

India - A Wildlife Cruise on the Brahmaputra River

With a Sunderbans pre-tour extension

Naturetrek Tour Report

Summary

This was a successful tour, with 224 species of birds, 24 mammal species and 8 reptile species recorded. Charaidew is a glorious old boat with its own character. The highlights were the sightings of many large mammals and several grassland and wetland species of birds. Our first mammal was the rare Gangetic Dolphin, seen from our boat, the Charaidew. Our visit at the Hollongapar Hoolock Gibbon Sanctuary produced the Western Hoolock Gibbon and Capped Langurs, along with a few Rhesus Macaques. We also spotted the large Malayan Giant Squirrel and Orange-bellied Squirrel. We had some cultural visits at the Majuli Island where we were entertained by the Monastic dances at the Kamalabari Chatra.

We then visited Vekeli Chapori village on the south bank of the Brahmaputra where we met the local Mishing villagers and learnt about their life and ways of living. We, of course, visited the mega hotspot, Kaziranga. Four visits in Kaziranga gave us the Indian One-horned Rhinoceros, Asiatic Wild Buffalo, Asiatic Elephants, Smooth-coated Otters, Swamp Deer, Hog Deer, Pallas's Fish Eagle, Grey-headed Fish Eagle and even a distant Tiger, on the sand bank, from our boat. We spotted a family of Gibbons from the highway on one of our bus rides. One of the enigmatic birds we spotted was Pied Falconet. On the night of the Bihu show on board, we even had a wild Makhna (tuskless) elephant walking past our boat in Silghat at the end of the show, as if on cue.

Large flotillas of ducks and geese were seen from the boat while we were on the move. Harriers, Buzzards & Peregrine Falcons were seen on the sand banks along with large flocks of 50+ Black Storks. Rafting on the beautiful Jia Bholeli river along the Nameri Tiger Reserve gave us Common Mergansers, Ruddy Shelducks, Mallard, Great Stone-curlew and Small Pratincoles on the shingle bed islands. The fig tree behind the Pygmy Hog conservation centre gave us great views of the Great Hornbill and Capped Langurs. Before our last sunset, we visited the Peacock Island which has a Shiva temple and a few feral Golden Langurs. We finally finished off at Guwahati with a visit to the famous Kamakhshya temple. And on the way, we stopped at the rubbish tip for some close-up views of the world's rarest Storks...the Greater Adjutants.

We also had a pre-tour extension at Sunderbans. Set in the idyllic village setting, the Sunderbans Jungle Camp is like a little paradise. We used our boat to cruise the channels and saw Wild Boar, Chital deer, innumerable kingfishers of several species, and large Saltwater Crocodiles.

Extension Day 1

Saturday 3rd December

Five clients flew to Kolkata for the Sunderbans extension tour, checking in to the Hyatt Regency hotel.

Extension Day 2

Sunday 4th December

Sightseeing round Kolkata.

Extension Day 3

Monday 5th December

The group, with Sujan, left the Hyatt at 8am...and drove for three hours to Godkhali jetty via Baruipur Road. We drove down the narrow road which wound through the small suburban towns, dodging rickshaws, trucks, tuktuks, school kids, hay stacks and even goats. We reached Godkhali at 10.30 and got on to our boat, the Baba Nabin, and set sail down south towards our camp, the Sunderbans Jungle Camp. On our way we recorded Collared Kingfisher, and got a fleeting glimpse of the Black-capped Kingfisher.

We reached camp by 12pm and, after lunch, we set sail again for Sajnekhali, the park headquarters, for permits. On the way we saw a pair of the gorgeous Brahminy Kites. As the paper work was processed, we strolled around and picked up a Brown-winged Kingfisher sitting in the crocodile enclosure. We also saw Rhesus Macaques in the terrapin pond, swimming out to steal pumpkins floating around for the terrapins. We closed the day with a glorious sunset over the River Matla.

Extension Day 4

Tuesday 6th December

The morning started off with the calls of the roosting Rose-ringed Parakeets. While we had our tea, they all flew back and forth from the roost in the palm trees, calling their heads off. We set sail at 6.30am amidst a lot of mist. We sailed south and reached the Dobanki Canal. We recorded a few Lesser Sand Plovers and a Grey Plover. Next was a large Saltwater Crocodile; it did not stay long and slid off the mud as we approached. We spotted a Wild Boar in the distance, which was approaching the water fast. The captain mentioned that he might cross, and so he did – it was the first time I ever saw a Wild Boar swimming across the channel. An enthusiastic Brown-winged Kingfisher gave us some good action, while trying to catch mudskippers from the mud bank. We then got off at the Dobanki tower and saw a few deer drinking at the sweet-water pond. Back on the boat we spotted our crocodile again, it went into a shallow creek and started to hunt fishes by churning the water.

The rest of the day was spent clocking White-bellied Sea Eagles, Small Minivets and several kingfishers amongst the birds, plus more crocodiles and Chital deer during the day.

Extension Day 5

Wednesday 7th December

We set off north today, soon reaching the Sudhanyakhali Watchtower. A Spot-tailed Pit Viper was spotted curled up on the bathroom wall. We then ticked off the pretty Loten's Sunbird, a Rufous Treepie and a whole bunch of Bronze Drongos. Later, we got large flocks of Lesser Whistling Ducks at a junction of two channels. We saw several Wild Boar, Chital, Crocodiles and Water Monitors. We had great views of a beautiful Shikra and a Crested (also known as Oriental) Honey Buzzard too. After several kingfishers and Brahminy Kites, we finished off with several Lesser Sand Plovers on a mudflat. The same flat had a few deer on high alert and sounding alarmed. We had our eyes peeled and ears cocked... but there was no sign of the striped cat.

We returned to our camp at dusk. A cultural show of a folk drama was organized by the villagers for us.

Main Tour Day 1/Extension Day 6

Thursday 8th December

This was our last day in Sunderbans so we went for a walk in the village, along the embankment. We visited a home to look at the manual threshing of their rice. A couple of lambs were cuddled and a few goats dodged

while on the walk; cow pats were inspected too. We also ticked off quite a few new birds in the process. Black-rumped Flameback, Greater Coucal, Pale-billed Flowerpecker and Purple Sunbirds were amongst the birds we added to our list. After an early lunch, we said goodbye to Sunderbans and the beautiful Sunderban Jungle Lodge and headed back to Kolkata.

The main group left London today, to fly to Kolkata.

Day 2

Friday 9th December

The main group arrived today and we went for a walk in the Indian Botanic Gardens in the afternoon. It's an oasis of peace in the middle of all the chaos that is Kolkata. The drive took us through middle of busy Kolkata and we enjoyed the sights of the beautiful Victoria Memorial, Eden Gardens (cricket ground) and the beautiful Howrah Bridge over the Hoogly River. The short walk in the garden produced, other than some common birds, a pair of Yellow-footed Green Pigeons, Lineated Barbet, a pair of Booted Eagles, White-throated Kingfishers and large flocks of Jungle Babblers. We strolled till 4pm and then headed back home.

Day 3

Saturday 10th December

We were off to the airport at 8am. The Jet airways flight took us to Jorhat via a stop at Guwahati. We arrived at Jorhat at 2.30pm, due to a slight delay. Mohan, our guide from Charaidew, was waiting for us at the gate. We drove about 45 minutes to the Neemati Ghat and boarded our country boat to reach the Charaidew, which would be our home for the next 10 days. Pratik, the manager of the boat, waited eagerly for our arrival. We had a small late lunch and set about settling down. Later over a 'Brahmaputra Sunset' Cocktail, we got our instructions regarding the boat and did our daily log.

Day 4

Sunday 11th December

We started early and took the country boat ashore and drove for an hour to the 'Hollongapar Gibbon Wildlife Sanctuary'. A bunch of Rhesus Macaques paced up and down near the entrance of the park. Accompanied by three spotters-cum-guards, we trekked down a forest path to look for Gibbons. We first found a troop of rich golden-brown-coloured Capped Langurs. They were sunning themselves after a very misty morning. The forest was very quiet, until a bird wave came along. Maroon Orioles, warblers, and Greater and Lesser Racket-tailed Drongos kept passing through the canopy, keeping us occupied for some time. Soon our spotters picked up some signs of Gibbons and we went off-trail into the deep forest in search. We found a family of three. They showed well but kept moving, so we followed them around until we had had our fill. We later came back for a great picnic breakfast laid out for us in the forest guest house campus.

After breakfast we went for another walk and found Malayan Giant Squirrel and Orange-bellied Squirrel. At the end of the walk we drove back to the gate and found the family of Gibbons we worked so hard to search for was feeding on berries very close to the road. On our way back, we stopped at two wetlands close to the road. They were filled with whistling ducks, Spot-billed Ducks, Swamphens, plovers, ibis and Lesser Adjutants.

We later reached our boat for late lunch. We then set sail into a glorious sunset.

Day 5

Monday 12th December

First thing in the morning some of us went ashore, in the tamarisk scrub, to look for birds. We got flocks of Striated Babblers, few Stonechats, and a Pallas's Gull but not much else.

Later, after breakfast, we all boarded our country boat and reached the Majuli Island. We stopped at Sakoli Bheel, which was teeming with birds, primarily Ferruginous Duck and large flocks of Grey-headed Lapwings. On another side we had a big flock of Greylags actively feeding along with Black-headed Ibis and egrets. Next we stopped at the centuries-old Annuati Monastery. We looked around the monastery prayer halls as Mohan explained to us the rituals and the ways of life of the monks. The garden is also good for birds and we had good views of Tickell's Leaf Warblers, Cinereous Tits, Ruby-cheeked Sunbirds, Grey-headed Canary-Flycatchers etc. We next visited the more cultural Monastery of Kamalabari. A short musical involving drums and cymbals was presented to us. A real foot-tapping beat was belted out along with some good dance moves with heavy drums. We were next treated with a beautiful flute recital by Monk Niranjan. After a quick stop at a Flying Fox roost; we headed back to our boat.

We then sailed for a couple of hours to Pohumara Vekeli Chapori. This was a new village for us. The villages we usually visited had now lost access from the river and could not be reached with our boat. We still had some light, so we got off and wandered around among the lentil fields before we retired for the night.

Day 6

Tuesday 13th December

Again some of us went for a pre-breakfast walk in the thick mist. We added a few new birds to our list: Oriental Skylark, Rufous-winged Bushlark, Hoopoe, a few Little Stints feeding in the mudflats, Blyth's Pipit etc. Later we took a walk around the village, inhabited by a small population of displaced Mishing tribe. They had lost their land on the Majuli Island, due to erosion and had to settle in this new land. We went around inspecting their sows and the little piglets, their chicken and their homes. Meanwhile a distracting, female Hen Harrier sailed over the rice stubbles, looking for some easy prey. After we came back to Charaidew, we set sail for our next destination, Kaziranga.

Day 7

Wednesday 14th December

We set off early in the morning mist on our country boat. It took us an hour to reach the disembarkation point. The safari jeeps were waiting as we reached and we set off for the entry point. At the gate we had some picnic breakfast while paperwork was sorted by Mohan. Kaziranga, as usual, had much to offer. The Sohola wetland was full of birds and mammals. Swamp Deer herds sat resting on the islands, buffaloes grazed in the distance. Ducks, geese, waders, pelicans, cormorants were all over the place. A Smooth-coated Otter rushed across the wetland and disappeared before we could get a good look. But later we got a whole family of them on the bank of a pond. We also got some great views of the One-horned Rhinoceros which was wallowing in the water. We ended the trip with few Oriental Pied Hornbills and a great Brown Fish Owl. We came back to Charaidew and set sail.

After lunch we sat on the top deck keeping our eyes peeled. At times we were close to the park and we saw deer, buffaloes and rhinos from the boat. We even saw a herd of elephants on the north bank. We turned our boat to

get better views of the pachyderms dusting themselves. But the best was yet to come. A distant Tiger was spotted, marching on the sand bank. It walked for a while and then stopped and sat down and started eyeing a buffalo - a superb moment to close the day. We kept watching completely mesmerized as we sailed away from the location. We moored near Biswanath for the night.

Day 8

Thursday 15th December

We sailed as soon as the fog lifted and reached Silghat at about 10am. We quickly got off and headed for Kaziranga. Along the highway we spotted a family of Hoolock Gibbons. They sat quietly watching the road gang re-tarring the road. We had great views of the family and then headed for Diphlu River Lodge for lunch. The gorgeous lady, Laxmi Purnima, was waiting for us near the river. Her calm demeanour and swaying gait attracted everybody's attention. What caught our attention most was her love for bananas...she gobbled all the bananas we could provide. Then she ambled down to the river and plonked herself in the mud. Some of us got down in the water and scrubbed her ears and her belly till she had had enough.

After cleaning up, we had some lunch and headed for the Kohora range of Kaziranga for our afternoon safari. We got more rhinos, a few good birds like the Great Hornbill, Pallas's and Grey-headed Fish Eagles and the two target turtles...Assam Roof and Indian Tent Turtles.

Day 9

Friday 16th December

We started extremely early for our elephant ride. We reached the park at 5.30am and got on top of our designated elephants. The loaded pachyderms then ambled off in the mist. As we walked through the grass, the sun rose behind us over the Karbi hills. The golden light hit the Swamp Deer and they glowed in the grass, the stags with full heads of horns. Several rhinos were spotted, some with babies and some without. We came back to base after an hour's ride and headed for some breakfast.

The breakfast place gave us an Emerald Dove and Scarlet-backed Flowerpecker. Next we headed for the Western (Bagori) Range for our safari. We got a few River Terns from the Donga Tower and a lone Otter along with 30+ rhinos, several Water Buffaloes and Swamp Deer. Next we got a herd of elephants in the tall grass, but some showed very well, slowly and gently feeding on the soft green grass. We got a few good birds later: Kalij Pheasant, White-rumped Shama and the very rare Pied Falconet. We again encountered a few elephants close to the road. A lot of rumbling and sniffing went on amongst the family group. As this was happening, two of our jeeps had driven off and two had stayed back for a few extra minutes. Later, as we started to drive, we found fresh pug marks of a tigress on the jeep tyre tracks. She had walked across the road and we had missed her by a whisker. We later came back to Charaidew for lunch.

In the afternoon we walked along the edge of the forest and saw a Blue Rock Thrush and a few dolphins. Lots of elephant dung was around so we turned around before dark. We had a bihu dance organized for all, on the top deck. The young girls and boys, beautifully dressed in traditional attire and playing the traditional musical instruments, gave us a superb performance. Everyone joined in at the end. To top it all, as the performance finished, a large tuskless elephant walked past us on the sand bank, like ghostly shadow, towards the rice fields in the distance.

Day 10

Saturday 17th December

Today was our last day in Kaziranga. We drove to Burrpahar Range. This range is very beautiful and less visited. Other than the usual suspects, we got some Oriental Pied Hornbills in the distance. Great Hornbills and Hoolock Gibbons called in the hills but we could not get on to them. We added Great Barbets, Himalayan Griffons, Large Woodshrikes etc to our list. We stopped on the banks of the Brahmaputra briefly, before carrying on with our drive. We got some big rhinos in the dry golden grass, which gave us some good photo opportunities. We finished the drive with some great views of a Pallas's Fish Eagle harrying Bar-headed Geese.

Day 11

Sunday 18th December

Today was slightly different. We drove up north to the banks of Jia Bhoreli. On the way we stopped along the roadside and saw Pin-tailed Green Pigeon, Streaked Spiderhunter etc. We got into the rubber dinghies which were waiting for us on the bank. We started paddling and looking out for birds. Osprey, Pied Kingfisher, Great Stone-curlew, Small Pratincole and Pallas's Fish Eagle were seen from the raft. After we disembarked, we stopped at the Nameri Eco Camp for a cup of tea and went to have a look at the Pygmy Hog Breeding Centre. These rare and endangered pigs are rehabilitated here before release into the wild. A fig tree in the hog campus gave us a pair of beautiful Great Hornbill and a family of Capped Langurs gorging on the ripe figs. Later we drove back to the boat and set sail. We moored on a sand bank and the stage was set for a great BBQ.

Day 12

Monday 19th December

Today was a long day of sailing. We sailed along the eroded banks of the villages which are homes of the Bangladeshi refugees. Some places which we had visited last year had been washed away. The bank sliced off, as if one had sliced through butter. At 10am we had 'Bidhan', our chief chef, giving us a short cookery class. Easy chicken curry and various kinds of bread kept some of us occupied for some time. We reached Peacock Island by late afternoon. We disembarked and took our country boat to visit the island. This is a popular destination from all across for its religious connection. But we were there for the Golden Langurs. These blond langurs were released here many years back and the numbers have increased to six. The cake-eating monkeys entertained us while some went to take a quick look at the temple. After the visit we made our last sail to Pandu Jetty amidst another glorious sunset.

Day 13

Tuesday 20th December

Today was our last day on board the grand old Charaidew and on the mighty Brahmaputra. We left for the Kamakshya Temple after breakfast. After a short drive up the hill, we reached the Hindu religious hotspot of Assam. Mohan explained to us the history of the temple and then we walked around the temple premises, dodging goats, pigeons and one mad man. We came back then to Charaidew for the last time. A large Gangetic Dolphin came to say goodbye to us too.

We left Charaidew for the last time and headed for Garchuk rubbish tip for a grand finale. The tip is the feeding ground of the largest concentration of Greater Adjutant Stork. We came across hundreds of them along with vast number of Black-eared Kites. We then headed for the airport with a short stop at the Deepor Bil wetland. Here we added Black-winged Stilts to our list before saying goodbye to Assam.

Day 14

Wednesday 21st December

It was the day to say good bye to all...

As usual, Charaidew and the always smiling and very helpful staff on board, plus the naturalists, made this trip memorable for all. Many thanks to all on behalf of Naturetrek
