### **Summary**

This tour has always been my favourite trip for Naturetrek. We visited a wide variety of habitats and altitudes. Some of the highlights in Bhutan were the fantastic mountains, the superb metallic-blue Himalayan Monal on Pele La Pass, the trek to the Tiger's Nest Monastery, and some of the best Bhutanese hospitality. We also saw the most beautiful Black-necked cranes at Phobjika Valley. Manas was wonderful, with all the green pigeons and broadbills showing well. The Malayan or Black Giant squirrels were found everywhere along with the beautiful Capped Langurs. The grasslands of Kaziranga gave us good numbers of Indian One-horned Rhinos; Smooth-coated Otters, fantastic views of Asiatic Water Buffaloes, Pallas's Fish Eagles, and Black-necked Storks. Driving along the highway in Kaziranga gave some superb views of Hoolock Gibbons. Amazing! Last but not least was the Sundarbans extension. This vast mangrove is home to several species of kingfisher; the glorious gems of Common, Pied, White-throated, Black-capped, and the fantastic Brown-winged Kingfisher were all seen as well as White-bellied Sea Eagle. Among the reptiles, we saw the Water Monitor and a couple of massive Saltwater Crocodiles.

#### Day 1

**Thursday 3rd November** 

In flight to Kolkata.

### Day 2

# Friday 4th November

The group met up: six arrived today morning by flight, two by train the day before and two in the evening flight. Two had already arrived a day earlier. The flight landed early, and everyone had a smooth arrival. We then drove to Hotel Taj Gateway and everyone had a leisurely day.

# Day 3

# Saturday 5th November

We left the hotel at 12pm and headed for the airport. We boarded our Bhutan Airline flight and flew to Paro in Bhutan. On the way we were thoroughly thrilled to see Mt Everest and Kanchenjunga. We had the most amazing landing in Paro, when the aircraft flew along the valley to eventually touch down on the runway. The slightly hazy but cool breeze welcomed us in Bhutan. We arrived at 4:30pm and were met by Tsering, and our driver, Zamba. The daylight faded as we drove along the main road, so we stopped for a few minutes to see a few birds along the river. A Brown Dipper showed very well. What a great start of the trip! We drove few minutes and checked into Hotel Olathang, which incidentally is the oldest hotel in Paro, with huge grounds.

# Day 4

# **Sunday 6th November**

An early start today: we left the hotel at 5.30am and drove up the Ha Road towards Chele La Pass. As light broke after an hour, we could see the golden glow on the snow peaks from our bus. We then started walking a bit and saw White-wing Grosbeaks, Spotted Nutcrackers, Blue-fronted Redstarts and just before the breakfast place, we saw two Himalayan White-browed Rosefinches. The field-kitchen team drove up with a superb breakfast and set it out on a road bend. Hot coffee was slurped up as a Himalayan Buzzard flew over us. Later a flock of Plain Mountain Finches graced the valley near us. At the pass, Black-faced Laughingthrush and redstarts showed well.

We then drove back to Paro, stopping at our hotel to change in to hiking gear and then drove to the base of the hill from where the Tiger's Nest Monastery walk starts. After another beautifully cooked lunch in the conifer forest, most of us headed for the Monastery hike. Seven did the trek and went up to the view point. Those of us who stayed back, ticked off Russet Sparrows, and Chestnut-capped Laughingthrushes, and Green-backed Tits in the shrubberies around the base. Once the hikers were back, we drove to a small marsh and ticked off two Black-tailed crakes, which showed quite well, as the light fell fast. Then it was back to the Hotel for some rest.

#### Day 5

### **Monday 7th November**

We left Paro for Punakha at 5:30am. The two-hour drive took us past Thimphu and up the beautiful Dochula Pass. We stopped at Thimphu at a lookout point over the sewers, a whole flock of Ruddy Shelducks and a few Brown-headed Gulls were spotted at the pond. Tsering picked up his guitar, which was destined to give us extreme entertainment at various locations!

We also spotted two drumming Darjeeling Woodpeckers on top of the conifers. We spent a little time at the pass, where some of the mountain peaks were peeking from behind the clouds. A few photos of the chortens and then we drove down to the Lamperi Botanical Gardens. The Kitchen team was waiting for us there with breakfast. After some hot breakfast, we walked along the park trail. We'd added several birds to our list: Steppe Eagles, Mountain Hawk-eagles, Rufous-vented & Whiskered Yuhinas, Chestnut-crowned Laughingthrush and Streak-breasted Scimitar Babblers. After a few hours in the park, we drove down to a roadside location for an outdoor lunch. After lunch we headed for Punakha. On the way we saw a few very playful Assam Macaques. We stopped briefly at Sopsokha, to look at the Phallus Handicraft We the reached Punakha and headed straight for Mo chu for the White-bellied Heron. We did not find it even after long search. A fantastic, Pallas' Fish Eagle, Brown Dipper, Crested Kingfisher, several Ruddy Shelducks, an Ibisbill and Great Cormorants were seen on the river but unfortunately no Heron was seen. We then decided to call it a day and retired in Zimkhang Hotel for the night.

#### Day 6

# **Tuesday 8th November**

We started early and headed for the Jigme Dorji National Park along the Mochu River. It was slow going, as lot of the trees along the road was chopped off due the installation of the power line projects. Most of the undergrowth was gone. We carried on, stopping at various places, and saw large mixed feeding flocks of Grey Treepies. We then reached our breakfast location, where our field-kitchen crew waited for us with another fabulous buffet breakfast. Close to the breakfast place, first we saw a pair of White-capped River Chat. After breakfast, we walked more and ticked off Mountain Hawk-Eagle, two Black Eagles and a Himalayan Buzzard. Finally, a whole bunch of Mountain Bulbuls, turned up to add more colour to our morning. We returned to the location close to the river for lunch. After a fabulous lunch. again... we were greatly entertained by a pair of Brown Dippers which put on a show, by flying in and out of the river, several times, fishing for insects. A country music session was not bad at all, by our good old Tsering and by one of the guests. We then headed back to Punakha; we then visited the Dzong. Punakha Dzong is positioned in the most picturesque location. In the afternoon light, it gave us some great photographic opportunities. Tsering was great in explaining in details about the Dzong and its importance.

#### Day 7

### Wednesday 9th November

This morning we left early for Phobjika. One the way we took a detour to the Mo chu for the heron. but sadly... no... there was no heron...

As usual our kitchen crew found the most amazing place to serve us breakfast.

A short walk after breakfast, a whole bunch of warblers and minlas were seen foraging in flocks. We stopped to spot the Yellow-rumped Honeyguide. Feeding off the honeycomb from an overhang. It flew back and forth, from a nearby bush, attacking the hives and avoiding the bees. We then stopped near Nobding and had another lovely roadside lunch. While we were settling down for lunch, a bunch of Nepal Gray Langurs appeared in a tree close to us. They gave a patient viewing to all our members. After we had dined with a view of the distant snow-capped mountain, we then drove over the pass into Phobjika valley. The first stop was of course, for the shaggy Yaks. They sat on the slopes chewing cud and posed for photo...still chewing cud. We then dropped down into the vast valley and reached the marsh where 50+ Black-necked Cranes pecked at the ground for grubs. Up to 100+ cranes were there. As hundreds of Red-billed Choughs circled in the horizon, we saw a Hen Harrier in the distance too. As it became more and more chilly, we decided to call it a day and checked in to the Dewachen Hotel. The checklist was celebrated with a glass of traditional 'Dragon Warmer' to celebrate the cranes and another session of jamming.

#### Day 8

# **Thursday 10th November**

Today we left early and drove up to the Pelela Pass, and down into the old abandoned road. We drove very slowly in the cold and grey weather, in hope to see the Himalayan Monal, which we had missed at Che le La. After driving down a few kms, with no luck, we decided to turn around and start heading back. Then suddenly a male Monal flew down the slope and landed briefly on a tree. We rushed out to get a view. The bird stayed briefly before disappearing further down into the valley. Some of us got good views. We then drove further and found a few more Monals foraging along the slopes. We then headed to some sunshine to grab some breakfast. Close to the breakfast spot, a pair of Red Crossbill put up a great show. They sat at arm's length licked mineral and salt from a rock face. They paid no heed to our presence at all. We then headed down to another forest track and ticked off a skulking Spotted Elachura, Minivets etc. After lunch we headed back to the valley to drive deeper into the valley to look for any unusual sightings. Without much luck other than some beautiful landscape, we came back to the marshes, we saw several Oriental Skylarks feeding along the edges, and at falling light we got a few cranes flying closer than usual.

### Day 9

# Friday 11th November

Today some of us walked down to the cold valley floor at 6am. What a great view with frost cover. We spent some time watching the cranes warming up for the day. As it started warming up, some of the cranes, started flying past giving us great views. We then came back to the hotel for breakfast. We then headed to Gangtey monastery to witness the crane festival. This festival is held each year to commemorate the arrival of the cranes. The monastery ground was crowded, and the dances started after the long speeches. We stayed there for an hour witnessing the school kids and the monks performing various dances and acrobatics. Outside the monastery a small farm fair was held. The tour leader bought some potato wine and tried to get the whole group to try some...only a small taste and the strong smell may have put others off. We then headed back to Thimphu, stopping at Nobding for lunch.

#### **Day 10**

### **Saturday 12th November**

We had a really relaxed breakfast, and left the hotel at 8am. We first visited the Mothithang, Takin reserve. Even though it's a Zoo, it's also a refuge for not just Takins, but also other injured animals. We drove over the high ridge of the reserve and got great views of this unique animal (created by the Divine Madman). The Post Office was our next stop, where some even got their own photos printed on stamps. We then headed for the Papermanufacturing centre. The bark of the Daphne plant is used to make this fine craft. We then started driving down towards Phuntsholing, and once again, but for the last time the kitchen team had found a fabulous place to set up our last meals. The wind along the gorge was strong, which caused a few rotis to fly around. After thanking the kitchen team for the last time, we hit the road, which took us through some beautiful mountain landscape. losing altitude at the end before reaching Phuntsholing. We reached the border town of Phuntsholing at 5:30pm.

### **Day 11**

# **Sunday 13th November**

Today was our last morning in Bhutan, so we rushed around getting ready and finishing our breakfast. We had a long drive ahead to Manas, in Assam. Our busses from India, came in and picked up our luggage, while we were driven to the border last time by Zamba and Tsering. We went through the new border crossing and headed for the Indian Immigration office. They obviously had other plans... it took quite some time to get ten people through. So, at 10am we eventually got everything done and then we drove towards Manas. The buses were comfortable, and we eventually reached by 4:30pm with a few stops along the road. Musa Lodge was spacious and comfortable and a beautiful garden full of birds.

### Day 12

# **Monday 14th November**

Our guide Bijoy, arrived early morning, and we drove off in the very beautiful Manas National Park. In a few minutes we spotted our first Rhino, hiding in the bushes next to the road. After few minutes, it showed itself well... that was a good start.... Several trees were laden with berries. Grey-fronted and Yellow-footed Green Pigeons were gorging on them, while hanging like fruits themselves. Barbets and bulbuls were also joining the foray. We also added several raptors to the list, like Crested Serpent Eagle, Honey Buzzards, Crested Hawk-eagles. We stopped at a river bank and saw a herd of Asiatic Wild Buffaloes grazing on a river island. We returned to base for lunch and went out again in the afternoon, for a shorter drive. As we were driving, we saw the convoy of the Bhutan's King approaching from behind us. We parked ourselves, on one side of the narrow track. But unfortunately, the driver of the pilot car misjudged his braking speed and bent the fender of our last safari vehicle! He was clearly quite embarrassed. We did see the young king sitting grim faced in one the cars while the cheerful Queen and the kids smiled and waved as us. and drove away followed by another 20 cars.

# Day 13

# **Tuesday 15th November**

Today morning we drove on towards the river, ticked off many more birds along the way including Silver-breasted Broadbill, White-rumped Shama, Asian fairy Bluebirds, Blue-bearded Bee-eaters, Chestnut-bellied and Velvet-fronted Nuthatch etc. The star mammal of the morning was a Dhole, which appeared on the path at one point. Capped Langurs and Black Giant Squirrels also were seen great numbers, both showing off their long tails. We reached the shore of the Beki river. Beki is the border between Bhutan and India. Bhutan too has a large tract of

forest protected under Royal Manas National Park. A male buffalo appeared on the Bhutan side. He decided to have a swim in the river, snorkelling around chewing grass from the floor of the riverbed. We drove long way back to base. On the way we stopped to the two very pretty birds... Long-tailed Broadbills and Sultan Tit.

After lunch, we drove in the grassland in hope of seeing something new and then drove to the Buraburi Watch Tower, where all the large mammals had congregated to lick on salt. Heards of Elephants with babies of various sizes, rushed around in frenzy... Gaurs with their frisky calves, grazed with their head low, but keeping an eye on the naughty young elephants. Four Rhinos also were there, some wanted to challenge the elephants, while one came up close to say Hi! What a great way to end our stay in Manas.

#### **Day 14**

### Wednesday 16th November

Today we left Manas for Kaziranga. After driving around on a bumpy village road for a while we hit the highway. After lunch we crossed the Koliabor bridge over the mighty Brahamaputra and started driving on the highway south of the river. We stopped at a look out point to get a view of the grassland and then saw a few Rhinos from the highway itself, foraging amongst the water hyacinth. At Infinity Resorts, we were warmly welcomes by Palash and James, our guide and host for the last leg of the main tour.

### **Day 15**

# **Thursday 17th November**

We had a 6.30am breakfast and then met our drivers and Palash. We had three jeeps waiting. We drove to the Kohora or Central Range. We got off close to the park and walked on the narrow tarmac. We ticked off Eastern Yellow Wagtails, Thick-billed Warblers, Black-shouldered Kites Cinerous Tits etc. At 7:30 the park opened, and we drove in. We spotted Swamp Deer, Hog Deer in the open grassland near the entrance of the park. We quickly spotted two Smooth Coated Otters. We assumed they were mother and a grown-up pup. They swam toward us, but stopped to inspect a Hog Deer, feeding close to the water's edge. In the afternoon, we visited the Western (Bagori) Range. The floods have inundated the grazing fields recently. It was very strange to see, water hyacinth flowering in grassland. Several Rhinos were seen grazing along the edge of the marshes, some with grown up calves. A couple of Breeding Pallas' Fish Eagles put a show. They kept flying in and out of the nest and settling back again. We stopped to tick off a Tucktoo Gecko, hiding in the crack of a tree trunk. We stopped at the Donga tower, briefly. We counted 40+ Rhinos grazing in the grassland across the lake. What an amazing sight, it shows, what great results a well-placed conservation regime can produce. We drove along and got some great photos of Buffaloes, and Rhinos grazing in the sunset. On our way back we stopped at the shop belonging to Hatikhuli Tea Estate.

# Day 16

# Friday 18th November

Today we headed for Eastern (Agratoli) Range. It was a longer drive, but we stopped to spot a few Oriental Pied Hornbills, Black-shouldered Kites, Oriental Honey Buzzards etc. Once inside the park, we reached the Sohola Lake. It was teaming with waterbirds. Bar-headed Geese, Greylag Geese, Mallards, Indian Spot-billed Ducks, Garganey, Pintail, Northern Lapwings etc. We drove up to the Brahmaputra riverbank and returned back to base. In the afternoon, we visited the Central (Kohora Range). We heard some alarm calls of Hog Deer. So we waited for some more leads. But unfortunately, not much happened so, we spent some time at the Daflang tower, where we spotted a few Swamp Francolins.

#### **Day 17**

# **Saturday 19th November**

Today we went to the Burapahar Range which is the farthest western range of Kaziranga. We first stopped at a Tea Garden along the highway, which is also a corridor for animal migration up the hills. After scanning the trees close to the highway for a long time, we spotted the rare Hoolock Gibbon. Hoolock Gibbon is India's only ape, and to see them so close on the highway is always amazing. Cameras went crazy at their antics. A family of Gibbons gave great views and swung around the branches before disappearing. We then headed for the Burapahar Range and did the short drive to the forest up to the banks of the Brahmaputra. And lastly, we found the Capped Langur and a few Malayan/Black Giant Squirrels. In the evening we decided to go back to the Central range. We spent some time at the Kathphora tower, from where we spotted the Blue-bearded Bee-eater a beautiful Pallas' Fish Eagle sat very close. We then parked ourselves on the Daflang watch tower. We got Chestnut-capped Babbler - a very pretty babbler from the grassland.

#### **Day 18**

# **Sunday 20th November**

Today we took a short walk through the Tea Gardens, behind our lodge. We saw a few good birds here, Green Imperial Pigeons in the lodge garden were spotted to start with. Later, we spotted Golden-fronted Leafbirds, Spotted Owlets, after breakfast, we packed our bags and got in the vehicles and headed for Jorhat. After a 1-hour flight we were back in home in the Taj Gateway.

#### **Day 19**

# **Monday 21st November**

Those not taking the extension tour flew back to the UK, after an amazing trip. Sundarbans

# **Extension Day 1**

We said goodbye to some of our friends and eight of us carried on with our journey towards Sundarbans. It was a three-hour drive in our bus. This was our most exciting road ever. It was bustling with life: people ferrying vegetables, fish, goods and large bales of straw. Various shops lined some sections of the road: street food, fish wholesalers, car and motorbike repairs, hardware stores etc. At 11am we reached our destination at Godkhali River Jetty. Here we met out boat captain. We loaded our bags on our boat and set sail. One hour's ride on the boat, and some tea and biscuits later, we landed at the most peaceful and pretty Sundarban Jungle Camp on Bali Island. On the way we saw both Collared and Black-capped Kingfishers. We checked in and headed for lunch. Later we took the boat to circumnavigate the Bali island and visited the Amlamethi flats. The winter migrants were still low in number, so we ticked off the Lesser Whistling Ducks and headed back in the dark.

# **Extension Day 2**

# **Tuesday 22nd November**

We left the camp early and boarded our boat. We set off south in the mist, we quickly spotted a Peregrine Falcon (pallidus race). We had several Black-capped Kingfishers, Common Sandpipers, Curlews etc. we had breakfast on board and kept sailing. We got an information about a sighting of a Tiger. We quickly rushed off and learned that a couple of boats had seen a mother and cubs. We missed it by a whisker. We tried hard, looking below the bushes, kept a sharp eye out into the creeks... and sent quite some time but unfortunately no luck, so we decided to go

and check out for some other birds. Later we came back to learn again that the tigress had shown itself again and disappeared again. We then spotted White-bellied Sea Eagles and Brahminy Kites and fairly large Saltwater Crocodile.

#### **Extension Day 3**

### Wednesday 23rd November

Today we headed up north, again we spotted another Peregrine Falcon, which gave a patient viewing. A crocodile was swimming for a while but went under as we went close. We then spotted two Small-clawed Otters, which are very rare, in these parts. They played around for a while and then decided to disappear. We sailed in high tide and again eventually reached the tiger spot. It turned out the that more boats were waiting since early morning to spot the tiger. But sadly, it was a no show for us. On our way back, we got stuck in the creek briefly, as the tide was very low. But we did manage to move out cautiously as the tide turned.

### **Extension Day 4**

# **Thursday 24th November**

Today was our last day of the trip, here. We went for a walk around the idyllic village and look at birds and daily life. We added a few birds like Forest Wagtail, Common Iora, Dusky Warbler, Clamorous Reed Warbler, Blackrumped Flameback, Small Minivet, Purple-rumped Sunbird, Plaintive Cuckoo etc. A beautiful female Indian Paradise Flycatcher, showed very well for all of us. After an hour of strolling along the village paths, we came back to the lodge for breakfast. Some went for another round of walks and then we packed our bags for the last time. After an early lunch, we said goodbye to the Sundarbans team and headed for Taj Gateway.
