Day 1

Sunday 9th November

Travel to Nagpur.

Day 2

Monday 10th November

The group arrived early at the Nagpur airport, with excitement and eagerness, and we started our journey to Pench National Park. On the way we saw a few birds. At the camp we checked in and, after a briefing about the next day's plans, we all had dinner.

Day 3

Tuesday 11th November

The morning was cloudy and unusually warm. We saw quite a few birds and some pugmarks, but no luck with the King of the Beasts.

In the evening our luck changed, as we saw four Dhole (Asiatic Wild Dogs) and, after a while, saw a Leopard close at hand. We were all happy to see the Leopard, although we were not able to take photographs, as the Leopard got off the rock and moved away. Then it started raining heavily, so we headed back to the lodge. On the way, we saw a pair of Wild Dogs again. In the evening, we did the checklist before we had dinner.

Day 4

Wednesday 12th November

This morning was again not so cold and, after tea and coffee at the camp, we started our last drive in Pench National Park. We heard a few distress calls of Langur and Chital (Spotted Deer). We again were lucky, with a good sighting of a pair of Wild Dogs and we also saw quite a few birds; however, the Tiger remained elusive. Back at the camp, we had an early lunch and checked out, before we started our five and a half hour journey to the Kanha National Park. We reached the Lodge in good time, and we were welcomed by Tarun, Dimple and Vinod. After the tea and coffee, we were able to see an Indian Giant Flying Squirrel go up a Sal tree and glide over the top of our heads. We did the checklist and, after dinner and a briefing, we all called it a night.

Day 5

Thursday 13th November

Morning in the deciduous Sal forest is always mesmerizing, with its peculiar forest smell, and birds chirping all around. We started our day with fresh Tiger tracks, and as we started following, we also heard a few alarm calls. Also we saw quite a few birds which were new for the checklist. The group were pleased to see Swamp Deer eating water weeds.

The afternoon drive seemed to be quiet, and the Tiger again remained elusive. We had dinner after doing the checklist.

Day 6

Friday 14th November

This morning was promising, and cooler the previous day. We saw the tracks of a tigress with sub adults (grown cubs), but no alarm calls indicated that Tigers might be present. Today four of our guests were going on elephant back for an hour. We were given two different time slots, so Robert and Heather went on elephant back at 7:00am. Meanwhile, while our guests Nev and Steph in the other vehicle saw a magnificent Tiger. Unfortunately, when Jacky and I reached the spot, after dropping Robert and Heather at the elephant camp, the tigress had already disappeared into the thickets. Back at the lodge, we went for a Nature walk for over an hour, seeing some interesting birds, butterflies and other invertebrates.

On the afternoon game drive, we saw Wild Dogs chasing a few Spotted Deer, at a distance in the meadow. Towards the end of the drives, we heard some alarm calls, possibly indicating the presence of a large cat, but then it was time to return to the lodge. We did the evening checklist, followed by dinner.

Day 7

Saturday 15th November

After tea and coffee in the morning we started our game drive. Today we had to travel a long distance to reach the other zone, Kisli. On the way we saw some tracks, possibly from early morning. We followed them for over four kilometres, and little later in the Kisli zone saw more tracks of a mother with sub adults. We also saw quite a few birds.

In the afternoon drive we heard a few distress calls of Sambar, and was told by a mahout that just a few minutes before, he saw a tigress crossing over the other side of the tracks, from where the calls were coming. We checked the parallel road and waited for a long time, then we checked the other area. We heard more calls, and although we did not see the Tiger, we did hear one growling.

Day 8

Sunday 16th November

This was our last game drive, so with high hopes we started out on safari. We heard quite a few distress calls of Langur and Sambar which were quite close, and we also heard growling which was not too far away. We could see the Sambar looking in a direction which was hardly 10 metres from the road, where most of the people were eagerly waiting for the tigress to come out. But then a noisy diesel vehicle approached and might have disturbed the tigress, as we could see the Sambar looking away towards the hill and giving the distress call. We also heard the Tiger, which was now going further towards the hill. Jacky decided to give up going to on the elephant back ride, as it was our last chance to see a Tiger. We checked the other crossing points, but the distress calls stopped, and no Tiger was visible.

Back at the lodge we had a little time to prepare for our departure. We had packed lunch which we enjoyed at a beautiful setting on the rocks, on the way to Nagpur. We made it on time in Nagpur, where we had our last farewell dinner together as a group.

Day 9

Monday 17th November

Next day Nev, Steph and Jacky had a early flight so we went to dropped them off at the airport, whereas Robert and Heather had late departure.

While we were a little disappointed not to have had more sightings of Tiger, we were reminded how secretive and rare these magnificent beasts are, and we appreciated seeing the pugmarks and hearing their growls. The Leopard sighting was particularly exciting, and we saw many other mammals and birds in this fascinating area of India.
