# Summary

The superb mountains of northern Castilla y Leon hosted another enjoyable Iberian Wolf trip once again. The weather was at times great, and at others a bit adverse, yet it was great to see some good quality wildlife whilst exploring different areas as we moved through breathtaking remote landscapes in our powerful 4x4 vehicles. We very much enjoyed our wildlife moments throughout the trip, alongside the dramatic landscapes, local villages, native people and the local gastronomy, especially the fine cuisine of Rosa, plus the drinks, especially at our comfy main house where local wines and beer were tasted!

### Day 1

# **Thursday 27th September**

Stansted airport to Santander - Cordovilla de Aguilar

The group's flight to Asturias airport arrived on time and, after going through security, we reassembled the group at the exit gate from where we walked out to meet up with Tino and Toño who were already waiting for us in their 4x4 in order to take us to the tiny village of Cordovilla de Aguilar in the province of Palencia, north of Castilla y Leon. The driving was done on a clear and full-of-stars evening. Once in Cordovilla de Aguilar, we settled in our comfy and cosy rooms in order to have a restful night.

# Day 2

# Friday 28th September

Resoba – Cervera de Pisuerga – Rabanal – Perapertu

A dawn start was made to visit our first hotspot known as El Cebollar, right above the village of Resoba, in the park of Montaña Palentina Natural Park. The morning looked promising and the dawn was beautiful, with a gorgeous blue sky; it was a bit chilly but not as cold as we were expecting. We sat quietly on top of the mountain overlooking the mountain of Monte del Obispo, its tops catching the first sunbeams of the very early morning. Numerous groups of Red Deer were spotted grazing along the steep hillsides; some handsome stags were still rutting. A few Griffon Vultures were seen perched on the rocks waiting for some good thermals to help them fly; the calls of Dunnocks, Woodlarks and Dartford Warblers were dominant in the area. They reminded us that a comfort break was needed after the effort of the early cold morning, so we drove to the little town of Cervera de Pisuerga in order to enjoy of a very nice coffee break.

After this, we hit the road again towards the upper basin of the river Pisuerga, towards the hamlet of Rabanal. Here we were scanning for Wildcats, finding Iberian Grey Shrike, Red-backed Shrike and Stonechat, amongst others, instead. We continued ups the track where we found fresh Iberian Wolf tracks and droppings. We eventually found a lovely lunch spot right above of the village of Redondo where we enjoyed our first picnic lunch.

After lunch, we took a stroll along the tracks, before starting our drive towards Cordovilla de Aguilar. We followed the track through Herreruela de Castilleria, where we found the first female European Wildcat hunting in one of the meadows nearby. We had great views of the feline from our vehicles, enough time to look though the stunning details of this lovely species. Further along the road and driving into the hamlet of San Felices, a second European Wildcat, male, was found, and we had great views of this individual too!

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Happy with the results of our very first day in the field, we returned to our accommodation in order to take a break, followed by the joy of Rosa's delicious dinner together with tasty wine.

# Day 3

# Saturday 29th September

#### Cortes Valle

It was a chilly but clear morning, with a gorgeous sky, full of stars! We drove for around 50 minutes in order to get to the valley of Cortes where we quietly found a spot in order to scan the valley in front of us. We had great views of Red Deer rooting and a very helpful Red Fox that was keen on getting rid of a cow's placenta. All of a sudden, a young Cantabrian Brown Bear turned up in one of the ravines, giving us great views through the telescope but, sadly, not for long. The morning was going by and there was no sign of Iberian Wolves, although we had been scanning for them very patiently. We made a move afterwards by following the track of the valley on foot, where we saw interesting birdlife such as Common Kestrel, Rock Bunting, Griffon Vultures, Northern Wheatear, European Stonechat and Mistle Thrush, amongst others.

We then drove further afield, right to the top of the valley which gave us amazing and breathtaking views of the north-eastern slope of the Cantabrian Mountains including the mighty Picos de Europa! We were astonished by the gorgeous landscape, so we decided to have lunch in the spot to enhance the enjoyment. A pair of Golden Eagles turned up too! After lunch, a walk was taken down the track which produced amazing views of a Short-toed Snake Eagle hovering above us, an ideal spot to see details of its amazing head size and eyes!

We then continued driving onto the main road finding another male European Wildcat hunting in one of the meadows. We carefully stop quietly to avoid disturbance and we had amazing footage of this wonderful feline hunting, probably rodents, which he did accurately and very effectively, allowing us to witness this great event of wildlife skill!

Very happy after this very productive stop, we headed back to the 'casas rurales' to take a break and to get ready for another delicious dinner after a brilliant day!

### Day 4

# **Sunday 30th September**

### Salcedillo – Brañosera woods

We left our base very early again to head to the point known as Salcedillo, where we scanned an area ruled by an eight-wolf pack. We scanned for a good couple of hours with no results other than Red Fox, Roe and Red Deer. After the scan, we drove to the village of Brañosera in order to have a coffee break followed by an exploration of its woodland, which produced more Red Deer, Crested, Long-tailed, Coal, Willow, Great and Blue Tits, Iberian Chiffchaff, Eurasian Nuthatch and Short-toed Treecreeper, amongst others. We eventually got to our lovely picnic spot where we enjoyed our food under a beautiful and pleasant sunshine while watching lots of Griffon Vultures flying nearby. After lunch, we continued exploring the upper area of the woodland which took us to walk amongst ancient oaks and hollies, a gorgeous woodland we all found fascinating walking through.

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By the late afternoon, we arrived in time to Cordovilla de Aguilar for the usual break and to enjoy our dinner which was delicious as usual! Rosa set the table and presented to us her last delicious menu cooked with local products from her family allotment, simply great!!

# Day 5 Monday 1st October

Salcedillo – Barruelo de Santullán – Cordovilla de Aguilar – Santander airport

We left Cordovilla de Aguilar very early and headed towards Salcedillo. The weather wasn't on our side, with dark clouds, windy, cold and at times, drizzle. We tried hard, but no results were achieved with Iberian Wolves, unfortunately. We then drove to the village of Barruelo de Santullán in order to have some coffee/brunch before heading back to our lodge in Cordovilla de Aguilar where we had a good hour to pack up our belongings and set off to Santander airport where we arrived in time to catch our flight back to the UK. We then said a massive "Hasta pronto" to Tino, Toño and Eva, wishing them all the best and thanking them for looking after us for these few days at Montaña Palentina.

This short break allowed us to learn more about the truly rural and wild Spain, visiting a well-hidden corner of this beautiful country; it is a corner where the magical wildlife is there for wildlife lovers who may have the fortune to see and appreciate the spectacular habitat and life of one of rare and difficult species of mammals; nevertheless, the most difficult species proved to be elusive to us this time: the always mysterious and yet beautiful Iberian Wolf!
