Day 1

Wednesday 18th July

Travel London Heathrow to Lyon – La Chapelle en Vercors

Seven group members met with Paul at the arrivals area of Lyon St. Exupéry Airport, having flown from London Heathrow Terminal 3 on the 1.50pm British Airways flight BA362, and Birmingham on the Flybe flight BE3203. Upon arrival, passport control and baggage reclaim were soon completed, and we made their way out to the car park, where our minibus was waiting. Luggage was stowed and we boarded the vehicle for the journey down to the Vercors region.

We drove south-westwards on the A43, A48 and A49 Motorways, leaving St. Romans and making our way, up onto the Vercors Plateau, through Pont en Royans, soon arriving in La Chapelle en Vercors, at the comfortable and friendly Hotel Bellier, our base for the tour. Along the way we saw Black Kite and Grey Heron. At the hotel we were met by our host's daughter, Sandra, who quickly allocated our rooms. At 8pm, we met in the garden for dinner, during which Paul briefly outlined the week ahead for us. After the meal, Paul and Trevor set up the moth trap.

Day 2

Thursday 19th July

Font d'Urle

This morning the moth trap had plenty of interest. For the micros, there were the Crambids *Catoptria falsella*, *Palopita vitrealis*, *Sitochroa palealis* and *Catoptria pinella*, and the Peleopodid, *Carvina quercana*, as well as both forms of Box Tree moth. For the macros, there were Brown-line Bright-eye, Pine Hawk-moth, Common and Scarce Footman, Leopard Moth, Red Underwing, Purple Thorn, Guernsey Underwing, Knot-grass, Uncertain, and Mottled and Feathered Beauties. There were also several additional insects in the trap, including the Ant-lion *Distoleon tetragrammicus*, Summer Chafer, and Harlequin and Seven-spot Ladybirds, among others

We left the hotel at 9am, and headed due south towards the village of Vassieux, where we visited the cemetery, where the victims of a Nazi reprisal against the Resistance, in 1944 are buried. Along the way, we had middle-distance views of a Short-toed Eagle. A brief examination of the track and adjacent arable margins revealed Marbled White, Meadow Brown, Small Skipper and Great Banded Grayling butterflies, as well as Southern Six-spot Burnet, Crepuscular Burnet, Black-vein and Silver-Y moths, and the Longhorn Moth *Nemophora metallica*.

Moving up towards the Col de la Chau, we continued to the Font d'Urle (1,500 metres), a ski station with limestone outcrops and meadows. Leaving the car park, we set off to explore. Initial finds were Dark Green Fritillary, Almond-eyed Ringlet, Scotch Argus, Small Skipper, Small Heath, Niobe Fritillary, Apollo, Common Brassy Ringlet and Brown Argus butterflies. Alpine Marmot was seen, as well as Alpine Chough, Griffon Vulture, Water Pipit, Black Redstart and Northern Wheatear. Other insects seen included Green Mountain Grasshopper, Wart-biter Bush-cricket, the Longhorn Beetle *Stenurella melanura* and the Drone-fly *Eristalis tenax*. After enjoying the views at the headland, we re-joined our vehicle and moved to a shady picnic table, in the forest for lunch.

Whilst Paul set up the meal, the rest of us went to explore the woodland and clearings. These proved quite rich, with Scarce Copper, Large White and Large Skipper butterflies and good views of Common Buzzard and Short-toed Snake Eagle. We also found the Longhorn Beetle *Monochamus galloprovincialis*.

After our meal we set off through the Route Combe Laval, pausing initially at the Col de la Machine to admire the view. Whilst there, we added Large Wall Brown, Titania's Fritillary, Woodland Ringlet and Meadow Brown.

The Route Combe Laval is a precipitous road, leading down to St. Jean en Royans, where Paul went off to do the week's picnic shopping, while the rest of the group explored a rather rough field. Here we found Short-tailed Blue, Red-underwing Skipper, Small Heath, Common Blue, Brown Argus, Scarce Swallowtail and Gatekeeper butterflies.

It was now time to make our way back to the hotel. After dinner, Paul set the moth trap.

Day 3

Friday 20th July

Réserve Naturelle des Hauts Plateaux du Vercors – Col de Rousset

Another good morning at the moth trap produced Common Plume, the Pyralid *Synagme punctalis*, Codlin Moth and Bird-cherry Ermine, Garden Grass Veneer and Mother of Pearl for the micros. For the macros, there were Tawny-speckled Pug, Rustic, Herald, Riband Wave [forma. *remutata*], Light Arches, Poplar Hawk-moth, Jersey Tiger, Rustic, Common and Scarce Footman and Mottled Beauty [f. *conversaria*]. Again, there was also other insect life in the trap, in the shape of Summer Chafer, Forest Bug, Soldier Beetle and Lacewing.

Today the Tour de France was due to pass through the region, so Paul shuffled the itinerary, to avoid the potential congestion and extended road closures.

At 9am, we joined our vehicle and headed south through St. Agnan en Vercors before turning left and making our way up along the forest road to the Réserve Naturelle des Hauts Plateaux du Vercors, where we parked in the car park at La Coche. Along the way, we made a brief stop at a view-point for photos. Here we found a solitary Piedmont Ringlet. The morning was cloudy, but warm as we set off to explore the forest tracks and woodland clearings, and it was not long, before we made our first sightings: Arran Brown, Swallowtail, Silver-washed Fritillary, Titania's Fritillary, Heath Fritillary and Northern Brown Argus. Queen of Spain Fritillary, Marbled White, Meadow Brown, Blue-spot Hairstreak, Scotch Argus, Dark Green Fritillary, Large Skipper, Pearl-bordered Fritillary, Pearly Heath, Niobe Fritillary, False Heath Fritillary, Almond-eyed Ringlet, Safflower Skipper, Painted Lady, Carline Skipper and Apollo were all noted - a good collection of butterflies! Moths were represented by Shaded Broad-bar, Chimney Sweeper, Hummingbird Hawk-moth, Wood, Jersey, Cream-spot and Scarlet Tigers, Ochraceous Wave and Golden Yellow Wave.

In addition, we recorded a number of other insects, among which there were the Longhorn Beetles *Pachyta quadrimaculata*, *Rutpela maculata* and *Molochorus minor*, Green Mountain Grasshopper, Scorpion Fly, Hornet Hover-fly, European Paper Wasp, Rose Chafer and the Orb-web Spider *Aculepeira ceropegia*.

Returning to La Coche, we took lunch, in the shade of some trees to keep out of the sun, before moving on to explore the forest route around the rear of the plateau, pausing to take in the spectacular views of the Grand

Veymont, before making our way down to the valley, stopping briefly by a verge bank at Les Munières. Here we added Large Blue and Field Cricket.

The final stop of the day was at the spectacular Col de Rousset, where we had magnificent views down the valley towards the town of Die. Exploring the old road margins, we found Meleager's Blue, Scarce Swallowtail, Black-veined White, White-letter Hairstreak, Cleopatra, Comma Butterfly, Common Blue, Great Sooty Satyr and, new to the trip, Black Satyr.

After spending a good hour-and-a-half exploring, it was time to make our way back to La Chapelle en Vercors. After eating, Paul, once again, prepared to set the moth trap; however, torrential rain made this impossible.

Day 4

Saturday 21st July

Route Presles – Forêt des Coulmes – Pont en Royans

We left La Chapelle en Vercors heading north-west and drove to where we turned west through the tunnel of the Grand Goulets and down to St. Eulalie en Royans, via the Petit Goulets. North of Pont en Royans we again turned west and began to climb up towards the Route de Presles. This is a magnificent limestone cliff formation, overlooking the Commune de Chatelus and the valley of the River Bourne. We made our first stop about three-quarters of the way up, where we explored the banks and meadows beside a quiet lane. Here we found Marbled White, Great Sooty Satyr, Large Skipper, Wall Brown, Scarce Swallowtail, Meadow Brown and probable Woodland Grayling butterflies, and Hoary Footman and Hummingbird Hawk-moths. Blackcaps were extremely vocal in the lane side bushes.

After spending an hour or so exploring, we drove on up through Presles into the Forêt Domaniale des Coulmes, to a picnic site at the Fontaine de Petouze, where we left the vehicle, and set about exploring several open areas within the woodland. Silver-washed Fritillary, Large Skipper, Titania's Fritillary, Marbled White, Mazarine Blue, Woodland Brown, Scarce Copper, Weaver's Fritillary, Oberthur's Grizzled Skipper, Small White, Essex Skipper, Arran Brown, Holly Blue, Dark Green Fritillary, Ilex Hairstreak, Large Blue and Pearly Heath butterflies were all present. Here, we also had Shaded Broad-bar, Silver-Y and Six-spot Burnet moths.

After our picnic, we explored another small meadow clearing in the forest. Wood White, White-letter Hairstreak, and Meadow Brown butterflies were found, and an array of other invertebrates. These included several species of Bees and Hover-flies, Bee Beetle, Longhorn Beetles, including *Strictoleptura cordigera*, *Rutpela maculata*, *Judolia cerambyciformis* and *Stenurella septempunctata*, and the Bush-cricket *Tettigonia cantans*.

From here, we moved back to a point above the high cliffs of the Rocher de Presles. Parking at the upper end of the cliffs, we again explored the verge banks finding Sooty Copper, Common Blue, Essex Skipper, Reverdin's Blue, Large Skipper, Small Heath, Gatekeeper, and Brown Argus butterflies.

From here, we drove on to Pont en Royans. Here, we visited a local ice-cream shop. Whilst enjoying our purchases, we found Geranium Bronze butterfly on a planted Lavender bush.

Our final stop of the day was by the banks of the River Bourne below Chatelus. The Buddleja growing on the banks proved to be a fine nectar source, with Silver-washed Fritillary, Dryad, Scarce Swallowtail, Great Banded

Grayling, Berger's Clouded Yellow, Cleopatra, Reverdin's Blue, Red Admiral and Small White butterflies to add to the day's records.

We now drove back to La Chapelle en Vercors for dinner.

Day 4

Sunday 22nd July

Route Moliere – Forêt Communale d'Autrans

At 6.30am we met to examine the moth trap. The catch included Muslin Footman, Chocolate Tip, Purple-bar, Black Arches, Common Carpet, July Highflyer, the Noctuid *Calliergis ramosa*, Heart and Club, and Brimstone Moth for the macros, and the Crambid grass moth *Crambus perlella*, Rusty-dot Pearl, the Crambid *Catoptria pinella* and Diamond-backed Moth for the micros. In addition, we also found the Ichneumon Wasp *Netella testacea*, Forest Bug, Orange Ladybird, Spotted Crane-fly and some Summer Chafers.

Following a splendid breakfast, we set off through the Gorges de la Bourne in the direction of Lans en Vercors. Here, we turned up towards the villages of Meaudre and Autrans, where we turned onto the forest road leading towards Les Feneys. At this junction we turned left and made our way up to the car park at Le Mollière. We set out on a circular walk, initially through woodland and finishing in subalpine, rough grassland. Apollo, Comma Butterfly, Chalk-hill Blue, Mountain Clouded Yellow, Dark Green Fritillary, Damon Blue and Small Heath, Small Tortoiseshell, Common Brassy Ringlet, Large Tortoiseshell and Swallowtail butterflies were among our finds, together with Drone-fly and Scorpion Fly.

Moving back towards Les Feneys, we found a picnic table where we set up lunch.

After eating, we moved on to explore some rock road verges and a wet meadow on the Route Forestale d'Autrans, a rough track through the Forêt Communale d'Autrans. Black Kite and Crested Tit were noted, as well as Marbled White, Essex Skipper, Heath Fritillary, Damon Blue, Grison's Fritillary, Black-veined White, Arran Brown, Large Tortoiseshell and Large White. The Burnet moth *Zygaena loti* was also seen.

From here we made our way to Lans en Vercors, where we headed south down the valley to Les Bruyères, to examine some damp meadows and stream banks. Unfortunately, it had clouded over and cooled down, and the only butterfly seen was a solitary Wood White, before it was time to retrace our steps back to La Chapelle en Vercors.

Day 5

Monday 23rd July

Col de la Bataille – Col de Bacchus - Gigors.

Slightly lower overnight temperatures meant that the moth-trap catch was sparser than previous nights. However, we did have the Crambid *Celypha striana*, Diamond-backed Moth and Common Plume Moth for the micros. The Macros were represented by Guernsey Underwing, Purple Thorn, Common Rustic, Scarce Footman, Knot-grass, and Pale-mottled Willow. The hotel garden produced Firecrest, House Martin, Short-toed Treecreeper and Common Swift.

Leaving La Chapelle en Vercors, we travelled down towards the Col de la Machine then on over the Col de la Bataille and south through La Vacharie, before stopping on the Col de Bacchus. Here we checked out a quiet lane, finding Great Banded Grayling, Mazarine Blue, Lulworth Skipper, Berger's Clouded Yellow, Brown Argus, Large Skipper, Cleopatra, Small Heath and Brown Argus. Latticed Heath and Six-spot Burnet moth were also recorded. In addition, there was Wart-biter Bush-cricket and Black-tailed Skimmer dragonfly.

We now headed over the Col de Bacchus and through Plan de Baix. We turned right on the outskirts of Beaufort sur Gervanne, towards an area of open, scrubby, grazing land with marginal woodland near Gigors, parking in the shade of a pine grove. A recently mown Lucerne field, surrounded on three sides by woodland, proved productive. Butterfly species seen included Lesser Spotted Fritillary, Pale Clouded Yellow, Painted Lady, Wall Brown, and Queen of Spain Fritillary.

After eating our picnic, we moved to a rough, scrubby area on the other side of the road. Here we found Gatekeeper, Woodland Grayling, Common Blue, Holly Blue, Small Heath, Marbled White, Dingy Skipper and Silver-washed Fritillary butterflies. In addition, we also found the Shield Bug *Eurydema dominulus*.

We now began to make our way back to La Chapelle. Along the way, we made two more stops. The first was at a small quarry on a verge just above Beaufort sur Gervanne. Here we added Red-underwing and Mallow Skippers. The second stop was on the wide verge on the west side of the tunnel leading to the Col de la Bataille. Small Heath, Dark Green Fritillary and Oberthur's Grizzled Skipper were noted, together with Drone-fly, Green Mountain Grasshopper and Seven-spot Ladybird.

It was now time to complete our journey back to the hotel.

Day 7

Tuesday 24th July

Pas de l'OEille

We did not run a moth trap this morning, as we were leaving the hotel a little earlier, in order to visit our highest altitude of the week, at the Pas de l'OEille, above Villard de Lans. Leaving La Chapelle, we made our way up towards the northern end of the Vercors plateau, passing through the spectacular Gorges de la Bourne on our way to Villard de Lans. Here, we parked at the bottom of the cable car, which would take us up to 1700metres, and caught the 9.15am telecabins.

At the top, we set off to walk up to an area of subalpine grassland and rocks, where we spent the day exploring. Initially, we recorded several habitat-specific birds. Raven, Citril Finch, Black Redstart, Alpine Chough and Northern Wheatear, were all noted. Common Brassy Ringlet, Arran Brown, Mountain Clouded Yellow, Niobe Fritillary, Blind Ringlet, Heath Fritillary and Geranium Argus were all recorded before we stopped for our picnic.

After lunch, we continued to search and added Moorland and Berger's Clouded Yellow, Almond-eyed Ringlet, Small Tortoiseshell, Mountain Argus, Purple-edged Copper and a species new to this trip, Eriphyle Ringlet. As we began our descent towards the Cablecar station, we looked at an area of shorter turf overlooking the refuge. Here, we added Mountain and Lesser Mountain Ringlet, Large Wall Brown, Carline Skipper and Escher's Blue butterflies. During the course of the day, we also saw Common Wall Lizard, Silver-Y moth, Stoat and Alpine

Marmot, before catching the downward telecabin and making our way back to La Chapelle en Vercors for dinner and to pack in readiness for tomorrow's homeward journey.

Day 8

Wednesday 25th July

La Chapelle en Vercors - Herbouilly – Lyon St. Exupery – London Heathrow.

One final moth-trapping night produced a small catch, due to a clear chilly night. For the macros there were Pine Hawk-moth, Common Carpet, Small Elephant Hawk-moth, Ruby Tiger, White Point, Brown-line Bright-eye and Muslin Footman. The micros were represented by Bird-cherry Ermine and the Pyralid *Synaphe punctalis*, while Red Admiral butterfly was in the garden.

Following a final splendid breakfast, we loaded up the bus, and bid farewell to Fabienne and her daughters, and start our journey back to Lyon.

We took a slightly different route northwards, turning east before reaching the Gorges de la Bourne, up through Herbouilly, making our first stop near the abandoned village of Valchevrière, another significant site related to the Resistance in the Second World War. Here, we noted Red Squirrel and Golden Eagle. We continued to Lans en Vercors, before turning up to the hamlet of Les Merciers. There are several habitat types here, including a rough, rocky path through woodland, rocky verge-banks and subalpine meadows.

We began with the verges and rough track. These proved quite species-rich with Six-spot Burnet and Jersey Tiger moths, as well as Marbled White, Large White, Silver-washed Fritillary, Heath Fritillary, Great Banded Grayling, Holly Blue, Southern Small White, Cleopatra, Large Wall Brown and Great Sooty Satyr.

The meadows yielded Meadow Brown, Damon Blue, Pearly Heath, Brown Argus, Apollo, Ringlet, Provence Chalk-hill Blue, Scotch Argus and Wood White. There were also Red-winged Grasshoppers, plus Common Buzzard and Red-backed Shrike.

Our next stop was for our picnic lunch, which we took in a motorway rest area, L'Aire Oyeu. Along the way we saw Black Kite. During the meal, we added Sooty Copper, Small White, Large Blue and Common Blue butterflies. We then made our way north on the A48 and A43 motorways, to Lyon St. Exupery Airport, for our various homeward flights.
