were taken to the lodge along a small creek, locally called the caño. On the ride to Sacha, we saw some typical riverside birds like Cocoi Heron, Osprey, Yellow-headed Caracara, White-winged and White-banded Swallows, and Greater Ani.

We arrived at the lodge and had lunch accompanied by a family of Giant Otters, whose presence was always easily detected by the loud screams and chattering of their young, begging for fish. On the way to our cabins, we had the next highlight: a young Green Anaconda right below the footbridge to the lodging area!

In the afternoon, we went on a canoe ride with our local team, to explore wildlife in the small creeks and on the lake. In this quiet, enchanting environment we found Rufescent Tiger Heron, Orange-crowned Manakin, Crane Hawk, Hoatzin, Cream-colored Woodpecker, Dot-backed Antbird, Black-capped Donacobius and a shy, but well-visible Sungrebe, together with many other new species for our trip.

## Day 7

**Saturday 15th November**

### Sacha Lodge – Canopy Walkway

After an early breakfast at 5.00am we left the lodge at 5.30am for a thirty-minute walk to the canopy walkway, 37m high and 275m long, with a great view over the canopy. But as soon as we arrived at the bottom of the first tower, a thunderstorm set in, and it didn't want to stop. In a brief period when the rain lessened, around 7.00am, Oscar decided that we should get to the top anyway, and wait for the rain to stop there. After four hours in pouring rain, without a roof, and the thunderstorm setting in again, the Sacha Crew decided we would go back to the lodge, which turned into a hike through creeks and swamps instead of paths: everything was flooded!

Happily, the rain stopped around 11.20am, so we were able to watch some birds around the lakeside. Later in the afternoon, we had the chance to return to the tower, this time without rain, and still experienced significant activity in the treetops, seeing Black-and-white Hawk-Eagle, Bat Falcon, White-necked Puffbird, Spangled Cotinga, Masked, Paradise and Opal-rumped Tanagers, Great Potoo and Spix's Guan, to name a few.

We stayed until sunset and then turned the walk back into a night walk, seeing many crickets, stick insects, tree frogs, whip spiders and, as a highlight, two huge Smoky Jungle Frogs next to the path.

One client spent the afternoon at the 43-metre-high observation tower built around a giant Kapok tree. Spotted in the canopy were a Brown-throated Three-toed Sloth, Plum-throated Cotinga and Yellow-rumped Cacique. Hoatzins were seen along the channel on the way to the tower trail.

## Day 8

**Sunday 16th November**

### Parrot Licks – Coca River Islands

This morning we left the lodge even earlier than the day before, as we had a day tour of the Yasuni National Park, including the Napo River islands and involving visits to two different clay licks, places visited by various parrot species to ingest clay and water to neutralize toxins from their green fruit diet, as well as to take up vital minerals.

On the way, we also passed smaller river islands and sandbanks, on which we could see Ladder-tailed Nightjar, Pied Plover, Amazonian Umbrellabird, Eastern Kingbirds (a lot) and Oriole Blackbirds.

Parrot activity was excellent and loud at both clay licks, and we saw Blue-headed and Orange-cheeked Parrots, Yellow-crowned and Orange-winged Amazons, Dusky-headed and Cobalt-winged Parakeets, and up to fifteen Scarlet Macaws. The absolute highlight was a rarely-seen Red-and-green Macaw joining the party! On arrival at the Napo River docks at Yasuni, we were extremely fortunate to have views of a Pink River Dolphin / Boto as it surfaced where the dark waters of a creek mixed with the milky water of the Napo. This was a species with which we all thought we were very unlikely to connect, but had all dreamt of seeing.

The group visited a number of sites on both shores of the Napo River and several creeks. We connected with new species such as Swallow-winged Puffbird, Green-backed Trogan, White-eared Jacamar, Cattle Tyrant, Black-billed

Thrush, Little and Crimson-crested Woodpeckers, Black-banded Woodcreeper, Scarlet-crowned Barbet, Black-fronted Nunbird and Amazonian Umbrellabird.

## Day 9

Monday 17th November

### Kapok Tower – canoe ride

After a short early morning canoe trip and short walk into the forest, we arrived at the magnificent Kapok Tower in good time for the morning's peak activity; thankfully there was no rain. The platforms are high in one of the largest trees at the Sacha property and offered a wonderful opportunity for us to experience mixed feeding flocks forty metres up in the canopy: it was magical! We recorded more than sixty species in two hours, and at times it was difficult to know which way to look as new species emerged from the foliage. Our guides kept us on point, and we added Black-bellied Cuckoo, Fork-tailed Woodnymph, Slate-coloured Hawk, Amazonian Violaceous Trogan, Purplish Jacamar Lemon-throated Barbet, Lettered Aracari, Buff-throated Woodcreeper, Dwarf Tyrant-Manakin, Purple-throated Fruitcrow, White-browed Purpletuft, Slender-footed Tyrannulet, Golden-bellied, Orange-bellied and Rufous-bellied Euphonias, Opal-crowned, Opal-rumped, Masked and Green-and-Gold Tanagers, Black-faced Dacnis and Green Honeycreeper.

At lunch, Iris joined the group again, and in the afternoon we went on a peaceful ride through the channels around Pilchicocha Lake, where we saw Rufous-breasted Hermit, Striated Heron, Common Scale-backed Antbird and had a brief flight view of a Ferruginous Pygmy Owl.

## Day 10

Tuesday 18th November

### Sacha Lodge – Coca – Pachakutik Lagoon – Susanita's Hummingbirds – San Isidro Lodge

On yet another rainy morning, we headed back to Coca in the motorized canoe, with the only notable sighting being a single Black Skimmer. On arrival, we were joined again by our friendly and reliable driver Franklin, who took us back up along the eastern Andean slopes to San Isidro. On the way, we stopped at several roadside locations, as well as Pachakutik Lagoon and Susanita's Hummingbirds for lunch.

We got a good overview of the changing ecosystems and their feathered inhabitants, like Riparian Parrotlet, Ruddy Ground-dove, Black-throated Mango, Carib Grackle (lower elevations); Chestnut-fronted Macaw, Little Woodpecker, Yellow-browed Sparrow (foothills); two Band-bellied Owls at roost and Ferruginous Pygmy-Owl (Pachakutik Lagoon); Cliff Flycatcher, Green-backed Hillstar, Black-throated Brilliant, Many-spotted Hummingbird and Gorgeted Woodstar (Susaita and surroundings).

In the evening, we settled in at our comfortable cabins at San Isidro lodge where, after dinner, we got great views of a Black-banded Owl.

**Day 11****Wednesday 19th November****San Isidro – La Brisa**

Our birding started unusually late, at 6.00am, with a cup of freshly-brewed coffee on the porch. Here, and later on around the lodge and road, we saw a nice mix of eastern cloudforest birds, such as White-throated Toucanet, Inca Jay, Andean Motmot, Rufous-crowned Tody-Flycatcher, Mountain Wren, Common Chlorospingus, Bluish Flowerpiercer, Beryl-spangled and Saffron-crowned Tanagers, and Azara's Spinetail.

In the afternoon, we drove to La Brisa Reserve, with a stop on one of the whitewater rivers, where a female Torrent Duck was busy feeding and swimming along the river. At the reserve there was great activity at the hummingbird feeders, with Bronzy Inca, Peruvian Racket-tail, Long-tailed Sylph and Violet-fronted Brilliant. We also got a fantastic view of a Scaled Fruiteater feeding in the palm trees.

After dinner and getting ready to rest, we got a group call from Iris to get back to the porch, as a Mountain Tapir had come to the salt lick below the porch. Those who made it back on the porch in time were rewarded with great views of the tapir as it calmly slurped at its treat for the night.

**Day 12****Thursday 20th November****Borja Road – Guango Reserve – Papallacta hot springs**

Today we left San Isidro after an earlier breakfast, to drive even further up the Andes and into the real highlands. We spent the first couple of hours at mid-elevation on the Borja road, where we had good activity among birds of more open habitats, like Black-and-white and Chestnut-bellied Seedeaters, Red-breasted Meadowlark, Pale-edged Flycatcher and several tanagers. The highlights along the river were a juvenile Fasciated Tiger Heron and a stunning male Crested Quetzal.

We arrived in Guango Reserve mid-morning, and immediately headed out to the mountainside, where Grey-breasted Mountain Toucans regularly show up to feed on grapes provided by the ranger. Initially they were very shy, or perhaps just not hungry, but after we waited for about forty, minutes they made several appearances to snatch the grapes one-by-one from the perch.

After lunch, we wandered around the lodge trails, and found White-capped Dipper, Mountain Cacique, Turquoise Jay, Hooded Mountain Tanager and Grey-hooded Bush-Tanager, while at the hummingbird feeders we found White-bellied Woodstar, Tourmaline Sunangel and Chestnut-breasted Coronet.

On the way up to the Papallacta hot springs, we took yet another side road to get Iris (and everyone else) a lifer for the trip: a Black-collared Swallow at the water reservoir, which had shown up at this spot two weeks before, for the first time ever in Ecuador! After giving this gorgeous little bird its due attention, we headed to the hot springs for a well-deserved dip into the thermal waters.

## Day 13

Friday 21st November

### Surroundings of Papallacta – Antenna Hill – Puembo

In the early morning, some of the group went out to bird the old Papallacta road, while others enjoyed a relaxed morning at the hot springs. The early birds saw Black-chested Buzzard-Eagle, Spillman's Tapaculo (poorly), Lacrimose and Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanagers, Pale-naped Brushfinch and White-crested Elaenia.

After breakfast, we drove up to the entrance of Cayambe-Coca National Park, but with no luck, as the birds were unusually quiet; however, we did add Red-crested Cotinga, and brief views of Tawny Antpitta for some.

After an early lunch, we headed back to Quito, where we took the road up from the pass to the radio antennas. At this inhospitable elevation of 4300m there are some special birds which you have to work for, in particular the perfectly-camouflaged Rufous-bellied Seedsnipe. After around twenty minutes of climbing around the cushion plants and slipping on muddy slopes, an eagle-eyed client finally found one, and then two, on the last area of the hill we checked. Most of us got a good view of them before they disappeared into the fog. Other nice birds at this elevation were White-chinned Thistletail, Plain-capped Ground Tyrant and Red-rumped Bush Tyrant.

On the way down to Puembo, we stopped at several places to scan the steep hillslopes for Spectacled Bears, and after some persistence, Iris found one feeding on some bromeliads! Although he was well-hidden behind some bushes, we still got to see him every time he moved to another bromeliad, and we enjoyed the show for quite a while.

## Day 14

Saturday 22nd November

### Antisana National Park – Departure

The trip to Antisana National Park was our last proper birding day as a group, as three of the participants would leave this afternoon for their flight back to the UK. It turned out to be the perfect farewell to Ecuador.

Our first stop was the Tambo Condor Restaurant, where we found not only our first Andean Condor, roosting on the stone canyon opposite the valley, but also finally got Sword-billed Hummingbird for those who had been delayed on the first day of the tour. We also saw Giant Hummingbird, Shining Sunbeam and Black-tailed Trainbearer.

At various stops through the Antisana highlands, we were still adding new species, such as Tufted Tit-Tyrant, Carunculated Caracara, Black-winged Ground-dove, Andean Ibis, Cinereous Harrier and Paramo Pipit. At La Mica lake, we saw Andean Teal, Yellow-billed Pintail, Andean Duck, Ecuadorian Hillstar and Andean Tit-Spinetail (at the nest), Many-striped Canastero, an obliging Tawny Antpitta and many more.

We did our last checklist at the Tambo Condor restaurant, enjoying close-up views of a Giant Hummingbird, and then it was time to leave for the airport. No, wait! It wasn't: we had to delay our departure from the restaurant, as a fully-grown Spectacled Bear showed up on the opposite mountainside, as if to wave a final farewell to the group, while Andean Condors circulated over the valley. What a way to end the trip!

## Day 15

Sunday 23rd November

Final departure

While those who had left yesterday flew across the Atlantic and arrived back in the UK, the remaining group members enjoyed breakfast at Puembo feeding station, with Western Emerald and Fawn-breasted Tanager among the usual visitors. They then had an excellent tour of Quito's old town, organised by Mercedes at Puembo. Further rain curtailed afternoon birding, although Neotropic Cormorants were seen close to Quito International Airport before their departure.
