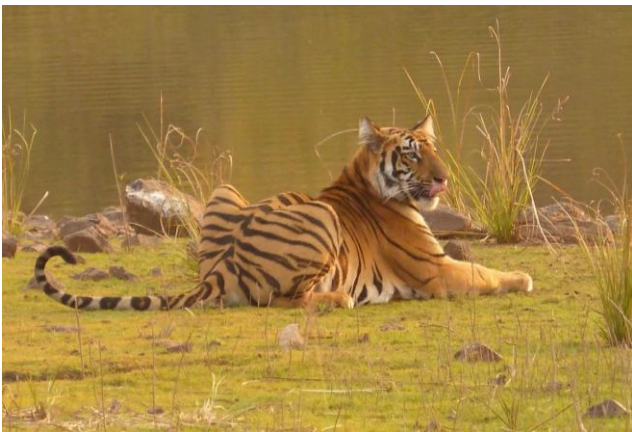

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Pre-Tour Extension to Tadoba

Day 1

Thursday 7th March

Arrival in Nagpur

The guests arrived on time at 1700 hrs into Nagpur. We received them and checked into the Tuli Imperial hotel. After some quick introductions we all had dinner and went off to bed.

Day 2

Friday 8th March

Nagpur to Tadoba

After an early morning breakfast we left for Tadoba. En route we stopped for some photos and birds. On arriving at the Svasara Resort, we were welcomed and after a quick lunch we all headed to the park for our first safari. Gaur, Sambar deer, Wild boar and Chital were seen in plenty. Birds like Hawk-eagles and Buzzards were also seen. It was a great evening and a good start for the tour. In the evening we all had dinner and saw a movie on Tadoba.

Day 3

Saturday 9th March

Tadoba

We woke up at 5am and were at the park gate at 5 30am. Driving around, we heard a Sambar giving an alarm call. Within 5 minutes we heard a Tiger roar about 30 metres away from us. We waited in anticipation and out he came! A big male Tiger was on his daily patrol - he walked on the road in front of our car for some time before disappearing into the bush again. In the evening drive we saw a Leopard crossing the road. A day well spent in the forest! After doing the species checklist we had dinner and went off to bed.

Day 4

Sunday 10th March

Tadoba

The day started on a very high note. A pair of mating Tigers was seen for more than 2 hours this morning! They were right in front of our jeeps and then went into the jungle and sat down in a small clearing in the open. After lunch in the evening we saw a Leopard and in the last part of the safari we saw a Tigress and her cub. We were having a tiger fest in Tadoba, with some great sightings! All the guests were very pleased... We had dinner early and went off to bed looking forward to the last safari in Tadoba.

Main Tour starts

Day 5

Monday 11th March

Tadoba/Nagpur to Pench

Everyone eagerly looked forward to the last drive in Tadoba, because we thought we could see the tiger couple again. We did, but at a distance in the undergrowth. One of the jeeps saw a Leopard and also a Sloth Bear. It had been a great safari experience for everyone.

After breakfast we all left for Pench. En route we had lunch at the Tuli Imperial and arrived in Pench at The Tiger Corridor. The remaining guests who were doing the main tour joined us for dinner – after arriving from Nagpur.

Day 6

Tuesday 12th March

Pench

Our safari in Pench started off amidst a herd of Gaur. There were 7 adults and 2 calves, all making their way towards the waterhole. One car was also lucky to spot a Leopard. In the afternoon we went to a waterhole and waited for the elusive cat but we were not in luck.

We saw a lot of Nilgai, Jackals, Sambar deer and also Wild Dogs (Dhole)! There were 6 of them just lazing around on the forest floor. We heard that there was a den near by and there were 5 puppies! We hoped to get a glimpse of them the next day as we exited the park. In the evening we did the checklist and had dinner. After dinner we saw a film on Pench: Tiger Spy in the Jungle.

Day 7

Wednesday 13th March

Pench to Kanha

The last safari in Pench was special. We saw 2 Tiger cubs in the under-growth, playing. They were difficult to see as they camouflaged into the bushes very well. We also saw a Jackal killing a fawn and it took the kill into the under-growth and started feeding on it. We also saw Wild Dogs again. It was really special to see all this in one morning!

After breakfast we left for Kanha. En route we had a picnic lunch and arrived in Kanha Jungle Lodge just in time to go for a nature trail with Jai. After a quick checklist and dinner we all went off to bed.

Day 8

Thursday 14th March

Kanha

On the first morning in the park we saw one of the highlights of Kanha - the Barasingha. We also had our hopes dashed of some tiger sightings because there were a lot of clouds gathering and as the morning progressed there was lightning followed by rain! However, in the afternoon we saw 3 sub-adult cubs playing in a meadow. They were in a grassland stalking Peacocks, and then got together and went off into the dense foliage. It was a great day! In the evening we all had dinner and hoped that the weather would improve.

Day 9

Friday 15th March

However, it rained the whole night and we were hoping that the park would be open. We also had some guests booked for the elephant ride. Fortunately the park opened and we were in at daybreak. There was bird activity in the lakes and we saw many waders and storks. In the afternoon the sky cleared but we were still luckless with cats. The rain was adding to the woes on the afternoon drive, and it rained in the evening too.

Day 10

Saturday 16th March

Kanha

With clear skies today we all hoped that we could see something exciting. Lots of alarm calls by Sambar deer and Chital raised our hopes, and we waited for over an hour but were not lucky. Birds like Brown-cheeked Fulvetta, Paradise Flycatcher, Monarch Flycatchers and even the beautiful White-rumped Shama were seen.

In the evening one jeep saw a Tigress with her cub stalking Gaur! The Gaur were snorting and charging at the tigers, and we reached there just in time before the Tigers disappeared into the thicket again. After dinner, we all went for a star gazing session.

Day 11

Sunday 17th March

Kanha to Nagpur

It was the last drive of the tour. It was a clear day and we saw a Jackal welcoming us into the park. Honey Buzzards, Hawk-eagles and parakeets were photographed.

The highlight was a Sloth Bear that walked in front for over 20 minutes! It stood up, used a tree to scratch its back and then broke down a termite mound and ate termites using its powerful claws. What an amazing sighting! We all were thrilled and exited the park. A picnic lunch en route to Nagpur and a farewell dinner in the Tuli Imperial ended the tour.

Day 12

Monday 18th March

The guests left for their flight to Mumbai and then on to London.
