



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Day 1

Thursday 3rd June

Stansted – Santander – Cordovilla de Aguilar

The group left the UK and it was a beautiful day as the group arrived on time into Santander. We immediately started driving towards Aguilar de Campoo. Parts of the road were misty and with some drizzle, but it became bright and clear near Aguilar. The town has an aromatic vanilla flavour in the air, as the town is very famous for producing the well-known vanilla tea biscuits! About 3 miles away from Aguilar, the small village of Cordovilla was our destination. Here, Tino and Rosa were waiting to give us a very warm welcome to their lovely 'casas rurales'. Surrounded by an old stone wall, the three Spanish style cottages provide terrific individual accommodation. Tino and Rosa live half mile away and they bring a large heatproof container about the size of a fridge with all the hot courses in it for supper. After we finished a delicious meal, washed down with several bottles of great local wine, we retired ready to go out birding the next day.

Day 2

Friday 4th June

Cordovilla de Aguilar and El Canal

After a restful night, we all gathered together in the main cottage to enjoy several hot cups of tea and coffee along with a good breakfast. We started the day at 8am, mainly walking the small tracks around the village, looking for birds and butterflies. The morning was fantastic, bright and sunny with a light mist covering the fields for the first 30 minutes. Soon, the bird flocks started to move around us and we got fantastic views of Meadow Pipits, Yellowhammers and many Pied Flycatchers. One of the fields was full of Corn Buntings, Mistle Thrushes and more Pied Flycatcher; some of these were moulting adult males, with no black on their heads. Marsh Harriers were soaring near the fields too, a pair displaying with each other. Near noon, the sunny day was perfect for Griffon Vultures flying not far from us.

We came back to our lodge in order to take our picnic lunch in the lush garden, enjoying the sun and the fresh breeze. We spent the rest of the afternoon around Aguilar de Campoo walking on part of the old train track which takes you back to Cordovilla. Back in the cottages, we enjoyed nibbles and drinks before another delightful local supper prepared by Rosa.

Day 3

Saturday 5 June

Fuentes Carrionas National Park (Baruelo area)

After an early start, we moved into our vehicles in order to start our third day of activities in the hills and huge outcrops north of Cordovilla, at Branosera, 1,500 metres above the sea level. The forest was outstanding and we were gladly surprised to see lots of mixed flocks of birds, dominated by Nuthatches, Chiffchaffs, Short-toed Treecreeper, Coal, Great, Long-tailed and Blue Tits, Honey Buzzard, Booted Eagle and a very nice Short-toed Treecreeper beautifully perched on the top of a snag. We also heard a very shy Middle Spotted Woodpecker, one of our trip's targets, but after responding to the tape initially, he just didn't turn up for us. Tino pointed out foot tracks of Brown Bear, freshly printed on the trail and very distinctive; also some Iberian Wolf tracks, as well as Beech Martin and Badger droppings, and a dead Mole (Iberian race.....) that I found along the track.

We walked back to our vehicles and continued driving even higher. Suddenly, two pairs of Short-toed Eagles made us jump off the 4x4's in order to see them better - one of them was being chased by a Carrion Crow. Also at this site Whitethroat, Griffon Vulture and Garden Warbler were seen, as well as a female Red Deer on top of the mountain. We continued much higher in altitude (1,850 m.a.s.l.) arriving at lush meadows from which we overlooked the beautiful Montana Palentina and its three enigmatic peaks (Curavacas, Espiguete and Puntaprieta). A single Woodlark was seen at one of the meadows just before we parked. We also saw many endemic flowers such as *Viola palentina* and beautiful birds like Ortolan Bunting, Whinchat, Tawny Pipit and Stonechat. We finished the afternoon and went back to the point where we started and headed into Cordovilla for a well deserved break and to enjoy another fantastic dinner.

Day 4

Sunday 6th June

Rebolledo de la Torre area

We started with a very chilly morning, so fleeces and coats were really needed this morning for the very first time! We drove further south to Cordovilla de Aguillar, and even into the province of Burgos in order to explore the 'cortados' (cliffs or crags) of the Rebolledo area. After a 35 minute drive, and the weather conditions looking windy, we parked our cars in a narrow track and climbed a small hill which overlooked the south face of the cortados. Soon, Tino pointed our scopes to a Golden Eagle nest, so we kept scanning until we got this beautiful Golden Eagle perched on the top. Another one was soaring just above the cliff amongst five Griffon Vultures. Some other birds seen here were Common Cuckoo, Red-billed Chough, European Jay, and Skylark, amongst others. This particular hill also offered a great variety of new orchids for our trip.

Continuing our morning, we made another two stops which produced more birds such as Hen Harrier, Woodlark, Yellowhammer, Cirl Bunting, Stonechat, Melodious Warbler, Corn Bunting, Booted Eagle, Egyptian Vulture, Tawny and Tree Pipits, Serin, and more. We then decided to take a break having some refreshments in one of the roadside cafes of the area. After this, we headed into the village itself of Rebolledo, where we had a pre-lunch walk, including a quick look at its church (one of the oldest Romanic churches of the area). After lunch, we drove to the abandoned village of Celada de Robledo where we managed to see a Golden Eagle in its nest, a Melodious Warbler, and a beautiful Firecrest. We also had fantastic views of a lovely male Hen Harrier literally soaring by our vehicles, on our way back to Cordovilla! Once at the 'casas rurales', we enjoyed some drinks and another delicious supper!

Day 5

Monday 7th June

Fuentes Carrionas National Park (Horca de Lores)

After some coffee, fruit, cheese and tea, some of us enjoyed the early morning breakfast at our cottages, waiting for Tino and Tono in order to make our 07.00 departure time. The day looked promising weather-wise as we drove through the village of Cervera de Pisuerga, collecting some fresh bread for our picnic lunch later on. At 8am we drove approximately 25 minutes to the small village of Sra. De la Pena Lraba, and from then into the Fuentes Carrionas National Park. Once surrounded by lush fresh green and flower-carpeted meadows, we drove through rough terrain and onto Horca de Lores area, right in the heart of the pristine natural park.

The landscape was unique and as soon as we reached the 1,800 metres (and up to 1,900 metres!), two of the main Montana Palentina's peaks were at eye level. Yes, the Cuaravacas (2,520m) and the Pena Prieta (2,600m) displayed a magical landscape, followed by gorgeous valleys across the horizon. The impressive Picos de Europa were beautifully located right behind the Palentinan mountains like a landscape painting. Hen Harriers, Griffon Vultures, Rock Buntings, Yellowhammers, Stonechats, Meadow and Tree Pipits, Red Rock Thrush, Northern Wheatear, Red-backed Shrike, Red Deer and Chamois (seen by two participants only), and some endemic flora, were seen as we meandered along these fairytale landscapes.

After we enjoyed our picnic lunch and a tranquil break up in the mountains, we started to drive down towards the village of San Salvador in order to enjoy some refreshments and continued our way back to the cottages, where Booted and short-toed Eagles, Common Buzzard, Southern Grey Shrike, Crested Lark, common Kestrel and another Hen Harrier were seen. After enjoying our pre-supper drinks, we enjoyed of another of Rosa's delicious dinners!

Day 6

Tuesday 8th June

Laguna de la Nava

After an early start, we drove about 70km south towards Palencia and got to Las Navas. We were surrounded by lush fields, plains and marshes and a nice Montagu's Harrier welcomed us to this new habitat. Many conspicuous Great Reed Warblers, Reed Warblers, Cetti's Warblers and Spanish Yellow Wagtails were seen during our first stop by an old bridge. We continued passing through the village of Fuentes de la Nava in order to see beautiful European Bee-eaters, Common Cuckoo, a legendary White Stork with two chicks in the nest, Great Spotted Woodpecker, and Linnet, amongst others. We then drove into the western side of the marshes where Tree Sparrow, Marsh Harrier, Black-winged Stilt, lots of Spanish Yellow Warblers, Great-crested and Least Grebes, Common Sandpiper, and an elusive Fan-tailed Warblers (*Zitting Cisticola*) were seen partially displaying near the hedges of the marshes. Purple Herons were also seen, more Marsh Harriers, Mallards, Cuckoos and an unexpected Grasshopper Warbler were seen at the eastern side. We ended up having our 'picnic' lunch in the third floor of the visitors centre's building, from where we could see Cattle Egrets, Purple Heron, Short-toed Eagle, Black Kite, and more!

After our 'usual' coffee stop in one of the surrounded village (Frechilla), we drove to the cathedral of village of Mazarriegos, a good place for Lesser Kestrels. At the other end of the plains, to the opposite side of the marshes, is usually a good place to see Great Bustards. We were scanning the fields intensively, but there were no signs of these fantastic birds yet.

However as soon as we drove towards the site, six were seen quietly sitting in one of the alfalfa fields, not far from the road. We managed to stick up our scopes and admire several of the 48 elegant males, and some of them were exercising their displaying skills. We enjoyed looking at them for a while until they gradually moved away to the next field. As the mission to look for Great Bustards was successfully accomplished, we spent time finding other interesting birds like Calandra Larks, Hoopoe, Bee-eaters, more Lesser Kestrels, Hen and Montague's Harriers, amongst others. We drove back to Cordovilla to enjoy a relaxing evening and another superb dinner.

Day 7

Wednesday 9th June

Bosque de Aguilar & Aguilar de Campoo

Our plans were spoiled as we tried to go out very early in the morning in order to see Iberian Wolf – and perhaps, if lucky even Brown Bear – but the rain and the fog across the mountains were very heavy and thick. The only clear thing today was that we were not able to go out. We stayed and had breakfast by 8am and then we set off to Bosque de Aguilar, a pine forest area located on the eastern outskirts of Aguilar de Campoo. As the bad weather remained, we just managed to see some common things such as Eurasian Treecreeper, Serin, Chaffinch, Coal Tit, and Red Squirrel. Many displaying Skylarks, Stonechat, Linnets, Northern Wheatear, White Wagtail, Stonechat, and a beautiful Roe Deer were seen around here too.

Continuing cross country, we drove into the village of Cillamayor in order to get some fresh bread from the local bakery. As we were out of the vehicles, the unmistakable voice of a gorgeous Golden Oriole sounded loud, and close...and we decided to go for it, why not! The cheeky beauty flew across the area leaving us empty handed with no sightings. We chased around the whole village, but he had mysteriously hidden somewhere. We decided to give it another go around the village where Tino and Rosa live, Villavega, located just 1 km away from where we were. We started exploring a nice flat meadow near the river when an unexpected Great Spotted Cuckoo emerged from a bush, seen just by myself and another participant; then he just vanished...what a pity!! We kept looking for them (Golden Oriole and Great Spotted Cuckoo) but instead we had some nice views of a Woodchat Shrike perched on some bushes at the other side of the river, a very rare bird in this area. A Great Spotted Woodpecker was also seen along here, whilst a very vocal Wryneck was moving around nearby. But surprises did not finish yet as a mega rarity in the area, the gorgeous Red-footed Falcon, was seen around the trees and perched in a pylon nearby. Then, two Golden Orioles started to sing again, and Tino and I carefully tried to locate them amongst the dense birch trees, and finally found them nesting. A female Golden Oriole was quiet and comfortably sat in its nest, great views of this lovely bird!

As heavy rain came along, we jumped into our vehicles and drove through the Aguilar forest, stopping by the town's dam and looking for Crag Martins along the bridge. We found some shelter to set up our picnic lunch and after that, we drove into Aguilar de Campoo for a leisurely (shopping!) afternoon. We returned to 'Las Casas Rurales' to enjoy a delicious early supper as we planned to go for a dusk walk afterwards. As the rain persisted longer than we thought, we stayed indoors enjoying Tino's local wildlife slide show instead.

Day 8

Thursday 10th June

We started very early on this our last morning, planning to go out, but the rain spoiled our plans once again.

We drove in to Aguilar de Campoo in order to enjoy a very typical breakfast – the delicious and traditional churros and hot chocolate! We then came back to the cottages to pack up and get ready for our journey to the airport.

We decided to make the rest of the morning more productive visiting the caves of Altamira and Santillana del Mar, where we enjoyed our last picnic before making our way to Santander airport in time to catch the flight back to the UK.
