Summary

Southern Greece in early spring is a spectacular place, and clients on this trip enjoyed some wonderful wildlife moments as spring flowers erupted and spring bird migration got into full swing. Stormy weather that had held things up moved away, and we largely enjoyed wonderfully sunny conditions. Starting at Pylos, the local wetlands gave us Greater Flamingoes, a wonderful pair of Montagu's Harriers, a dazzling array of Yellow Wagtail forms and some delightful flowers in the shape of birthworts, cyclamen and many species of orchids. After dark, we ventured out for African Chameleons, which we found while, listening to a cacophony of Golden Jackals. On the Mani peninsula, bird migration was getting going and we enjoyed a great array of birds, including roadside Wrynecks, Wood Warblers, Pied Flycatchers, Tree Pipits and Common Redstarts. Among them came Collared Flycatchers, Eastern Black-eared and Isabelline Wheatears, Rüppell's and Eastern Subalpine Warblers and, best of all, a vagrant Isabelline Shrike. Flowers abounded and there were great colonies of orchids among a bed of spectacular trefoils, stocks, honeysuckle, anemones, vetches and so much more.

We visited the ancient archaeological sites of Pylos Castle and Mystras, and toured the abandoned village of Vathia, all offering insights into a turbulent past. Driving through the Mount Parnon massif, we added the local form of Spring Sowbread to our lists, and enjoyed roadsides full of Algerian and Snake's-head Irises, Burnt Candytuft, Dark Grape-hyacinth and many more. During the week, butterflies emerged in ever greater numbers, giving us sightings of two species of swallowtail, three species of orange-tip, the diminutive Eastern Baton Blue and the fabulous Southern Festoon.

Day 1

Thursday 2nd April

We departed from Athens Airport after a short delay. We broke our journey at the Corinth Canal for a quick photo opportunity and a look at a couple of pairs of Lesser Kestrels. The night before had seen a huge storm causing flooding in parts of the area, and the rain continued heavily in the higher sections of the Peloponnese as we passed through. Eventually, we arrived at our hotel in time for a wonderful meal and then bed, for some well-earned rest after a long day of travel.

Day 2

Friday 3rd April

Rain showers were to dampen our day today, but we fared pretty well and managed to dodge the worst of them. We began at Pylos Castle, where we had two hours to enjoy this extensive site, including the main fortress building, the Byzantine church and the various museums that hold artefacts excavated in the region. Migrant birds were at first slow to appear, but eventually we enjoyed Whinchat, Black Redstart, Common Whitethroat, Northern Wheatear and Woodchat Shrike, as well as resident Cirl Bunting and Western Rock Nuthatch. Plants had been battered by the weather of the previous day, but many were still showing good colour, including large drifts of Crown Daisy, various bird's-foot trefoils, Greater Honeywort and Wavy Stock. Greek Phagnalon, Caper and *Stachys canescens* were enjoyed along the walls.

Heading out for lunch, we stopped first in some fine scrubby habitat, and found a wonderful array of orchids: eleven species were seen in all, including several tongue and bee orchid species, bright pink Pyramidal and Pink

Butterfly Orchids, and subtle Holy Orchids. Nearby, a swarm of Horseshoe Bee Orchids was joined by many other plants, including Tassel-hyacinth, Yellow Bartsia, Spiny Asparagus, Caterpillar-plant, Red Vetchling and others. We headed to Methoni for lunch, finding a comfy spot near the castle to eat our picnic lunches. At the castle, Green Toads were calling in the moat, and Northern Wheatear and Blue Rock Thrushes were on the ramparts. In the bay, a young Mediterranean Gull patrolled the tideline.

After lunch, we drove round to part of the Gialova wetland area, taking in Evergreen Birthwort and Smearwort on the way. Further down, open fields and flooded areas provided us with plenty of birds. While the full range of swifts and swallows cruised overhead, we enjoyed close views of an array of bright Yellow Wagtails: Black-headed, Blue-headed and Grey-headed were all present, as well as some intriguing hybrids. A pair of Montagu's Harriers put on a lovely show between sightings of Marsh Harriers and Sparrowhawks, and a big surprise came in the appearance of four Stone-curlews, which gave a nice fly-by. All in all, it had been a pretty good start to the trip!

Day 3

Saturday 4th April

The weather made a real improvement today, and we had sunny conditions for most of the day. We headed out to Gialova Lagoon and were soon immersed in birds. Though water levels were high, we still found good diversity, starting with some very close Greater Flamingoes and a surprise Little Gull. Egrets and herons were scattered across the marsh, and we logged four different Purple Herons. Greenshank, Mute Swan, Shelduck and Marsh Harrier all added to the mix, while the reeds and bushes were alive with Sedge and Cetti's Warblers, Chiffchaffs and Blackcaps. Vetches and peas were present in a bewildering array, and several species of broomrape tested our identification skills.

Further along the track, a Great Reed Warbler chuntered away, and we managed to get views of a perched Red-throated Pipit and a Zitting Cisticola. We walked through coastal scrub habitats and found a couple of Common Tree Frogs along a water channel. Both Cretan and Sage-leaved Rock-roses were flowering, and Cleopatra butterflies flitted by. The main body of the lagoon was rather quiet, apart from some jumping Grey Mullet and a few Sandwich Terns, so we completed a circuit back to the vehicles and took our picnic out to the beach. Among stands of Cottonweed, Woolly Chamomile and Sea Spurge, we ate lunch, then drove into town for a well-earned coffee break.

For the afternoon, we headed into the hills and walked a trail to Kalamaris Waterfall. On the way, we found several fern species, including Jersey Fern and Southern Polypody, and such shade-loving plants as Butcher's-broom, Italian Lords-and-ladies and Algerian Iris were present. But the main plant attraction here was the lovely stands of flowering *Cyclamen rhodium* subsp. *peloponnesiacum*. Unfortunately, the recent stormy weather had caused the river to rise and to wash away the log bridge to the waterfall, and we were not able to get to see the main event. However, we had seen much of the waterfall through the trees, and also had enjoyed a great number of new plants. Several butterfly species put in an appearance, as well as some fine Violet Carpenter Bees. We made one final stop, back at the lagoon, where five Wood Sandpipers and a mighty Caspian Tern were new for our lists.

After another superb dinner, during which we watched a spectacular sunset, we headed out in the dark and chanced our arm at finding African Chameleons. Our luck was in, and we quickly found three youngsters, all snoozing the night away. Our chameleon search was nicely serenaded by a mass of frogs, and we also experienced some wonderful Golden Jackal howls.

Day 4

Sunday 5th April

It was a transfer day today, and the weather looked favourably upon us. We headed east from Pylos and climbed up into the foothills of the Taygetos massif. We took a roadside walk and found Giant and Four-spotted Orchids, Greek Squill, Strigose Alyssum and banks of Oriental Meadow-rue. Scarlet heads of Peacock Anemone trembled in the wind, and we admired the unusual flowers of Friar's Cowl. Further along the track, more open slopes provided us with Narrow-leaved Glaucous Spurge, and a pair of Golden Eagles soared in the distance. A couple of Isabelline Wheatears were a nice find, as were the flowers of Pale Sainfoin. We took our lunch beside a derelict building with spectacular views right down to Kalamata and the nearby gulf. Blue and Great Tits passed through the trees, and Linnets passed overhead.

A quick coffee stop was had once we were back on the main road and, even here, there were plants to be enjoyed: we spotted Field Gladiolus and Cudweed-flowered Feather-thistle in flower. Our route took us ever southward, until we stopped at a roadside corner near Lagkada. A Western Rock Nuthatch was being boisterous on a nearby house, and a male Blue Rock Thrush sang and showed wonderfully from a nearby Olive tree. Flowers here included a great sea of Mani Hairy Vetch and Starry Clover, many spikes of Yellow Asphodel, Horseshoe Bee Orchid, White Iris and Entire-petaled Catchfly. Continuing on our way, we were soon at our next hotel at Areopoli, with plenty of time to settle in before a fine dinner.

Day 5

Monday 6th April

Today started well, and just got better and better! We began with the discovery of a roosting Gruner's Orange-tip that had been found late yesterday and was still in the same place for all of the group to enjoy this morning. In a fine Valonia Oak beside the butterfly, a Wood Warbler was feeding, and several Tree Pipits called overhead. We headed south, all the time looking out for migrants, and finding we needed to stop several times for roadside Hoopoes, Woodchat Shrikes, a Black Redstart and even a fine male Cretzschmar's Bunting. Migrants had clearly arrived, and it took us quite a while to make progress, but we eventually arrived at Cape Tenaro and began the walk out to the lighthouse. Tree Pipits and Stonechats were soon in evidence, and a Great Reed Warbler chuntered from the undergrowth. We took in the Roman mosaics, but they had to play second fiddle to the likes of Eastern Subalpine and Rüppell's Warblers and a very obliging Wryneck. The sunny weather also brought out the Peloponnese Wall Lizards for some basking sessions. Flowers were much in evidence and almost bewildering in their variety. Cretan Vetch scrambled through tangles of Greek Spiny Spurge and Spiny Burnet, red Downy Flax appeared beside yellow fumans, and spininess was all around in the guise of a wide range of thistles and their relatives.

Most of the group managed to make it to the lighthouse and, on the return journey, we picked out the tiny flowers of the lovely *Allium circinatum* subsp. *peloponnesiacum*. We ate our picnic lunches on the beach, in the shade of a tamarisk bush, then headed off to look for orchids. We walked a nice section of roadway and found a good selection of twelve species, although quite a few were past their best. White Pyramidal Orchids were still doing well, though, as were Horned Woodcock Orchids, and we added Bergon's Tongue Orchid to our lists. A single Mirror Orchid was found further along, but the local tulip population had pretty much passed over to the other side! On the way to this site, we had found a smart male Common Redstart, but better was to come as we departed, as a male Isabelline Shrike was found perched up on a roadside fence! Initially against the light, it seemed likely that it would shoot off without giving us photo opportunities that would allow confirmation of this major rarity. However, it

behaved perfectly, and plenty of photos and even videos were obtained as it hunted from bushes and overhead wires. What a great highlight for the day, which was rounded off nicely with a walk through the tower house village of Vathia and a well-earned coffee (or other beverage!).

Day 6

Tuesday 7th April

We headed south again today, but this time with a view to completing a circuit of much of the Mani Peninsula. Our drive was a little quiet to start with, but as we progressed further south, we began to find migrants: Hoopoes exploded from the roadsides at regular intervals, a Pied Flycatcher toyed with us, and a Turtle Dove was seen. Common and Black Redstarts appeared as we neared the southernmost part of the peninsula, and Tree Pipits appeared in good numbers. Whinchats, Wrynecks, Eastern Black-eared Wheatear and Eastern Subalpine Warblers were all added to the list, and we had unusually commanding views of a Short-toed Snake Eagle as it soared below us along the coast. An old well was home to an impressive scorpion and some Mediterranean House Geckos. Our route then took us back north on higher ground, before we headed down to the coast on the eastern side of the peninsula. On the higher slopes we soon located a fine male Rüppell's Warbler, which showed extremely well at close range and made a good subject for photography as he posed among the yellow flowers of Hairy Spiny-broom.

Butterflies became a big feature of today's interesting discoveries, and the likes of Common and Scarce Swallowtails, Eastern and Gruner's Orange-tips, and Green-underside Blue were all enjoyed. Our route eventually took us down to the east coast of the Mani, and we found a lovely little beach on which to sit and eat our picnic lunches. We followed this with a quick coffee stop, then continued on our way.

In the afternoon, roadside walks provided us with more new plants for the list, and an obliging pair of Sombre Tits. It had turned into a glorious afternoon as we parked up at Pyrrichos and took some flower-filled walks in the

area. At the first stop, Naked Man Orchid and the delightful Reinhold's Bee and Eastern Woodcock Orchids were found, together with the smart Mill's Buttercups and a few 'past-their-best' Giant Orchids. At our final stop of the day, Shrubby Bush-vetch, Herbaceous Periwinkle and the diminutive Elongate Birthwort were all found. It had been a very full day, and we headed back for another voluminous dinner.

Day 7

Wednesday 8th April

It was another sunny day, and we made another trip down to Cape Tenaro. The day started with rings of low cloud/mist around the higher mountains, providing some spectacular scenery as we drove south. As we arrived around the narrow neck, it soon became clear that there were migrants around: a male Eastern Black-eared Wheatear was on the road, and Whinchats and Tree Pipits were in evidence. Sparrowhawks and Short-toed Snake Eagles were overhead as we continued to the car park at the point and walked back through the village to check for birds. As we arrived at the first houses, a male Cretzschmar's Bunting was perched on a fence, which was a good omen! As we walked back up from the car park, Yellow Wagtails passed overhead, Bee-eaters were heard calling, and migrants began to appear in the small gardens. A male Pied Flycatcher and a Wood Warbler shared the same fig tree, and Cretzschmar's Buntings had increased to three. More Pied Flycatchers were forthcoming, and then a Collared Flycatcher appeared briefly, resulting in several Common Redstarts and a Western Rock Nuthatch being found during our efforts to relocate the flycatcher.

As we walked back towards the car park, we were lucky enough to catch up with a rather showy Nightingale, and then we turned up a second male Collared Flycatcher, this one staying long enough for all to enjoy it. Nearby, a single Turtle Dove cruised by, and a lone Starling was in a Eucalyptus tree. There was much activity and so many birds to enjoy!

Before lunch, we took a short detour to a higher plateau area and enjoyed a wonderful patch of dozens of individuals of various *Ophrys* species. There were particularly large patches of Sawfly and Yellow Bee Orchids, while among them grew our first Bumblebee Orchids and some Eastern Woodcock Orchids, which were just coming to their peak flowering. Heading across the peninsula, we had lunch on the lovely beach at Porto Kagio, followed by coffee at the local taverna.

In the afternoon, we headed back towards Areopoli and took a boat trip through the Caves of Diros for an interesting subterranean experience. After this, the group took one of several choices: some walked the local lanes and found Sombre Tits, a Nose-horned Viper and an array of nice roadside plants; some visited the type locality for *Campanula kamariana*, a species only described as new for science in 2017, and probably seen by less than a hundred botanists to date, and added Common Tongue Orchid, Isabelline Wheatear and a Dahl's Whip Snake to the list of species. Yet others took a well-earned break and some peaceful rest and relaxation.

Day 8

Thursday 9th April

We were sad to leave our wonderful hotel on the Mani, but we needed to head north. We made the one-hour drive to Sparta and then headed on to the ancient Byzantine capital, Mystras. Having met up with our site guide, we entered via the upper gate and began an interesting and informative walk down through the steep slopes of the site. There was a great wealth of flowers to enjoy, beginning with Woad at the upper gate, and ending with a flowering *Campanula andrewsii* at the lower gate. Along the way, we passed walls covered in *Cymbalaria microcalyx*,

the minute Rue-leaved and Ivy-leaved Saxifrages, and a great array of other plants. Blue Rock Thrushes sang overhead, Western Rock Nuthatches topped the walls, and Cirl Buntings sang from the Italian Cypresses. Many Judas Trees were in full bloom and, with the Southern Nettle Trees just breaking bud, a few Nettle-tree Butterflies were on the wing.

After our tour of Mystras, we headed east to Mount Parnon and found a nice place to eat our picnic lunches. A walk here revealed plenty of Coal Tits, Robins and Wrens, while Firecrest and Black Woodpecker were heard. As we were at a higher altitude (about 1200m), we had a quite different flora to enjoy, with great sheets of Narrow-leaved Glaucous Spurge along the roadside, and forests of Grecian Fir mixed with Syrian and Prickly Juniper. Patches of Algerian Iris, Burnt Candytuft, Dyer's Alkanet, Peacock and Balkan Anemones, and the amazing *vividum* subspecies of Spring Sowbread. We passed Short-toed Snake Eagles and Eastern Strawberry Trees on the way down, eventually arrived at the coast, and followed the shoreline northward. At the head of the bay, a group of young Mediterranean Gulls was feeding along the tideline as we drove round to our hotel at Nafplio.

After checking in, we walked down through town, accompanied by screaming flocks of Pallid Swifts, to enjoy a final dinner together along the harbour front.

Day 9

Friday 10th April

Our final day began with something of a lie-in before breakfast: then we went out for a walk along one of the beaches near Nafplio. There were plenty of birds around to enjoy, with courting Kentish Plovers chasing around on the beach and flocks of Mediterranean Gulls in the shallows. A few Grey Plovers and Ruffs were also present, and we picked out two Little Gulls, along with a few Common and Sandwich Terns. Crested Larks and Yellow Wagtails patrolled the beach, and Red-throated Pipits inhabited the saline pools, though the latter were somewhat elusive. An Osprey and eight Lesser Kestrels were likely freshly arrived, and Zitting Cisticolas danced overhead.

With time marching on, we found a local diner for lunch, then began the final leg of our journey back to Athens Airport. Check-in went smoothly, and we were soon winging our way home, though some clients stayed on to enjoy the delights of Athens. Thanks to all for a wonderful trip, which was full of much mirth, merriment and marvellous memories.
