

Just Tigers!

Naturetrek Tour Report

7 - 18 February 2014

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Day 1

Saturday 8th February

Cloudy, Slight drizzle, cold

The group were met at the airport and we went to the Hotel Westin Gurgaon. After check in, we met again later to leave for Sultanpur Bird Sanctuary. We did couple of hours of birding and returned back to the hotel by 6.30pm. After briefing the guests regarding next days plan, I left them to relax and rest for the evening.

Day 2

Sunday 9th February

Sunny, cold, breezy

Today we did some Delhi sightseeing before leaving for Jabalpur. At 10am, we went to Qutb Minar with our local tour guide. Later we saw India Gate on the way to lunch at Pindi restaurant. After lunch we saw some more of Lutyen's Delhi before going to Humayun's Tomb. After seeing the monument, we started for Hazrat Nizamuddin train station. We picked up our packed dinner and boarded the train to Jabalpur. We had our dinner on the train and went to sleep.

Day 3

Monday 10th February

Sunny, cold, breezy

We reached Jabalpur at 10am. We went for a wash and change at Narmada Jackson Hotel and then had breakfast. We started for Kanha which took us three and a half hours to reach. We arrived at Tuli Tiger Resort, had a quick lunch and had an afternoon drive in the park. We went to the Sarhi area of Kanha National Park for the afternoon. It was a good first drive - we saw Gaur, Sambar, Spotted Deer, Barasingha and some birds. We got back to the lodge, did our checklist before dinner and went to sleep.

Day 4

Tuesday 11th February

Sunny, cold morning, warm afternoon

We started our morning at 5am. We had tea & biscuits in the lodge and left to queue at the gate. We had our drive at the Kanha zone. We had a few alarm calls, and saw Changeable Hawk Eagle on the way to the central grasslands. We went towards Bison Road to check for any tiger movement. Some alarm calls of Spotted Deer could be heard in the bushes, so we decided to stop and wait there. A female Tiger came out and crossed a small clearing in between the bushes!

All the vehicles were waiting for the tiger to come out to catch a good glimpse. Suddenly, the tiger jumped out of the bush and started chasing a spotted deer fawn which it caught and took it inside the bushes. It all happened in a flash and we could not believe what we had seen! The group's first tiger sighting was an unbelievable one... We waited there and soon the tiger came out with its kill in its mouth and crossed the road. We left there and went for our breakfast. We were all elated this morning!

We went back to the lodge for lunch and started for the afternoon drive at 2.30pm. We went towards the Kisli area. It was a really nice area for birding. The waterhole near Indri was highly productive. Later we got some alarm calls near Chimta camp but no sightings of any tigers. We also saw some Gaur, Sambar and our first Barking Deer. We came back to the lodge after our drive, did our checklist for the day, had dinner, and retired to bed.

Day 5

Wednesday 12th February

Sunny, cold morning, warm afternoon

We had our drive in Kanha in the morning. We got some alarm calls around Digdola and waited for any predator to come out. Later the calls stopped and we moved ahead. We did some good birding in terms of raptors; Crested Serpent Eagle, Crested Hawk Eagle, White Eyed Buzzard, White Rumped Vulture, Red Headed Vulture etc. We also got Jerdon's Bushchat. Not much news of tiger sightings that morning however...

We had our breakfast in the park and checked some more areas before coming back to the lodge. In the afternoon, the park was closed so we went for a walk to the nearby village market in Mocha. It was a weekly market and had all kinds of things on display. After visiting the market we went to the Banjar River bed. We saw a few new birds and enjoyed the scenery. We came back to the lodge just before sunset. In the evening we had dinner and before that we did our checklist.

Day 6

Thursday 13th February

Cloudy cold morning, cloudy warm afternoon

In the morning we went to Sarhi. It was a beautiful area of the park with nice stream beds and forests. We got some alarm calls, Tiger tracks etc but none of them helped us to see a Big Cat. We saw Nilgai, Gaur, Jackal and did some good birding. In the afternoon we went to the Kisli area, and tried looking for leopard. Near to Rajakachhar, we saw a male Tiger crossing the road. A few minutes later one of our vehicle saw a female walking on the road and she went into the forest. We waited there and after 20mins she crossed ahead into the grassland where we could have a good look. We all came back excited after the afternoon drive!

Day 7

Friday 14th February

Cloudy cold morning, warm breezy day

One of our vehicles saw a male Tiger near Bhapsabhera walking in the Sal forest before reaching the Kanha grasslands. No other cat sightings in the morning.

In the evening we went to the Kisli area. A male Tiger nicknamed Alpha Male came out on the road near the Rajakachhar grassland. He was quite relaxed and was sniffing the grass close to the road and spray marking. He stayed with us for an hour and mostly rested on the road. Close to the exit time, it walked away on the road and we had to head back in the opposite direction. After coming to the lodge, we did our checklist before dinner and then retired for the night.

Day 8

Saturday 15th February

Overcast sky and cloudy day

It had rained the previous night and drizzled a bit in the morning. We went to the Mukki area of the park. It was a new area for us and we had a beautiful drive there. Not much tiger movement, though we saw some tracks on the road. In the afternoon, we went to the Sarhi area. In a couple of places we heard alarm calls but had no sighting of any tiger or leopard in the area. We did some birding while waiting for the calls.

Day 9

Sunday 16th February

Cloudy breezy morning, sunny afternoon

In the morning we went to Kanha area where we saw the Umerpani female Tiger attempting to hunt in the grassland. She later came back to the forest and crossed the road in front of us. We went around the grassland to see some new areas. Calls started in the middle of the grassland and after some serious scanning of the area, we saw a Tiger walking far away. Later it came on the road, in front of our vehicle and crossed the grassland. It was a female. We did some good birding after breakfast.

In the afternoon drive, we wanted to try our luck for a leopard. In the morning we came to know that one area had a kill of a leopard and decided to take our chances there. Though we got some serious alarm calls in the area, we didn't have any luck of a leopard coming out.

Day 10

Monday 17th February

Clear cold morning, sunny day

In the morning we left early for the Kanha area, and saw a young male Tiger near to Badrinath. It was resting in the sun and after some time went inside the forest. Later we did some birding. We decided again to try for leopard but it still eluded us. We came back to lodge, packed, and had lunch. We left for Jabalpur by 1.30pm and reached there by 4.30pm, had some tea at Kalchuri and started for the Railway Station. We picked up our packed dinner and settled onto the train.

Day 11

Tuesday 18th February

Sunny & hazy day

In the morning the train reached Agra by 9.30am and we directly went to ITC Mughal for breakfast and then for a wash and change. We started with the local tour guide for sightseeing at 11am. First we went to the Taj Mahal and then we went to see some marble works. Finishing our visit to the workshop, we went to the Red Fort.

After the Red Fort, we went for lunch at the Only Place restaurant. We were now left with a last monument to visit, the Baby Taj. From our restaurant it took us half an hour to drive to the Baby Taj. We visited there and came back for some shopping in the city.

We all dispersed from there on our various post-tour extensions or return to the UK. While Frances and Brian went to Bharatpur, Mark, Tess and Sue went to Chambal from Agra. I left with Jane to the Westin Gurgaon in Delhi which we reached by 9.15pm, and she got an early morning flight back to the UK.
