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## Day 1

Wednesday 21st March

Weather: Fine Warm and sunny with a breeze.

Eight tour group members met with Paul at Malaga airport, having arrived on flights from several UK airports. We made our way from the arrivals hall to the multi-storey car park, where our minibus was waiting. Leaving the airport, we drove toward Campillos, passing extensive Olive groves and Citrus plantations as we went. After a brief stop for refreshments, we turned off the main Ronda road towards Teba, in order to make a stop at the Tajo del Molino Gorge. Common House Martin and Eurasian Crag Martin were our first sightings, but we also added Blue Rock Thrush, Corn Bunting, Eurasian Blackcap and Grey Wagtail. Although the ground was very dry, we did find some plants, including *Asphodelus fistulosa* (Small Asphodel), *Ophrys fusca* (Sombre Bee Orchid), *Asphodelus albus* (White Asphodel) and *Antirrhinum graniticum*. Large White and Spanish Festoon butterflies were also seen, together with European Pond Terrapin. Iberian Water Frog could also be heard calling. From here, we drove south towards Ronda, to the Finca la Guzman, where we were met by Peter, our host, who, having settled us in our rooms, provided pots of tea and coffee to refresh us. After freshening up, we met on the patio for sherry and nibbles, before heading off for dinner at a local 'venta', Venta La Codorniz..

## Day 2

Thursday 22nd March

Weather: Fine, hot and sunny

After a superb breakfast, we drove down to Ronda, and out on the Seville road to the village of Grazalema. As we drove, we recorded Corn Bunting, Swallow and Crested Lark. On the cliff faces just outside the town, Red-billed Choughs were seen. Driving into town, we parked by the National Park Visitors Centre, to which we made a short visit. The occasional Griffon Vulture drifted aimlessly over the town, and Goldfinches were chattering in the trees. The high town walls below the car park produced a fine display of *Saxifraga granulata* (Meadow Saxifrage).

Our morning walk was to be in the Sierra del Pinar. Along the path-side, as we set off, we found *Romulea bulbocodium* (a Sand Crocus), *Ophrys fusca* (Sombre Bee Orchid), and the young leaves of *Ptilostemon hispanicus* (a Thistle). The path rose through *Pinus pinaster* (Maritime Pine) forest, mixed with *Quercus* species (Oaks) and *Juniperus* species (Juniper).

Common Blue and Wall Brown butterflies were also recorded, together with *Psammodromus algirus* (Large Psammodromus Lizard). After about a kilometre and a half, we emerged from the forest onto an open saddle, with splendid views in all directions. Exploration of an area of broken limestone boulders, adjacent to the path, revealed *Narcissus assoanus* (Rush-leaved Jonquil) and the diminutive, yellow *Viola demetria*. On the northern side of the ridge, towards the Cerro de San Cristobel, we could clearly see one of only two relic population remnants of *Abies pinsapo* (Spanish Fir) forest.

After our descent, we took our picnic, before continuing on. Lesser Spotted Woodpecker and numerous Griffon Vultures were seen, as we ate. Our next stop of the day was at the 'Gargante Verde', with the specific purpose of visiting the largest nesting colony of Griffon Vultures in Europe. Many of these majestic birds were present and we were fortunate to see several sitting out in the open. Plants seen included *Ophrys tenthredinifera* (Sawfly Orchid), *Ulex parviflorus* (Small-flowered Gorse) and *Fedia cornucopiae* (Fedia). Black Redstarts, Sardinian Warbler and Crag Martin were also fairly numerous.

Our next port of call was a rough bank adjacent to the road to Les Mezas, where we found a good number of *Himantoglossum robertianum* (Giant Orchid), *Ophrys fusca* (Sombre Bee Orchid) and *Asphodelus aestivus* (Common Asphodel). Our last stop of the day was an arable margin near the town of Monte Corte. Here we found *Narcissus papyraceus* (Paper-white Daffodil), *Cerintho major var. purpurescens* (Greater Honeywort), *Adonis annua* (Pheasant's-eye) and *Lathyrus annuus* (Annual Pea). Corn Bunting was singing loudly and a Whinchat was seen close by. From here we set off back towards Ronda, returning to the Finca in time for dinner.

## Day 3

Friday 23rd March

Weather: Mostly fine, warm and sunny, with a cold wind in exposed places

Today we travelled in the opposite direction, towards the village of El Burgo. We stopped first at the 'Puerto del Viento' to seek out *Paeonia broteroi* (Peony), which was in bud, but not flowering. We found approximately ten plants, well protected from grazing goats by a number of bushes of *Quercus coccifera* (Kermes Oak). We also spotted a solitary Stonechat. A little further on, we stopped to see a rather good display *Iris planifolia* (Flat-leaved Iris), *Hornungia petraea* (Hutchinsia), *Veronica cymbalaria* (White Speedwell) and the endemic *Biscutella frutescens* (Perennial Buckler-mustard). Several Red-billed Chough, Chaffinch and Stonechat were also recorded.

Our next stop was at the Mirador del Guarda Forestal. Here we saw *Aristolochia baetica* (a Birthwort), *Quercus ilex* (Holm Oak) and *Hyacinthoides hispanicus* (Spanish Bluebell). Crag Martins, Great Tit and Peregrine were seen and also a Red Admiral. Continuing on to El Burgo, and on towards Ardales, we took the road along the eastern shore of the Embalse del Conde de Guadalhorce Lake. Our objective was the 'Mirador' where three lakes meet. An exploration the *Pinus halepensis* (Aleppo Pine) woodland revealed how parched the area was, with no sign of many of the species we have come to know here. We did, however, find evidence of the splendid *Narcissus cantabricus* (White Hooped-petticoat Daffodil), but it was past its best. *Rupicapra africana* and *Chaenorhinum villosum* were flowering sparsely, and only a single plant of *Fritillaria lusitanica* (Portuguese Fritillary) was seen. Birds seen here included Great Tit, Chaffinch and Great Crested Grebe.

After our picnic lunch, we made our way to El Chorro, through a spectacular gorge, to the café by the lake. Along the way we saw a good stand of *Acanthus mollis* (Bear's-breech). The area around the café and verges produced a good number of species. *Convolvulus althaeoides* (Mallow-leaved Bindweed), *Parietaria officinalis* (Large Pellitory-of-the-Wall), *Erodium malacoides* (Mallow-leaved Stork's-bill), *Adiantum capillus-veneris* (Maidenhair Fern), *Allium triquetrum* (Three-cornered Leek) and *Polygala rupestris* (Rock Milkwort) were all recorded. We also admired the geology of the gorge, together with the famous cliff-side Kings Walk, which hangs precariously to the gorge walls, one hundred and fifty feet, or so, above the water.

Our final stop, before making our way back to Ronda, was overlooking the Embalse del Conde de Gaudalhorce. Coot, Mallard and Great Crested Grebe were all that was on the water, and a mixed flock of Common House Martins and Swallows were feeding over it. *Moricandia moricandioides* (Moricandia), *Ophrys fusca* (Sombre Bee Orchid), *Lathyrus clymenum* and *Lathyrus cicera* were also added to the plant list.

## Day 4

## Saturday 24th March

Weather: Cloudy with light rain. Cold at altitude

After breakfast, we headed off in a south easterly direction and into the Sierra de las Nieves National Park. Our objective was the Los Quejigales recreation area, situated some ten kilometres from the main San Pedro road. The park road took us, initially, through *Quercus* (Oak) woodland and shrubby scrub below, then on up through a mixture of *Pinus halepensis* (Aleppo Pine) and *Pinus pinaster* (Maritime Pine) woodland, before emerging above the tree line into an exposed limestone area. It was in this latter habitat that we made our first stop to check out a colony of *Narcissus assoanus* (Rush-leaved Jonquil), which were at their peak. Here, we also found *Orchis olbiensis* (an Early Purple Orchid). Our next short stop was a site for *Narcissus bugei* (Long-spathed Daffodil) with *Helleborus foetidus* (Stinking Hellebore), *Prunus prostratus* (Prostrate Plum), *Asplenium trichomanes* (Maidenhair Spleenwort) and *Viscum cruciatum* (Red-berried Mistletoe). There was quite a chill in the air, and this seemed to affect the bird population, which was conspicuous by its absence.

From here we continued on, passing a larger colony of *Narcissus bugei* (Long-spathed Daffodil), before stopping at the car park at Los Quejigales. After parking, we set off, taking the path towards the region's second relic population of *Abies pinsapo* (Spanish Fir), passing *Lonicera arborea* (Tree Honeysuckle) as we went, and climbing through more mixed Pine forest, on up the path. Great Tit, Coal Tit, Wren and Robin were present, and Great Spotted Woodpecker was heard in the distance. As we continued, the Pine began to thin out making way for shrubs such as *Ulex parviflorus* (Small-flowered Gorse), *Daphne gnidium* (Mediterranean Daphne) and *Daphne laureola* (Spurge Laurel). We also began to find young *Abies pinsapo*. It was not too long before we reached some of the more ancient and noble specimens. Growing below them we also found *Lavandula lanata* (Woolly Lavender), a local endemic. We also found a second large population of *Narcissus bugei* (Long-spathed Daffodil).

After our picnic lunch, we made our way into the Moorish influenced town of Ronda for the afternoon. Walking along the cliff edge walk we saw Crag Martin and Red-billed Chough, and we also had very good views of a pair of Blue Rock Thrushes and numerous Serins. *Ailanthus altissima* (Tree of Heaven), *Moricandia moricandioides* (Moricandia) and the emerging flowers of the endemic *Ornithogalum reverchonii* (a Star of Bethlehem) were seen clinging to the cliff edge. After time for sight-seeing and a little shopping, we made our way back to base.

## Day 5

Sunday 25th March

Weather: Cloudy at first and at altitude, becoming warmer and brighter later

Leaving Finca de Guzman, we took the road towards Campillos. Crested Lark and Spotless Starlings were seen as we went. When we reached the small village of Teba, we turned east and stopped, once again, to explore the river gorge at Tajo del Molino. Sadly, from the plant perspective, there was little different to what we had seen on day one. However, in the gorge we saw Rock Doves and Red-billed Chough, and over the river, reasonable views of Kingfisher. Above our heads were a few Griffon Vultures and good numbers of House Martin and Swift, with the occasional Swallow. Moving on, we made our way towards Antequera, via Campillos, stopping to the west of the latter, where water has often stood in the past. Once again, due to the dry year, there was no water, but we did find Cattle Egrets, Corn Bunting and Crested Lark.

Passing through Antequera, we continued on to El Torcal, the highest point in the El Torcal de Antequera National Park. The access road was shrouded in low cloud, but we continued to the visitor centre car park. After a warming coffee and with thinning cloud, we began to explore the spectacular limestone outcrops and boulders. We immediately encountered a small group of female Spanish Ibex (*Capra pyrenaica subsp. hispanica*). *Sedum brevifolium* (Small-leaved Stonecrop) and *Ruscus aculeatus* (Butcher's Broom) were both present, and several Black Redstarts and Rock Buntings were also in evidence. We walked through part of one of the circular summit tracks, finding *Euphorbia characias subsp. characias* (Mediterranean Spurge) and the emerging flowers of the beautiful *Linaria anticaria* (a Toadflax), a local endemic, and *Ophrys tenthredinifera* (Sawfly Orchid). We now returned to the vehicle, in order to make our descent, making a short stop to see the rare, *Iris subbiflora*.

After taking our picnic in a quiet, but blustery spot, we continued in a north-westerly direction, making a stop at the La Reserva Natural Laguna Dulce Lake. Many species of waterfowl and some waders were seen here, including Coot, Gadwall, Red-crested and Common Pochard, Black-winged Stilt, Greater Flamingo, Great Crested Grebe, Little Grebe, Black-necked Grebe and White-headed Duck. A pair of Marsh Harriers was also seen hunting in the reeds on the east side of the lake. We now returned to base for supper.

## Day 6

Monday 26th March

Weather: Fine warm and sunny, with a strong, gusty wind

After breakfast, we again left the hotel and drove down towards Ronda, before taking the Seville road, turning off towards Benaolan and Montejaque. Our objective was the famous Cueva de la Pileta. This cave is the only site where you can still see original wall paintings, some of which are thought to be around 30,000 years old! We arrived in good time for the first scheduled excursion, and while we were waiting to start, we found *Jasminum fruticans* (Wild Jasmine), *Anogramma leptophylla* (Jersey Fern) and *Centaurea pullata* (a Knapweed).

After our visit, we moved on to the small town of Montejaque, making our way up to the 'Hidden Valley' in the Sierra de Montalata, where we parked. Stonechat, Rock Bunting and Griffon Vulture were seen. The first cliff we stopped at produced endemic *Saxifraga bourgaeana* (a Saxifrage) and *Ornithogalum reverchonii* (a Star of Bethlehem). Continuing up the valley, we recorded Black Wheatear, Black-eared Wheatear, Linnets and Stonechat, before parking at the head of the valley.

We set off for a walk into the valley. *Orchis olbiensis* (an Early Purple Orchid) and *Narcissus cuatrecasasii* (Rock Jonquil) were seen. It was a good afternoon for butterflies, with Western Dappled White, Large Tortoiseshell, Wall Brown, Brimstone, Small Heath and Cleopatra. The birds included Red-billed Chough and Robin, both heard, and Great Tit. Everywhere there were the emerging buds of *Paeonia broteroi* (Peony), but unfortunately, none were yet fully in flower. We also found good numbers of *Romulea bulbocodium* (a Sand Crocus) and *Orchis italica* (Naked Man Orchid).

Leaving the Hidden Valley, we sent off north from the village of Montejaque, stopping by a failed hydro dam system. Here we saw Griffon Vultures and Red-billed Chough. Plants included *Ranunculus spicatus subsp. blepharicarpos* (Rock Buttercup), *Linaria aeruginea* (a Toadflax), *Saxifraga granulata* (Meadow Saxifrage) and *Vinca difformis* (Periwinkle). A second stop on the roadside at Cerro Tavizna, in an area of scrubby shrubs and arable fields, produced emerging spikes of *Himantoglossum robertianum* (Giant orchid), and a few a number of spikes of *Narcissus fernandesii* (a Daffodil). Sardinian Warbler and Corn Bunting we also heard, before it was time to return to base for dinner.

## Day 7

Tuesday 27th March

Weather: Fine, warm and sunny with a strong wind

Following a leisurely breakfast, we set off in the direction of Ronda, joining the Seville road, again turning off towards Grazalema, and stopping briefly by the roadside to the east of the town to see *Quercus faginea* (Beech-leaved Oak), *Cistus ladanifer* (Gum Cistus) and a tiny plant of *Cephalanthera longifolia* (Sword-leaved Helleborine). Next we made a brief stop on the road to Villaleuaga to admire an extensive colony of *Narcissus fernandesii* (a Daffodil), which was coming to the end of its flowering period.

Moving on, we parked below the cliffs just outside the village of Grazalema, where we set off to explore the cliffs and boulder-strewn fields and roadsides. *Osyris alba* (Osyris), *Narcissus papyraceus* (Paper-white Daffodil), *Scrophularia sambucifolia* (Elder-leaved Figwort) and *Ophrys tenthredinifera* (Sawfly Orchid) were all seen, together with Spanish Festoon, Common Blue and Provence Hairstreak butterflies. Birds included Blue Rock Thrush, Rock Bunting, Red-billed Chough and a pair of sitting Griffon Vulture.

We now moved on through the village, and north, stopping to have a picnic at the Mirador de Los Acebuches. *Fritillaria lusitanica* (Portuguese Fritillary), *Astragalus lusitanicus* and *Gagea foliosus* (a Yellow Star of Bethlehem) were seen as well as *Psammotromus algerus* (Large Psammotromus Lizard) and a *Buthus occitanicus* (Scorpion). We then continued on towards Zahara de la Sierra. Parking at the top of the town, we walked back towards the centre, recording *Linaria platycalyx* (a Toadflax), *Centranthus calcitrapa* (Annual Valerian) and *Rupicapnos africana*, before stopping for refreshments. As we enjoyed our drinks and the afternoon sun, Jackdaws and Red-billed Chough kept us entertained circling overhead, calling. As we were leaving the village, we stopped at a low cliff face with *Mucizonia hispida* (Mucizonia), *Hyoscyamus albus* (White Henbane) and *Campanula mollis* (a Bellflower).

Our final stop was to explore the banks of the Embalse de Zahara-El Gastor, where we began to examine the ancient Olive groves. Thekla Lark, Crested Lark, Grey Heron and Whinchat were all evident. Among the plants recorded were *Ophrys speculum* (Mirror Orchid), *Arisarum vulgare* (Friar's Cowl), *Himantoglossum robertianum* (Giant Orchid) and *Ophrys lutea* (Yellow Bee Orchid). We returned to Ronda in time to pack before dinner.

## Day 8

Wednesday 28th March

Weather: Cloudy at first, becoming warm, dry and sunny

After we had said our farewells to Peter and thanked him for a wonderful stay in this beautiful area, we set off for Malaga airport in good time for our flight back to the UK.
