Summary

We spent relaxing and enjoyable few days in this richly varied corner of East Sussex, with much medieval as well as natural history to enjoy. We explored the diverse habitats of Rye Harbour Nature Reserve, visited the majestic Bodiam Castle, had a leisurely cruise on the River Rother, and enjoyed gentle walks through local woods. A good variety of flora and fauna was seen, including 18 species of butterfly and 12 species of odonata.

Day 1

Monday 30th June

John and Jenny met the group at the Flackley Ash Hotel in Peasmarsh, and we discussed the plans for the next few days over dinner.

Day 2

Tuesday 1st July

The weather forecast for today predicted high temperatures, but we spent most of the day in and around Rye Harbour Nature Reserve where there was a refreshing breeze. As we started a short walk to the first hide (unfortunately closed for repair), the first birds seen were Rock Pipit on the riverside saltmarsh, and several Curlews roosting on the more extensive inland 'New Saltmarsh' area. Skylarks, Little Egret, Mediterranean and Blackheaded Gulls were also present. A scan over 'Flat Beach' from the vicinity of the Gooders Hide produced Redshank, Sandwich and Common Terns, a Turnstone, and noisy Oystercatchers. The track side bramble bushes were busy with many butterflies, including Gatekeeper, Peacock, Marbled White and Essex Skipper, and various bee species. Other plants included the handsome white blooms of Greater Bindweed and Broad-leaved Everlasting Pea.

We backtracked to the Discovery Centre, where we looked at the many displays illustrating the development of the reserve, both natural and anthropogenic. We then moved on to the hides on the western edge of the reserve, observing the diversity of gulls, terns and wading birds, including numerous Common Tern chicks being fed, and the rather distant noisy Sandwich Tern colony. Apart from the terns, the noisiest birds were the many Oystercatchers which were breeding on the reserve, and the many singing Skylarks. In the salt marsh areas along the river's edge were typical plants such as Samphire, Sea Beet and a lovely carpet of lilac Rottingdean Sea Lavender. Along the shingle ridges were many classic seaside plants, including Wild Carrot, Sea Mayweed, Yellow-horned Poppy, Sea Kale, Sea Campion, Moth Mullein and Viper's Bugloss. On the track back to the car park we found Wild Parsnip, Hemlock, various thistles, Teasel and various vetches, as well as many spikes of bright pink Pyramidal Orchids.

After lunch at the Discovery Centre, we returned to our vehicles, drove a short distance inland, and walked to a raised viewpoint, which gave us good views across extensive reedbeds towards Camber Castle, and a large nesting colony of Cormorants. There were Great Crested Grebes and Coots on the water, and a Red Kite drifted over. Among the reeds were tall spikes of Hemp Agrimony, Meadowsweet, Common and Rosebay Willowherbs, Yellow Loosestrife, Water Figwort and the large leaves of Water Dock.

We then returned to the hotel. where some of the group made use of the various spa and gym facilities. before we reconvened for the log and a delicious dinner.

Day 3

Wednesday 2nd July

We headed north this morning, to the dramatic, historic site of Bodiam Castle, where we marvelled at the scale of the place and enjoyed a video display about its history, which included a bustling community around the wharf on the nearby River Rother. Some of the group joined a short guided tour. The impressive moat around the castle contained many huge carp, which seemed ever hopeful for a snack; but feeding was prohibited. A lovely flotilla of White Water Lilies graced the water, and handsome stands of Purple Loosestrife and Water Figwort grew among the rushes at the water's edge. Birds were rather few, but we did hear Nuthatch and Blackcap, and there were Pied Wagtails, noisy juvenile Starlings and Jackdaws around the castle.

After lunch in the café in the grounds of the castle, we moved to Brede High Woods, the largest Woodland Trust reserve in Sussex, and enjoyed a leisurely walk among some handsome Hornbeam, Oak and Birch (an ancient woodland) plus Sweet Chestnut coppice, old heathland and newer plantations. A few Chiffchaffs and a Blackcap or two were still singing, and Great Spotted and Green Woodpeckers were heard. We found various ferns, such as Lady and Scaly Male Fern. In one area of heathland, we found a small dispersal of tiny Common Frogs and Toads under way, and plants such as the lanky Marsh Thistle, Yellow Vetchling, Greater Bird's-foot Trefoil, Great Willowherb, Lesser Spearwort, Creeping Buttercup, various *Potentilla* species and Foxglove. Butterflies included many Gatekeepers, Brimstone, Comma, Common Blue, Green-veined White and Red Admiral.

During dinner that evening, we were joined by a beautiful female Blue Emperor dragonfly, which caused some concern as it battered itself against the glass roof of the conservatory. But Tom, the duty manager, rescued it in a beer glass and we had a brief closeup of this beautiful emerald green insect, before it was released into the garden.

Day 4

Thursday 3rd July

This morning dawned bright and sunny: ideal weather for our boat trip on the Rother. We enjoyed a lovely three hours on the river, appreciating a good variety of riverside plants, such as White, Yellow and Fringed Water Lilies, Amphibious Bistort, Meadowsweet, Flowering Rush and handsome stands of Purple and Yellow Loosestrife, as well as Arrowhead, Water Plantain and Water Dock.

Our boatman, Robin, was very knowledgeable about the history of the river, and kept up a running commentary. We had some good bird sightings too, including an Egyptian Goose, Red Kite and Kestrel. Reed Warblers flitted among the riverside reeds, plus Reed Buntings, which were regularly heard singing from the bush tops, and a few Swifts and Swallows feeding above and along the river. There were many odonata flitting among the riverside vegetation, including Blue Emperor, Broad-bodied Chaser, Black-tailed Skimmer, Azure and Common Bluets, Large Red Damsel and Beautiful Demoiselle.

Mid-morning, Robin pulled into the river bank so that we could enjoy our scones, cream and jam, balancing our picnic boxes on our knees. We later enjoyed a delicious lunch at the Lime Wharf Café, with bird interest provided by a Red Kite drifting overhead. Later, we headed for Bixley Wood, where the warm sunshine had encouraged butterflies out along a wide woodland ride. We enjoyed watching several species, including two White Admirals, a

new species for one or two of the group, Silver-washed Fritillary, Marbled White, Brown Argus and Large Skipper. Flowers included Marsh Thistle, Dog's Mercury, Large Bird's-foot Trefoil, Common Centaury, Enchanter's Nightshade, Creeping Jenny, Lesser Spearwort, Foxglove and Broad-leaved Helleborine. We also found classic woodland ferns such as Male, Lady and Hard Ferns, and Broad and Narrow Buckler Fern. We had no unexpected wildlife guests at dinner this evening!

Day 5 Friday 4th July

Back to the coast today! A local farmer allowed us to drive up to the walls of Camber Castle. Unfortunately, access was not possible due to safety issues. Camber Castle is a very different building to Bodiam, in that it was built purely for defensive purposes, as opposed to the more grandiose Bodiam Castle, which was more of a status symbol!

We walked to the Castle Water hide, where we enjoyed the comings and goings of the Cormorants from the colony, and saw a good variety of waterbirds including Gadwall, Lapwing, Avocet, Little Ringed Plover, and Great Crested and Little Grebes. Unfortunately, there was no sign of a Bittern which had recently been seen in the area.

Having spent a productive hour or so in the hide, we moved on to the Winchelsea Beach Café for coffee, before heading along the coast road. We stopped and walked up onto the sea wall, where we could look inland across Pett Pools, and out to sea, with Dungeness nuclear power station to the east and Fairlight Cliffs to the west. On our drive back to the café for lunch, a Marsh Harrier was seen over the levels. After lunch, we headed to Cliff End for a walk, to look at Fairlight Cliffs. Sadly, a recent landslide meant there were no nesting Fulmars or Jackdaws, and there was no sign of Ravens or Peregrines, which are possibilities here. Then it was back to the hotel to say our farewells.
