## **Summary**

A beautiful sunny week in two of Andalucía's most picturesque spots yielded some fantastic nature-watching! Iberian Lynx teased us twice with close but fleeting views in both Doñana and Sierra de Andujar, and the group eventually enjoyed views of a magnificent male stalking its mountain realm - fantastic!

Wetland birding was exceptional with Red-knobbed Coot, Marbled and Ferruginous Duck and Red-crested Pochard amongst the thousands of wintering wildfowl in Doñana. Spanish Imperial Eagles dominated the Andujar skies amongst Cinereous (Eurasian Black) and Griffon Vultures.

Superb food at both bases rounded off a memorable trip!

## Day 1

## **Monday 24th January**

Niki and Javi collected the group at Sevilla airport and without further ado headed for lunch at a local *venta* or café, enabling an early sampling of Spain's delicious cheeses and hams! Then we began the journey towards El Rocío, our first base for the trip.

On the way, we made a stop at Dehesa de Abajo lagoon. Almost immediately we had great views of Red-knobbed Coot, one of Doñana's sought-after bird species! In fact, two were present and they drifted in and out of the nearby reeds giving great close views. We also had great views of Marbled Duck, Ferruginous Duck, Red-crested Pochard and Northern Pintail amongst seas of wintering Common Pochard and Northern Shoveler.

Driving through areas of pastureland, we enjoyed large flocks of Spanish Sparrows and European Serin and made another stop for two gorgeous Black-winged Kites seen in flight and perched.

We soon arrived at our first base, Hotel Toruño in El Rocío, beautifully situated on the shores of the Madre de las Marismas freshwater lagoon. A light rain had set in, and some of the group sensibly chose to simply admire the assembled Greater Flamingoes, Eurasian Spoonbills and White Storks from their bedroom window! Those of us that did head out for some pre-dinner birding were rewarded with views of Bluethroat, Glossy Ibis, Blackwinged Stilt and Western Swamphen.

## Day 2

## **Tuesday 25th January**

This morning we headed out early in 4x4 minibuses with Doñana Nature – Irene and Sammy would take us into areas of the park that can only be reached with special permission – and four-wheel drive!

We drove through the stone pine woodlands in the light of the rising sun and enjoyed large groups of Red Deer out on the heath as we searched for our main quarry, the elusive Iberian Lynx.

It was not long before a male Lynx sauntered across the track ahead of us! It paused briefly in full view before vanishing, having given a close but typically fleeting view to most of the group. A good start!!

We made a stop to stretch our legs and immediately picked up two Spanish Imperial Eagles – an adult and a first-year bird – perched together in a tree, giving great scope views. We also got our first good look at an Iberian Grey Shrike.

After more searching in the Lynx habitat, we took a stroll at Coto del Rey heath, where we found a large flock of over 20 Eurasian Stone-curlews, Thekla's Lark and Woodlark, Sardinian Warbler, Iberian Grey Shrike and another stunning adult Spanish Imperial Eagle. Eurasian Hoopoes were seemingly everywhere, with 11 spotted!

We took our lunch in a restaurant back in El Rocío, where we were introduced to local delicacy *pisto* – a hearty ratatouille-type dish topped with a poached egg and eaten with delicious crusty bread – just what we needed to warm us through and get the energy levels up!

We wandered back to Toruño for a siesta along the shores of the lagoon, picking up flocks of Black-tailed Godwits, Pied Avocets, Penduline Tits and more heart-stopping Bluethroat views!

In the evening we headed out once more with Doñana Nature to explore the heaths, enjoying Little Owl, wintering Common Cranes and large herds of hundreds of Red Deer before sunset.

## Day 3

## Wednesday 26th January

We spent the morning once more with our friends from Doñana Nature, enjoying Iberian Magpies, Woodlarks, Black Redstart and White Wagtails amongst the pine forests and heathlands of Doñana. Although no lynx was seen, there were plenty of potential kitty treats, in the form of European Rabbits! We also admired the sharp, bright colours of the native Red-legged Partridges, another favoured Iberian Lynx prey item.

We took our picnic lunch by the *marisma* enjoying the array of wintering wildfowl and waders, including Greylag Geese (the emblem of Doñana National Park) Eurasian Wigeon, Northern Shoveler, Eurasian Teal, Western Swamphen, Black-winged Stilt, Common Snipe and Green Sandpiper. We also added Little Ringed Plover to our rapidly growing bird list.

We said goodbye to the sandy streets of cowboy town El Rocío and headed north-east to our second base in the Sierra Morena, near Andújar. This range of beautiful, wooded hills remains the Iberian Lynx's major stronghold, and is still home to the majority of the population.

On arrival we settled in to our villas and joined Ramón and the Los Pinos team for dinner in their locally-renowned restaurant. Here we tasted a range of local specialities including Partridge pâté, tomatoes 'a la abuela', and a delicious bean dish as well as locally-grown meat for those that wished.

## Day 4

## **Thursday 27th January**

We set out to explore our new realm, where we focussed our first morning on the famous Iberian Lynx-spotting area of La Lancha. This stretch of track affords stunning views out over the *sierra*, and from our lofty vantage point we could observe the whole valley's lifescape, including highlights such as Mouflon, Spanish Ibex, close

flocks of Hawfinch, and a perched Spanish Imperial Eagle. Iberian Green Woodpeckers and Little Owls were very active and vocal!

Driving on a little further, we encountered a herd of Spanish Ibex really close to the track – we were able to view down upon them using the footprint of the vans as cover.

As the air warmed, the thermals filled with raptors, and we had views of Cinereous (Eurasian Black) Vultures and Griffon Vultures, as well as two distant Golden Eagles.

We took our picnic lunch seemingly surrounded by Hawfinch and Eurasian Nuthatches, and with more great views of soaring Vultures and Spanish Imperial Eagle. We then headed back to Los Pinos for a break and a coffee.

We spent the rest of the day at another famed Iberian Lynx spot, alongside the River Jándula. A flock of perched Cormorants made for an unusual sight alongside the river. Short-toed Treecreepers sang in the conifers. Dozens of wintering Common Chiffchaffs and Eurasian Blackcaps flitted fly-catching in the soft evening light. Amongst the riverside scrub, Cetti's Warblers were frequently heard. We ended the day on excellent close views of a Common Kingfisher.

## Day 5

## Friday 28th January

Today, after our hearty breakfast of super-whizzy coffee and giant toast, we began the day at the Río Jándula, arriving there just after sunrise and enjoying the tranquillity of the area. Great Spotted and Iberian Green Woodpeckers called, and flocks of Long-tailed Tits flitted through the trees.

We picked up Rock Sparrow (Petronia) at the dam and many Crag Martins were feeding overhead. Grey Wagtails showed well on the faster-running water areas. We also got a great look at a foraging flock of Iberian Magpies.

After coffee we headed back up to La Lancha. On the way, a male Iberian Lynx crossed our path once more! As is often the way on this trip, we can only be in the right place at the right time with the right vibe - the cat itself must bring the luck! We had never seen a lynx before on this stretch of road and yet here one was, strolling across in front of us! Another close, but fleeting look...

We suspected this animal was one being seen regularly on our favoured bend in the road, so we stayed on, hoping for another look at this elusive feline. He didn't show up for us this evening, but in waiting for him, we got to experience his realm, with Red and Fallow Deer, Eurasian Sparrowhawk, Iberian Green Woodpecker, Mistle Thrush, Eurasian Siskin, European Serin, Hawfinch and Rock Bunting as well as more great views of Spanish Imperial Eagle.

## Day 6

## Saturday 29th January

Our final day, and we decided to have one last look up at La Lancha before heading to the airport for a late afternoon flight. Taking up our places in a viewpoint on a different part of the track, we enjoyed once more the gorgeous views and got a great look at a particularly showy Blue Rock Thrush and a close Rock Bunting.

Then, the cat finally brought the luck! Angie spotted the animal heading behind a Mastick bush! Thanks to some excellent teamwork and great directions, we were soon all looking in the right place and ready, hoping the animal would emerge! It did, and we got to watch this gorgeous animal stalking across the entire hillside before it finally disappeared from view once more.

Time to go, and we headed back to Los Pinos for a celebratory *paella* lunch, before saying our goodbyes to Ramón, Montse and the team and heading back to Sevilla for homeward bound flights and onwards journeys.
