# **Spain's Sierra de Guara - Land of the Lammergeier**

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Day 1 Monday 5th May

#### London Stansted - Zaragoza - Alquezar

We left from Stansted airport and arrived at Zaragoza airport in the evening. Laura was already waiting for us at arrivals; we gathered the whole group together and started our trip towards Alquezar. Heading northeast and through La Hoya de Huesca (Alto Aragon), the main gateway of the Sierra de Guara Mountains, we got to the medieval village of Alquezar at midnight, and checked into our very comfortable hotel before going straight to bed.

Day 2 Tuesday 6th May

#### Alquézar – La Clusa – Las Balsas de Balsacun

Some of us took an early look around the Alquezar before breakfast. It was a sunny beautiful morning in the village, and amongst the small streets and ancient architecture we were introduced to a range of common local birds including some migratory Honey Buzzards, Nightingale, Black Redstart, European and Alpine Swifts, Serin, Griffon Vultures, Lesser Kestrel, Blue Rock Thrush, Egyptian Vulture, and Red-billed Chough, amongst others. We walked around the impressive building of La Colegiata. The River Vero basin was pristine with views down to the southern basin of the River Ebro. We had stunning views of flying Egyptian and Griffon Vultures from here with very close eye-level flights of both species. In a ravine we spotted a single Melodious Warbler and a noisy Nightingale which we saw well through the telescope; plus some very interesting butterflies and other invertebrates.

After this village stroll, we took a little break and then we drove out of the village, just a short distance, up to the area of Las Clusas where we had our picnic lunch by the shade of ancient almond trees and enjoyed the many wildflowers and butterflies around the lush fields and lime stone mountains. We saw Western Bonelli's Warbler, Common Kestrel, Buzzard, and more Griffon and Egyptian Vultures from this spot.

After lunch, we took a serious walk up to the highest point and towards the summit of the Pico de Quizans, spotting some butterflies and also nice birds such as Western Bonelli's Warbler, Cirl Bunting, Red-billed Choughs, and more vultures soaring around the top of the peaks. Once at the top, the views of the valleys were breathtaking; with incredible views of the Pyrenees. Griffon and Egyptian Vultures emerged from the many limestone crags with snowy mountains in the background! We also saw a triplet of singing warblers on the way back to the vehicles; Subalpine Warbler, Western Orphean and Western Bonelli's Warblers. As the afternoon turned into early evening, we decided to drive back to our hotel in order to have a break, followed by nibbles and drinks at the hotel's bar, checklist, and enjoyed a delicious local dinner at Casa Gervasio Restaurant.

### Day 3

# Wednesday 7th May

## Santa Cilia Vulture Station and F.A.B. Visitors Centre

After breakfast, we drove up out of Alquezar towards the village of Santa Cilia. The main reason to drive to this area was to witness a very unusual and unique experience. We were offered the chance to watch feeding vultures accompanied by local vulture expert and Fondo Amigos del Buitre's co-founder Manu Aguilar. His vast and unparalleled knowledge of these birds has made him a very well respected naturalist and pioneer (together with late colleague David Garcia) on the ethology and ecology of vultures, especially on Lammergeiers. Manu brought with him more than 200 pounds of meat collected from local farms. We drove to the car park and walked up the hill towards the feeding point. Manu's helper and visitors centre manager Teresa also brought a few hen eggs, an Egyptian Vulture's favourite food (they break the eggs using a small rock held with their beaks and hammering till eggs split apart!).

After walking about 500 metres from the car park, we were allocated strategically around the limestone steep hill and waited. Over 250 Griffon Vultures landed on the carcasses straight away, while six Egyptian and three Bearded Vultures (Lammergeiers) soared above them waiting for their turn. Some Red Kites were vagrants which didn't miss the opportunity to grab some bits too. An Egyptian Vulture was very keen on the eggs but he was not confident enough to show us his peculiar way of breaking them. After this spectacular wildlife show, we walked down to the visitors centre and finally we were invited to the FAB's interpretation centre in order to see the fantastic results of their hard work through years of effort and also to see a slideshow of their amazing collection of images recorded by a remote camera located in the site where the vultures are watched from...amazing! We had our picnic lunch at the hamlet's mirador which overlooks the vulture's feeding station, with our telescopes pointing at the site where two Lammergeiers were still around the leftovers. We had wonderful telescope views of these wonderful birds, handsome vultures indeed!

The sun was hitting hard as we finished our delicious picnic lunch and it became very slow birding-wise. We left the hamlet of Santa Cilia behind, heading to a local bar in order to enjoy some cold drinks, which certainly helped a lot! After this refreshing stop, the afternoon's temperature increased, so we decided to drive back making a couple of stops by the River Alcanadre where we saw a few interesting birds such as Sardinian Warbler, Corn Buntings, Nightingale, Melodious Warbler and plenty of Goldfinches. We drove back to our hotel to get ready for the species checklist, food and bed!

# Day 4

# **Thursday 8th May**

#### River Vero - Colungo - Lecina

After breakfast, we drove up out of Alquezar towards the village of Colungo heading north, making a stop by the old Moorish bridge were we had a good stroll around the River Vero - this produced fantastic views of Golden Oriole, Woodchat Shrike, Corn Bunting and very interesting flowers and butterflies. We continued our drive towards the point known as La Palomera, stopping by the bridge where we found plentiful of *Saxifrage longifolia*, and interesting birds such as Linnets and wild Rock Doves. We continued through Las Gargantas making a stop on the top of the pass. A few interesting birds such as Firecrest and Spectacle Warbler were spotted here. We then drove for a few minutes to the main mirador of El Brranco, on the same route of the River Vero. Many Griffon Vultures were seen as well as Alpine and European Swifts, Crag and House Martins, Egyptian Vulture, and a very elusive Peregrine Falcon.

Lunch time was around the corner so we drove to the beautiful village of Lecina where we enjoyed lunch in the main square of the village, followed by a walk into the oak woodland above the village which produced a few birds' species such as Short-toed Treecreeper, Firecrest, Booted Eagle and singing Golden Orioles and Eurasian Cuckoo. Some nice wildflowers were also found along this walk. The heat was hitting the area so we started to head back to Alquezar, making a quick stop to get a lovely Crested Tit, the icing on the cake of a lovely day! Once in Alquezar, we got ready for the usual nibbles and drinks, followed by a well deserved supper at Casa Gervasio restaurant.

Day 5 Friday 9th May

#### Alquezar – Monte Aragon Castle – Nocito

We woke to another sunny morning in the village of Alquezar before starting our journey to the northern slope of the Sierra de Guara based at the hamlet of Nocito. We had a few stops to make on the way with Monte Aragon Castle the most relevant of the day. Located just thirty-five minutes from Alquezar on the outskirts of Huesca, the castle is highly vulnerable to erosion. We stopped at the base of the narrow road which leads to the castle in order to take some photos of the highly contrasted landscape, and also to look for some wildlife, especially at the base where we start our walk up to the castle itself. A great variety of species was seen here, such as Black-eared, Northern and Black Wheatears, Thekla and Crested Larks, European Bee-eaters, Rock Sparrows, Corn Bunting, European Bee-eaters and Eurasian Hoopoe. We also saw a pair of Egyptian Vultures and several Black Kites flying around, with some Griffon Vultures soaring in the background. After reaching the top of the hill where the castle lies, we walked back down to the vehicles and continued towards the northern slope of Sierra de Guara making a lunch stop on the way. We had a short walk once we reached the heart of the Sierra from the northern slope. A few interesting species were found here, such as Red-backed Shrike, Stonechat, Eurasian Cuckoo, and several flowers including lots of orchids. Our final stop was made at 1,000 metres and above the village of Nocito where our mountain hostel was waiting for us; but before checking in, we enjoyed refreshing drinks at the village bars while our host, Mari, kindly allocated us our cosy rooms! We took a break and some of us a short stroll around the village before we gathered together in the bar next door, where we did our checklist over some drinks, followed by a nice supper! Some of us went for a night walk around the village after dinner, which paid off with fantastic close views of Eurasian Scops Owl...wonderful!

# Day 6

# Saturday 10th May

#### Nocito to Used

Today, we managed to take an early pre-breakfast walk around the village, attracted by the beautiful landscapes and the 'garden' birds accompanied by a glorious sunny morning! We walked by the river track finding nice species such as Short-toed Treecreeper, Eurasian Nuthatch, Great Spotted and Green Woodpeckers, Coal Tit, and heard a singing Golden Oriole. We enjoyed wonderful views of Garden Warbler, Crested Tit and Eurasian Wryneck. We walked back to our lodge for breakfast.

After that, we drove to a point near to the Monastery of San Urbez were we left our vehicles and walked along the track that leads to the village of Bara, overlooking the Tozal de Guara. We saw beautiful birds here such as Golden Oriole, a pair of Red-backed Shrikes, White Wagtail, Black Redstart, Corn Bunting, Short-toed Treecreeper, Firecrest, Orphean Warbler, Common Whitethroat, Western Bonelli's Warbler, Iberian Green Woodpecker and others were also seen. A highlight of the morning was the stunning view of a single Booted Eagle soaring in the blue sky whilst a pair of Common Buzzards chased it away; and also, a pair of Short-toed Eagles.

We then arrived at the village of Used where we enjoyed our picnic lunch in the grounds of this partially abandoned hamlet, admiring the buildings which were left behind back in the late 1950's. We saw a few other birds such as Hoopoe, Chiffchaff, Serin, Firecrest, and Nuthatch nesting in the tree under which we were having our lunch! After our picnic meal, we continued our exploration along the road alongside a pine woodland where we saw Short-toed Treecreeper, Marsh Tit, Coal Tit, Pied Flycatcher, amongst others. As the bird activity slowed down, we drove back to Nocito in the late afternoon where we had a drink at the local bar, followed by a delicious dinner!

# Day 7 Sunday 11th May

Nocito Pass - Bara (Biban Trail & River Alcanadre)

After breakfast, we checked the area above Nocito making a stop at the pass, where we saw many interesting species such as Rufous-tailed Rock Thrush, Crested Tit, Red Crossbill and Wood Lark. We then drove towards the hamlet of Bara to walk along the River Alcanadre where many birds such as Stonechat, Red-backed Shrike, Short-toed Eagle, Tawny Pipit, Eurasian Hoopoe, Subalpine Warbler and other interesting wildlife were seen on the way. The bushy terrain produced butterflies and a variety of flowers, including orchids such as Early Purple, Fly and Burnt Tip, also some Dipcadi or Brown Bluebell, Ramonda mycondi, and many more! The walk led up to an area which produced fantastic views of the river basin from the top of the trail.

As lunch time was around the corner, we walked back towards Bara where we found a spot along the river to enjoy our picnic lunch. The activity became slow as the afternoon was hot, so we drove back towards Nocito, taking a detour towards the pass again, and on to the river. We had more great views of Eurasian Cuckoos, Rock Bunting, Serin, Booted Eagle, alongside many interesting flowers that Laura found for us. We drove back to Nocito in the late afternoon in order to relax and to get ready for our evening meal. Some of us went for a night walk in order to try to see European Nightjar – we heard one, but did not see it.

## Day 8

# **Monday 12th May**

#### Nocito – Belchite (El Planeron Reserve) – Zaragoza

After a leisurely breakfast we left the lovely Nocito and made our way towards the Zaragoza area. A diversion not far from the town took us to the upper River Ebro basin. Our first stop was made at the village of Jaulin where we had our picnic lunch just before going into Belchite. A few Skylark, Turtle Dove, Serin, and Crested Larks were seen here. We then continued towards Belchite going through the village of Fuendetodos, the birthplace of the famous Goya, and then to the arid area of El Planeron. We saw larks such as Calandra, Greater Short-toed and Lesser Short-toed Larks (but no signs of the elusive Dupont's), and had great views of Montague's Harrier, Black Kite, White Stork, Iberian Grey Shrike, Woodchat Shrike, Marsh Harrier, amongst others. We also found a bank where plenty of European Bee-eaters were nesting. Later in the afternoon we made our way towards Zaragoza airport in order to catch our flight back to the UK.

It was a very nice holiday indeed around this fantastic part of north-eastern Spain, and I enjoyed sharing it with a great group of keen nature lovers!
