Day 1

Monday 8th June

A beautiful day greeted us as we arrived at the Beggars Reach Hotel, in, stark contrast to the recent weather. Tea was served at just after 3.30pm and we sat outside on the balcony overlooking the gardens, with Swallows and Pied Wagtails busily heading about in their business and attending to their nests.

Soon we headed off on our first excursion, just a short drive down the road to Rooseferry Farm Wood. Upon arrival, we had Swifts and House Martins flying around, while Goldfinches and Chaffinches were seen. We headed into the woodland and down the hill to the river. The wood was full of activity with family parties of Blue and Coal Tits, alongside some very freshly fledged Blackcaps. We also had neck-aching views of three Spotted Flycatchers busily catching insects overhead in the canopy.

Once we were down at the estuary, we were surprised to see little activity, although the heat of the day provided entertainment in the form of raptors, with three Buzzard and a Red Kites, and the star of the show: a Goshawk soared distantly over the far side of the river. What a brilliant start to the trip!

Soon we headed back to our van, passing Chiffchaffs and an unusually showy Goldcrest. Dinner at 6.30pm was brilliant and filling, and we all headed our separate ways for the night.

Day 2

Tuesday 9th June

After some overnight rain, the day dawned sunny but windy. We left at 8.10am and crawled down towards Haverfordwest to grab some supplies from Tesco for our day trip. We soon hit the road again, passing through the glorious Pembrokeshire countryside, in perfect sunshine. When we arrived at Dale airfield, we went for a walk along the old wartime runways, looking to see what we could find in the way of birds. Even with the wind, the sky was full of the song of Meadow Pipits and Skylarks. Linnets and Stonechat were numerous, but posed only briefly. We soon reached the western runway and had brief, distant views of a breeding-plumaged Golden Plover, which felt a little out of place among the concrete. We also had a great session looking at the wild flowers growing through the gaps in the concrete: Stonecrop, Wild Thyme, Lady's Bedstraw, Lesser Trefoil, Bird's Foot-trefoil, Devil's Bit Scabious, Dove's-foot Crane's-bill, Lesser Hawkbit, Lesser Stitchwort, Herb Robert and Ragged Robin were just a few of the species that we identified.

We headed to a viewpoint overlooking Skomholm and Skomer, as well as Marloes Sands. On the beach below were some very windswept Oystercatchers, and we had distant views of Choughs, along with a Raven. We watched as a boat battled its way north. Soon it was time to move on, and we went for the relative shelter of The Gann. Here we went for a short walk, adding Shelduck, Cormorant and Black-headed Gull to the day list, as well as our first butterflies: Speckled Wood and Large Skipper. We took a break on the beach below the sea wall out of the wind to have our lunch. Here we saw Bullfinch and Greenfinch, and most importantly we picked up three Black-tailed Godwits distantly circling the bay, before gaining height and continuing high to the south.

Soon it was time to head down to Martin's Haven to board our boat trip. This was in fact on the boat that we had seen earlier that day battling against the waves to make it round here. Due to the swell, we only managed to make

it round the northern side of Skomer, in the strong south-westerly wind. We were soon out on the waves and headed round the island, seeing rafts of loafing Puffins, Razorbills and Guillemots on the water, while above us the constant toing and froing by the cliffs was brilliant to watch. Being on the water gave us a very different perspective to the seabirds' movements and colonies. Kittiwakes, Cormorants, Shags and some distant Manx Shearwaters were seen, along with the odd Gannet and Fulmar using the boat's slipstream. A Grey Seal was the mammal highlight in North Haven. All too soon, we were riding the waves back to shore, where it took us a little while to readjust to solid ground.

We drove a little way along the road and had a short walk down to Marloes Mere to settle our stomachs. Here we added Little Grebe, Moorhen and Coot to the trip list, while Sand Martins zipped low over the water and Reed Buntings and Sedge Warblers sang from the scrub beside the path, all rounding off a brilliant afternoon.

Day 3

Wednesday 10th June

The day dawned with scattered but heavy thundery showers. We left the hotel at 9.00am sharp, and we headed for Stackpole Quay. Luckily, by the time we arrived the storm clouds and rain had disappeared, and we were treated to another beautiful day.

We headed up onto the cliff tops and saw Gannets fishing out in the bay, before finding our first two Choughs among a group of Jackdaws on the cliff. Pyramidal Orchids were found up on the cliff top, before we headed down towards Barafundle Bay, after stopping to look at the magnificent view. Once we were down on the sandy beach, we went to the water's edge and found Moon Jellyfish, Sea Gooseberries, and best of all a large Barrel Jellyfish along the tide line!

Soon we headed up onto Stackpole Head, where we found and had great views of Choughs. Rock Pipits, Fulmars and Razorbills were found on the cliffs, while three Red Kites soared over the headland. Skylarks sang overhead, and we found the day's first butterflies: Small Heath and Common Blue. After soaking up the views and just about seeing Lundy on the horizon, we retraced our steps and had a well-earned lunch at the National Trust café, where we were kept entertained by the tame Chaffinches, Dunnocks, House Sparrows, Blackbirds and Robins. A Hummingbird Hawk-moth was also seen on the Red Valerian.

After lunch, we hit the road and headed to the barn visitor centre at Stackpole. From here we made the short walk down the hill to Bosherston Lily Ponds, where we set about scanning from the eight-arch bridge. We found Grey Heron, Mute Swans, Mallards and Moorhens, plus Common Bluetail and Azure Bluet damselflies, and Blue Emperor dragonfly, and Speckled Wood and Meadow Brown butterflies.

We headed a short way down the lake to the next bridge, where a family of Mute Swans with six cygnets were seen distantly. Some Hemlock Water-dropwort held a good number of insects, including the hoverfly *Vollucella pulleceus*, Yellow-haired Sun Fly, and Orange-tailed and Sandpit Mining Bees. A Reed Warbler and a Chiffchaff were heard singing before we headed back along the lake's edge to the van, passing a brilliant Grey Heron, which was successfully fishing. We also added Nuthatch, and Great and Long-tailed Tits to the trip list, and had great views of two young Buzzards taking their first flight over the woodland.

Next, we headed a short way down the road to Broad Haven South, for a short walk along the cliff top. We had great views of squabbling Fulmars, while an Oystercatcher stood guard over the headland. A Raven flew through and was constantly harassed by gulls. We had a great time spotting orchids, finding Common Spotted, Southern Marsh, Common Marsh, Pyramidal, Broad-leaved Marsh and the associated hybrids which come with a mixed colony of closely related orchids. We soon headed back towards the van, taking in the surroundings and passing a showy Common Whitethroat.

Day 4

Thursday 11th June

The final full day dawned wet and windy. We left the hotel at 8.45am, and despite a wet drive, by the time we had reached Dowrog Common the rain had mostly passed, leaving a rather muggy misty day, with the odd bit of drizzle.

At Dowrog Common, we had a brief encounter with a Cuckoo, a reeling Grasshopper Warbler, and plenty of Willow Warblers and Meadow Pipits. As we walked along the lane, we had a brilliant time looking at the wild flowers, which included Cotton Grass, Yellow Rattle, and Heath Spotted and Southern Marsh Orchids, to name just a few.

With the weather not improving, we headed for St. Davids, where the group spent some time exploring the city, spending time in the cathedral and the local shops and cafés. After this, with the weather improving to just a general cloudiness, we headed towards Lower Fishguard, but en route we stopped at Llangoffan Fen National Nature Reserve. We went for a short walk on the boardwalk, which took us into the reedbed and willow habitat hidden away in the valley. It was very different to the habitats in the rest of Pembrokeshire. We had plenty of Blackcaps singing, and a single Garden Warbler, and a handful of Willow Warblers were singing too as we headed round. However, the highlight for some of the group was the Bumblebee Mimic Hoverfly (*Volucella bombylans*)!

Soon we were back on the road and heading towards Lower Fishguard. We headed upriver a short way and stumbled across several Dippers, our target bird. Chiffchaffs, Song Thrushes and Blackcaps sang from the canopy, while House Martins hawked insects overhead. We had only had fleeting but good views of two adults and a juvenile Dipper, so we headed back towards the car park. As we were crossing the bridge over the river, we spotted the young Dipper feeding, just off the road. We had great views as it hunted and caught insects. When it stuck its head in the water, you could see the water flowing effortlessly over its body. It was brilliant to watch, and it was very successful in its hunting.

When we got back to where we had parked, we noticed something odd among the usual group of moulting Mallards. To our surprise, this turned out to be a rather tame drake Pintail, a bird that shouldn't really be in Pembrokeshire at this time of year: this was quite a remarkable record.

Soon we headed to Goodwick, where a Gannet was fishing in the harbour, before we headed up into the clouds and out to Stumble Head to round off the day. We headed to the seabird shelter. From here we had brilliant views as thousands of Manx Shearwaters streamed through, heading east back towards the islands. Razorbills, Guillemots, Puffins, Gannets and Kittiwakes were all seen heading in a similar direction, but in much smaller numbers. Some of the group were lucky enough to spot a large pod of Harbour Porpoise, apparently chasing a shoal of fish. A pair of Choughs were about the cliffs, along with Oystercatchers, Common Whitethroats and

Linnets, while a Buzzard overhead was not appreciated by the local Herring Gulls. Soon it was time for us to head back to base, where we settled in for a curry night!

Day 5

Friday 12th June

Our final morning of the tour was a weirdly muggy and misty affair. At sea level, the mist wasn't reaching the ground, but our plan was to head up towards Rosebush. We left the hotel at 8.45am, after most of the group had checked out. We were soon heading up into the clouds and the higher we got, the more the fog closed in.

Soon we arrived at the Pantmaenog Forest, near Rosebush. We decided that since we were out of the wind, we would go for a walk. This was very atmospheric, to say the least, but the woodland was still full of life, with Willow Warblers, Blackcaps and Chiffchaffs singing from seemingly every corner of the forest. Heading further on, we stumbled upon a flock of Long-tailed Tit. To our surprise, we could also hear Willow Tits, so we stopped and soon had very brief glimpses of an adult feeding two freshly fledged youngsters. This was really good, as they are becoming increasingly scarce: we were about half a mile away from a place that this tour has seen them previously.

We discovered a large colony of orchids, but we couldn't quite figure out which species they were: hybrids of some sort were likely involved, probably Common Marsh x Heath Spotted Orchid, or something similar! We continued on our loop, passing the old slate quarries for which Rosebush is famous, before heading back to our van and our next and final stop of the trip.

At Llys-y-Frân reservoir we went for a short walk, finding the first Great Crested Grebes, Greylag and Canada Geese for the trip, along with large numbers of Lesser Black-backed Gulls out on the water. Soon we headed back to the café for a light lunch, passing two Greenfinches and having a Red Kite flying so low overhead that you could almost reach out and touch it.

After a pleasant lunch, it was time for the final drive of the trip, via Clarbeston Road station for part of the group to depart on an earlier train. Soon we were back in the grounds of the hotel for 1.40pm, saying our goodbyes. This marked the end of another incredible tour of Pembrokeshire in early summer.

The group managed a collective total of eighty-seven species of birds, with the standout highlight of the trip as voted by the group being the auks on our boat trip, followed closely by seeing Manx Shearwaters at Stumble Head, and Choughs at Stackpole. These were some truly unforgettable encounters. An honourable mention must also go to the out-of-season Pintail in Lower Fishguard!
