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Summary

Early May offered an excellent opportunity to explore the rich wetlands, lagoons and coastal habitats of western Greece during spring migration. Beginning in the remarkable mosaic of lagoons, dunes and pine forests around Strofilia National Park, and continuing north to the lagoon systems of Messolonghi, the week combined relaxed birdwatching with spectacular scenery and a great diversity of wildlife. The weather was somewhat variable for the season, with periods of cloud, strong winds and occasional light rain during the first days, gradually giving way to calmer and brighter conditions later in the week. Highlights throughout the week included huge concentrations of waders, some in breeding plumage, lots of singing warblers, and raptor colonies, including Lesser Kestrels and Griffon Vultures.

Day 1

Friday 1st May

After arrival we transferred west to Kalogria. Although the weather conditions were not ideal, the journey offered the first glimpses of the Peloponnesian coastline. After settling in, we made the short drive to a restaurant where we had our dinner. On our way back to the hotel, we heard our first owls: a Little Owl calling and a Scops Owl singing.

Day 2

Saturday 2nd May

Our first full day was spent exploring the remarkable habitats of Strofilia National Park, beginning at Prokopos Lagoon, before continuing through Mavra Vouna, Kalogria Lagoon, the Strofilia Pine Forest and finally Kalogria Beach. Although there were no major rarities today, the sheer beauty and diversity of the landscape itself made a lasting impression. Big numbers of herons, egrets, gulls and terns moved constantly over the lagoons. The flooded lagoon edges supported numerous waders, including Little Stints and Collared Pratincoles. The atmospheric Stone Pine Forest of Strofilia provided a striking contrast to the open coastal lagoons and sandy coastline.

While we were having our lunch break, we heard Short-toed Treecreepers, numerous Sardinian Warblers and large numbers of finches singing. At Kalogria beach, we took a short walk at the sand dunes, and we came across a pair of Kentish Plovers with their small chicks, feeding along the shoreline.

Day 3

Sunday 3rd May

Today combined culture and birding with a morning visit to ancient Olympia, before heading north to the Lechaina saltpans during the afternoon. The archaeological site was alive with both breeding and migrant passerines, with the highlight being a superb singing Icterine Warbler. The combination of ancient monuments and flowering vegetation created great scenery and at the ruins of the archaeological site we saw at least three Peloponnese Wall Lizards, an endemic species of the peninsula.

Later, at Lechaina salt pans, large numbers of waders were seen feeding across the shallow waters. The highlight was a striking Grey Plover, already in rich breeding plumage, while Glossy Ibises and other waterfowl were feeding in the wetland. An unexpected male Pintail added further interest among the more typical wetland species.

Day 4

Monday 4th May

We spent the day travelling north toward the Messolonghi wetlands, driving first via Prokopos Lagoon before continuing to Lamia Marsh, and then having our lunch at Agyia Marsh in Patra, where we walked a bit to enjoy the view of Charilaos Trikoupi's bridge that connects Rio-Antirio.

After our arrival in Messolonghi we did an evening visit to Kleisova Lagoon, where we saw one of the most impressive spectacles of the tour. Huge numbers of waders shimmered across the mudflats and shallow pools, constantly shifting in the sunset light, while large numbers of terns passed overhead.

Day 5

Tuesday 5th May

Our exploration of the Messolonghi region began with a short check at Plostena Lagoon, before we visited the National Park Information Center at Aitoliko lagoon, and the Finikia Marsh. From there, we continued inland towards Kleisoura Gorge, where we came across soaring Griffon Vultures, a singing Blue Rock Thrush and the tour's only Blackcap.

We stopped for lunch beside Aitoliko Lagoon, before birding along the Acheloos River, Lesini Village and finally Fraxos Forest. The Lesser Kestrel colony at Lesini village proved especially enjoyable, with birds constantly circling over rooftops, calling noisily and engaging in courtship activity around their nesting sites. The villagers were especially welcoming, and clearly proud of the Lesser Kestrels nesting among their houses, and they informed us about their status over recent years.

Later, the visit to Fraxos Forest provided a complete contrast to the open wetlands of the previous days. In the mature oak tree woodland, we saw at least two Middle Spotted Woodpeckers, a pair of Levant Sparrowhawks calling in their territory, and a Hermann's Tortoise.

Day 6

Wednesday 6th May

Today we explored the western part of the wetland complex, including Aitoliko Lagoon, Louros, Dioni and the Acheloos River Estuary. One of the major highlights came early in the day, when a Golden Jackal was seen running in a field in the Louros area. In the same place we had excellent numbers Calandra, Greater Short-toed and Crested Lark displayed high above our heads. Further down, we encountered a singing Rufous-tailed Scrub Robin, which was a unique moment.

After Louros we headed back to Aitoliko lagoon, where we enjoyed a relaxed homemade lunch at a friend's house overlooking the lagoon. Next, we visited Acheloos river estuary and Dioni beach. The mixture of river channels, mudflats, reedbeds and open coastal lagoons created a spectacular backdrop for birdwatching, where Marsh Harriers, large numbers of herons and waders, and even a Caspian Tern were seen.

Day 7

Thursday 7th May

Our final full day began at the ancient site of Oiniades, before continuing to Agia Triada Lagoon during the midday. Oiniades proved to be a fascinating combination of archaeology and wildlife. The old theatre and fortifications overlooked lush wetland habitats alive with amphibians, terrapins, insects and birdlife, creating a wonderfully peaceful atmosphere for morning exploration. We saw both European Pond Terrapins and a Balkan Terrapin, while Marsh Frogs were continuously calling.

At Agia Triada lagoon, we had our memorable finale for the week. Stone-curlews showed particularly well around the saltmarsh edges, while Turnstones fed along the shoreline among large gatherings of other waders. It was exciting to see several Dalmatian Pelican fledglings, numerous pairs of Common Terns, Yellow Wagtails and our second pipit species, a Tawny Pipit, feeding among Crested Larks. It was a beautiful finale to a memorable week in the wetlands of western Greece.

Day 8

Friday 8th May

After breakfast, we began our journey back toward Athens, stopping for lunch at the Corinth canal. Even during this transfer day, there was still time for wildlife highlights, the best coming from the colony of Lesser Kestrels inside the rocks of the Isthmus. Several birds were watched at close range, including a pair engaged in copulation. We grabbed a coffee after taking some photos of the canal, and then headed towards the airport.

As spring migration continued across western Greece, the week ended with unforgettable memories of glowing lagoons, calling waders, soaring raptors and the remarkable diversity of life found in these unique wetlands.
