

India - Tiger Direct!

With Tadoba & Satpura Extensions

Naturetrek Tour Report

7 - 14 March 2016

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Summary

In addition to the India – Tiger Direct! tour, this report includes a pre-tour extension to Tadoba and a post-tour extension to Satpura.

Pre-extension Day 1

Wednesday 2nd March

The Tadoba pre-tour extension started with flights from the UK to India.

Pre-extension Day 2

Thursday 3rd March

Participants for the Tadoba extension arrived safely in Nagpur at 5pm. After collecting luggage we headed to Tuli Imperial Hotel for an overnight stay before leaving for Tadoba National Park the next day. After checking in and finding our rooms, we met again at 7pm to discuss plans. We then had dinner, after which we retired for the night.

Pre-extension Day 3

Friday 4th March

Today the weather was cool and clear in the morning, but heavy showers in the afternoon. After breakfast we met in the hotel lobby at 10.30am. We completed checkout formalities and left for Tadoba at 11am. It was a pleasant ride and we enjoyed the countryside. We reached Svasara, our lodge for the next three days, at 1pm. We quickly found our rooms and then met for lunch.

We had an afternoon drive in the park. There was news that a Royal Bengal Tigress called Sonam had made a kill in the morning. We rushed to the Jamunjhora area and when we arrived we saw the kill of a male Sambar near to the pond. After some time the Tigress came out and started dragging the kill towards the undergrowth bordering the pond. One of its cubs also came out for a drink. It was really exciting to see our first Tiger of the trip within an hour! After enjoying the sighting we left to explore other areas of the park. Later it started to rain heavily. Before finishing the safari we saw a tiger walking ahead of us on the Kosekenar road. The Tigress named Chhoti Tara walked ahead of us for a kilometre! We also saw Grey Mongoose and Gaur on the drive.

Back at the lodge we went to our rooms for showers before meeting in the sitting area to do our checklist and discuss plans. We then had dinner and retired as we had an early wakeup call in the morning.

Pre-extension Day 4

Saturday 5th March

On a cool and clear day we had an early start to the park. On the morning safari people in two of our jeeps saw the Tigress named Sonam with one of her cubs in the same area as yesterday. Also on the main road a Sloth Bear was seen.

We enjoyed some good sightings on the afternoon drive. A Grey-headed Fish Eagle was seen at Tadoba Lake, the Tigress Sonam and three of her cubs were seen in the Jamunjhora area, another Tigress was seen crossing the road near the Khatoda gate, and a male Tiger named Matkasur was seen on the Jaamni-Kolara road.

Pre-extension Day 5; Main Tour Day 1

Sunday 6th March

The main tour started with flights, mostly from the UK, to India. Meanwhile those on the pre-tour extension had more jeep safaris in the park.

On a cloudy morning, people in a couple of our jeeps saw the Tigress Sonam with one of her cubs at the Jamunjhora waterhole. That was the only big cat sighting of the morning.

On the afternoon drive Wild Dogs were seen close to Tadoba lake, a Tigress named Maya was seen with three of her cubs at Ainbodi, and people in a couple of vehicles saw Matkasur, a male Tiger, on the Jaamni main road

Pre-extension Day 6; Main Tour Day 2

Monday 7th March

It was another cloudy but clear morning. On the morning safari people in one of our jeeps had an amazing sighting of the Tiger Matkasur in the Jamunbodi area. A pack of Wild Dogs were seen in the Pandarpauni area and were later seen at Number 97 waterhole. While watching the Wild Dogs at Pandarpauni, a Leopard was also seen. Other highlights of the morning included sightings of Monitor Lizard and Nilgai. After the drive we returned to the lodge to pack. We then had lunch before leaving for Pench.

We reached Pench before sunset and in the evening the rest of the group arrived. With the main tour group now formed, we discussed plans for the coming days before our first dinner together.

Day 3

Tuesday 8th March

We left early in the morning for the park and our first safari. On entering the park we enjoyed some good birding. We went to the Chhindimatta area where there were some alarm calls. Later we got a good look at a Tigress called Sharmili on the rocks. Golden Jackals were also seen chasing Spotted Deer in the area.

In the afternoon, a Tiger named BMW was seen at the Alijhod waterhole. It came and sat in the water for some time and then went off to settle nearby for the afternoon. We also saw a pack of Wild Dogs make the kill of a Spotted Deer in the Chhandimatta area.

Day 4

Wednesday 9th March

Today was cloudy and cool. The morning started with a sighting of some Wild Dogs in the park. A Golden Jackal was also seen carrying a Spotted Deer fawn kill, and a group of Black Storks were seen in the Alijhod waterhole. After the drive we returned to the lodge, had lunch and then departed for Kanha at 1.15pm.

We reached Kanha Jungle lodge, our home for the next three days, in the evening. After checking in we discussed plans before dinner.

Day 5

Thursday 10th March

On a cool and clear day, we went for our first drive in Kanha. We entered the park and explored the area looking for big cats. The people in one of our jeeps were really lucky. They spotted a Tigress named Chhoti Maada on Gidhapala road and enjoyed a relaxed sighting. Two Tigers were heard calling around the Chhedi Talab area and a herd of Barasingha were seen in the Sondar area.

On the afternoon drive a Crested Serpent Eagle was seen killing a snake and then being mobbed by crows. Later in the drive, people in three of our vehicles saw a Tiger named Link 7 at Umerjhola pond. It was in the pond, cooling off, and later left the water and walked towards the Andhakua camp.

Day 6

Friday 11th March

It was another cool and clear day. We enjoyed our usual two safaris in the park but no tigers were spotted, although we saw a good amount of tracks and alarm calls were heard at a few places, confirming their presence. On the morning drive we saw lots of Gaur. In the afternoon we saw Lesser Adjutant Stork, and impressive Barasingha stags were seen in Bisanpura meadow.

Day 7

Saturday 12th March

Although the morning was clear, there was heavy rain and thunder in the evening. On the morning drive a Tigress named Chhoti Maada was seen at Bagh Pulia junction. Golden Jackals were also sighted in the park.

In the afternoon, two of our jeeps went to Kisli and a female Tiger was seen near the Kisli Elephant Camp. It was walking on a dry stream bed when it was spotted. In the Mukki area of the park, people in the other two vehicles saw a Tigress at two different places. One was spotted near the Imli teeraha and was later identified as the daughter of the Tigress Chhoti Maada. She was again spotted behind Singarpur waterhole stalking a Wild Boar by people in another of our jeeps. She spooked the boar and the animal escaped. Gaurs were seen in the Minkur area.

Main Tour Day 8; Post-extension Day 1

Sunday 13th March

It was our last morning in Kanha. On our safari we saw tiger tracks and scrape marks near the Gidhlighogra area but no alarm calls were heard or sightings made. We did spot a Rufous-bellied Hawk-Eagle feeding on a Jungle Owlet on a tree. Later we saw a Peacock (Indian Peafowl) displaying on the middle of a road ahead of us and a Changeable (Crested) Hawk-Eagle perched nearby. After the drive we returned to the lodge to pack and get ready to start the next legs of our tour.

Group members finishing the main tour then departed for Nagpur and those staying in India for the post-tour extension set off on the long drive to Satpura. The journey took close to nine hours including stops on the way. We had packed lunches with us and the small towns and countryside kept us busy during the journey.

We reached Satpura in the evening and checked into the Reni Pani Lodge. After discussing plans, we had dinner and then retired for the night.

Main Tour Day 9; Post-extension Day 2

Monday 14th March

After spending the night in Nagpur, group members finishing with the main tour departed for the airport for flights back to the UK.

Meanwhile on a clear, cool day, those on the post-tour extension had an early drive in the park. Our first drive in Satpura had an exciting start when a Leopard was seen in the Kaarimaati area. Other sightings included Nilgai, Gaur, Spotted Deer, Sambar and Indian Giant Squirrel with a courting pair near the Aampaani area. The birding was phenomenal as we were in a different habitat.

In the afternoon we saw Western Osprey in the Keria area. Lot of storks were seen including Asian Openbill and Painted and Woolly-necked Storks. A Leopard was seen by everyone near to Jamunjhiria pool.

Main Tour Day 10; Post-extension Day 3

Tuesday 15th March

The Tiger Direct! main tour finished when the overnight flight landed in the UK and another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.

It was another clear and cool morning with a hot afternoon in India. In the morning we went to the Lagda area of the park which was very scenic. A Grey-headed Fish Eagle was seen in this area and we had our breakfast there. Later Indian Giant Squirrels were seen in the Aampaani area, and there was a Sloth Bear on a tree in the Sidhbaba area.

In the afternoon a male Sloth Bear was seen in the Khapa area. We followed it for some time and watched it cross the road in front of us and go up the hill. While we were busy looking at the Sloth Bear, we caught a glimpse of some movement around the trees in the Gulel road and found three Leopard cubs playing on the rocks. We watched them till it was time to leave the park.

Post-extension Day 4

Wednesday 16th March

The day again started clear and cool, becoming hot in the afternoon. We divided into two groups for our morning activity. Peter, Joan, Brenda and Andy went canoeing. Lots of water birds were seen of which Indian Skimmer was the highlight. Indian Vulture was also spotted. Jo, Graham, Pat and Andrew went for an Elephant ride. Sightings from the elephant included Gaur, Giant Squirrel and Sambar.

In the afternoon we went to the buffer area of the park as the park itself was closed for activities. We went to a waterhole and parked up. We waited patiently for an hour but we weren't lucky and nothing came for a drink. On our way back we saw two Sloth Bears; a mother and cub foraging on the forest floor. We also saw Indian Stone-curlew, Indian Eagle-Owl, Sambar and Indian Gerbil during the drive.

Post-extension Day 5

Thursday 17th March

While Jo, Graham, Pat and Andrew went canoeing, Peter, Joan, Brenda and Andy went for an elephant ride. After the activities we returned to the lodge as we had to leave for Bhopal. We packed and checked out, and with a packed lunch, we left Reni Pani at 11am.

On the way to Bhopal we stopped at Bhimbhetka to visit the rock shelters. We reached the Jehan Numa Palace hotel in Bhopal at 4.30pm. After supper we left for the airport to catch our overnight flights back to the UK.

Post-extension Day 6

Friday 18th March

We arrived back in the UK where another Naturetrek adventure came to an end.
