

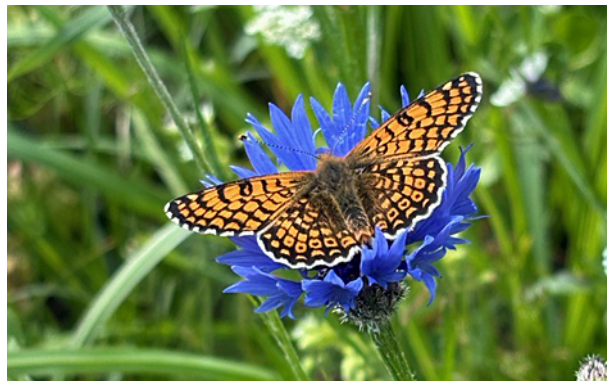

14th – 21st May 2026

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Summary

The weather in the Cévennes can be changeable. This year it threw everything at us, from snow and hail, to warm sunshine. It started off very cold and windy, but by the end of the week the butterflies had emerged and the Swifts had returned to the sky above the hotel. Highlights included an emergence of green and golden Sulphur Owl-flies, which suddenly floated up from the grass when the sun came out, and tracking down a Moonwort high on Mont Aigoual.

Day 1

Thursday 14th May

Transfer day and village walk

We arrived on time at Montpellier airport, where we met up with Tony and some other travellers. With the minibus hired, we drove towards the Cévennes, taking the pretty route rather than the frantic motorway. We drove past tranquil vineyards and shuttered villages, before making our way along the River Tarn and up into the mountains.

Having arrived at our hotel, we had our first picnic in the garden between showers, then set off for a walk to investigate our surroundings. A range of ferns growing on the walls by the river included Forked Spleenwort (*Asplenium septentrionale*). Jacquin's Mignonette (*Reseda jacquinii*), with its strange angular pods, was also identified. In the tiny ancient village of Cocures, Serin, Black Redstart and White Wagtail were found, as well as nesting Crag Martins.

Day 2

Friday 15th May

Causse Mejean and Roc des Hourtous

Bundled up in many layers against the biting wind, we drove up to the Causse Mejean, the first stop being the top of the escarpment. The area has very thin soil over limestone, and the vegetation comprises Box bushes with Juniper and Amelanchier (*Amelanchier ovalis*). Among the scrub we found lovely stands of Early Purple Orchids (*Orchis mascula*) and a charming white pea (*Lathyrus pannonicus*). A Nightingale was singing by the car park, and a Cuckoo was singing too.

We drove along the Causse Mejean, which looked a little desolate in the cloud and rain, but we stopped off to look at Griffon Vultures on the trees near to which they are sometimes fed. Meanwhile, our first Military Orchid (*Orchis militaris*) was seen, along with a fine stand of Wintercress (*Barbarea vulgaris*).

We moved on to the Roc des Hourtous, passing some huge dark *Aquilegias* at the side of the road, and having a glimpse of deep-red Cévennes Pasqueflowers. When we arrived at our proposed picnic spot, we were amazed to find it covered in a convention of gleaming Ford Mustangs! The very kind owners allowed us to use "our picnic table" under a tent for lunch.

The rain eased off, and we took a walk to the west of the café, finding Violet Limodore (*Limodorum abortivum*) in bud, Fly Orchid (*Ophrys insectifera*) and Aymonin's Fly Orchid with its little yellow frill (*Ophrys aymonii*). The lovely purple Cévennes Alpine Aster was in flower, but the rain came down and we abandoned our walk. Instead, we went back to the café to regroup, then took a short walk to the east, where the vegetation was completely different. Man, Lady and Monkey Orchids, Sword-leaved Helleborine and a very fine Wintergreen were observed. In a brief period of sunshine, some Adonis Blue butterflies were moving sluggishly, and Coal and Crested Tits were seen. We returned to the café, dodging the showers, for a very welcome coffee before returning to the hotel.

Day 3

Saturday 16th May

Corniche de Cévennes

Another cold morning for the Corniche de Cévennes. Our first stop was at an old, stone-built, hump-backed bridge over the Tarn. Some watched a Grey Wagtail, while others explored the low cliffs on the other side of the river. We found Brittle Bladder Fern (*Cystopteris fragilis*), Common Polypody (*Polypodium vulgare*), and best of all a graceful bright green fern with a long black stipe: Irish Spleenwort (*Asplenium onopteris*).

The next stop was to see the dinosaur footprints at St Laurent de Treves. The way up to the footprint field was edged with Meadow Saxifrage, and some sheep were tinkling down in the valley. It was biting cold, so we did not hang about; however, we did find a lovely Downy Buttercup (*Ranunculus lanuginosus*) with the softest of leaves, growing from the base of a wall.

Pip had promised us a closer look at a field of *Narcissus poeticus*, and it did not disappoint. They were not so much fluttering and dancing as bowing and rippling, a veritable wave of white, dotted with deep purple orchids.

We drove on to the next stop right at the top of the corniche. We dived into a field full of Green-winged Orchids (*Orchis morio*), with acres of Broom and lots of Blue Hound's-tongue. The Yellow Gentians were not in flower, but showed promise. However, a burst of hail and snow driven by a strong wind pushed us back to the vehicles. Everyone was cold and wet, so a strategic retreat to the hotel was called for, where lunch was taken in slightly warmer surroundings.

We sallied forth once again, to visit a really good orchid field. It did not disappoint: we found a large colony of Woodcock Orchids (*Ophrys scolopax*), drifts of Military Orchids, some statuesque Lady Orchids, numerous hybrids and some Greater Butterfly Orchids (*Platanthera chlorantha*) just coming into flower. Finally, as the weather was much improved, we gave Tony's Duke of Burgundy spot a try. We were in luck: the butterflies came out and posed beautifully for photos, and as well as the Duke himself, we saw a number of different blues, including Baton and Green-underside, plus several fritillaries, a Painted Lady and some skippers.

Day 4

Sunday 17th May

Causse Mejean and Gorges de la Jonte

With the weather taking a turn for the better, we once again headed up to the Causse Mejean. Our first stop took us up a narrow lane edged with crops on one side and scrubby grassland on the other. On the arable side we found

Pheasant's-eye (*Adonis annua*) and Cornflowers. After scaling a rusty fence on the other side of the road, we found a stand of Early Spider Orchids (*Ophrys sphegodes*), slightly battered by the previous day's hail. Birds included Red-backed Shrikes, Corn Buntings and Woodlarks. We parked with a view over the area containing Przewalski's Horses, dun-coloured with stubby little manes. Choughs were calling, and in the field next to us we found the bright yellow Spring Adonis (*Adonis verna*). Moving on to the village we saw larger herd of horses, and a very nicely camouflaged Little Owl perched on a post.

We drove on through the sparse limestone landscape to the Armande Caves, a handy lunch spot. The bushes round our picnic site were full of bird calls, and a Cirl Bunting was seen. Next, we found our way to the D63, a route marked "difficile et dangereuse". We trundled down to the Gorges de la Jonte, stopping at a couple of good butterfly spots. Species included Berger's Clouded Yellow and, a Scarce Swallowtail. When the sun came out, a cloud of yellow and green Sulphur Owl-flies rose up from the grass.

We reached the bottom of the gorge and visited 'The House of Vultures', a nesting site high on the pinnacles above us. Other than the Griffon Vultures and a soaring Peregrine Falcon, we found a Marsh Fritillary, a remarkable find, and Ground Pine (*Ajuga chamaepitys*).

Day 5

Monday 18th May

Le Pont de Montvert, Sommet de Finiels and Les Bondons.

The Swifts had returned this morning with the warmer weather and were swooping round the hotel with the Crag Martins as we set off up the hill from the hotel. Our first stop was by the river, where we discovered a beautiful meadow full of Ragged Robin, Spiked Rampion (*Phyteuma spicatum*) and Maiden Pink (*Dianthus deltoides*). Just as we were about to leave, the sun came out, bringing out butterflies.

We continued up the road to Le Pont de Montvert, a tiny town built around the river, which was described by Robert Louis Stevenson in his "Travels with a Donkey". It was a good place for coffee, and two of our group administered first aid to the chef, who had badly cut his finger.

By the time we reached the top the col at around 1600m, the temperature had dropped, and it was very cold indeed. A Montagu's Harrier was seen, along with some lovely Mountain Pansies (*Viola lutea*), but we decided to find a more sheltered spot to picnic. An off-season ski resort provided us with picnic tables next to a drinks van serving coffees, which was ideal.

Leaving the heights, we stopped at a small farm track leading into a flowery meadow. It was the most idyllic spot, with Cornflowers and Carthusian Pinks, Burnt and Bug Orchids: it was truly enchanting. We left it reluctantly to look at the menhirs marching across the hillside, then to see the strange conical *bondons*, before descending by yet another 'difficile et dangereuse' route. A few kilometres from the hotel, some of the more energetic members of the group decided to stretch their legs and walk the rest of the way.

Day 6

Tuesday 19th May

Col du Perjuret, Chaos de Nimes, Mont Aigoual

The Swifts were screaming again this morning as we left to go south, over the Col du Perjuret to the Chaos des Nimes. Pip told us to look out for a rare Cévennes Potentilla, which bears a close resemblance to an *Alchemilla*. It finally appeared half way up the north side of a boulder the size of a small house. Grizzled Skippers and Wall Browns were seen. Birds included Red Kites, a singing Common Whitethroat, an elusive Montagu's Harrier and Choughs. Back at the Col de Perjuret, we had a brief walk in a sloping meadow. Most interesting were the pure white Military Orchids standing out among the purple regiment.

Lunch was taken in a pine forest with a Robin singing close by, and then we went up to Mont Aigoual. Two of the group were very keen to find Moonwort (*Botrychium lunaria*) and some research had indicated where it might be. Happily, the information was accurate, and we walked straight to it, not just a single plant, but masses of it coming up in the verge on both sides of the track.

After that excitement, we checked out a spot for Piedmont Ringlet, without success, then drove down to the Col de la Serreyrede. A field full of *Tulipa sylvestris*, somewhat rooted up by Wild Boar, was a delight, but the highlight of the day was a Clouded Apollo butterfly which Tony snatched out of the air, and then released unharmed. Many of us sampled an ice cream before finally moving on to another orchid field. It did not disappoint, and held nine species, including Frog Orchid (*Coeloglossum viride*).

Day 7

Wednesday 20th May

Tarn Gorge, Montbrun, Castlebouc and St Enimie

Our final full day started on a glorious morning and we set out west of Florac into the Gorges du Tarn. The narrowest of roads took us up to Montbrun, a largely deserted village perched on the side of the mountain. Above the village was a north-facing cliff, covered in rosettes of *Saxifraga longifolia* and the endemic *Saxifraga cebennensis*, a small cushion of a plant with white flowers. We wandered down through the village, some of us taking more circuitous routes than others, then carried on along the side of the Tarn to Castlebouc. This was another picturesque village built among and around huge boulders. A little way along the track, we came to a cloud of blue butterflies taking salts at a damp patch on a bridge, mainly Little Blues, but some Adonis Blues. We picnicked by the tarn, with Dippers, Grey Wagtail, Choughs and a Kingfisher putting in an appearance.

Further down the valley we reached St Enimie, where the magical spring was investigated. Another Dipper was in the stream here and a Southern White Admiral photographed.

We returned to the hotel, as some wanted to make a start on their packing; others went back up to the 'Butterfly Bridge' to spend a happy hour searching through a flowery meadow and finding a huge range of butterflies lured out by the warm sunshine, including our first Common Swallowtail, Brimstone and Spotted Fritillary, along with Black-veined White and many fritillaries already seen on the trip.

Day 8

Thursday 21st May

Departure

After an early start, we arrived at Montpellier airport in good time for our flight home.
