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## Day 1

**Wednesday 7th July**

We flew from Gatwick and on arrival drove from Montpellier to the hotel in Arles. There was a pure blue sky and a slight breeze as we drove along the western side of the Camargue. We did not have time to go out before the meal so we used the time to go through the programme and introduce ourselves.

## Day 2

**Thursday 8th July**

After an early breakfast we drove to the Roman aqueduct where we had time to see the ruined stone aqueduct that provided power for 4 flour mills in the 1st century. We then explored the dry limestone hillside watching Rollers on the wires, Kestrel and Turtle Doves. After that we walked through a nearby disused olive grove with a small canal which proved to be a good spot to watch dragonflies such as Blue Skimmer. Butterflies included Striped Grayling and Great Banded Grayling, Southern Gatekeeper, Scarce Swallowtail and Meadow Brown.

We returned to the hotel for lunch and siesta in preparation for the evening walk. After an early meal we drove to a recommended site for observing Eagle Owls in Les Alpilles. This was a site neither of the leaders had been to before but it was said to be very good. After a long period of waiting we had to return to the hotel without any luck...we did see late feeding dragonflies and some grass coloured stick insects.

## Day 3

**Friday 9th July**

A warm muggy day! We drove to Marais du Vigueirat, a protected nature reserve of extensive marshes, and on the way stopped lots of times to see interesting birdlife: Montague's Harrier quartering a ditch line, Rollers, Bee-eaters, Black Kites and an unknown eagle that flew off too soon for us to put a name to it.

Eventually we arrived at the reserve and took a morning to walk around the reserve's public path, where there were plenty of birds to see and dragonflies to ID and photograph. We were able to distinguish all the herons: Grey Heron, Purple Heron, Little, Cattle and Great Egrets, Squacco Heron, Night Heron and Storks as well as lots of Scarce Bluetail *I pumilio*, also Black-tailed and White-tailed Skimmers. Someone found a Willow Emerald *L viridis* in a wooded area. At the end of the walk we saw at very close quarters, a Pond Terrapin sunning itself on a fallen tree.

We had our picnic lunch on shaded benches and some people visited the shop. Then we were met by Fred and Phillippe who gave us a presentation in English regarding his research on *L macrostigma* the Dark Spreadwing, an endangered marshland damselfly. We then drove to the area where they occur but unluckily we could not find any, however, the place was not open to the general public and was very peaceful. It was also good for other dragonflies such as Blue Emperor and Lesser Emperor; the orange form of the Scarce Bluetail and David saw an *L barbarus*, Migrant Spreadwing. There were lots of spiders to photograph and we also watched birds from various hides and found Common Terns breeding on old boats, Cormorants, a Ruddy Shelduck, Graylag Geese and swans. A Little Bittern flew over the road before we left the reserve. We drove back after a full day of activities at Vigueirat.

## Day 4

Saturday 10th July

It was a misty start to the day when we drove off to the Gimeaux to St Gilles Road. Good views of Bee-eaters, Black-winged Stilt. *I pumilio* gold var, and praying mantis were had, and Red-veined Darters in the rice fields were plentiful. The sky cleared and we went on to Mas D'Agon to the viewing platform. Photographers had a good time getting shots of Coypu that was definitely not coy! And then we drove north stopping at various places to see water birds: Glossy Ibis, Flamingos, and Whiskered Tern for example.

Back to the hotel for a picnic then out to St Martin and the Ecomusee to book permits to go on La Crau where we saw an exhibition of dragonfly photos. We then had time for a visit to Vallee des Baux canal and had a super view of some new damselflies – Orange Featherleg, and Blue eye, we also saw lots of Southern Banded Demoiselles displaying over the water.

## Day 5

Sunday 11th July

It was a hot sunny day with very little breeze. Fred came to the hotel at 8.00 and we left straight away to make sure we saw the young flamingos in the colony before the heat haze really became strong. We had access to a protected area near the old Rhone river path before it changed course. Beyond old salt pans we came to an observation point built on the ruins of a C17 customs house used for collecting salt tax. From there about 500m out in the lake we could see 4 crèches of flamingos with their dark young. Unfortunately none of the adults were near us. Shelagh spotted a Spectacled Warbler, very similar to a Whitethroat, feeding its young on Salicornia shrub. We walked back to the vehicles and drove on to a pumping station where we got better view of flamingos, and saw many Kentish Plovers along the ditches and sandy areas. We drove out onto La Digue to look for Slender-billed Gulls, saw a group of Little Terns and the photographers were attracted to a confident Little Egret feeding by an outflow.

We went for lunch to a place called Mas de St Bernard, where Fred negotiated with the owner for us to have our own picnic lunch in the shade – it was a very pleasant restaurant with sculptures done by the wife of the owner in the grounds. After coffees we drove on to look for more sea birds near Salin de Giraud: Sandwich Terns, Slender-billed Gulls, Curlew, Sandpiper and closer views of flamingos. All the while lots of beach tourists drove past us on the way to the coast.

## Day 6

Monday 12th July

Today we got up early for Peau de Meau and La Crau. And as we arrived we were met by a family of 5 Hoopoes, a bird we were hoping to see all week and like the buses they all came at once! This was a good omen for the day and we were soon walking out to the barn observatory. We were treated to the typical birds of La Crau: Stone Curlew, Tawny Pipit, Short-toed Lark, Lesser Kestrel and a passing Sand Grouse. Ian saw a Red-footed Falcon (perhaps an early migrant), Short-toed Eagle, and a Little Owl, which breeds in the barn, made an appearance. The river turned up its usual spectacle of colourful dragonflies and damselflies: Copper and Southern Banded Demoiselles, Dusk Hawker and Keeled Skimmers along with many other species.

We found some shade at Etang Des Aulnes to have our picnic and then moved around the lake afterwards to find more dragonflies and butterflies both in the woods and over the dry meadows. We decided to stop for coffee in St Martin before heading back to what we hoped would be an early return. Unfortunately we were delayed for 4 hours because of an accident on the road only 200m from the hotel. A slight detour for another coffee passed the time while we waited for the road to clear.

## Day 7

Tuesday 13th July

We woke to another hot day with clear skies. We decided that because the group had not been able to take photographs of flamingos close up that we would drive to Etang de Vaccarres to a place where we could get close. We did and were not disappointed. A group of flamingos was feeding just offshore and other birds such as Egrets, Black-winged Stilts and Greenshank rested or searched for food in a small bay. From the observation platform it was possible to get some good photos. We also heard and saw a Curlew, on migration probably.

We then drove onto Etang de Grenouillet, which also has a wooden observation platform, just as a group of Spoonbills were coming in to land. Gill and David saw a Green Lizard sunning itself on a bush and others found plenty of photo opportunities along the road but not many species of dragonfly. We then drove on to the next intriguing site. After various attempts to get access we found the right place at Le Verdier, Le Sabuc. We walked along a country road looking unsuccessfully for the Western Clubtail, *G pulchellus*. Ian found a brilliantly coloured fly that was pestering Jan, it was the Metallic in superb colours.

We returned to the hotel for a picnic and siesta in preparation for the second attempt to see Le Gand Duc in the evening. We were not disappointed. Ian knew of a good place and within a few minutes of arriving and scanning the escarpments Hans had located two young Eagle Owls. Mention should be made of the enormous Egyptian Grasshopper on the way to the owls. As the light faded two adult owls arrived and we had the opportunity to watch and compare behaviour. Nightjars flew over and called and we could see Venus rising as the sky darkened.

## Day 8

Wednesday 14th July

The group agreed to go to Arles for a couple of hours to do some sight seeing, so we packed everything up and drove into town. Ian and Andy looked after the vehicles while the rest went walkabout. We then had sufficient time to drive to the airport and catch the plane. This brought to the end a very successful holiday tour of the wildlife of Provence. We ended up with 119 species of birds and 29 species of dragonflies.
