

The Best of Ethiopia

Naturetrek Tour Report

18 October - 5 November 2014

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Day 3

Monday 20th October

Early this morning, we took a cool walk in the hotel grounds and saw Spur-winged Geese and Sacred Ibis over the flooded entrance, a pair of exuberant Nubian Woodpeckers and many wonderful Greater Blue-eared Starlings. Over breakfast we were joined by a family of Black-billed Wood-Hoopoes.

At eight, we set off for the Blue Nile Falls, making many stops along the way to see our first grassland and open country birds. Here were displaying Yellow-crowned and Black-winged Red Bishops, Yellow-mantled Widowbirds and Bronze Mannikins. Two Saddle-billed Storks flew off in the distance and, as we reached a local dump, we were treated to many more storks – African Openbill, Woolly-necked, and trees decked with Marabous. Also here were Rüppell's, White-backed, Hooded and Egyptian Vultures, plenty of Yellow Wagtails and our first Tawny Eagle.

Late in the morning we made the hot walk to the very impressive Blue Nile Falls, stopping to admire Cinnamon-breasted Buntings, White-throated (Yellow-rumped) Seedeaters, Blue-breasted and Little Bee-eaters and a very handsome Long-crested Eagle. As we walked back we saw Banded Barbets in a tree by the footbridge, and a young male Peregrine in the gorge.

At our lunch stop, by Lake Tana, we saw Gull-billed and White-winged Terns, Great White Pelicans and a Nile Monitor while, in the afternoon (setting the tone for the adventure-filled days which lay ahead), we explored the lake by boat with our guide Abebe. First we visited the 800-year-old Entos Eyesu monastery, seeing our first Lemon Doves, and having excellent views of Speckled Pigeons (one of them bizarrely being courted by a Feral Pigeon) and Egyptian Fruit Bats. From here we went to the mouth of the Blue Nile, to be greeted by Hippos, Spur-winged Geese and Lapwings (in a spur-winged mixed flock), hundreds of White-winged Terns, several African Fish-Eagles and our first Pink-backed Pelican. Once again: spectacular!

Day 4

Tuesday 21st October

Our early morning walk today was quieter, though we did see a lovely pair of African Pygmy Geese and had superb views of Nubian Woodpecker, Copper Sunbird and a young Shikra.

After breakfast we set off across the Fogera Plateau, a rich agricultural area, chequered with fields of teff, millet and rice. At our first stop, in a wide open panorama of fields, Erlanger's Larks and a Red-breasted Wheatear trotted by the roadside and Common Cranes circled overhead. Here we also saw a glorious pair of Black Crowned Cranes, with a small group of Spur-winged Geese, a Western Marsh Harrier and our first Marsh Sandpiper. Our second stop was alive with wetland birds: Black-tailed Godwit, African Jacana, a pair of Fulvous Whistling-Ducks with their brood, and a Grey-headed Kingfisher. On a power-line here was our first Northern Carmine Bee-eater.

We had a delicious lunch at the Four Sisters restaurant in Gonder, before checking in to the Goha Hotel. In the afternoon we visited several cultural sites in the city, including Emperor Fasildas' castle and the Royal Baths. Here we added plenty of new birds to our list, including White-rumped Swift, Abyssinian Oriole, African Harrier-Hawk and Hemprich's Hornbill.

Day 5

Wednesday 22nd October

This morning's early walk was around the grounds of the Goha Hotel, where Tawny Eagles and Thick-billed Ravens competed to be the most tame and photogenic. Also here, we saw Black-headed Batis, Booted Eagle and, as we loaded up the bus to travel to the Simien Mountains, a Lammergeier.

The journey to the Simiens was fascinating and beautiful, and we made stops on the way to see African Stonechats, Yellow-crowned Canaries, Blue (Black) Saw-Wings, Nyanza Swifts, Moorland Chats (the first of many, many, many) and both Little and Blue Rock Thrushes.

Before we even reached the Simien Lodge, our base for three nights while we explored this dramatically beautiful park, we encountered our first Geladas by the roadside. Here was a bachelor group, right by the road, grazing peacefully until a large herd of male-led families came over the brow of the hill (like a scene from Zulu, we felt) and there were loud altercations. It was a truly impressive welcome to the Simiens, but in the afternoon things got far better still, as we spent two hours in the company of grazing Geladas. In splendid sunshine, each of us sat quietly amid these peaceful primates. Eventually we watched them go over the cliff to roost; also here we saw a pair of Verreaux's Eagles in the distance, and an equally distant pair of Ethiopian Klipspringers.

Day 6

Thursday 23rd October

Having splendidly met our goal of getting to know Geladas yesterday afternoon, today (after a cold early morning walk on which we saw Groundscraper Thrushes, Wattled Ibis and Streaky Seedeaters) we made the long drive to Chenek in search of the Walia Ibex. On arriving, after a dusty, bumpy journey, it took us a few seconds to see our first Walia. We spent the rest of the morning watching these striking animals, and delighting as Lammergeiers, Steppe Eagles, Tawny Eagles and Augur Buzzards flew low over our heads. At our picnic we were joined by a Yellow-billed Kite and a cheeky pair of Thick-billed Ravens, and the grassland nearby was busy with the scampering of many Unstriped Grass-Rats.

After stopping on our drive back to see the rare Ankober Serin, it seemed rude not to spend the late afternoon in the company of our friends, the Geladas. With them, this afternoon, were Lappet-faced Vultures, White-rumped Babblers, Yellow-bellied Waxbills and Abyssinian Slaty Flycatchers.

Day 7

Friday 24th October

This morning's early walk was joined by singing Yellow-crowned Canaries, by Thekla Larks and by an Ethiopian Cisticola. Afterwards, we drove back towards Chenek, to visit the Sankaber forest. Here we watched Ethiopian Klipspringers, a female Menelik's Bushbuck, a White-billed Starling and a singing Abyssinian Catbird, among many other beautiful creatures.

We spent another peerless afternoon with our Geladas and finally, as the shadows lengthened, let them wander away to their cliff-side roosts, and out of our lives.

Day 8

Saturday 25th October

Our drive back to Gonder today was lined with Dusky Turtle Doves and Speckled Pigeons. As we left the park, we saw a first year Pallid Harrier, and there were Lanners on several of the telegraph posts here. We stopped again for coffee in Debark (we had to, as we had forgotten to pay for coffee on our way in to the park), and said good-bye to the Lammergeiers of the Simiens, and hello once again to the many Hooded Vultures to be seen here.

Our return to the Goha Hotel was overseen by a family of African Grey Flycatchers and a singing Singing Cisticola (how confusing). Overhead drifted a Mountain Buzzard.

Day 9

Sunday 26th October

Early this morning we said good-bye to our wonderful driver Kinde, as he left us at Gonder airport for our flight back to Addis Ababa. Here we were met by Tsiroy, our equally wonderful driver for the whole southern section of the tour. Our drive to the Awash Falls Lodge began on the impressive new expressway, built recently with Chinese investment.

We had lunch at Nazret, watching an Eastern Olivaceous Warbler, an African Harrier-Hawk and our first Beautiful Sunbird as we did so. Late in the afternoon, we stopped by a lake close to Awash and met Gull-billed Terns, Marabouts and Nile Crocodiles.

We reached Awash in the evening, at the perfect time to watch a Lesser Kudu emerging shyly from the forest, and Yellow-necked Spurfowl going home to roost. An Ethiopian Hare scampered along the road in the dark, and some were lucky enough to see a Common Genet by the roadside.

Day 10

Monday 27th October

Awash! This is a splendid place for watching mammals and birds, and the species seen on our walks and drives this morning included: Red-backed, Woodchat and Northern White-crowned Shrikes, Pygmy Falcon, Kori Bustard, Northern Red-billed Hornbill, Yellow-breasted Barbet, Superb Starling and White-headed Buffalo-Weaver. In the thickets we watched beautiful Harar Dikdiks, while in the open grasslands we spent plenty of time watching magnificent Beisa Oryx and delicate Soemmering's Gazelles. Representing the reptiles, we met a splendid, decades-old Leopard Tortoise, going about his slow business.

In the afternoon we walked in riverine forest and met our first White-bellied Go-away-birds, Rüppell's Starlings and Mantled Colobus (what a superb primate!). Also here were Olive Baboons, up to no good, Black-billed Barbets and a singing Red-fronted Tinkerbird.

As we returned to the lodge, we made a slow and very successful night drive, seeing a White-tailed Mongoose, a very obliging Common Genet and an African Wildcat.

Day 11

Tuesday 28th October

This morning, we ventured further afield to the Aledeghe Reserve, in search of Gerenuk and Somali Ostrich. We were amazed when, just metres inside the reserve, we disturbed not only a Harar Dikdik but also a Gerenuk, which, sadly, many saw only partially as it ran away. We were amazed by the vast herds of goats, donkeys and camels which grazed this supposed protected area, but equally delighted by the wildlife which we saw here. Among plenty of Oryx and Gazelles, we saw many Somali Ostriches (most of them blurred by the dramatic heat haze), two Gerenuk in the shade of a distant acacia, Black-headed Lapwings, two Secretarybirds (which unusually took flight and soared above us), and several stately Arabian Bustards.

In the afternoon, we attempted to visit a site for Defassa Waterbuck, but were driven back by the state of the road, pausing though to see Buff-crested and White-bellied Bustards. At dusk, we were in place at the celebrated Spotted Hyena den, where we watched several of these imposing animals emerging. Our night drive back to the lodge was, again, very productive. Tonight, the grassland was full of Ethiopian Hares, and we also encountered a Three-banded Courser, and saw the back end of an Aardwolf as he galloped away. We all agreed the back end of an Aardwolf was infinitely preferable to no Aardwolf.

Day 12

Wednesday 29th October

Our early morning safari was also, sadly, our departure from this wildlife-rich park. We again saw Beisa Oryx and Soemmering's Gazelles well, in addition to lots of Isabelline Wheatears and Chestnut-backed Sparrow-Larks, our first Eastern Yellow-billed Hornbills, and a singing Rosy-patched Bushshrike.

On our way through the Rift Valley, bound for Hawassa, we called at Lake Koba, where we saw African Fish-Eagles, a Goliath Heron, White-faced Whistling-Ducks with their ducklings, and northern waders including Ruff and Wood Sandpiper. Our lunch stop at Lake Ziway was nothing short of spectacular. Here, the local fishermen feed the scraps of their catch to the hordes of waterbirds which line the shore, including great flocks of Marabous and Great White Pelicans. Also here, were Woodland and African Pygmy Kingfishers, Long-tailed Cormorants, Black-winged Stilts, Hottentot Teal and Little Grebes.

Reaching our hotel in Hawassa in the evening, we explored the lakeshore, seeing Black Crakes, a Little Bittern, Malachite Kingfishers and the hotel's very tame Mantled Colobus family.

Day 13

Thursday 30th October

Our early morning walk along the shore of Lake Hawassa was most productive, with beautiful birds falling over themselves to give us spectacular views. Perhaps first prize went to the absurdly obliging Klaas' Cuckoo, which posed to be photographed from every angle. Also very popular here were the Little and Spectacled Weavers, the Brown-throated Wattle-Eye, the friendly Eurasian Wryneck and the Eastern Spotted Flycatcher. After breakfast, we billed and cooed over the Mantled Colobus, and were very pleased to see a Spotted Creeper.

At the fish market on Lake Hawassa, we witnessed a similar spectacle to yesterday's, with the addition of hundreds of White-winged and Gull-billed Terns. Walking nearby, we watched an African Reed Warbler, the

tour's only Black Kite (among countless Yellow-billed), a Booted Eagle and a noisy band of Spur-winged Lapwings.

Nearby we visited another spot on the lake's shore, where Temminck's and Little Stints trotted through the mud, and local people carried on with their business, apparently oblivious to the two Hippos lolling in the shallows.

At lunch, en route to the Bale Mountains, we watched a pair of Yellow-bellied Waxbills diligently feeding three Village Indigobird chicks and, in the afternoon, before reaching the park headquarters at Dinsho, we stopped at a small wetland and saw Red-knobbed Coots and Blue-winged Geese. Next we crossed the Gaysay Grasslands and were amused by the many Warthogs along the road, and impressed by the stately Mountain Nyalas which were also common here. At Dinsho there were more Nyalas, plus Bohor Reedbuck and a Bush Duiker.

We reached our hotel in Goba exhausted, having packed so many ecosystems and so much wildlife into a single long day.

Day 14

Friday 31st October

This morning things temporarily went wrong. We set off to the Sanetti Plateau full of hopes of seeing the Ethiopian Wolf and the many other rare creatures which live there, only to be defeated by the first serious patch of mud in the road.

Abiy and I held counsel and decided we would hire a more mountain-hardy bus for the following day and would spend today in the Gaysay Grasslands and around Dinsho.

Good decision.

We went with local guide Muhammad to various points in the Gaysay grasslands in the hope of seeing a Serval. We didn't see one, but during the search we encountered many other wonderful animals. On our first walk, we saw Chestnut-naped Francolins and several handsome Abyssinian Longclaws. Then, beyond the grasslands, we had a superb look at the Cape Eagle Owl which had eluded us the day before (though yesterday's Ethiopian Rock Hyrax were absent today). At Dinsho, we watched an Abyssinian Owl at its roost right in the open and, craning our necks, had even worse views than yesterday of a roosting African Wood Owl (quite the day for owls, it was proving to be). Also at Dinsho, we had great encounters with a female Menelik's Bushbuck and a Bush Duiker.

In the afternoon we again explored the Gaysay grasslands, hoping to see a Serval. Our diligence turned up a family of Golden Jackals, two Spotted Hyenas, many Mountain Nyala and Bohor Reedbuck and plenty of lovely birds including African Stonechats, Pallid Harriers and Slender-billed Starlings. But Servals came there none.

Day 15

Saturday 1st November

Today was make-or-break day, the day on which the success of the whole tour depended. Our trusty bus, driven by Ephraim, with the help of his assistant Antena, arrived early and showed no sign of being daunted by the muddy ruts in the road. In no time, we were up on the Sanetti Plateau watching Wattled Cranes, Spot-breasted

Lapwings and giant Lobelias. Two Moorland Francolins pattered by the side of the road, and there were many Chestnut-naped Francolins here too. Suddenly, on the right side of the road, we saw an Ethiopian Wolf trotting through the scrub. We stopped to watch and our Wolf was briefly joined by a second animal before carrying on his journey in front of us. We were delighted, but a short while later the experience was eclipsed by a third Wolf right beside the bus!

Having achieved our goal, we crossed the plateau and ventured down to the Harena Forest, in search of the rare Bale Monkey. Our initial searches over our picnic lunch were fruitless, but Abiy wanted to try just one more site. Bingo! Here an amazingly obliging family of Bale Monkeys was feeding on bamboo.

It didn't seem as if things could get better, but they did. The Giant Root-Rats (Mole-Rats) were in their accustomed place (though some of the group insisted for ages that they were inanimate), surrounded by Blick's Grass-Rats. There were three more Wolves, including one listening for rats in their burrows. And the remarkably beautiful Starck's Hares were exactly where Abiy said they would be, with two Wattled Cranes nearby, a pair of Lanners perched in the giant Lobelias, and one of the Wolves skirting us. There was even a Golden Eagle, plus some hugely photogenic Steppe Eagles and Augur Buzzards by the roadside.

Astonishing!

Day 16

Sunday 2nd November

We left the Bale Mountains in rain today. Reaching the heat of the lowlands, we stopped at Abijata-Shalla, and visited the compound where the last of the reserve's Bright's Gazelles and Somali Ostriches live. Here we also saw Black-headed Oriole, Von der Decken's Hornbill, Lesser Honeyguide and lots of Lesser Whitethroats. After a delicious lunch by Lake Langanano (with added interest in the form of Verreaux's Eagle Owl, Red-fronted Barbet, Blue-spotted Wood Dove, Hemprich's Hornbill and Blue-naped Mousebird), we visited the spectacular shore of Lake Abijata where countless thousands of Lesser and Greater Flamingos and Ruff were joined by hundreds of Common Cranes and Northern Shoveler, and smaller numbers of Pied Avocets, Kittlitz's Plovers, African Spoonbills and many other species. Two Golden Jackals trotted along the lakeshore as we arrived.

In the dusk we reached Bishangari Lodge on the shore of Lake Langanano and, after dinner, we went for a night walk. The moon was very bright for seeing mammals, though we did encounter a White-tailed Mongoose.

Day 17

Monday 3rd November

Early this morning, we were watching birds in the dawn light along the lake's shore. Yellow-fronted Parrots came down to drink and a very confiding young Dark Chanting Goshawk allowed us excellent views and the chance to examine every detail of its plumage.

After breakfast, we took to the riverine forest, and saw countless excellent birds and mammals, including Mantled Colobus, Grivet, Narina Trogon, White-winged Black Tit, a Tawny Eagle eating a hapless Cattle Egret, Scaly-throated Honeyguide (though seeing it was hard work), White-cheeked Turaco and Bare-faced Go-away-bird.

In the afternoon we walked along the shore of the lake, watching African Openbills, Spur-winged and Egyptian Geese, a Comb (Knob-billed) Duck, a Northern Pintail and, in the surf at the edge of the lake, Marsh Sandpipers and a Three-banded Plover.

After dinner, we again took a night walk but, again, the blazing moon put paid to our efforts.

Day 18

Tuesday 4th November

After this morning's early walk and breakfast, we left the beauty of Bishangari and began our journey back to Addis Ababa, and from there to the UK. We stopped for lunch at Debre Zeit, where Lake Bisheftu was devoid of Southern Pochard, and reached the Ghion Hotel in the afternoon. Late in the night, having sat around an aromatic wood fire, saying good-bye to Ethiopia in our hearts, we moved to the airport and flew home.
