Day 1

Thursday 30th October

The 'Tadoba extension' group arrived at Nagpur airport at 7.15pm where they met their guide, Himanshu and went straight to the lavish Tuli Hotel. After a short briefing session we all sat down for dinner before retiring to our rooms.

Day 2

Friday 31st October

We had a good breakfast then departed for Savsara Lodge in Tadoba. We stopped at a few birding areas seeing some beautiful birds, and reached Savsara Lodge at 1.30pm. After freshening up we had lunch then set off for our first safari in the jungle where we watched numerous birds, monkeys and deer. We met again in the evening and did our checklists before dinner, after which we retired as we had a 5am wakeup call the next morning.

Day 3

Saturday 1st November

We started our safari at 6am and as we entered the park we found a few tiger tracks. We didn't hear any alarm calls announcing the presence of tigers so we went to Ponderpani water hole. There we saw some awesome birds including Red Avadavat and Crested Serpent Eagle. The evening was relatively quiet. We heard a few calls and enjoyed seeing lots of birds and mammals. Back at the Lodge we did our checklists and went to bed to be ready for another early start.

Day 4

Sunday 2nd November

We set off at the usual time and were barely ten minutes into the park when we saw Jeeps rushing by and then stopping. I transpired that three Leopards had been seen crossing the road just two minutes earlier. Leopards are shy animals and don't often reappear so most of the Jeeps moved on. We waited and within a minute of the other Jeeps leaving the Leopards were back on track! They walked along the road and gave us an excellent show, staying on the road for almost 15 minutes! We were so happy to get such a wonderful sighting and we all got lots of great photographs even though the light was slightly low. Our encounter was not over yet when, in better light, another Leopard crossed right behind a Jeep containing most of the group and we got some awesome photographs.

We had another safari in the evening and although enjoyable, we couldn't match the excitement of the morning drive.

Day 5

Monday 3rd November

Tadoba and Nagpur to Pench.

We started the day with an early morning drive and saw another Leopard, this one being well camouflaged.

After a hearty meal at the lodge we left for a four hour journey to Pench, arriving at 5pm. We checked in at the Tuli Resort and met for lists at 7.30pm.

Meanwhile the rest of the group had arrived at Nagpur airport and were met by the second guide, Dilip. They made their way to Pench where everyone met up. After introductions and a briefing we all retired to be ready for wake up calls the next morning.

Day 6

Tuesday 4th November

Pench Tiger Reserve

We left our lodge at 5.15am and after formalities at the gate, entered Pench Tiger Park. We were using a number of Jeeps and the last one to enter the park contained Elizabeth, Derek and Marilyn. Within two minutes of entering the jungle they saw the first tiger! We later named them the A team. A tigress came onto the track and walked along the road for a good ten minutes before she entered a patch of jungle and disappeared from sight.

The A team were again very lucky during the evening safari drive when they watched a beautiful female tiger walking along the road and alongside their Jeep for ten to fifteen minutes. People in the other Jeeps managed to see Wild Dogs and Jackals. That night we all retired hoping everyone would be lucky the next day.

Day 7

Wednesday 5th November

Pench to Kanha

We all set off for our early morning game drive feeling positive. We heard some alarm calls and saw fresh tracks of both male and female tigers. Later, at the breakfast point, we learned about the sighting of a tigress with three cubs on a kill so without delay we headed to the spot. Success! One of the cubs, a male sub-adult around 18 months old, was sitting next to the road and we all got good views. We then watched two cubs together. They gave quite a show and we enjoyed the sighting for a good 40 minutes – brilliant!

After lunch we left for Kanha. Most of the group went there directly with others making a slight detour via Balaghat. Reaching Kanha at dusk we were welcomed by Tarun and Dimple. After a briefing about the camp we enjoyed watching the resident Flying Squirrel gliding from tree to tree. After doing our checklists and having an enjoyable dinner we retired to be ready for an early start the next day.

Day 8

Thursday 6th November

Kanha

We started our morning game drive early, entering the park at 6am. Group members in one of the Jeeps came across a pack of Wild Dogs at Bailkundri. The dogs had killed a Chital and were eating the deer. One dog was very anxious and alert, looking in the direction of the Jeep every now and then. After getting some great photographs the Jeep moved on, only to get news of two tigers near a bamboo patch. Arriving in the area, they saw a Tiger on road and watched it enter thick bamboo and disappear.

On the evening game drive the same group saw a lovely male Tiger, another group saw a female Tiger and the third group watched Hoopoes and Swamp Deer. All in all a very successful evening.

Day 9

Friday 7th November

Kanha

Another early morning start but today we had the good news that Elephant safaris were on the agenda. Most of the group took the opportunity to spend the morning on the back of an elephant, a wonderful experience. Whilst some of the group had an elevated view of the park, others used the trusty Jeeps and we were all to have a fabulous morning.

One group in a Jeep went back to Bailkundri where Wild Dogs had killed a deer the day before. On nearing the spot yelping was heard and then a dog was seen dashing across the road. The Jeep stopped at the road junction from where the kill could be seen. Soon a Tiger came out onto the road. It appeared that this Tiger had driven the Wild Dogs away. It came to the kill, snarled at the Jeep then picked up the carcass and carried it into the jungle. The body of a Wild Dog was later found so it appeared the Tiger had killed one or two of the dogs before taking the deer carcass. The elephant camp was close by and the mahouts alerted to the incident. The group on one elephant managed to see the tiger with kill, and the other two elephant parties also got lucky. At the end of the morning safari the whole group had enjoyed lovely views of the Tigers.

The evening safari was quieter after the eventful morning. It had been an excellent day with lots of brilliant memories.

Day 10

Saturday 8th November

Kanha

Another early morning start and today we went to the Kisli zone. We found a lot of fresh tracks and practiced our tracking technique by following the tracks of the male Tiger for a good 4 kms before giving up. We did see some lovely Gaurs and lots of birds.

We also had an enjoyable evening game drive and saw lots of birds.

Day 11

Sunday 9th November

Kanha to Nagpur

We had our last game drive in Kanha seeing some new birds and a single Wild Dog! We wondered if this was the one that survived the tiger's assault the other morning.

After a hearty brunch we set off on the return journey to Nagpur. We broke the drive at Rookhad where we enjoyed hot tea.

We checked in at the hotel, had dinner then retired as we had an early start the next morning with an 8am flight.

Day 12

Monday 10th November

Everyone met in the lobby at 6.15am and we left for the airport at 6.30am. At the airport the group said their goodbyes and thanks to Himanshu and Dilip before their flight back to the UK.
