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Day 1

Wednesday 7th March

Travel from the UK

Day 2

Thursday 8th March

Arrival from UK

Holi – the festival of colours. On this auspicious day the group arrived by flight on time and we checked into the Tuli Imperial. Post briefing them about the next day's program we had dinner and called it a day.

Day 3

Friday 9th March

Tadoba Pre-tour Extension

After an early morning breakfast we left for Tadoba. En route we saw some Indian Rollers, Black shouldered Kites and Rosy Starlings. On arriving at the resort we were welcomed by the host, had a quick check followed by some delicious lunch and we were off on our first safari. The safari started on a very positive note. A male Sloth Bear crossed the road right in front of us! We were all taken aback! With temperatures hovering near 38 degrees it was very odd to find one wandering about at this time of the day! Moving on we went to a 'hotspot' for tiger cubs: Panderpauni, where there have been regular sighting of a mother with her 4 cubs. We hoped to see them sometime on this trip. With some lovely dinner we all looked forward to the next day's safari.

Day 4

Saturday 10th March

Tadoba Pre-tour Extension

With an early morning start we were greeted by some Sambar Deer crossing the road. Moving ahead we saw a large heard of Gaur grazing with the least of worries...which meant there was no predator here.

Some Mynas and Rosy Starlings were chattering about. Suddenly out of nowhere we heard a Sambar bark out a loud warning call. With our jeeps heading towards this call we waited with our breaths held for some time, but nothing happened. With hopes pinned on the afternoon drive we exited the forest and came back for some breakfast. After lunch we all boarded the jeeps again and headed to the hotspot: Panderpauni. This time we were not let down! There in the middle of the road were two 18-month cubs playing! What a sight! With cameras whirring we saw them until they disappeared into the bush. We called it a day after dinner and completing our species lists.

Day 5

Sunday 11th March

Tadoba Pre-extension

Another morning and we were off on the safari. We went to a different area hoping to catch a male Tiger. We saw a Jungle Cat staying cool on a rock in the undergrowth. As soon as we came near it, it jumped off the rock and hid behind it. We waited for it to come out and it did! We saw it stalk a mouse rather unsuccessfully. In the afternoon we drove towards the area where the cubs were seen yesterday. We saw many birds around the lake nearing that area, some crocodiles, Gaur, Sambar, Barking Deer and also a rather tame Nilgai who came very close to the car and let it get photographed. Just as we were exiting the park we saw a huge number of cars in the middle of the road. It meant only one thing – TIGER! A big male Tiger was walking on the main road with over 20 cars behind it. It was walking without a worry in the world and went about its business. It disappeared into the jungle as easily as it had appeared.

Day 6

Monday 12th March

End of Tadoba Pre-extension – Beginning of Main Tour

A BIG DAY - 5 tigers in total!! For more than 45 minutes! What more can we ask for...!? The safari would be our last in this wonderful park. We headed to Panderpauni. At first the cubs had disappeared as if into thin air. There was just one alarm call of a Chital Deer. One of our vehicles took off with little hope, but they were well rewarded with 2 cubs playing near the base of a tree not more than 50 feet from the car. As the cameras started clicking 2 more appeared and then the mother. 5 TIGERS was too much to handle!! Our other jeep also joined us and we saw them cross the road in front of our jeep and go into the waterhole where they played around. What a sight! As if 5 tigers was not enough 1 jeep also saw a male Leopard. With much reluctance we left the park to head to Pench. En route we stopped for a well-earned meal at Nagpur in the Tuli Imperial. On arriving at the Tiger Corridor in Pench we were greeted by the manager and his staff. The main tour people joined us and we called it a day, after telling some excited stories about the morning's sightings.

Day 7

Tuesday 13th March

Main Tour – Pench National Park

Pench always throws some surprises. The day started with some Spotted Owls near the gate. On entering the park we were greeted by some Sambar Deer crossing the road. The previous day's imprints left by the tigers were very evident and following them we were led to the backwaters of the Totladoh Dam.

Sambar alarm calls told us that we were on the right track. Sure enough there was a Tigress close by. We could manage to just get a glimpse of her! After lunch we headed to the same place and saw her stalking deer. It was a great experience and the guests actually saw the drama being unfolded in front of them. A Chital Deer call spoiled her chance of a successful hunt. With lots of photos we left from there back to the hotel. After our checklist we had a delicious dinner.

Day 8

Wednesday 14th March

Pench National Park – Kanha National Park

We were on the last drive in Pench and the birds were at their best; Racket tailed Drongos, Small Minivets, Jungle Babblers and Black hooded Orioles were orchestrating the perfect melody. Chital Deer rutting in the background added to the sounds. The elephants were at work but we could not locate a tiger. We had to leave the park and move on to the next jungle: Kanha. After lunch we all boarded the vehicles and left. En route we stopped in villages and on arriving at Kanha Jungle Lodge we were greeted and checked in. We saw a Flying Squirrel gliding from her roost to the adjoining tree. After the checklist we had dinner and slept.

Day 9

Thursday 15th March

Kanha National Park

The wake up call was at 5 am. Heading to the park gate we were all excited for the first morning's drive in Kanha. The sal forest was looking really beautiful with its fresh leaves and flowers. The Barasingha female lead her herd to the open grassland for feeding. Common Mynas and sunbirds were engrossed in taking nectar from the Flame of the Forest trees. The jungle was alive with life. Lots of indirect tiger activity was seen on the roads, but no actual sight of a tiger. After lunch we left for the afternoon safari. The jungle was very quiet. Just some birds were around. The sighting of a male Gaur was the definite highlight of the safari. That night we had an early dinner and went off to bed.

Day 10

Friday 16th March

Kanha National Park

We saw a Jungle Cat even before we entered the park! The Barasingha's were still rutting and were seen in their finest of antlers, as were the Spotted Deer. The Langur monkey and deer combination, which so often helps us locate the tigers, was totally quiet. In the afternoon we went to look for Leopards after getting some news of a sighting in the morning. All in all a very quiet day as far as cats was concerned.

Day 11

Saturday 17th March

Kanha National Park

We were feeling the pressure to find tigers but we knew that it was just a matter of time before we saw one. The Racket tailed Drongos were seen mimicking some other bird calls and got us confused for a while!

That evening drive we ascended the plateau of Bamni Dadar - which is the highest point of the park. We were very lucky to see the highly secretive Chowsingha or the Four Horned Antelope. With all the hopes pinned on the last days drive we called it a day.

Day 12

Sunday 18th March

Kanha - Nagpur

We all boarded the jeeps for the last day's safari. As soon as we entered the park we heard that the elephants had located a Tigress. We hurried to the center point and after collecting our token we all went and saw a TIGRESS! It was such a relief and a joy to everyone. The sighting was worth waiting for...

When we left the elephant ride spot we heard Langur calls and we headed in that direction. A slight glimpse of something striped got us all excited. Knowing exactly where it would come out we waited. Sure enough the Tiger came and walked across the road in between our jeeps (within 8 feet of us). This was the best goodbye Kanha could have given us! We left the park and headed out, and after some lunch we left for Nagpur. On arriving at the Tuli Imperial we had our farewell dinner.

Day 13

Monday 19th March

Fly UK

The guests left for Mumbai at 8:35 am. The tour had really ended on a TIGER high! All in all it was truly a memorable tour...
