Day 1

Monday 5th November

London to Georgetown

After flying via Barbados we arrived at Georgetown airport on time in the late evening and transferred to our comfortable hotel close to the city centre.

Day 2

Tuesday 6th November

Georgetown to Arrowpoint

After breakfast we left Georgetown and drove inland along the east bank of the wide brown Demerara River through lush fields of sugar cane and past the Demerara Rum Distillery. At Temeri Creek we transferred into a boat, crossed the river and proceeded up the narrow forest-fringed Kamuni and Pokero Creeks past Santa Mission to Arrowpoint Lodge. We arrived in time for lunch and then after a siesta interrupted by an exciting range of small birds and an impressively large Tegu Lizard we went for a walk in the nearby sandbelt forest. Bird highlights during the course of the afternoon included our first Black-necked Aracaris and White-throated Toucans, a pair of Yellow-tufted Woodpeckers and a smart male Barred Antshrike. We ended the day in the canoes cruising the short distance back down the creek to the lodge. In all an easy and relaxing day enjoying a wide range of birds and other wildlife and acclimatising to being in Guyana.

Day 3

Wednesday 7th November

Arrowpoint

In the early morning cool we enjoyed a wonderful canoe ride upstream from the lodge and saw a huge variety of birds that included several stunning Crimson-topaz Hummingbirds at their lek, a Squirrel Cuckoo, two smart Black-capped Donacobius and good numbers of Red-bellied and Red-shouldered Macaws. After breakfast back at the lodge we visited the Amerindian community at Santa Mission. Lunch and a siesta followed and then we finished the day with another walk along the forest trails and a bit of after dark caiman lamping on the creek.

Day 4

Thursday 8th November

Arrowpoint to Shanklands

Another superb early morning canoe ride completed our time at Arrowpoint and we departed shortly after breakfast, backtracking down stream and across the Demerara River to Temeri Creek.

Here we transferred to our bus, drove back downstream towards Georgetown, re-crossed the Demerara on the famous floating bridge and continued along the low-lying coastal strip through villages and farmland to the mouth of the mighty Essequibo River. At Parika we boarded another boat and then roared and bumped our way up the Essequibo to the colonial splendour of Shanklands where we arrived in good time to settle in before lunch.

In the late afternoon with White-throated Toucans calling from the treetops and Southern Lapwings strutting across the lawns we took an exploratory walk around the clearing and into the adjacent forest and scrubland. After dinner a brief night walk produced a Silver Fox skulking near the kitchen door and a superb, lightning fast Red-footed Tarantula hunting on a tree trunk.

Day 5

Friday 9th November

Shanklands

A thoroughly enjoyable day at Shanklands involved a pre-breakfast stroll around the clearing, a morning exploration of the forest trails and an afternoon walk along the river shore that was cut short by a spectacularly heavy rain shower. Notable sightings included a troop of Wedge-capped Capuchins crashing through the forest canopy, a pair of Bat Falcons mobbing a Turkey Vulture, four skulking Spix's Guans, a handsome and very vocal Spot-winged Antbird, a Glittering-throated Emerald on its tiny nest, lekking Golden-headed Manakins and fantastic views of nesting Yellow-rumped Caciques.

Day 6

Saturday 10th November

Shanklands to Kaiteur Falls and Surama

After breakfast we left Shanklands and cruised a little further upstream to the airstrip at Baganaro where an aircraft awaited us. In no time we were airborne and heading south-westwards over an endless sea of rain forest. After 40 minutes or so the terrain became rather hillier and we entered the gorge leading up to Kaiteur itself. Suddenly the falls were there in front of us in all their awesome glory and after one quick fly-past we landed at the nearby airstrip. From here we walked the trails to various spectacular viewpoints and admired the waterfall from a range of angles. In the surrounding mist-forest we enjoyed the impressive Tank Bromeliads complete with their jewel-like Golden Frogs and found several stunning Guyanan Cock-of-the-Rocks.

From Kaiteur we flew on southwards for another hour or so. After a while the blanket of rainforest began to break up into a patchwork of forest and savannah and then we sighted the Rock View airstrip and landed in time for lunch. In the late afternoon we drove out across the open savannah, stopped for a variety of notable birds including a pair of Burrowing Owls, and arrived at serene Surama just as the sun was setting. It had been a full and enjoyable day.

Day 7

Sunday 11th November

Surama

A morning walk from the lodge took us across the savannah and into a superb stretch of forest where we encountered an excellent range of wildlife including Capuchinbirds, Grey-winged Trumpeters, Leaf-cutter Ants,

Blue Morpho butterflies, Red-rumped Agoutis and a fine male Red Howler Monkey. In the late afternoon some of the party went to the village to watch a song and dance presentation by the local Amerindian school children whilst others went for another walk to a different area of forest and found a roosting Great Potoo.

Day 8

Monday 12th November

Surama to Iwokrama

Leaving Surama before dawn we were at the canopy walkway at Atta in the heart of the Iwokrama Forest Reserve shortly after first light and able to enjoy the marvellous experience of being up amongst the tree-tops in the early morning. Bird activity was excellent and a host of exciting species included Spangled Cotinga, Green and Black-necked Aracaris, Channel-billed and White-throated Toucans, Pied Puffbird and an exquisite male Black-eared Fairy.

After a late breakfast back by the vehicles we drove on through the forest to the Essequibo River where we boarded a waiting boat and completed the journey to the comfortable Iwokrama Research Centre. We arrived in time for lunch and a siesta and then in the late afternoon we went for a walk on one of the trails through the surrounding forest with our enthusiastic and entertaining local guide Wally. Wildlife sightings were few in the afternoon heat but we did get good views of a Chestnut Woodpecker and a female Black-throated Trogon.

Day 9

Tuesday 13th November

Iwokrama

In the morning most of us went for a long but rewarding hike to the top of Turtle Mountain where we enjoyed the extensive views out over apparently endless primary forest. Notable birds included dozens of very noisy Screaming Pihas (some of which we actually saw), a smart Black-faced Ant-thrush running across the trail, another Spangled Cotinga and a brief Sungrebe. In the afternoon we went for a boat trip around one of the river islands and then up to the nearby rapids. Highlights here included an immature Ornate Hawk Eagle gliding low over the river, a flock of spectacular Blue-and-yellow Macaws and a couple of huge Giant River Turtles clambering around amongst the rocks of the rapids. After dinner we went out on the river again and found a few moderately sized Spectacled Caimans plus both Cook's and Emerald Tree Boas.

Day 10

Wednesday 14th November

Iwokrama to Rock View

We started the day with a pre-dawn departure from the Research Centre and another early morning session up on the canopy walkway. Bird highlights this time included displaying Purple-throated Fruitcrows, Fasciated and Mouse-coloured Antshrikes, Todd's Antwren and good views of Paradise and Spotted Tanagers. We ate a late breakfast back at Atta camp where a King Vulture soaring high overhead provided an interesting diversion and then proceeded towards Annai and Rock View. A walk along a trail near the Iwokrama reserve entrance took us up to a rocky outcrop where we were able to see a couple of old Cock-of-the-Rock nests. A range of notable birds here included a trio of impressive Red-necked Woodpeckers, a Long-billed Gnatwren and a wonderful little Ferruginous-backed Antbird that pottederred confidently across the forest floor.

We arrived at Rock View in good time for lunch and then in the late afternoon we went for a stroll around the surrounding fields and savannah. Buff-necked Ibis, Yellow-crowned Parrots, Eastern Meadowlarks and Burnished-buff Tanagers provided avian interest whilst a fine sunset rounded the day off nicely.

Day 11

Thursday 15th November

Rock View

In the early morning we walked a trail along the wooded ridge a little to the west of Rock View and encountered a satisfying range of birds including Lineated Woodpecker, White-bellied Antbird, Tropical Gnatcatcher, Finsch's Euphonia, Yellow Oriole and a confiding Laughing Falcon. In the afternoon we watched the preparation of some cashew nuts (a volatile and fiery process) and then explored the savannah and forest edge along the road towards Surama. The Burrowing Owls were still standing sentinel by their burrow and nearby we found Vermilion Flycatchers, a pair of Double-striped Thick-knees and a superb Bicoloured Wren.

Day 12

Friday 16th November

Rock View to Karanambu

In the early morning we drove south along the traffic-free dirt-track highway towards Lethem and made a series of short stops. The savannah here, criss-crossed by low wooded hills and interspersed with marshy hollows and small pools, was absolutely alive with birds. Highlights included several impressive Muscovy Ducks, Savannah and White-tailed Hawks, a surprise Limpkin, a bevy of Crested Bobwhites, a flock of Brown-throated Parakeets and dozens of elegant Fork-tailed Flycatchers.

After a leisurely middle of the day at Rock View we finally took our leave in the mid-afternoon and drove the short distance to a point on the Rupununi River where we met up with the boats and guides from Karanambu. With luggage transferred we embarked on an extraordinary three-hour trip that rapidly developed into a thrilling wildlife extravaganza during which we saw a host of herons, three species of Kingfisher, dozens of Anhingas, a couple of mighty Jabirus, several Crane Hawks and a superb male Red Howler that sat atop a riverside tree and watched us cruise past. As the sun went down we enjoyed a rum punch and watched scores of Band-tailed Nighthawks wheel overhead whilst hordes of Bulldog Bats skimmed low over the water surface – fantastic! We finally arrived at Karanambu an hour or so after dark and rapidly settled in and sat down to a delicious dinner.

Day 13

Saturday 17th November

Karanambu

A full day exploring the waterways and gallery forests around Karanambu took us into some superbly unspoilt habitat and introduced us to a wonderful variety of wildlife. Among the highlights during this excellent day were several huge Black Caiman loafing on the river banks, dozens of Arapaima turning in the shallows of beautiful, lily-studded Crane Pond and a host of birds that included Agami and Boat-billed Herons, Black-collared Hawk, Wattled Jacana, Pied Lapwing, Black Skimmer, Large-billed Tern and Yellow-chinned Spinetail. We finished the day once again with a sunset cruise down the river drinking rum punches as the bats and the nighthawks came out.

Day 14

Sunday 18th November

Karanambu

A morning excursion in the vehicles out on the savannah soon produced our chief quarry in the form of two Giant Anteaters, a mother and well-grown youngster, curled up amongst the grass tussocks under a small tree with the adult's huge tail covering them like a blanket. After this success we proceeded across the savannah to another wooded creek system where we found a mighty Jabiru on its massive stick nest high up in a tall tree plus a range of other notable birds including Least Bittern, Sharp-tailed Ibis, White-tailed Trogon and Slate-headed Tody-Tyrant.

In the afternoon we took to the boats again and had a wonderful time exploring a series of serene and pristine creeks where we saw a single Giant Otter that appeared briefly right by the boats, a troop of breathtakingly acrobatic Bearded Sakis leaping through the tree-tops, two superb Rufescent Tiger Herons and a skulking Sunbrebe. As dusk fell we sat in the boats alongside Victoria amazonica Lilies and watched as their flowers slowly opened and their pollinators, a species of chafer beetle, arrived and clambered into them. One flower, incredibly, received over 80 beetles. A spot of caiman lamping on the way back to the ranch completed another thoroughly satisfying and enjoyable day.

Day 15

Monday 19th November

Karanambu to Georgetown

Our final morning at Karanambu saw us making a last trip to the Buffalo Ponds in the hope of another encounter with Giant Otters. As we made our way through the wooded cover along the shore of the first pond we suddenly came upon them, seven in all, moving fast through the water, heads popping up, snorting and looking our way. They swam the length of the pond and back again and we followed them as best we could and got a series of excellent views. They made their way to the second pond where we lost them but were treated to the usual spectacle of a host of water birds plus, on this occasion, an extra bonus in the form of a pair of nest-building Crimson-crested Woodpeckers. Happy with our success we returned to the ranch for breakfast.

After an early lunch we made our way to the airstrip and peered into the sky to the south. An aeroplane duly appeared and in no time we were airborne and on our way back to Georgetown. Below us the patchwork of savannah and rainforest stretched away to infinity, a hugely impressive sight. After an hour or so we landed in Georgetown and transferred to our hotel to freshen up before setting out to the nearby botanic gardens. Here we enjoyed the last of the afternoon and found a range of good birds that included a Pearl Kite, a Straight-billed Woodcreeper, two Grey Kingbirds, several Yellow Orioles and a pair of Festive Parrots.

Day 16

Tuesday 20th November

Georgetown and in flight

After an early morning trip back to the Botanic Gardens for the keen few, which turned up a brief Blood-coloured Woodpecker, a trio of neat little White-bellied Piculets and another Limpkin, we made our way to the international airport for our late morning flight to Barbados via Trinidad.

After a little excitement we made it to Barbados and connected with our overnight BA flight to London where we arrived safely and on time early the following morning.

Birds

Mammals

Red Howler Monkey (Arrowpoint, Surama, Iwokrama and Karanambu), Wedge-capped Capuchin (Shanklands, Surama and Iwokrama), Bearded Saki, (Karanambu), Silver Fox (Shanklands), Giant Otter (Karanambu), Red-rumped Agouti (Arrowpoint, Shanklands, Surama and Iwokrama), Little River Bat (Surama, Iwokrama and Karanambu), Leaf-nosed Bat sp. (Arrowpoint), Bulldog Bats spp. Karanambu.

Reptiles

Those specifically identified included: Black Caiman, Spectacled Caiman, Giant River Turtle, Cook's Tree Boa, Emerald Tree Boa and Amazonian Tree Boa. Additionally we saw a range of Iguanid and Anolis Lizards, Skinks and Geckos.

Amphibians

The only specific identification was the Golden Frogs in the Tank Bromeliads at Kaiteur Falls. Additionally we saw various Tree Frogs and Bufo Toads.
