Tour Report The Burren

Tour participants: Bruce Middleton (leader) with 15 Naturetrek clients

Day 1 Monday 20th May

Sunny

The majority of the group were picked up from Shannon Airport and driven to Sheedy's Hotel in Lisdoonvarna, where we met the rest of the group. After everyone had checked in and made their evening meal requests, we set off to Newtown Castle. Beside the sixteenth-century cylindrical fortified tower house there is an art college with a small café where we had lunch.

After we were suitably nourished, we set off on a walk down a lane and then up onto Cappanavalla Hill. We entered an area of woodland and scrub and here we spotted our first butterflies of the tour, including Pearl-bordered Fritillary, Red Admiral, Dingy Skipper and Wood White. A Common Lizard was seen by some as well as a number of Green Tiger-beetles. In the background was the constant call of a Cuckoo and as we started our ascent we were welcomed by a very vocal Blackcap. We saw a good variety of plants that included Lousewort, Mountain Everlasting, Wild Thyme, Common Milkwort, Rue-leaved Saxifrage and Early Purple Orchid. Then there were the breath-taking, metallic-blue propeller-shaped Spring Gentians and, to top it all, lots of the beautiful Large-flowered Butterwort could be found as well. We then wandered back to the bus which returned us back to the hotel to freshen up before having the first of our tour's delicious evening meals.

Day 2 Tuesday 21st May

Sunny

After a hearty breakfast, we set off to Poll Sallach on the coast road. Here we looked at the limestone pavement and found the beautiful yellow-flowered Hoary Rockrose together with Limestone Bedstraw, some Mossy Saxifrage and numerous Heath Spotted-orchids. We also found some Early Marsh-orchid (*Dactylorhiza incarnata* subsp. *incarnata*).

We then continued along the coast road in the bus to Black Head and then disembarked to look at some sheep with their lambs gathered around the lighthouse. Here there was Thrift and Sea Campion and hidden in the limestone crevices we found Sea Spleenwort fern. The sea was very still and at times there was little sound at all except the sound of Sandwich and Common Terns calling as they flew by. As we looked out to sea, we spotted a number of Grey Seals and we also saw a lot of Black Guillemots and a couple of Great Northern Divers. On our return to the bus we found lots of Irish Saxifrage. We then headed towards Ballyvaughan but before we reached there, we stopped at the wellsite which had lots of Fairy Foxgloves growing on it. Next stop was lunch at Monks Bar that specialises in seafood and the food here melted in the mouth.

In the afternoon we drove a little way back and set off down a path towards the sea to look at a coastal spit known as the Rine. The path had numerous Wood White butterflies fluttering along in the sunshine as we were serenaded by a Whitethroat. Then, whilst out on this spit, we met a herd of cattle with calves and we were asked by a local to keep our distance which we did. We also came across a flock of Wild Goats that moved on as we came close. The spit had some nice flowers, such as Greater and Lesser Sea Spurrey and lots of Field Mouse-ear

and some Sea Mouse-ear. We also came across an area of saltmarsh that had the plants of both Lax-flowered Sea-lavender and Irish Sea-lavender. However, it was too early to see them in flower.

We then set off away from the coast and went up to Poulnabrone Dolmen. There we looked at it, lying atop the limestone pavement. Beside the dolmen there was a wet ditch which had lots of Brooklime, Common Spikerush, Lesser Spearwort and some Marsh Arrowgrass growing in it. There was also a small fenced-off pond that had Smooth Newts in it and lots of Whirly-gig Beetles and Water Boatman upon it.

As we made our descent back in the bus, we stopped at a ringed hill fort known as Cahermort Fort. Here we had lovely views across the landscape as well as finding our first Water Avens of the tour. Then we returned to Sheedy's for another great evening meal.

Day 3

Wednesday 22nd May

Sunny

After breakfast we set off towards Slieve Carran National Nature Reserve and en route we stopped off briefly to photograph Leminagh Castle. On arriving at the reserve path that leads up to the 'Eagles Rock' we discovered a few Dense-flowered Orchids which were going over. There were hundreds of plants of the eight-petaled Mountain Avens and it was also noted that the numerous Spring Gentians sometimes had five petals or six petals and sometimes even only three. The path led us to the seventh-century hermitage and holy well dedicated to St Colman Mac Duagh which was hidden in a hazel copse. This copse had a woodland floor covered in Wild Garlic, Yellow Pimpernel and Bluebell. The commonest moth we saw here was the Speckled Yellow, but we also saw some of the rare Transparent Burnet Moth as well as Burnet Companion. As we looked at the holy well with Brittle Bladder-ferns growing out of the walls, we were serenaded by a Garden Warbler. Then we walked back towards the bus via a wet bog area with Common Cotton-grass blowing in the wind. Here we also found Common Butterwort, Bog Pimpernel and Round-leaved Sundew. We then drove on to Cassidy's in the small hamlet of Carran for another scrumptious meal.

Afterwards we set off to Mullach Mor and investigated the partly dried up Loch Gealain which is a Turlough (winter-fed lake). Here we were immediately greeted by the Shrubby Cinquefoil which is plentiful here. We noticed lots of Brimstone butterflies which as caterpillars would have fed on the Alder Buckthorn that is stunted and hugs the limestone pavement here. We also saw Common Blue Damselflies flying by, as well as a Stonechat that flew over our heads. There were Marsh Marigolds, Black Bog-rushes and the speciality of the area - the Turlough Dandelions to be seen. On an adjacent turlough we saw Mute Swan, Little Egret and Grey Heron.

We returned back to Lisdoonvarna for a quick exploration of a nice wet meadow site - not far from the hotel. Here we found masses of Meadow Thistle and a number of the Western Marsh Orchid. We then returned to the hotel and had another wonderful meal.

Day 4

Thursday 23rd May

Light rain all day

The day was started by us all going down into the village and buying our own packed lunch. Then we set off along the Caher Valley to the Caher Bridge Garden. Here we met the enchanting Carl Wright who right from the start enthused us with his passion for his garden that he has created and is still creating. As we wandered through his magical garden, he told us about how it all started by him buying a derelict house and how he rebuilt it and how he built a paradise around it on top of the limestone pavement that supports little or no soil. He told us how he cleared small areas of Hazel bit by bit, built walls from scratch and how he sieved all the imported soil for his garden plants to survive on. He told us that he is an ecologist that has picked up his horticultural skills over the years. Carl is obviously skilful at whatever he puts his mind to and was truly an inspiration to us all. After our tour many of the group had their lunch in the bus whilst others had their lunch by the wall overlooking Carl's garden.

After lunch we drove to the remains of Formoyle Church and from here, we walked up a green lane to look across the landscape and see if we could find a few more Dense-flowered Orchids. We did find some but again they had pretty much gone over. However, we did see lots more Spring Gentian and Mountain Avens. We also saw a few brave Speckled Yellow moths in the rain and a few Meadow Pipits flew over our heads. Because the mist started to set in and block our view, it was decided that there was enough time to go back to see if we could find the Pyramidal Bugle which had eluded us two days earlier. Carl had given us a good hint to where we should start from. So, we returned to Poll Sallach and here after a bit of searching Linda discovered one plant that had already gone over due to the drought conditions from which Ireland has been suffering. We then returned back to the hotel for a celebration drink to finding the elusive plant. It was also the last of the delicious evening meals of the tour.

Day 5 Friday 24th May

Overcast to begin with but later some sun appeared

After our last hearty breakfast at Sheedy's and farewells to our excellent host Martina, we set off to the Cliffs of Moher. However, it was decided we would drive just that little bit further on to see the ancient healing well of Saint Bridget and the more recent O'Brian's Monument. However, at the cliffs of Moher, we had to use our binoculars but were rewarded by seeing numerous Fulmars, Guillemots and some Kittiwakes. The friendly ranger pointed out where it was best to see the Puffins. Some of us saw the Peregrine nesting on the cliff edge and others heard and then saw two Chough fly overhead. We also discovered some Roseroot only in leaf and beside it there was some Sheep's-bit Scabious.

We then drove to Fanore Dunes where we were greeted by a number of rabbits that soon disappeared into the long Marram Grass. The plants of note were the Dodder smothering the short grassland flowers in amongst the Pyramidal Orchid and Irish Narrow-leaved Eyebright. Then much to our delight we found our only O'Kelly's Spotted-orchid. From here we returned quickly to the hotel where members of the group who were staying another night could pick up their cars and follow on behind to Kilfenora Burren Centre. Here we had lunch and then visited the ruins of Kilfenora Cathedral to see the ancient limestone Celtic crosses and here we observed Navelwort growing on the walls. At this point many of us parted our ways and said our goodbyes. Then the ones

that needed to catch the plane drove back on the bus to the Shannon Airport and after saying goodbye to our wonderfully informative bus driver Brian, so ended another lovely Naturetrek tour of the Burren.
