## Summary

New trips are always full of surprises, but some perhaps more than others. Many of the group were surprised at the enormity of the wetlands that we visited, the great wealth of birds to be found there, the lumbering size of the Dalmatian Pelicans and, perhaps the greatest surprise of all, which shall be referred to simply as “Martin”. We moved in a Greek way, enjoying pink-tinged, plunge-feeding Slender-billed Gulls, great hordes of fishing cormorants and pelicans, some wonderful views of Greater Spotted Eagles in the Eucalyptus trees, and busy parties of Serins, Cirl Buntings and Woodlarks. A day out at Ancient Olympia was a delightful break from the wetlands, and we had some wonderful meals courtesy of Maria and her little taverna.

This was a wonderful trip for the huge numbers of waterfowl, herons, egrets and waders that thronged the coastal lagoons and for the wealth of raptors, from buzzards and kites, to harriers and impressive eagles. All these made for a wonderful time in a chilly yet spectacularly scenic corner of Greece.

### Day 1

**Saturday 10th January**

A chilly early morning start, shortly after the passing of a major storm, could have given cause for concern, but we boarded and set off remarkably efficiently. Arriving in Athens, we headed west along main roads and stopped off at the impressive Corinth Canal for a photo stop and lunch. Continuing on our way, we had to detour to avoid road closures, but eventually we made it to our hotel, tucked away in the north-west corner of the Peloponnese. A short drive took us to a local taverna for dinner, before preparation for the morrow and bed.

### Day 2

**Sunday 11th January**

Our first day dawned as predicted, after a wild night of high winds, rain and thunderstorms. Our vans picked their way through floodwater on the road to breakfast, and the weather continued wet for the morning, though the winds died down. We spent time around Kalogera Lagoon and later Prokopou Lagoon, finding birds at nearly every turn. A highlight came with a mass of hundreds of Great Cormorants gliding in to feed. The feeding frenzy drew in parties of huge and impressive Dalmatian Pelicans, while in the background, ranks of Great and Little Egrets, Grey Herons and Spoonbills picked off morsels around the edges. Flocks of Teals, Shovelers, Coots and others were on the water, and we had some close encounters with Black-necked Grebes. Caspian Terns put on a fine display, and we were pleased to find a Slender-billed Gull. Surrounding fields held flocks of Meadow Pipits, with Water Pipits in the wetter areas, while two flighty Richard’s Pipits were a nice bonus.

For our packed lunches, we headed into the dunes in the Strophylia National Park, stopping off to watch Crested Larks and Kentish Plovers on the beach, before heading into the scenic forest of Stone and Aleppo Pines. We began the afternoon cruising through the pinewoods, which were flooded with water to the point that Redshanks, egrets and even Greater Flamingoes were feeding within the pinewoods! The rain had eased after lunch and the sun started to edge its way through: great landscape photo opportunities arose. We passed flocks of Starlings and Lapwings, the latter with a single Golden Plover in tow, and finished our day with some great views of Western Rock Nuthatches as the sun set over the distant outline of Zakynthos. It had been a great day, all rounded off with a wonderful taverna dinner.

## Day 3

Monday 12th January

We headed out for a bit of culture today, and headed down the coast for a day at the site of Ancient Olympia. We had a guided tour around the museum, which contained a great wealth of artefacts found at this important site over the years. We could see the gradual change from an array of pottery items in changing styles, through the use of metal to create more intricate implements. There were amazing statues, too, of Hermes and the infant Dionysus, Nike of Paionios, the Roman emperor Hadrian and many more. Outside, we toured the original gymnasium site, the *palacio* and the temples of Hera and Zeus, all in various states of renovation. Here, too, was the original Olympic stadium, and some of the group showed us their prowess in hurtling along the length of the site.

After a bit of free time to wander the Crown Anemone-studded paths, we reconvened at the vehicles and ate our packed lunches. From here, we headed back towards Strofylia, stopping for some final wetland birding and to watch the impressive murmuration of Starlings over the reeds as the sun lowered in the sky.


## Day 4

Tuesday 13th January

After our usual 7.30am breakfast at Maria's place, and the almost obligatory Green Sandpiper in the flooded drive, we packed up the vehicles and began our drive to our next destination. Just a short distance away, we stopped at a small harbour to see what birds were along the beach or in the bay, and found a nice collection of gulls and terns on nearby rocks, including some forty Mediterranean Gulls, several apparent 'Baltic' Lesser Black-backed Gulls, and a few Sandwich Terns. Crested Larks and a Kentish Plover were on the sandy beach.

Our route then took us over the spectacular Charilaos Trikoupi bridge, one of the world's longest multispan cable-stay bridges, a feature which gracefully added to the majesty of the landscape. Once over the bridge, we headed west and arrived in Messolonghi in plenty of time for a first tour around part of the vast complex of lagoons, saltmarsh and bays that make up this important site for wintering birds. Vast rafts of Coots and Great Cormorants, stands of Greater Flamingoes and ranks of herons and egrets were spread out before us, and we worked our way through a fine collection of waders which included Avocets, Grey Plovers, Little Stints, Redshanks and Greenshanks in great quantity, plus choicer finds including two Temminck's Stints and two Greater Sand Plovers. Our attempts to find 'Derek the Terek' proved fruitless during the week, but it gave us another fun talking point over dinner as the week went on.

## Day 5

## Wednesday 14th January

Today saw us heading to a more easterly part of the wetland complex, with Common Buzzards and Marsh Harriers continuing to stir up the flocks of birds. Water Pipits trotted around the margins with more numerous Meadow Pipits and White Wagtails, and a raised viewing tower allowed us to spot some Common Snipe on muddy patches within the reed stands. From here, we headed northwards into the hills and drove up into Klissoura Gorge, where dramatic limestone cliffs housed some very obliging Griffon Vultures. A pair of Ravens was in residence, and stands of Annual Honesty were flowering along the old roadside, along with the first Almond flowers of the year and some Scorpion Senna flowers.

For lunch, we arrived, via an interesting detour, at what we discovered was 'Martin's Place', an interestingly quirky lunch stop, full of waffles, lakeside stories and surely many interesting memories to be savoured! Beyond here, we headed for the more westerly Louros lagoon area of the wetlands, taking some interesting dirt roads around a number of bird-filled lagoons. As ever, Greater Flamingoes graced the open waters, and wagtails and pipits trotted around the margins. Two Black Storks were a highlight here, and we found a small party of Spanish Sparrows and our first Serins of the trip. One particular stop turned up a nice gathering of Common Snipe on some grassy pools, and they showed nicely in the scope.

## Day 6

## Thursday 15th January

After the now obligatory cruise to check for Derek the Terek (still no sign), we picked up our bakery lunches and headed a couple of hours to the north, into the great basin of the Amvrakikos Wetlands National Park. Snaking our way through little back lanes, we eventually arrived at our destination, and were soon seeing small groups of Black and Red Kites circling around. When we scanned the scattered trees, our first Greater Spotted Eagles were found, and we enjoyed some lovely views of these smart birds, especially the spotty-winged youngsters. A Hen Harrier passed through all too briefly, before we found ourselves once again overlooking a vast complex of coastal lagoons. Lunch was taken on a small beach, overlooking a calm sea studded with several hundred Great Crested Grebes and smaller numbers of Black-necked Grebes. We spotted an acrobatic school of Common Bottlenose Dolphins, leaping with great abandon across the bay.

Further on, shallower margins provided more waders, with Oystercatcher and Sanderling being added to our lists, while several Black-throated Divers and two Red-breasted Mergansers were enjoyed in the scope. Trying to fit in all of the great wildlife locations in this corner is difficult, but we did manage to squeeze in a short visit to one of the important freshwater lakes of the area, Lake Lisimachia, before we wound our way home enjoying yet more fabulous vistas set off against a setting sun.

## Day 7

## Friday 16th January

It was time for a little more culture today, so we headed into the nearby hills to visit the ancient site of Pleuron, with its Cyclopean walls, giant cistern and partially-renovated theatre. While enjoying the site, we inevitably chanced across some nice wildlife, too, with parties of Serins and Cirl Buntings noted, and a nice total of nineteen Woodlarks. A male Blue Rock Thrush held court near the ancient theatre, and some of the small plants lining the paths were coming into flower, most notably large quantities of the pale blue *Bellevalia hyacinthoides* and white Chios Chamomile, together with a few stripy heads of Friar's Cowl.

From here, we headed north to a small National Park comprising riparian woodland of Ash, Elm and White Poplar, which is rapidly becoming a very rare habitat in the region. After eating our picnics, we took a walk along a stone path and heard a Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, then enjoyed great views of a Middle Spotted Woodpecker. Heading back towards Messolonghi, we took the driveable track along the eastern side of Klissova Lagoon and out to the southernmost tip of the wetland. Here, we found more flocks of waders gathered on the mud, with notably large numbers of Grey Plovers, a cluster of Sanderlings, several Bar-tailed Godwits and a wide range of the now familiar species.

## Day 8

## Saturday 17th January

Flights times only allowed for an hour or so of local birding before we needed to start heading for Athens, so we took a final short drive along the side of Klissova Lagoon. Unfortunately, it was rather windy today and birds were less easy to approach, but we enjoyed shrimp-pink Greater Flamingoes and diminutive Pygmy Cormorants with their ever-attendant Coots, while the occasional Dalmatian Pelican lumbered overhead, no doubt moving in a Greek way.

After a final stop at our favourite bakery for lunch goodies, we took to the main roads and headed back over the wonderful cable-stay bridge, turning eastwards along the northern coast of the Peloponnese and making it in good time back to Athens airport. Some of the group headed off to the railway station for a few days of cultural activities, and the rest of us headed for Departures. Many thanks to all for a wonderful inaugural trip to this little-known corner of Greece, which was full of wonderful surprises, great memories and some very strange moments of mirth!
