Day 1

Thursday 5th June

Stansted Airport – Zaragoza – Alfaro

We left Stansted under a fairly overcast sky, right in time, arriving to Zaragoza in the early afternoon. After dealing with the lengthy process of getting our minivans, we drove straight to the small town of Alfaro, where Hotel Palacios welcomed us warmly. After checking in, we went for a little stroll along the canal behind the bullring, which produced Nightingale, Cetti's Warbler, lots of European Serins, White Storks and a beautiful pair of Eurasian Orioles on the nest! Back at the hotel, we took a little break. then gathered again in the hotel's private cellar to get to know each other and to carry out our first wine tasting. We started with some of the great wines from Rioja Oriental produced by our hosts, Palacios Remondo.

After enjoying these delicious wines, we walked straight to the bar/dining area to enjoy our first dinner, which was washed down with yet more beautiful wines! We then retired to our rooms for a well-deserved night sleep.

Wines tasted Palacios-Remondo cellar:

- La Vendimia 2022: red (40% Garnacha / 60% Tempranillo)
- La Montesa 2021: red (95% Garnacha / 5% other red varieties)
- Montecierzo Lágrima de Merlot: rosé (100% Merlot)

Wines at dinner:

- Burgo Viejo 2022: red (50% Tempranillo / 50% Graciano)
- Burgo Viejo Blanco: white (100% Viura)

Day 2

Friday 6th June

Bardenas Reales Natural Reserve – Arguedas – Bodegas Ilurce

After an early breakfast, we drove out of Alfaro into Navarran territory, to explore the very interesting Bardenas Reales Natural Reserve. The early morning looked promising as gorgeous sunshine was already on us; our first stop was made right at the entrance of the park, which produced breathtaking views of the eroded landscapes and natural formations. We soon had great views of Thekla's and Crested Larks, Linnets, Little Owl, Iberian Grey Shrike, Marsh Harrier, Corn Bunting and others. Once inside the reserve, we made a stop at the Castil de Tierra, getting fantastic views of Western Black-eared Wheatear, Greater Short-toed Larks, Tawny Pipit, Dartford and Spectacled Warblers, and an Isabelline Wheatear, a rare vagrant in the area.

We also took a couple of walks during the morning. The first was right by a small marshland, which produced Marsh Harriers, Great Reed Warblers, more larks such as Greater Short-toed, Crested and Thekla's, and Red-legged Partridge. The second walk was made in the heart of the reserve and among beautiful scrubland, where birds such as Tawny Pipit, Dartford Warblers, Egyptian Vultures, Western Black-eared and Northern Wheatears, Griffon Vultures and Mediterranean Short-toed Larks were seen. As we left through one of the exits, a last stop before lunch was made by an old bridge, which produced fantastic views of Bee-eaters, Rock Sparrows and Iberian Grey Shrikes. Lunch was calling loudly, so we drove to the village of Arguedas where we enjoyed a delicious lunch!

After lunch, we drove towards Alfaro, making a stop nearby at Bodegas Ilurce for our second wine-tasting session of the tour. This has been a family business since 1940, and third-generation family member Inma welcomed us to the bodega and told us all about their business: the beginnings, the production, the facts and figures, and the beautiful wines! We tasted four varieties, which were very popular with the group.

Back at the hotel, we had a break followed by the checklist, drinks and dinner, which sealed a fantastic day!

- El Sueño de Amado Reserva 2019: red (100% Garnacha)

- Ciego del Rey 2022: red (50% Tempranillo / 50% Graciano)
- Inurrieta Orchidea: white (100% Sauvignon Blanc)

Day 3

Saturday 7th June

Ablitas – Sotos de Alfaro trail

After a very early breakfast, we left the hotel at dawn in order to be at our birding hotspot in the area of Ablitas at dawn. We arrived at first light, with the sun just rising over the horizon. Within some fifteen minutes of our arrival and with carfeul listening, Byron managed to locate at least three singing Dupont's Larks. We failed to locate the first two, but it was third time lucky: we found the wonderful male perched on the top of a rosemary bush, singing away, and we all had fantastic views of this rare lark! Lots of Hoopoes, Red-billed Choughs and very numerous Calandra Larks joined the choir of the early morning.

After this successful quest, we took a stroll along one of the tracks, finding lots of Calandra and Greater Short-toed Larks; suddenly, another Dupont's Lark called nearby, and started his display right in front of us. We watched a nearly ten-minute sequence of display and had terrific views as the bird perched on rocks and scrub not far from where we were: absolutely amazing!

After this wonderful moment, we drove towards the old quarry, where we took a stroll and saw Western Black-eared Wheatear, Turtle Doves, Rock Sparrows and a beautiful family group of Eurasian Eagle-Owls. We managed to have great views of one individual in the telescope; the other three proved more elusive. We also had fantastic views of two pairs of Lesser Kestrels, and a few groups of Pin-tailed Sandgrouse flying above our heads!

After a great morning, we called in at a café in the village for a coffee break, and drove back to Alfaro to have our lunch in a beautiful area by the River Ebro. After lunch and a well-deserved break, we took a good walk in the Sotos de Alfaro, a nice trail that goes along the Ebro. We had fantastic views of Cetti's Warbler, Spotted Flycatchers, Iberian Yellow Wagtail, Melodious Warbler, Zitting Cisticola, Cirl Bunting, lots of Sand Martins, Purple and Grey Herons and Great Egret.

We then drove back to the hotel for a break, drinks, checklist and dinner.

Day 4

Sunday 8th June

Pitillas Lake – Olite – Arbayún Gorge – Burgui

After an enjoyable and relaxing breakfast, we said goodbye to Alfaro and headed north towards the Navarran Pyrenees, our final destination. We planned three stops along the way; the first was forty minutes north of Alfaro in the area of Pitillas Lake. We enjoyed exploring the lake and surroundings, which produced fantastic views of Short-toed Snake Eagle, Montagu's Harrier, colonies of both Rock Sparrows and European Bee-eaters, Western Black-eared and Northern Wheatears, Corn Buntings and many others. We had our lunch at the lake's visitor's centre, watching waterbirds such as Great Crested, Black-necked and Little Grebes, Common Shelduck, Common Pochard, Northern Shoveler and others.

After lunch, we drove a short distance to have a good look of the beautiful village of Olite. After spending time in this unique medieval village, we continued our drive towards Burgui, making a quick final stop at the Foz de Arbayún. This beautiful spot offers amazing and dramatic views of the Salazar valley with its impressive crags and

rocky falls. We had plenty of Griffon Vultures, Crag Martins and Alpine Swifts, and a beautiful Blue Rock Thrush. After enjoying this fantastic site, we continued our journey, arriving to Burgui where a welcome from our hosts Favien and Zuberoa at our mountain hotel. We enjoyed a break, before gathering outside the hotel for cool drinks and local nibbles, the checklist and a delicious dinner at El Almadiero.

Day 5

Monday 9th June

Larra-Belagua Valley (Pyrénées Atlantique National Park)

After a relaxed breakfast, we drove straight north through the Roncal Valley, reaching the heights of the lush Larra-Belagua Valley. Our first stop was right at the top of the valley, where a viewpoint produced fantastic views of the surroundings and made us realise how high we were! Honey Buzzards, Tree Pipit and others were seen here. Our second stop was even higher and right at the treeline, where we had fantastic views of Citril Finch, Serins, Crossbill, Firecrest and a single Ring Ouzel. We continued driving higher, crossing the border into France and the Pyrénées Atlantique National Park, where a good walk produced great views of Alpine Choughs, Water Pipits, Northern Wheatear and others. We enjoyed our picnic lunch nearby, and watching a Short-toed Snake Eagle hovering.

The temperature increased as the early hours of the afternoon passed by; we decided to explore one of the ravines at the bottom of the Belagua Valley, which produced a pair of Egyptian Vultures flying really low, literally above our heads! We continued exploring towards the top of the track, and right up to the border with Aragón; here, scanning from a viewpoint, we managed to see a herd of Pyrenean Chamois grazing on the high-altitude meadows. We then checked a group of raptors soaring in the sky and right across an impressive rock face mountain: we found two Golden Eagles, plenty of Griffon Vultures, a pair of Egyptian Vultures, a Peregrine Falcon and a pair of Lammergeiers.

After an enjoyable if long day in the high tops of the Navarran (and French) Pyrenees, we started to drive back to our lodge, to take a break before gathering again for drinks, nibbles and the checklist ahead of dinner. As on every evening, an assortment of local wines was sent to us to be tasted with our delicious food!

Wines at dinner:

- Ochoa Eco 2023: red (40% Tempranillo / 25% Garnacha / 20% Merlot / 15% Graciano)
- Orchidea Cuvée: white (100% Sauvignon Blanc)

Day 6

Tuesday 10th June

Fago Gorge – Zuriza Valley – Las Coronas Mirador (viewpoint)

It was another beautiful morning in the gorgeous Burgui. The temperature felt a bit high at breakfast, but we managed to get out earlier to make the most of the morning. We drove east in order to explore Fago, a beautiful track and natural border between Navarra and Aragón. We took a two-hour walk along the southern access track and along the impressive gorge, which produced Western Subalpine Warbler, Griffon Vultures, Black Redstart, Garden Warbler, Red-billed Chough, and fantastic butterflies and wildflowers.

We then continued with our plan, driving up the valley and gaining some altitude, still along the border with the area of Zuriza. Here, we took a stroll in pristine beech woodland, followed by a picnic lunch. After lunch, the temperatures rose significantly, so we drove back to our lodge in Burgui for a break, before going out again in the late afternoon. We visited Las Coronas Pass, which produced Western Subalpine Warbler, Woodlark, Western Bonelli's Warbler and fantastic views of the Pyrenees.

After this, we drove back to our lodge for a break, our usual drinks in the village's plaza, the checklist and dinner.

- Pago de Cirsus: red (Cabernet Sauvignon / Syrah / Tempranillo)
- Principe de Viana 2024: white (100% Chardonnay)

Day 7

Wednesday 11th June

Arbayún Gorge – Lumbier Gorge – Bodegas Aristu – Burgui Gorge

We started our day with another great breakfast, then drove south and made our first stop at the impressive Foz de Arbayún. Here we had great views of Blue Rock Thrush, Rock Sparrow, Griffon Vultures, Firecrest, Black and Red Kites, Crag Martins and more. The views from this spot never disappoint! After enjoying the site, we kept driving south for another fifteen minutes to the Foz de Lumbier. Here, we took a nice walk along the River Salazar where it cut through impressive gorges, which produced lots of rock specialists such as Crag Martins, Rock Sparrows, Alpine Swifts, Blue Rock Thrush and 'proper' Rock Doves. Red-billed Choughs, Griffon and Egyptian Vultures were also seen very close, soaring and landing right in front of us: a great show! We also had our delicious picnic lunch here.

We then drove to the other side of the village, to visit Bodegas Aristu, hosted by Illbón, the third-generation of the winery's family. After welcoming us to the premises, he started his wine tour by showing us the vineyards,

which now produce 100% organic and natural wines! Once in the bodega, we tried a few of his best wines from 2024, and a beautiful signature wine he created in 2019 to honour his grandfather. We enjoyed his wines and the very different flavours they delivered, all accompanied by delicious local charcutería.

After enjoying our visit to this bodega, we drove straight back to Burgui for a break, followed by a short stroll on the path to Burgui's gorge, all along the River Esca. Back in our lodge, we got ourselves ready to enjoy our usual drinks and nibbles, checklist and a delicious dinner.

Day 8

Thursday 12th June

Burgui to Zaragoza airport

Our great week exploring different corners of Navarra and the surrounding areas was sadly coming to an end. Very happy with the great experiences we had had during the week, we enjoyed chatting about the events of the week over our usual delicious breakfast at El Almadiero. We then packed all our belongings up and said a big “see you soon!” to our hosts Fabien and Zuberoa, and thanked them for looking after us so well during the last few days in Navarra. We then said goodbye to four clients who were staying on in Spain, and wished them all the very best on their road trips.

We then started our very picturesque drive to Zaragoza airport, enjoying the fantastic views of the Pyrenean skyline, and the impressive Mallos de Riglos. After a smooth drive, we arrived at the airport with plenty of time to relax before our flight back to Stansted.

We had all truly enjoyed the week exploring some of the most beautiful corners of the Reyno de Navarra. We had had the chance to see fantastic birds, taste fantastic wines and to laugh: the group had established great harmony and camaraderie from day one! The wildlife and stunning landscapes had been fantastic, and the great wines we had tried during our tour had further enhanced our trip.

And this is a “see you soon” rather than a goodbye! We'll all cherish the best memories of the fantastic birds and other great forms of wildlife we managed to see, all blessed by the ancient wine 🍷. Salud Navarra...Salud España!!
