## With Tadoba & Satpura Extensions

Naturetrek Tour Report

15 - 22 February 2016

## Summary

In addition to the India – Tiger Direct! tour report, this report includes a pre-tour extension to Tadoba and a post-tour extension to Satpura.

### Pre-extension Day 1

Wednesday 10th February

The Tadoba pre-tour extension started with flights from the UK to India.

### Pre-extension Day 2

Thursday 11th February

Participants for the Tadoba extension arrived safely in Nagpur at 5pm. After collecting luggage we headed to Tuli Imperial Hotel for an overnight stay before leaving for Tadoba National Park the next day. After checking in and finding our rooms, we met again at 7pm to discuss plans. We then had dinner, after which we retired for the night.

### Pre-extension Day 3

Friday 12th February

Today was cool and clear. After breakfast we met in the hotel lobby at 10.30am. We completed checkout formalities and left for Tadoba at 11am. It was a pleasant ride and we enjoyed the countryside. We reached Svasara, our lodge for the next three days, at 1pm. We quickly found our rooms and then met for lunch.

We had an afternoon drive in the park. There was news of a family of Royal Bengal Tigers close to Tadoba Lake. We rushed to the area and waited. Soon a Tigress named Maya came out with three of her cubs and we watched them go to the lake for a drink before returning into the forest. It was really exciting to see the Tigers on our very first drive!

After the drive we returned to the lodge. Went to our rooms for showers and later met at the sitting area to do our checklist. After completing the checklist we discussed plans for the next day before dinner. We had our meal and then retired to our rooms to be ready for an early wakeup call next morning.

### Pre-extension Day 4

Saturday 13th February

It was cool and clear again today. We had our wakeup calls at 5am and met for tea/coffee at 5.30am. After a drink and a quick bite, we headed to the park gate in our safari jeeps. We did both morning and afternoon safaris in the park and whilst we were not lucky with any big cat sightings, we enjoyed exploring the park and viewing other wildlife. We saw some good birds and super landscapes. In the evening we did the checklist and had dinner.

### Pre-extension Day 5; Main Tour Day 1

Sunday 14th February

The main tour started with flights from the UK to India. Meanwhile those on the extension had more jeep safaris in the park. Whilst no big cats were spotted on the morning safari, in the afternoon we checked the Telia

area of the park and people in one of the jeeps saw a Tigress named Sonam with three of her cubs on the far side of Telia lake.

## Pre-extension Day 6; Main Tour Day 2

Monday 15th February

It was another cool and clear day and we were really lucky to see some exciting wildlife in Tadoba. We started the morning by seeing a female Leopard close to the Jaamni crossroads. We spent a good 15 minutes with the Leopard before it went into the jungle and disappeared. Moving on, there was a pack of Wild Dogs feeding on a kill. Close to Pandarpauni waterhole we waited for the Tigress named Maya to come out. After a long wait we found her sitting on the road close to another waterhole. Later she walked towards the first waterhole where her cubs also came out to join her. We spent a wonderful hour at the sighting before leaving the park. Back at the lodge we packed, had lunch and then left for Pench.

We reached Pench before sunset and in the evening the rest of the group arrived. With the main tour group now formed, we discussed plans for the coming days before our first dinner together.

## Day 3

Tuesday 16th February

The first full day of the main tour was cool and clear and we enjoyed two jeep safaris. In the early morning we left for our morning drive at Pench. We explored the park and saw some good wildlife. People in one of the jeeps saw a Tigress named Patdev with three of her cubs in the Naya Talab area. On the afternoon drive others saw a male Tiger named BMW at the same waterhole.

## Day 4

Wednesday 17th February

We had our last morning safari in Pench before moving on. We saw Wild Dogs and later a Tigress named Bahin-Nullah was seen on the Jodamunnara road. She walked for quite some distance before going into the forest.

Back at the lodge we had our lunch before leaving for Kanha at 1.30pm. In the evening we reached Kanha Jungle lodge, our home for the next three days. Later we discussed plans before dinner.

## Day 5

Thursday 18th February

It was cool and clear again as we left for the park in the early morning. The morning drive was a good introduction to the flora and fauna of Kanha National Park. We saw Barasinghas in the grasslands, however Tigers stayed out of sight.

We were really lucky on our afternoon drive. Close to the road at a fire break a male Tiger named Link 7 came to the waterhole to cool himself. It was a good view for people in all our vehicles. Later people in a vehicle with Yusuf saw a male Tiger named Kingfisher with a female Tigress, the daughter of Mahaveer.

**Day 6****Friday 19th February**

Today our morning had a great start when a male Tiger was seen close to Babathenga. Some group members opted for an elephant ride in the park. From the elephant, three people saw a Tigress named Chhoti Maada briefly moving under lantana bushes.

During the afternoon safari, the male Tiger Link 7 was seen going to the waterhole close to the road at the firebreak again. A few of us also saw a Tigress, most likely Mahaveer's daughter, near to Gidhlighogra.

**Day 7****Saturday 20th February**

Today the weather was cold and misty in the morning, and cloudy in the afternoon. Most of the jeeps went to the Kisli area of the park in the morning. Though no Tigers were sighted, the change in landscape and birding was good. Alarm calls kept us busy looking for Tiger and Leopard. While returning from Kisli, we briefly got a glimpse of two Tigers in the undergrowth close to Babathenga – Singarpur junction.

In the afternoon drive we were determined to find a courting pair of Tigers. We kept checking the area repeatedly and got lucky around 4.45pm when two Tigers showed up close to the area where they had been spotted in the morning. We identified the Tigers as the male named Bheema and the female, known as Dhawajhandi female. We spent around 45 minutes with them as they kept walking towards the road and at one time settled behind two of our jeeps on the road. It was a really incredible feeling to see these cats so close. Everyone was thrilled and we celebrated well back to the lodge.

**Main Tour Day 8; Post-extension Day 1****Sunday 21st February**

It was a cloudy today with periods of heavy rain and mist. It was our last morning in Kanha. We tried to spot a Tiger on our final morning drive but we were out of luck. We returned to the lodge to pack and get ready to start the next legs of our tour.

Group members finishing the main tour then departed for Nagpur and those staying in India for the post-tour extension set off on the long drive to Satpura. The journey took close to nine hours including stops on the way. We had packed lunches with us and the small towns and countryside kept us busy during the journey.

We reached Satpura in the evening and checked into the Reni Pani Lodge. After discussing plans, we had dinner and then retired for the night.

**Main Tour Day 9; Post-extension Day 2****Monday 22nd February**

After spending the night in Nagpur, group members finishing with the main tour departed for the airport for flights back to the UK.

Meanwhile on a misty, drizzly and cloudy day, those on the post-tour extension went on an early drive in the park. After completing the entry formalities, we started our drive and after ten minutes our spotter saw some drag marks on the road made by an animal dragging a kill. We scanned the nearby hillock where a family of Leopards were frequently sighted. After couple of minutes we could see some movement on the rocks and

realised there was a Leopard dragging a Spotted Deer. It was the mother and soon three cubs came to feed on the kill. We watched the spectacle for some time before moving on. Later we also saw a Sloth Bear.

## **Main Tour Day 10; Post-extension Day 3**

**Tuesday 23rd February**

The Tiger Direct! main tour finished when the overnight flight landed in the UK and another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.

It was another misty, drizzly and cloudy day in India. In the morning we had a boat ride on the River Denwa. It was great see a lot of bird life from the water. Marsh Mugger Crocodile and other mammals were seen coming to the water. A highlight of the boat safari was watching the Indian Skimmers.

On our afternoon drive in the park we had good sightings of Sloth Bear and Indian Giant Squirrel.

## **Post-extension Day 4**

**Wednesday 24th February**

Today was clear and cold. Near the park entrance we saw a pack of Wild Dogs. They were on a hunt and we saw them chasing some deer and Indian Hare for quite some time. During the safari we also saw Sloth Bear, Giant Squirrel, Gaur, Wild Pigs and Sambar along with some good birds.

The park was closed in the afternoon so we went on the buffer zone drive to look for Leopards. We were really lucky to spot three different Leopards; two close to two different cattle kills close to the village and one crossing the road.

## **Post-extension Day 5**

**Thursday 25th February**

In the morning we had an elephant ride in the park. We started at the elephant boarding camp down the river and the ride lasted for an hour. We had breakfast in the park before returning to the lodge to get ready to leave for Bhopal. We packed and checked out, and with a packed lunch, we left Reni Pani at 11am.

We reached Bhimbhetka at 1.30pm and visited a rock shelter. The visit lasted for an hour and then we drove straight to Jeha Numa Palace in Bhopal. After a rest and supper, we left for the airport to catch our overnight flights back to the UK.

## **Post-extension Day 6**

**Friday 26th February**

We arrived back in the UK where another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.
