Summary of the tour:

It was an amazingly successful tour with 6 tiger sightings including tiger cubs as well as 3 leopards (2 cubs of about 9 months and a mother crossing road) and a Sloth Bear digging for the termites. We enjoyed walking in the jungle and having boat rides and seeing kingfishers hovering and then diving for fish, and eagles catching fish, and marsh mugger crocodile by the bank of the river, and indian hares, and vultures of flying over the beautiful hills...

Day 1

Thursday 10th November

It was a nice morning today with a good temperature - about 18 degrees. We went to the airport to pick up the guests and went in the hotel for freshen up at 1130 followed by a briefing about the timings and the plan for the day. We left the hotel at 330 pm. On our way to the station we saw loads of Black Kites, Rock Doves and crows and reached the station at 420 and then we got our packed dinner and boarded the train. On the journey we saw some open fields with some Cattle Egrets along with cattle. After having dinner everybody went to bed after their long journey.

Day 2

Friday 11th November

It was quite cool this morning when we arrived at Katni, and the full moon was right over our heads-as we got off the train at 620 in the morning before we began the drive to Bandhavgarh. On the way saw quite a few birds like Black Ibis, crows, Ruddy Shelduck, kingfisher, Indian Roller, Open billed Stork and some doves along the road and in the fields.

We arrived at the hotel at 920 and got settled into our room and met for the breakfast at 0945. Clare and Rebecca went for a walk around the village after their breakfast. We met for lunch at 1 and wandered around the lodge and saw some butterflies like Common Indian Crow and Chocolate Pansy and Giant Wood Spider in its big web. At 2pm we left to go to the park; I was with Mike and Janette this evening, (and then the next day I was with Clare, Rebecca, Katharine and Philip). We didn't see any Tiger but had a good drive with Sambar, Chital, Wild Boar and other birds. We came back from the park at 6pm and then met for a gala dinner and tribal dance at 7.30 where everybody danced with the local tribal people.

Day 3**Saturday 12th November**

Cloudy

We got up at 515 and met for the tea and coffee at 545 and then left for the park at 6am. We saw some nice birds and everybody went on the elephant ride for the first Tiger show of the season in the Tala Zone. Everybody was very happy to see a male and female Tiger - and seeing them mating as well - and hearing them roar. We came back from the park around 1130 and then had early lunch at 1230. After that we all went to the park at 2pm to the Magdi Zone. We had a nice drive with some common animals but missed the Tiger on the way back by only two minutes as a forest ranger came and we had to leave as it was getting late to come out of the park. At 6pm we met for a presentation from Amit Sankhla (the owner of the lodge) and then did the checklist at 8pm, followed by dinner, and then went to bed at 9.30pm.

Day 4**Sunday 13th November**

Cloudy. 18 degrees Celcius

We went into the park at 6am and heard alarm calls at many places of Sambar deer and Spotted deer but no Tiger. We saw some nice birds like Eurasian Griffon, Himalayan Vulture, White Rumped Vulture and Jackal. We came back and had breakfast at the hotel.

We had a break and then met at 1pm for lunch and then went to the park at 2pm. We got the news that in the Magdi Zone three Tigers were sighted (a female with two cubs) and they had made a kill of a Sambar deer in the morning just by the road. We went straight to the place and waited there for the whole time but the Tigers did not come out and we heard from the patrolling guard that they were now sleeping in the Bamboo thickets. We came back at 6pm and then met for the checklist at 7pm and then dinner and off to bed.

Day 5**Monday 14th November**

Got up at 5am this morning and went to the park at 545 and it was a little cooler this morning. We had a nice drive and saw fresh footprints of the female tiger with cubs but didn't see any of them. We still had a nice drive with new birds and with some common animals, and on the way back saw a Monitor Lizard very close to the gate in a hole in a tree. We had breakfast at the hotel and then a break until lunchtime at 1pm.

We went off to the park at 2pm again in the Magdi Zone in a hope that we'll see the Tiger family this afternoon, but with no luck. We left the park and later met for the checklist at 7 followed by dinner and then to bed.

Day 6**Tuesday 15th November**

We got up at usual and went to the park and I went to speak to the rangers and managed to change the route and then we had one male and one female Tiger sighting! Mike and Janette were with me (we had the female tiger) and the rest saw the male tiger. Everybody was very happy! Then after that we all had a Tiger show on elephant back as well and we saw the same female who was in the mating with the male tiger previously. We got back from the park and had an early lunch at 1230 pm and then went off to the park at 2pm again for the last safari.

Mike, Janette and myself didn't get to see any tigers but Clare, Rebecca, Katharine & Phil got to see the female Tiger with cubs. Clare and Rebecca left with their packed dinner at 7pm for their train journey and we said goodbye and wished them a safe flight back home.

Day 7

Wednesday 16th November

We all left at 7am from Bandhavgarh Jungle Lodge to Jabalpur to catch the train to Piparia. On the way to Piparia we saw lots of sugar cane and wheat fields and saw a Male Black buck and loads of cattle and birds like Pied Kingfisher and Black shouldered Kite, and other common birds. We got to the Reni Pani Resort at around 4pm. We left for the drive outside the park near a nala (river bed) to see owls, and spotted a Tawny Fish Owl. We came back and had dinner and then off to bed around 9pm.

Day 8

Thursday 17th November

We started our day to the park at 520 in the morning. It was a beautiful ride where we saw loads of birds in the fields and after about five minutes we saw three Leopards crossing road! They were two cubs about nine months old and their mother. Everybody saw them crossing the road but no one got pictures as it was a little dark. We got to the park and saw a Sloth Bear digging for termites and saw five Indian Hares as well! We came back and had a little brunch and then off to the park again at 2:30pm and had good birding in the park and came back at 6pm. We had drinks and snacks and then dinner and then off to bed.

Day 9

Friday 18th November

Again we began early and went to the river bed with a torch to look for the leopards and birds – we didn't see the leopard but had Mottled Wood Owl. We had breakfast in the park after an Elephant ride which we all enjoyed and then came back and went again to the park at 2.45pm for the boat ride and saw Crocodile and good number of birds, including a Grey-headed Fish-eagle with a very big fish, before it flew off into the dense forest. We came back at around 6.15 and later the guests tried the local Mahua drink at the hotel before dinner.

Day 10

Saturday 19th November

We got up and went for the walk in the village before leaving to Bhopal to catch the train as the station is about 5 hours drive from the resort. We left at 9am from Reni Pani with a packed lunch and got at the Bhopal station at 1:30pm. We got into Agra around 9.30 pm and then drove to the hotel and checked in before dinner and bed.

Day 11

Sunday 20th November

We met at 7am for breakfast but the weather was bad today with fog and we decided to do the fort and baby taj first, as it was not good to see the Taj in this weather. We did both the monuments and came back to the hotel to have a shower and then we checked out and went to a restaurant to have lunch and then to see the Taj at 1.30 pm. We came back from the Taj and did some shopping and then we went to see the Kalakriti, the Taj Show as the train was a few hours late and we had enough time to do the show. After the show we all went to a restaurant to have dinner.

We reached the station at 9.45 and the train came at 10:30pm and we got to Delhi and then headed straight to the airport to check in for the flight home to the UK.

Day 12

Monday 21st November

End of the tour.... I hope you all had very good time with some lovely sightings of Tigers, Leopard and Sloth Bear and many birds.
