## Pre-tour Extension Day 1

Wednesday 7th November

In flight to India

## Pre-tour extension Day 2

Thursday 8th November

On a clear, pleasant and sunny day, the flight landed at Nagpur a little earlier than expected. At Nagpur, Yusuf met four of the guests and we transferred to the Radisson Blu hotel in Nagpur. One of the client's flight got cancelled at Heathrow and came later. After dinner Yusuf briefed the guests about the next day's programme.

## Pre-tour extension Day 3

Friday 9th November

We met in the hotel lobby before starting our 2½- hour journey to Tadoba. On the way we saw quite a few birds. We reached our destination, Svasara Jungle Lodge, at 1pm.

After lunch we went on our first safari. Everyone was very keen. We saw quite a few birds and mammals. Soon, after few minutes, we saw Tigress P2 and her two subadults. One of our group's jeeps saw an Indian Treeshrew. In the evening we met for the checklist followed by dinner.

## Pre-tour extension Day 4

Saturday 10th November

After refreshing tea and coffee, we went for our morning safari. We had our first Tiger sighting within 10 minutes of entering the park gate. We saw a few vehicles slowing down and soon we saw a dominant Tiger T54 crossing the road, and then we saw him walking parallel in the thickets, and finally we saw him in the fire-break line before he vanished. We also saw quite a few birds and other mammals. Later in the morning drive we saw a transient Tiger with a radio collar, lying down in the open patch.

On our evening drive we were lucky to see the same collared male again. Back at the lodge we did the checklist and later had a flavoursome dinner.

## Pre-tour extension Day 5; Main tour Day 1

Sunday 11th November

It was a chilly morning and after a refreshing cup of tea and coffee, we set out for our game drive. We saw quite a few tracks and followed them for quite a bit. Peter, having missed the first sighting, saw the Tigress P2 with her two subadult offspring near Tadoba lake. We also saw quite a few birds.

In the afternoon we again got lucky, with Tigress Maya P2 with her two subadults. We found the streak of Tigers resting near the Tadoba lake, in shade. Later we saw another Tiger, T54. He went into the thickets; we were expecting him to go uphill, so anticipating that, we drove quickly to the hill top, but he possibly must have settled in the bamboo thickets. After waiting for a while, we saw a Leopard cross the road. He was almost sprinting. We decided to intercept him on the Chital road; we dove fast to reach the spot and saw the Leopard

crossing the road very quickly. Then we saw him on the other parallel road. It was a successful afternoon drive. Back in the lodge we did the checklist followed by dinner.

Meanwhile, two of our clients on the main tour started their adventure with a flight from the UK to India.

## **Pre-tour extension Day 6; Main tour Day 2** **Monday 12th November**

Today was our last drive in Tadoba. Our guests in one of the jeeps got lucky with the Tiger sighting. We reached the lodge and had enough time to clean and change. We had an early lunch. After lunch we left for Pench. We reached Pench at around 5.15 in the evening.

Meanwhile the flight for the other three group members landed a little late at Nagpur. They then had a two-hour drive to Pench. In the evening we all met to do the checklist, we had dinner together and briefed the guests about next day's programme.

## **Day 3** **Tuesday 13th November**

Today was a bit cold, and after hot drinks, we had an early start for the park. After completing the formalities, we entered the park and, as we drove, we saw tracks of the Tigress. After following the tracks for a while, we reached a junction, and we heard a few distress calls. The calls stopped after a few minutes. We got the news that streak of Tigers had been sighted near a waterhole by a few lucky ones, but due to time constraints, we could not reach that spot.

In the afternoon we decided to check that waterhole. When we reached the spot there were no distress calls. We also saw a Crested Hawk-Eagle. After waiting for a while, we heard a single distress call of a Peahen. We decided to explore other areas and return back to the same spot. We saw quite a few birds and when we returned back, we saw streak of Tigers. The guests in one of the jeeps saw mother with four subadults and our guests in another saw three subadults. It was a nearly the closing time, so we could not wait longer.

We later met for the checklist followed by dinner, before calling it a night.

## **Day 4** **Wednesday 14th November**

Today was our last drive in Pench. After some hot beverages, we started our morning drive. Today we decided to explore the park. We saw a big flock of Great Cormorants land in the Pench river and it was quite interesting to observe their feeding behaviour. Later in the drive we saw the Tigers at a distance. We had an early lunch, and afterwards, we set out for our next destination, Kanha National Park. We reached Kanha Jungle Lodge at around 5.45pm. We were welcomed by the hospitable staff of the lodge. In the evening we did the checklist, followed by dinner.

## **Day 5** **Thursday 15th March**

After our early morning wake-up call, we met for hot beverages before proceeding on our first safari in the park. It was quite cold as we left the lodge; magical Kanha has always been a refreshing change, as it was a little misty

in the grassland. It was amazing to see the endemic Swamp Deer in the mist with some of the males with decorated antlers. We saw a few Tiger tracks on the way. We reached a spot where we heard a few distress calls and we even heard a Tiger growl. Soon the Tiger came out of the thickets and crossed the road, then disappeared in the thickets; soon we saw him at the junction. He walked on the road like a true king. We followed the Tiger for a bit as he went towards one of the waterholes and sat in water for a few minutes. Then we saw him walking for a bit in the meadow, before vanishing again. We anticipated his movements and we decided to wait for him to show up again: soon he appeared again in the meadow and walked straight in our direction. We saw him up close, as he went towards one of the tree to scent mark. He was patrolling his territory. He finally disappeared in the Sal patch with heavy undergrowth. Later our guests in one of jeeps saw another Tigress crossing the road and they followed her quite a bit before she vanished.

After reaching lodge we went for a nature walk; we saw quite a few interesting spiders, insects, butterflies, wild flowers etc.

In the afternoon we explored few Tiger territories. We came to one of the junction where we saw a few tracks of a Tigress and subadult youngsters. We followed the tracks for a few kilometres, but the Tigress had already crossed towards another zone; only a few people saw her briefly.

Later we assembled in the dining hall for the checklist and dinner. After a briefing about the next day's schedule, we called it a night.

## Day 6

**Friday 16th November**

Today was a bit chilly; we met for refreshments before leaving for a safari. As we drove a few kilometres in the park we saw a few Tiger tracks, possibly from last night. Initially there was hardly any distress calls, but later, we decided to check one of the areas, and soon we saw fresh tracks of Tiger. We followed them for quite a bit; suddenly, we saw a vehicle at a distance, indicating to us that the Tiger had just gone into the thickets, possibly a second ago. After waiting for a long time, we decided to move on to other areas. After a while, we got lucky with a sighting: we saw a Tigress walking on the road. She seemed to be relaxed and was patrolling her territory. There were a few vehicles, but she was not bothered by them. We managed to get a better position and take a few pictures. The afternoon drive was interesting, but no Tiger sighting happened.

In the evening we did the checklist and, after dinner, briefed the guests about the next day's programme.

## Day 7

**Saturday 17th November**

This morning we were booked to visit the Kanha zone. It was a bit cold to begin with, but then pleasant for the rest of the drive. It was a long drive to the Kanha zone. On the way we saw some interesting birds like Verditer Flycatcher and Common Kingfisher, to name a few, we also saw a few tracks of Sloth Bear. Later Yusuf spotted the Sloth Bear at a distance in Kanha meadow. It was a long sighting: the bear was quite relaxed and was foraging in the undergrowth. Everyone was quite keen to see the Sloth Bear. Later, we had our picnic breakfast at Kanha centre point. We saw some interesting wildlife including Black Buck. In the afternoon we enjoyed the cooking demonstration at the lodge, followed by lunch. Afterwards, we went for an afternoon safari. We saw a few birds and Swamp Deer in good light at the twin lakes.

We later met for the checklist before we had our farewell dinner under the stars!

## Day 8

Sunday 18th November

Today was a relaxed day, so we all decided to wake up a little later than usual, as we had a long journey to Satpuda and Nagpur. We had breakfast at 8am, we all gave two of the group our best wishes for their post-tour extension to Satpura with another guide, before the rest of us departed from the lodge at 9am. We reached Nagpur airport quite in good time, at around 2.45 pm, for the flights home.

## Day 9

Monday 19th November

Those flying back to the UK arrived in London, as another successful Tiger Direct tour came to an end.
