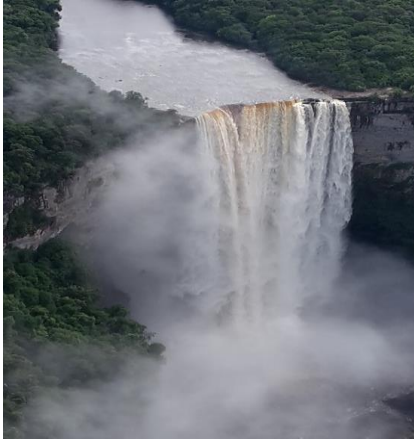

Highlights

There were many highlights on this trip, amongst which were:

- Seeing five male Cock-of-the-Rocks and having incredible views at Kaieteur Falls.
- Seeing several large macaws, Orange-breasted Falcon and Sankar, the large very Black Caiman in Iwokrama.
- Sightings of a Sloth, Grey-winged Trumpeters, Black Curassow and Red Brocket Deer at Atta Lodge.
- Sighting a male Cock-of-the-Rock in Iwokrama.
- Sightings of the many birds on the trip down the Burro-Burro river to the Harpy Eagle nest and finding the chick in its splendour.
- The boat trips on the river and lakes near the Karanambu Lodge, with lots of wildlife observations, including the family of Giant Otters on the river, the three orphans at the lodge and the Giant Anteater out in the savanna.
- Having several species of mammals, reptiles and amphibians during the trip.
- Great birding at the Mahaica River, especially the Hoatzin, great breakfast at Naresh and getting the mangrove specific species at the Abary area.
- The many photographic opportunities during the trip for capturing 'moments in nature'

Day 1

Monday 19th November

UK to Cara Lodge, Georgetown

Two of the group flew from London Gatwick, via Port of Spain, to Georgetown. In the afternoon Wally Prince departed with Colin for Cheddi Jagan International Airport to pick them up at 9.45pm, and transported them back to Cara Lodge where they checked in. Anne and Frank had arrived a few days earlier. Everyone arrived safely with their bags.

Day 2

Tuesday 20th November

Cara Lodge to Iwokrama River Lodge via Kaieteur Falls

We were at Ogle Airstrip at 8.30am, stopping en route to do some brief birding at the Ogle seaside mudflats at low tide. After a couple of hours' delay, we departed for Kaieteur Falls. We had spectacular views of the falls from the Rainbow View lookout point. The volume of the falls was high, due to recent rain, hence a spectacular display of the Kaieteur. We also saw collectively five Cock-of-the-Rocks; with three males close to each other.

We arrived at Iwokrama River Lodge after 3pm and were shown to our rooms and our afternoon trail-walk, was washed out by the rains. We also saw Red-and-green Macaws, Cliff Flycatcher and a pair of Ornate Hawk-Eagles among other bird species and including the Golden Frog at Kaieteur.

After dinner, we departed for the nocturnal river activity, and the combined sightings included one Amazonian Tree Boa, a few fishing-bats, Ladder-tailed Nightjars and Black Caimans. We were able to rescue an immature Barn Swallow from becoming dinner for an Amazonian Tree Boa.

Day 3

Wednesday 21st November

Iwokrama River Lodge



Orange-breasted Falcon

After a 6am breakfast, we departed for Turtle Mountain. We observed many birds on the way, and our way back to the lodge. Everyone went up to the top. The bird of the day was the Orange-breasted Falcon, which was the main reason that one of the group came to Guyana, to see this bird and the Harpy Eagle. We also saw and photographed a Long-tailed Potoo on the TM trail. We also saw Black Spider Monkey from the lookout point.

We arrived back at Iwokrama River Lodge for lunch at 2.45pm. Later in the afternoon, we went up to Fairview village landing to see the Petroglyphs and to do some late birding at the eastern end of the airstrip. This provided the only opportunity for the trip to see the Blue-and-yellow Macaws. We also had clear views of Sankar, the Black Caiman.

Day 4

Thursday 22nd November

Iwokrama River Lodge to Atta Rainforest Lodge

Before breakfast, we departed at 4.20am to do some early morning spotlighting along the road, and then birded on our way back to Iwokrama River Lodge. After breakfast, we departed for Atta Rainforest Lodge, birding along the way and arrived at the lodge at around midday. We saw Tapir tracks along the road.

We were greeted by the Atta staff, shown to our rooms, and in the afternoon, we departed for the Canopy Walkway. As it became dusk, we left the walkway and went out to the road to find the White-winged Potoo, but no luck. We were told that it was around the lodge grounds, while we were out at the road.

Day 5

Friday 23rd November

Atta Rainforest Lodge

We requested a 6am breakfast, and John and Wally took the group onto the road heading east towards the Mori-Scrub area that is approximately three kilometres from the lodge. We were able to get a few habitat-specific species, including Bronzy Jacamar, Black Manakin, White-fringed Antwren and other species such as Spotted

Puffbird, White-crowned Manakin and a Rufous-capped Antthrush, which was a Lifer for our guide John Christian. We arrived back at the lodge for lunch. Two Tayras were seen crossing the road. On our arrival back at the lodge, a Red Brocket Deer was browsing in the yard and a Red-rumped Agouti was also seen.

In the afternoon at 4.10pm, we went back up in a westerly direction to the Mushiparu Bridge, again sighting several species of new birds for the group. We were also able to see several Electric Eels foraging in the Mushiparu Creek. On our way back at dusk, we stopped and made a second attempt for the White-winged Potoo and this time we were lucky, albeit for just a couple of minutes or so.

Day 6

Saturday 24th November

Atta Rainforest Lodge to Surama

After a 6am breakfast, we took the group to Mushiparu Bridge and along the road; many species of birds were observed, including antbirds, parrots, macaws, toucans, flycatchers, herons and three species of cotingas.

The vehicle picked us up from the road and we proceeded onwards to the Cock-of-the-rock trail, and took photos of one male, which provided brief sightings. We arrived in Surama, had lunch, were shown to our rooms, and relaxed until 4pm.

In the afternoon, we did a walk down the old landing road and returned at sunset to the eco-lodge.

Day 7

Sunday 25th November

Surama

After a 6am breakfast, we walked down to the Burro-Burro river and got into a motorized boat for a 1.5-hour journey downriver to the Harpy Eagle nest. The chick is now 'branching', and so we spent close to two hours there, before heading back to the lodge for a late lunch at about 3pm.

In the late afternoon, only Mark and Brian took the afternoon savanna stroll with Milnor and me. The rains forced us to shelter at Milnor's house, but we saw a few species, and had good views of rainbows and the sunset after the rains.

Day 8

Monday 26th November

Surama

After a 6.30am breakfast, we were dropped off at Surama Junction, and walked our way back to the village entrance, where the vehicle picked us up and dropped us off back at the lodge. This five-kilometre walk proved productive with birds such as: Crimson Fruit Crow, Guianan Red Cotinga, Cayenne Jay, all new for the trip, and several other species.

It then decided to rain from midday until mid-afternoon. At 4.15pm we departed for the Great Potoo site, where we found two birds. We had to wait for the rains to stop before we could take photos, but it was worth it.

Day 9

Tuesday 27th November

Surama to Karanambu Lodge

At 8.37am the group departed for Genip Landing, birding en route. We saw Black-and-white Becard, White-tailed Hawk, Great Black Hawk, Savanna Hawk, King Vulture, Violaceous Euphonia, Tropical Gnatcatcher, Pied Water Tyrant, Vermillion Flycatcher, Jabiru Stork, and many other species.

Our boat ride to the lodge was also very productive, including a Black Hawk-Eagle, a very unusual and unexpected sighting. The water level in the river was higher than expected for this time of the year, since there had been a lot of rains, as we saw on day one of the trip.

In the afternoon, we departed upriver for Mobay Pond. We saw many birds, including herons, Rufescent Tiger Heron, egrets, parrots, macaws, Band-tailed Nighthawks and Boat-billed Herons. We spotlighted our way back to the lodge. Squirrel Monkeys were also sighted at Mobay Pond. The rains chased us away from the pond.

The Lodge have three young orphan Giant Otters, and they're well taken care off by Maya DeFreitas; admin staff at the lodge.

Day 10

Wednesday 28th November

Karanambu Lodge

At 6am, we departed in one vehicle to look for the Giant Anteater, and we were able to find a large individual on our own, without the assistance of the Vacqueros (cowboys). It seems that in the 12 attempts to find this animal, only two have been successful, so we were very fortunate. This is one of the key animals that Anne and Frank wanted to see, and the other being the Giant Otters.

In the afternoon at 4.35pm we departed for the savannas, and had several savanna species, including very good views of the Orange-backed Troupial. After sundown, we also saw the White-tailed and Nacunda Nighthawks.

Day 11

Thursday 29th November

Karanambu Lodge

At 5.15am we departed to do a stakeout at a Giant Otter den upriver, but with no luck. On our way back to the lodge we saw a closer den that showed signs of activities. It rained the entire time we were out there staking out the den.

After breakfast, we hiked to the Capuchinbird trail, but we did not manage to see this strange bird. We did see Screaming Piha and the Blue-backed Manakin.

In the afternoon, we went out to Taraqua Pond to look for otters, but again, with no luck. We then crossed over to Semoni Pond, including 'sun-down', and saw Red Howlers and Brown-bearded Saki monkeys. We saw a lot of Band-tailed Nighthawks and caimans.

Day 12

Friday 30th November

Karanambu Lodge to Cara Lodge, Georgetown



Giant River Otter

At 5.10am, we departed to the closer Giant Otter den upriver near Crane Pond entrance, to stake out the otters. This time it paid off, we had a family of 5 individuals, and the young were much older and larger than the orphans at the lodge. We spent close to an hour with them, observing them playing and hunting for breakfast. It was quite a treat to be able to witness this.

We departed for Lethem at 9am. Our flight left Lethem at 1.12pm; we arrived in Georgetown, checked into our rooms, and had lunch at Cara Lodge. The rest of the afternoon the group relaxed. Mark and Brian visited a Bourda Market, a local market two blocks away from Cara Lodge; a brief immersion in local fruits and culture.

Day 13

Saturday 1st December

Georgetown: Mahaica River, Abary, Botanic Gardens

At 4am, we departed for the Mahaica river. We were met by Naresh at the riverside, and we immediately proceeded on the boat trip to do birding and wildlife spotting. We saw many of the species we were targeting for the Mahaica: Hoatzin, Little Cuckoo, Blood-colored Woodpecker, Long-winged Harrier, and several other species, including two sightings of Red Howler Monkeys. After a very sumptuous breakfast, of traditional East Indian cuisine, we proceeded to the Abary foreshore site, and we were able to get the two main mangrove-specific species: Rufous Crab Hawk and the Bicolored Conebill. We also got several others including the Black-crested Antshrike.

We headed back to Georgetown to have a late lunch at the Back Yard Café and finish the day off with birding in the Botanical Gardens: Toco Toucans and West Indian Manatees. What a great day!

Day 14

Sunday 2nd December

Georgetown to Port of Spain, Trinidad and on to UK

At 7.15am, Colin and I took the group to Cheddi Jagan International Airport to check in for their departure for Trinidad and the UK.

Day 15

Monday 3rd December

Arrival back in the UK
