#### Introduction

This report commences with the Just Tigers! Tour, which ran from 11th to 23rd January with four members and was led by Yusuf. Two group members then stayed on for the Chambal and Bharatpur Extension, which continued till 26th January and was also led by Yusuf.

Day 1

Friday 11th January

In flight to India

The tour started with an overnight flight from the UK to India

Day 2

Saturday 12th January

Delhi - Sultanpur

The flight landed on time at Indira Gandhi International Airport, Delhi, where Yusuf met the group. Within ten minutes we reached our hotel, the Holiday Inn. We met again at about noon to go to Sultanpur Bird Sanctuary.

After one and a half hour's drive we reached Sultanpur and saw lots of good birds including egrets, herons, Painted Stork, Glossy and Black-headed Ibises, Eurasian Wigeon, Common Pochard and Ferruginous Duck. Our raptor sightings included Eastern Imperial Eagle.

Back at the hotel we had a briefing about the next day's programme.

Day 3

Sunday 13th January

Delhi - Flight to Jabalpur

We left the hotel at about 8am to catch flight to Jabalpur which took about two hours. We went to a hotel in Jabalpur to freshen up and have lunch. Post lunch we continued our road trip to Kanha, arriving at around 6pm. Everyone was tired after a long day travelling, and it was going to be a dawn start tomorrow, so we decided to meet directly for an early dinner. Yusuf briefed the group about the next day's programme before we retired for the night.

Day 4

**Monday 14th January** 

Kanha National Park

The day started with an early morning wake-up call at 5:15 am. It was quite a cold and foggy morning, but

after some hot beverages we were ready for our first safari in Kanha. We saw a few interesting animal tracks including Tiger and very fresh tracks of a Sloth Bear, and after following the tracks we got lucky with a Sloth Bear sighting. This male sloth bear was clearly in his prime as he had healthy looking coat and was a very good size.

After lunch we went to the Kisli zone and it was initially a little quiet this afternoon, although we saw a Sambar, some Spotted Deer and a few pug marks. Later during the drive we went down a hill and while we were watching a Sambar we heard the distress calls of Spotted Deer. We drove quickly to the spot but the calls stopped. After waiting for a while we drove further to check out the area around a track junction and as soon as we arrived we saw a few vehicles already present, and everyone on those vehicles seemed to be very excited. We took our position and soon saw a young Tiger. The Tiger was on the road just for a minute before he moved into the undergrowth, and we then watched him for a good 15 minutes while he stood in a slightly open patch before disappearing into the thickets.

Back at the lodge we met later for the checklist and drinks, followed by dinner.

#### Day 5

#### **Tuesday 15th January**

#### Kanha National Park

This morning was very cold again, but after some hot drinks we went for our morning safari. We saw quite a few interesting birds including Little Cormorant, Lesser Whistling Ducks, Lesser Golden-backed Woodpecker, Green Sandpiper, Jungle Owlet, Crested Hawk-Eagle and Red and Yellow Wattled Lapwings. We also saw quite a few mammals including Gaur, Sambar, Swamp Deer and Jackal.

Our afternoon drive was similar but also included sightings of Indian Vulture. We also heard a few distress calls but did not see any predators.

In the evening we met for the checklist which was followed by dinner.

## Day 6

## Wednesday 16th January

#### Kanha National Park

Today was the first day of the Tiger census so the park would not be open to visitors until 8:45am, so we decided to go birding first thing in the morning, meeting for a 7.00am start. It was quite cold again, and most of the birds stayed well hidden, but we did see Nutmeg Mannikins, Coppersmith Barbet, Black-hooded Oriole, Ashy Drongo, White Wagtails and Indian Pond Herons, before we came back for hot breakfast at the lodge with rest of the group before going out for our safari.

In the afternoon, after lunch, we met for a birding cum village walk and visited the local market which gave an interesting insight into the food and culture of this part of India. We saw quite a few birds on the walk

including Common Myna, Brahminy Starling, Coppersmith Barbet and House Sparrow.

In the evening we met for checklist, which was followed by a delicious dinner.

#### Day 7

## **Thursday 17th January**

#### Kanha National Park

The morning was a very cold again, and Yusuf and Geoff met at 7am before going out birding. We saw White Wagtails, White-browed Wagtail, Tree Pipits and Little Cormorant. We joined the others at the breakfast table and post-breakfast we went for our morning drive.

Today we were going to the Mukki zone. It was quite an interesting drive, and on the way we saw a lot of pug marks, so clearly there had been a lot of Tiger movement the previous night and early in the morning. We met some people on the way going towards the Kisli zone from Mukki, and we were informed that there had been a sighting of a Tigress in Mukki and she had been seen crossing the main road. We tried to anticipate her movements and we decided to try to intercept her near a water hole. We reached a suitable spot and saw a few vehicles lined up already. After a while the guide in one of the vehicles saw the Tigress coming towards the road where we were waiting. We positioned our vehicle accordingly and within a few minutes she appeared from the undergrowth. Jaki, Hazel, Kay and Geoff all were very happy to see the Tigress up close. Our driver quickly reversed the vehicle and we followed her for a short distance before she vanished into the thickets.

In the afternoon safari we got lucky with another Tiger sighting, and this time it was a dominant male. While driving we saw that people in the vehicle in front of us were taking pictures and we realised that a Tiger was walking towards us, so we positioned our vehicle and we were thrilled to watch him patrolling his territory. He was walking on the road under the canopy of Sal trees with the sunlight filtering through the trees giving a good photographic opportunity. Within a few minutes we saw him disappear in the undergrowth, so anticipating his movements we drove onto another parallel road and waited near a fire break where we expected him to emerge. While waiting we saw an Asian Paradise Flycatcher perching on weed stems close to the ground, giving us a great view of this beautiful bird. After waiting for a while we decided to check a little further along the road as far as the next junction. When we returned the alarm calls started and the Tiger came out and quickly crossed the road a little further ahead, before being lost to view. We decided to try to intercept him on another parallel road and this time we saw and photographed him. He crossed the road again into the undergrowth, and after a while we again intercepted him on another road before he finally disappeared for good.

After a very successful day we enjoyed our evening meal back at the lodge, and after doing our checklist and going over the next day's plans we retired to bed very happy.

#### Day 8

## Friday 18th January

#### Kanha National Park

This morning was cold again as Geoff and Yusuf went for their usual birding session. We saw a few interesting birds like Greater Racket-tailed Drongo, and Lesser Golden-backed Woodpecker. We met the others at breakfast time before going for our morning safari. First of all we saw two bull Gaurs. There were a few pug marks but initially no distress calls. Later there were a few distress calls and when we reached the spot we saw langurs giving alarm calls and Yusuf said it could be for a Leopard. After a few minutes a Leopard ran across behind our vehicle, but unfortunately it was only seen by our driver.

After lunch we went out again, but it was very quiet, although we saw a few birds, Swamp Deer and a Wild Boar.

In the evening we did the checklist followed by delightful dinner.

#### Day 9

## Saturday 19th January

#### Kanha National Park

We had a good birding session this morning, seeing a few Black-hooded Orioles, White, White-browed and Grey Wagtails to name a few. After breakfast we went for our morning safari and saw a few interesting birds at the park gate including Verditer Flycatcher, Yellow-crowned Woodpecker, Jungle Owlet and Jerdon's and Golden-fronted Leafbirds. On the drive we saw a few tracks but heard no alarm calls. While exploring we saw a Sloth Bear coming out into the open. He must have been on the look out for some food, moving in and out of the undergrowth, his coat shining in the bright sunlight. After a few minutes he vanished into the bushes and was lost from sight. Everyone was so happy to have this sighting, and a little further on we saw a Jackal feeding on a Spotted Deer carcass and a Crested Hawk-eagle waiting for its turn to feed.

In the afternoon we also saw a few birds, and in the evening we did the checklist followed by dinner.

## Day 10

## **Sunday 20th January**

#### Kanha - overnight train to Agra

It was a little cold this morning for our last drive in the park. After the morning birding session we went for our safari, which due to time constraints we had to cut short by about 45 minutes, yet we were lucky enough to find a Tigress. On reaching Mukki we saw some pug marks and while exploring the area we heard the alarm calls of Spotted Deer, and soon afterwards we saw a Tigress in the thickets. A short time later we saw the Tigress on the road so we followed her for a short distance. She seemed to be a little unsettled and we wondered whether she might be looking for her cubs, so we decided to leave her when she went back into the undergrowth. Everyone was of course very excited to see the Tigress on our last drive.

Back at the lodge we had enough time to clean up and change, pay our extras bills and say good bye to the hospitable lodge staff. We drove to Jabalpur to catch our overnight train to Agra taking our packed lunches with us. We reached Jabalpur in time and after some tea and coffee at a motel we went the station which was just a minute's drive from the motel. We boarded the train with a packed dinner.

#### **Day 11**

## **Monday 21th January**

Agra

The train reached Agra on time and we were received by our local ground handling agent. We went straight to our hotel where we went straight for breakfast, and then we went to our rooms to get some rest. We met again at 1:30 pm after lunch to visit Fatehpur Sikiri. The weather was cloudy and it rained when we reached Fatehpur Sikiri, but fortunately we had some umbrellas with us that kept us dry. After reaching the hotel, Yusuf briefed the group about the next day's plans.

#### **Day 12**

## **Tuesday 22th January**

Agra; visit Taj Mahal; Extension group to Chambal

We woke up quite early as today we were visiting the Taj Mahal at sunrise. It had rained during the night, but it had cleared up by morning, and we were all excited to see this wonderful monument just as the sun was coming up.

We came back for breakfast at the hotel, and then checked out and continued our excursion of Agra, first of all going to see the Baby Taj, followed by lunch and then a visit to Agra Fort. After spending time looking at the fort we re-grouped and said our goodbyes, as Geoff and Kay went towards Chambal safari lodge to begin the tour extension, while Jaki & Hazel went with Yusuf to the station to catch the train to Delhi. The train was on time reachin Delhi at 7:30 pm. And the guests were escorted to the Hotel Holiday Inn for an overnight stay.

## Day 13

## Wednesday 23rd January

The main tour came to end and Jaki and Hazel went to the airport in time to catch their flight to Heathrow.
