Day 1

Thursday 14th February

Tadoba Extension

Valentines Day! The guests arrived on time at 1635 in Nagpur airport. After receiving them we checked into the Tuli Imperial for a night's stay. We had an early dinner and went off to bed.

Day 2

Friday 15th February

After breakfast we headed to Tadoba. On arriving at Svasara Lodge we were greeted by Ranjit and Nandita. We had a quick bite to eat and began the first safari. We were welcomed in the park by a very noisy pair of Red wattle Lapwings. Egrets, herons, wagtails and Ibis were seen. One of our vehicles also witnessed 3 Wild Dogs on a hunt! Another saw a male and female Tiger just coming out of water and disappearing into the undergrowth! What a heart stopping moment that was!

After returning to the lodge we heard some sounds we did not want to...thunder and lightening! It started to rain until pathways become small streams - we hoped that our game drive tomorrow would not be a washout. With hopes pinned against the rain gods we all went off to bed.

Day 3

Saturday 16th February

In the morning there was a bit of a drizzle but we braved it and went for a drive in the park. Not a single animal stirred. The Spotted Deer were all cold as were most of the birds. The weather was grey and windy! With the sun showing up at about 10am we hoped the afternoon would be better.

After lunch we all went in the park and saw some signs of animal movement...a pair of Ruddy Mongoose on the hunt. A group of cars had congregated on the main road. On reaching them we heard that there was a Leopard seen by them and it had gone inside the forest. We waited for over 30 minutes before we saw it come out again and walk towards us. It was a great sight. While returning to the lodge we saw a male Tiger crossing the road! Wow! We were hoping our luck continued on to the next day. After the safari we watched a film on Tadoba and then had dinner and went off to bed.

Day 4

Sunday 17th February

The night's rains had stopped and the sun was out. Lots of birds like the Grey headed Eagle, Parakeets, Drongo and Woodpeckers were seen. We all went towards the eastern side of the park towards a lake called Telia. There was a good chance of seeing tigers there and the alarm calls were all around us. We waited but no luck. The solitary Nilgai was seen foraging in the thick of the forest. We hoped that we could have some change in the afternoon.

We headed back to Telia Lake and were rewarded. On the way sub-adult Tiger cub came within 10 feet of our jeep and gave us ample opportunity to photograph him. He then went on to cross a stream and disappeared into the undergrowth. We got information there was a tiger sighting at the lake too. On driving there we saw a Tigress with her 2 other sub-adults who were 'frolicking' in the water! We all were glad to see them and very reluctantly left the reserve as the sun was going to set.

Day 5

Monday 18th February

Main tour begins

Today was the last day in Tadoba. Lots of alarm calls were heard but no cats! At Tadoba Lake we enjoyed some superb sights of Open-billed Storks feeding on the giant snails. We headed back to the lodge and left for Nagpur. We were going to be joined by 10 more guests who were doing the main tour. All of us met at Tuli Corridor in Pench and after meeting up, we had dinner and went off to bed.

Day 6

Tuesday 19th February

Pench

All of us excitedly got into the vehicle for our first drive into Pench Tiger Reserve. We saw a lot of water birds like Spot bills, Teals, Ruddy Shelducks and Storks. Nilgai and Sambar were near the water hole as the temperature was about 30 degrees. One of the vehicles was on the trail of a Tigress but after waiting for nearly an hour it was not to be... We exited the park in the afternoon hoping that we would have some good sightings in the afternoon. The afternoon was splendid!

We saw a pack of Wild Dogs on a hunt. After chasing down a Chital, the Wild Dogs went for the kill and were successful. Buzzards and Vultures came circling over. We exited the park with excitement and great memories.

Day 7

Wednesday 20th February

Pench to Kanha

Since it was a Wednesday the park was closed and we went for a nature trail in the buffer zone of the park. All of us enjoyed views of Parakeets, Drongos and Coucals. Taking a packed lunch we drove to Kanha. En route we had lunch under mango trees. On arriving at Kanha we were welcomed by Tarun, Dimple and Jai. After check in we were led for a nature trail by Jai – the youngest naturalist in India. Everyone enjoyed the trail. After the checklist we went off to bed.

Day 8

Thursday 21st February

Kanha

The first drive in Kanha is always a great one. The landscapes and the variety of wildlife is enough for any person to fall in love with it. Some of our guests got the privilege of doing an elephant ride for an hour. It was a great experience. One of the jeeps saw a Tigress waking into the mist. Others saw the endangered Barasingha deer. In the afternoon two of our vehicles saw a Tigress sitting in the meadow. Alarm calls of the Chital deer attracted our attention and hence we could locate her. In the evening we saw a Flying Squirrel gliding from one tree to another. Just one more of nature's miracles...We had a good dinner and called it a night.

Day 9

Friday 22nd February

Kanha

The morning drive started with some rain. There was a lot of lightning and wind throughout the night. The birds were quiet and we were all wondering if the tigers would be around too. Some more guests had an elephant ride and were simply amazed at how the forest was. A very different perspective as compared to the jeep tracks where you are limited to stay on them. We saw a lot of pugmarks but no actual animal. Hoping that the rain and clouds would disappear that evening we were glad to see that our prayers were answered. We had a good evening drive and saw many birds and mammals. The Peacock was the highlight and it displayed for a whole 15 minutes. In the evening we also saw the Flying Squirrel again. We went to bed, all looking forward to the next day.

Day 10

Saturday 23rd February

The sky was clear and we knew that THIS was going to be the day. We drove to looking for signs of tiger and saw a lot of small prints! This meant that there were cubs. And we saw them! There were 3 cubs by themselves in the foliage just wandering, waiting for their mother to come back. We all were very excited to see them and had ample opportunity to photograph them. In the afternoon we saw them again as they were crossing the road. One of the cars also saw the secretive Jungle Cat for over 30 minutes. It was on a prowl of some squirrels or rodents. It groomed itself and then sat waiting for the right moment to pounce. One of the cars was also lucky to see the rare Painted Snipe. What a day it had been! After a quick species checklist we all went off to bed – very content.

Day 11

Sunday 24th February

Kanha to Nagpur

This morning we saw the Barasingha giving rutting calls and also a lot of Sambar deer. The tigers stayed hidden inside the forest and we were sad to leave Kanha. We took a packed lunch and had it under the mango trees en route to Nagpur. On arriving at the Tuli Imperial we all checked in and had a farewell dinner...

Day 12

Monday 25th February

The guests left for their flight to Mumbai and then onwards to the UK...
