Summary

We had changeable weather but managed to avoid the worst rain showers. There were plenty of plants to see and enjoy. Highlights of our forays included a wide variety of orchids including Burnt, Lady, Monkey, Military, Fly, Common Spotted, Twayblade and White Helleborine. Then there were the other flowers such as Pasque Flower, Rock Rose, Dodder, Dragons-tooth and Clustered Bellflower. There were a few birds to see like Cuckoo, Common Tern, Lapwing and Northern Shoveler. Then when the sun was out, we saw butterfly species including Orange Tip, Dingy Skipper and Green Hairstreak. Highlights of the tour included being shown around the "rare arable flower" plant nursery at College Lake run by the Wildlife Trust and visiting the breathtaking Bernwood Meadow with thousands of Green-winged Orchids. Also, seeing the numerous Red Kites wherever we went.

Day 1

Wednesday 10th May

Weather: Sunny to begin with and then stormy weather later

The tour began when everyone met for the first time at the reception of the Mercure Thame Lambert Hotel in the morning. Some had stayed at the hotel the night before and others had travelled there in the morning. So, after introductions it was not long before we set off to the Totternhoe Knolls reserve. On the way we saw a number of Red Kite Milvus milvus which were to become a very common sight throughout the tour. At Totternhoe we made our way up towards an old fort site that had numerous Cowslips Primula veris all over it and there were also some Twayblade Listera ovata just coming out next to them and there were leaves of Common Spotted Orchid Dactylorbiza fuchsii. On the south face of the fort there were lots of yellow-flowered Horseshoe Vetch Hippocrepis comosa. There was the background singing of Chiffchaff Phylloscopus collybita and there was also a very vocal Blackcap Sylvia atricapilla that we could see singing in the Hawthorn Crataegus monogyna which was in full blossom giving out its rich smelling aroma that smelt nice and sweet in the morning sunshine.

The sun brought out a nice number of butterflies that included Peacock Aglais io, Red Admiral Vanessa atalanta, Small Tortoiseshell Aglais urticae, Brimstone Gonepteryx rhamni, Orange-tip Anthocharis cardamines, Painted Lady Vanessa cardui, Green-veined White Pieris napi and Holly Blue Celastrina argiolus. It was coming up to lunch time and there were a few drops of rain, so we made our way back to the mini-bus and drove a short distance to the Old Farm Inn where we chose a variety of meals and beverages. Luckily, we made it inside just in time before the heavens opened up and the rain came down.

Luckily the rain stopped before we left and set off to our next destination on the other side of Luton. We made our way to the chalk grassland National Nature Reserve of Knocking Hoe. As soon as we made our way onto the site, we found numerous Rock Roses Helianthimum nummularium just coming into flower. As we climbed up the hill, we heard a noisy Green Woodpecker Picus viridis and it was not long before some of us heard and also saw Skylarks Alauda arvensis flying up above our heads. There was also a scratchy sounding Whitethroat Curruca communis making a lot of noise and it could be seen flying back and forth in the hedge. As we came onto the reserve, we found more leaves of Common Spotted Orchid Dactylorbiza fuchsii and Twayblade Listera ovata near a pond. Then out on the reserve we spotted our first Pasque Flower Pulsatilla vulgaris and Clustered Bellflower Campanula glomerata.

We made our way to a hill where we discovered a few Burnt Orchids *Neotinea ustulata* out and we also found Fleawort *Tephroseris integrifolia* just coming into flower. At this point we disturbed a couple of Red Kite *Milvus milvus* that took off then soared above us in the sky. Then the rain came down and so we decided it was time to get back to the mini-bus. It was a good thing that we headed back when we did because after we were all seated back in the mini-bus the rain really came down, there was thunder rumbling and the rain at one point changed to hail, and as we set off the rain was coming down so thick and fast that at one point it looked like we were driving up a torrential river bed and not a main road at all. Luckily it soon cleared, and we drove back to the hotel. We had a short moment to freshen up before sitting down to eat and drink as well as going through the list of species we had found during the day.

Day 2

Thursday 11th May

Weather: Some sun with rain showers.

After breakfast we set off to Goring and, on the way, we saw many Red Kites flying overhead. On arrival we set off heading to the Hartslock Reserve but intending to have a quick peek at the River Thames first. We found the path to be very wet and muddy because of the bad weather we had had the day before. However, we made our way down to the Thames in search of any dragonflies but sadly we did not see one despite the sun being out and the only insect we did see was a single Mayfly Ephemeroptera sp. Otherwise, whilst we were there, we did find Spring Snowflake Leucojum vernum, Greater Pond Sedge Carex riparia and Greater Reedmace Typha latifolia. We left the edge of the Thames and made our way up on to the Reserve, where we found an area that had been taped off which had a large number of hybrid Monkey/Lady Orchids Orchis purpurea x simia that were very colourful, and we did see one orchid that resembled a Lady Orchid Orchis purpurea but probably had a bit of Monkey Orchid in it as well. However, after a bit of searching we did find one real small Monkey Orchid Orchis simia. We also found some White Helleborines Cephalanthera damasonium that had not come out in the beech woodland.

As we moved further into the reserve, we found both Chalk Milkwort *Polygala calcarea* and Common Milkwort *Polygala vulgaris*. There were not many insects to see but we did see Brimstone *Gonepteryx rhamni* and Small Heath *Coenonympha pamphilus* butterflies. We also noticed a Fallow Deer *Dama dama* some distance away that was eventually joined by two others. We then found a small area of Pasque Flowers *Pulsatilla vulgaris* and just as we were heading back, we saw a Roe Deer *Capreolus capreolus* run off in front of us. On our way back towards Goring we did hear and see Blackcap *Sylvia atricapilla* and some of us did see a Comma butterfly *Polygonum c-album*. We were very lucky in that we managed to arrive back at the mini bus in time before a hard rain shower came down. Then we set off to the Dog and Badger pub in the rain. Luckily by the time we arrived at the pub the rain had stopped and the sun had come out again. After being refreshed with food and drink we drove the short distance from there to the entrance of Homefield Wood.

It was not long before we saw our first Military Orchid Orchis militaris. It was a bit early for them, so they had not really come out, however by the time we had fully explored the site we did find a few that were nearly fully in bloom. We did find a number of Fly Orchid Ophrys insectifera in flower and one White Helleborine Cephalanthera damasonium almost out. We also saw Twayblade Listera ovata and the leaves of Common Spotted Orchid Dactylorhiza fuchii and Broad-leaved Helleborine Epipactis helleborine. The butterflies were out and about, and we saw Small Copper Lycaena phlaeas, Brimstone Gonepteryx rhamni, Orange Tip Anthocharis cardamines, Peacock Aglais io, Red Admiral Vanessa atlanta and the beautiful Green Hairstreak Callophrys rubi. On our return drive back to the hotel we did see a number of woods awash with native Bluebells Hyacinthoides non-scripta and we drove through some

very pretty villages. On our return we freshened up before having another pleasant evening meal and drink as well as going through the list of species we had discovered throughout the day.

Day 3 Friday 12th May

Weather: Some sun with rain showers.

After breakfast we set off to College Lake near Tring. This wonderful site is managed by the Berks, Bucks and Oxon Wildlife Trusts. It was a gravel pit that now holds water and is host to a number of wetland birds. There are a number of hides that are elevated above the wet areas making it easy to observe the birds. The site when it was having gravel extracted from it revealed numerous fossil bones including mammoth tusks. From the hides we saw numerous birds including Redshank *Tringa totanus*, Northern Lapwing *Vanellus vanellus*, Gadwall *Mareca strepera*, Northern Shoveler *Spatula clypeata*, Common Tern *Sterno hirundo*, Little Ringed Plover *Charadrius dubius* and Greylag Geese *Anser anser*.

There was an area that is dedicated to propagating rare arable flowers found around the country. The project started on this site because a large number of these species were naturally here in the first place and then over the years other species have been grown here too. The season was behind but we did see in flower Corn Buttercup Ranunculus arvensis, Corn Gromwell Lithospermum arvense, Crimson Clover Trifolium incarnatum, Pheasant's Eye Adonis annua, Shepherd's Needle Scandix pectten-veneris, Field Penny-cress Thlaspi arvense, Interrupted Brome Bromus interruptus and then there were other plants that were still to come out including Thorowax Bupleurum falcatum, Field Cow Wheat Melampyrum arvense, Venus's-looking-glass Legousia hybrida and the Darnel Lolium temulentum. Other plants of interest we found on the site were Dragon's-tooth Lotus maritimus, White Helleborine Cephalanthera damasonium, Twayblade Listera ovata and the leaves of Common Spotted Orchid Dactylorhiza fuchii.

We went all the way around the lake just in time to have some lunch in the café-shop as the rain came down. After a pleasant rest we then set off to Bernwood Meadows. As we pulled up to the entrance, we could see the mass of purple-pink coming from the thousands of Green-winged Orchids *Anacamptis morio*. This a truly amazing sight to see and because there are so many of these orchids here there is a good variety of the same species to see, with salmon-pink ones, white one, purple ones and even two-toned pink and white ones. There were also some small patches of Adder's-tongue Ferns *Ophioglossum vulgatum* to see here as well. It seemed a shame that we had to leave such a wonderful site, but the tour had to come to an end.
