#### Day 1

## Monday 11th June

Most of the group met up for a walk before dinner. The wind had got up so it was very blowy down the lane. There were only a few birds calling but there were plenty of Speckled Wood butterflies. At the end of the walk was a pond but the vegetation was so high around it we did not find any uncommon plants. Along the road there was Navelwort *Umbilcus rupestris* as well as Red Valerian *Centranthus ruber* and Foxgloves *Digitalis purpurea*. Back at the hotel we met up with the other two members of the group as well as watching the Swallows. That night as we had dinner a fox wandered into view and a Buzzard sat on the lawn.

## Day 2

## **Tuesday 12th June**

We headed for Skomer and bought some lunch in the local Nisa Store at Johnstone. On the way there at about 08:05 Andrew rang the boat operators and was very disappointed to hear that there were no sailings that day as the wind direction was too risky. As an alternative we then headed for Minwear Wood where everyone heard various Wood Warblers but only a few saw them fly or perch. At the Slebech Estate by Blackpool Mill we stood on the bridge, which was built in about 1830, and saw Grey Wagtail and Dipper. It was then onto Rosebush and we walked besides the old Rosebush and Bellstone Quarries where they worked the slate. It took a long time to walk along the track as there were so many birds about. In a hole in one wall you could see the gaping mouths of young Blue Tits and a bird recently out of the nest hopped around in front of us. There were Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff, Blackcap, Whitethroat and Goldcrest to name a few. There were plenty of bees and several plants including Yellow Rattle Rhinanthus minor and Ragged Robin Lychnis flos-cuculi. We did not have lunch at the car park as the whole place smelt of creosote due to some logs being painted. Instead we had lunch on the top of the hills where the road crosses a ridge and where there were Skylarks singing.

We then drove further north to the Welsh Wildlife Centre at Teifi Marshes and after parking the minibus we walked to the centre which is on three floors. On the top we bought some refreshments and then sat on the hill looking over the marsh. We walked to a few hides and heard quite a lot. At the Curlew Hide a Red-breasted Merganser flew in and on the walk back the Reed and Sedge Warblers were singing, along with a single Cetti's Warbler. There were froglets all over the path near the vehicle. It was then time to head back to the hotel where the wind had died down and the low cloud had gone making for a lovely evening, although unfortunately two of the group headed home as they were feeling unwell.

#### Day 3

## Wednesday 13th June

Once again we departed at 7:30am and bought some lunch at the NISA store. We arrived at Martin's Haven at about 8:25 where the car park was practically full and we joined a long queue for tickets. Eventually a lady came out saying that all the landing tickets had been sold and that there were organised sailings to see the birds, but from the sea. There were at least 50 people in front of us, so we pottered around the headland and saw Stonechat, Wheatear, Rock Pipit and lots of Choughs with their red bills and legs. There were plenty of Devilsbit Scabious *Succisa pratensis*, Thrift *Armeria maritime ssp maritime* and Kidney Vetch *Anthyllis vulneraria*.

We then went on the boat ride where we had close views of Puffins as well as other sea birds including Razorbill and Guillemot. A Peregrine was perched on a rock face and a Honey Buzzard was circling mobbed by the gulls over the sea. At sea there was also a Gannet but no shearwaters as the sea was so calm. After an hour we landed back at the quay and there were large spider crabs visible in the bay.

The minibus collected people from the buildings near the boat launch and we drove back to the National Trust Car Park for lunch. There was Southern Marsh Orchid *Dachtylorhiza praetermissa* nearby.

After lunch we visited Dale for a comfort stop and then parked just out of the village and saw lots of Oystercatchers and a few Curlew. It was then an hour's drive to Gupton Burrows where there is a wide sandy beach with sand dunes behind it. There were Dunlin on the shore line and a couple of the more adventurous members of the group went for a paddle. There was some exploring of rock pools as well. On the dunes there was Pyramidal Orchid as well as lot of Alexanders *Smyrnium olusatrum* by the car park cafe trailer. It did not take too long to get back to the hotel for tea and cake.

## Day 4

## Thursday 14th June

The early morning bird walk was very productive despite the strong winds. There were good views of Linnet as some horses came over to us.

After breakfast we headed across the toll bridge again and ventured to Bosherton where we walked around the lily ponds clockwise. There were few birds but the vistas were superb. There were Common Twayblades *Listeria ovata*, Pyramidal *Anacamptis pyramidalis* and Bee Orchid *Ophrys apifera* as well as White Water-Lilies *Nymphaea alba*. At Broad Haven beach there were Choughs galore and though still windy there were people walking on the beach.

Lunch was in the cafe at Bosherton and afterwards we drove to Stackpole Quay for the cliff top walk to Barafundle Bay where people were swimming in the sheltered water out of the wind. On the cliffs we saw a Herring Gull nest with an egg plus the closest we are going to get to Rock Dove. There was Fulmar, Razorbill nesting and a Gannet flew past. After an ice cream at the National Trust cafe we drove to Stackpole Court and visited the Eight Arch Bridge and the Walled Gardens. A Song Thrush sang as we walked back to the minibus before a return to the hotel for tea and cake. The wind gradually eased off through the day but it still remained blowy and of course the sun shone all day.

## Day 5

## Friday 15th June

There was an early morning bird walk once again down the lane. There were lots of species about including Bullfinch, Chaffinch, Linnet and Mistle Thrush.

After breakfast we packed our cars and departed by minibus plus a car for St David's where we parked in the Merrivale Car Park near the cathedral. We found Ivy-leaved Toadflax *Cymalaria muralis* on the walls before a tour of the cathedral and town where we had a coffee.

Our final stop that morning was at the National Trust common just outside town with the name Waun Fawr. Here there were lots of Marsh Orchids *Dachtylorhiza praetermissa* and Bog Asphodel *Narthecium ossifragrum*. The highlight was a Cuckoo sitting on the wire just before we left and returned to our cars at the hotel.

It was disappointing that we could not get onto Skomer but queuing from 6am was not an option for us on the day the boat could put people ashore. We did get to have very close views of the seabirds, especially Puffins, and we did see lots of Chough around the coast. Bosherton was delightful, as was the day of birds from Minwear Wood to the National Wildlife Centre. The weather held out for us despite some strong winds. The hotel was excellent and the food exquisite. Even though there were 77 species of bird seen or heard it was the Puffins on the water that stole the show.
