# The Italian & French Alps

Naturetrek Tour Report

25 June - 2 July 2019

## Day 1

# **Tuesday 25th June**

With our flight arriving safely on time into Turin in the late afternoon we had time to simply arrange the minibus and then undertake a direct transfer to the Cogne valley where our first hotel lay. As we travelled north, we could see the distant high peaks of the Alps ahead and it was not long before we swung westwards to travel along the Aosta valley with the mountains rising steeply on both sides. We then turned off southwards into the Cogne valley where the road became narrower and winding as the scenery became ever more attractive. We crossed and passed close to the rushing Eyvia River as we travelled with an increasing number of tempting flowers seen on the roadside. Arriving at the comfortable spa hotel, we had just enough time to settle in before meeting before dinner for a quick chat and then on to the dining room for a tasty meal.

# Day 2

# Wednesday 26th June

The morning dawned hot and sunny as it was to remain throughout the duration of the trip, as Europe and the UK was plunged into a record-breaking heatwave. Despite the heat, we were at least fortunate that our trip was generally spent at altitude, within the cooler region of the high Alps, as the heat maps showed us surrounded by dark black and reds on the weather charts of lowland Europe.

Our first excursion was a short drive away, with a walk taken from the village of Gimillan. Our route began with a short steep climb through a meadow of tall herbs that allowed us to familiarize ourselves with some of the very many commoner plants that we would be encountering. After this short climb, the path levelled out and we were then assailed with a multitude of flowers, butterflies and a few choice birds to admire and try to take in. Among the many butterflies the undoubted stars were the Apollos, with several individuals drifting past the group to settle occasionally, allowing a close view and photo opportunities. As we left the open grassy meadows, we entered an area of open pine woodland with steep open stony slopes either side. In this rather bare habitat, we found the very localized endemic *Aethionema thomasianum* alongside rosettes of *Saxifraga paniculata*. Reaching the river, we paused in the shade for a rest and drink while we searched through the many butterflies coming to the damp mud. This mix of species held several good finds such as Alpine Blue and False heath Fritillary.

The heat of the day was taking its toll on some of the group who opted to remain and make their own way back, whilst most continued across an open meadow containing *Camapanula scheuchzeri* and *Onobrychis montana*, on the opposite side of which were shading trees where we stopped for lunch. From here, a further few of the group opted to remain and relax whilst the final hardy members opted to continue on to a short climb near a waterfall, during which further interesting plants were seen, including a few examples of *Pulsatilla halleri* in bloom.

Heading back the group slowly reformed catching up the earlier departees. A different bridge was crossed to take an alternative route that led us through some fresh areas to explore producing further new plants as we went. Once the entire group was together, we continued back to the vehicle where we then drove on into Cogne for a refreshing ice cream after the heat of the day.

# Day 3

# **Thursday 27th June**

Our day began with a walk from Valnontey up the switchback path leading to a waterfall that dropped steeply down into the valley. With the heatwave in Europe continuing, we were fortunate that most of the route was within the shade of the Larch and pine forest. During our climb, we had a number of close encounters with the tame and people-habituated Chamois of the area that allowed for a close approach and extended views. Growing at the trackside we found several *Astragalus exscapus*, another localized alpine specialty. Reaching the bridge crossing the torrent, we paused to cool ourselves in the fine spray before continuing a little further up through the thinning woodland to eventually reach the open meadows, with a stunning view towards the summits of the park. A further spell of relaxation was taken whilst a couple of the group headed on upwards to explore further. We then began our slow descent back to the village where a cold soft drink in a café was required whilst we waited for the two pioneers to return.

We next drove a short way along the river and valley floor before stopping to take our lunch in the shade alongside the river. From here we took a further walk along the level valley floor at a relaxing pace. We encountered more exceedingly tame Chamois on the path that were licking salts from the soil on the path side and were reluctant to move away from the small gathering of walkers approaching from both directions! Eventually we passed slowly, allowing the Chamois to move to one side and watch us from the meadows only 10-15 metres away. The lightly wooded trail provided enough shade to keep the heat at bay as we continued our explorations. A damp marshy meadow held an interesting mix of plants that included *Arnica montana*, *Dactylorhiza majalis* and *Tofieldia calyculata*. With the group again starting to fragment, a few walked on further before we regrouped, once more, and headed back to Cogne for second helpings of the delicious ice cream on offer!

# Day 4 Friday 28th June

Today was spent on our transfer from Italy across into France and the Vanois NP. We took all day doing this with a number of stops and walks along the way as we passed through some amazing scenery on the journey.

Our route led initially out of the Cogne valley and back to the Aosta valley where we headed west on the motorway. We turned off at Morgex to continue west, heading directly towards Monte Bianco/Mont Blanc. We pulled into a convenient layby where we were afforded a splendid view of the highest mountain in Europe for a few photos. Moving on, we were soon climbing numerous switchbacks as we headed south-west up towards the Col du Petit St Bernard. Enjoying the splendid views and abundant flowers as we passed, we left the forested slopes and entered the treeless alpine pastures of the col where we stopped for a walk. Late snow was still present in abundance, despite the heatwave, enabling us to catch up with a few *Crocus caeruleus* and *Soldanella alpina* appearing from the edges of the snow as it retreated. Among the grassy undulating ground, other prime flowers were found, such as *Viola calcarata*, *Geum montanum* and *Trifolium alpinum*, with numerous Dewy Ringlets flying throughout the area. As we were preparing to leave, we finally picked out a couple of White-winged Snowfinches flying over the buildings at the car park.

A short drive on across the border brought us to La Rosière where we stopped for a coffee on the terrace of an alpine ski café where we could enjoy the wonderful view, enlivened by a passing Short-toed Eagle! Refreshed, the road then began the equally winding descent way down into the Isère valley. Once at the valley floor, the road travelled alongside the river, climbing slightly all the way. In view of the heat and strong sun, we opted to find a

shady picnic site by the road before reaching our next planned stop. Having spotted a suitable layby, we pulled over to have our lunch beneath some over shading trees. From here, we drove on through the famous ski areas of Tignes and Val-d'Isère, stopping at the bridge at Saint-Charles at the base of the ascent up towards the Col de L'Iseran.

Here we took a further walk that followed the Isère river towards its source at the high escarpment at the border between Italy and France. The ground here was treeless and lacking in any shade, so we were fortunate to have a cooling breeze blowing down the valley. The initial steeper climb soon levelled out and we were able to admire a mother Alpine Ibex with her kid from a close distance for an extended spell before moving on further on the track. An attractive violet *Viola pinnata* was found at a couple of spots growing at the trackside, joined later by several examples of Edelweiss *Leontopodium nivalis* subsp. *alpinum*. Our luck was further good with the sighting of a couple of Lammergeier overhead in the valley. The heat and climb began to take its toll on a few of the group, who opted to stop and rest and begin their return, with a few of the group continuing along the steep gorge to where the valley opened out to reveal a splendid vista to admire before all then began their return.

With all back at the vehicle, we then drove on to begin our ascent up towards the Col du L'Iseran. A very brief pause was taken on the way up to point out Alpine Bells *Primula matthioli*, growing by the road. Reaching the top of the col we continued on without stopping, as we were due later in the week to return and explore this interesting area. Our route led us through more stunning scenery during which we spotted more Alpine Marmots before dropping down into the valley of the River Arc and ultimately Lanslevillard where we would be staying for the remainder of the trip.

# Day 5

# Saturday 29th June

Today was spent walking in the high alpine grasslands of the Plan du Lac. Arriving in the car park after the dramatic drive up, we shared out the picnic lunch among the group and headed out to spend most of the day on foot. As was the norm, early progress was slow as we spent time examining the many new and exciting species of flower along the edge of the path. Highlights included species such as *Loiseleuria procumbens, Vitaliana primuliflora*, *Gentiana brachyphylla* and a variety of dwarf willows. As the path levelled out, we reached the upland lake where we found several large colonies of *Anemone (Pulsatilla) vernalis*, with a few still in flower alongside recently melted snow patches.

The scenery opened up around us with distant views of the ranges nearby, several of which had large hanging glaciers spilling down from the tops. The clarity of the air was stunning making distant peaks stand out clearly in the absence of air pollution and smog. Our route led on past the mountain refuge that we skirted past heading towards an area of slopes clothed in abundant *Rhododendron ferrugineum* and more *Loiseleuria procumbens*. We took some time to examine the differences between the similar flowers of *Dryas octopetala*, *Anemone baldensis* and *Callianthemum coriandrifolium*. The area is known as a breeding haunt of Rock Ptarmigan and, on this occasion, we were very fortunate in spotting a bird fly up from the slope above us to settle nearby among some exposed rocks. The amazing camouflage of the bird once landed made it tricky to pick out, but we were all happy with the flight views when the white flashes in the wings stood out. We took this opportunity to sit and relax and eat lunch with a view to remember.

We returned to the refuge for a sit down and a coffee on the terrace before the group then split, with most following the easy tarmac route back to the vehicle. The tougher members pushed on across to view the Termignon gorge. Along the way we picked out *Gentiana alpina* among the large colonies of similar looking Trumpet Gentians, *Gentiana acaulis*. Searching among the rocks near the gorge we managed to find a few examples of the diminutive *Phyteuma globularifolia* subsp. *pedemontanum* and stunning fuchsia pink *Primula pedemontana*. During the return walk several Alpine Marmots were seen, whilst overhead both species of Chough were seen with a final highlight of a low-level Lammergeier drifting by that was fortunately seen by both sections of the group.

Once the entire group had re-formed, we began the drive back down from the heights. We took one stop on the way with a walk into the pine forest during which we caught up with several woodland species of plant not previously seen, that included a number of Wintergreens, *Clematis alpina, Veronica urticifolia* and *Aquilegia atrata*. The walk passed a large overhanging area of rock on which a few examples of *Saxifraga diapensioides* grew. Walking on, we reached the attractive rushing torrent crossed by a narrow wooden bridge. We had found several new orchids nearby, that included *Dactylorhiza incarnata* subsp. *cruenta*. After a full day in the open sun we were then happy to return to the hotel to relax on the terrace with a cooling beer or ice cream.

# Day 6

# Sunday 30th June

Most of the group undertook a pre-breakfast walk among the hay meadows opposite the hotel. Our attention was mainly directed to the birds of the area with a fine variety spotted. Although not much of a 'looker', the main highlight of the walk was finding several singing Marsh Warblers in the tall Meadowsweet meadows. To this, we added both species of Redstart, Mistle Thrush, Fieldfare, Crested Tit and several other species of birds by song alone.

The major part of the day was then spent in the vicinity of Mont Cenis and the large lake named after this famous peak. Being a Sunday in the midst of a raging heatwave, it seemed that all the world and his wife had travelled up into the mountains to escape the heat and enjoy the splendour of the Alps! It was fortunate that we had set out in good time to reach the car park near the Refugio du Petit Mont Cenis, where we managed to get a parking spot ahead of the crowds. We then took a walk past the refuge and on to take a circuit back, during which we were to find many more new species alongside a wealth of other previously encountered alpine species. Early finds were the abundant *Gentiana punctata* near the Refuge followed by *Primula latifolia* and *Aquilegia alpina*. We took a steady pace as the walk began to climb, allowing all to keep together as new species were pointed out. At the furthest point for the group, we sat and relaxed while the enthusiasts of the group walked on to admire the deep gorge of the River Ambin. Once regrouped, we continued our circuit passing a number of stunning natural rockeries of a mix of species, notable among them being *Saponaria lutea* among the colourful *Sempervivum arachnoideum* and *Dianthus pavonius*.

We were fortunate that we were able to occupy one of the benches at the Refuge for our picnic, among the many walkers and day-trippers enjoying the weather! Driving back along the narrow access road and onto the main tarmac route, we became aware of just how many people had visited the area. Luckily, this did not detract or impinge on our enjoyment and planned activities. We drove on to pull over at the start of a trail leading towards Grand Mont Cenis and the fort of Pont du Ronce. Our path was lined with a multitude of colourful species, all overlooking the lake and mountain summits all around. Group members opted to walk as far as they were happy

with, before stopping or beginning their slow return. A few walked on to maximize their explorations of this stunning region before we all eventually regrouped back at the bus and a drive back to the hotel for our customary refreshments on the terrace.

Day 7 Monday 1st July

As promised, we returned to the Col du L'Iseran to search for a range of tiny prostrate high-alpine flowers that occur in this harsh environment. The col sits at 2764 metres and is the highest paved tarmac road in the Alps, meaning we don't have to climb up a mountain to access the special plants found here! We were also very fortunate in the weather as the heatwave was still ongoing, so we were able to relax in pleasant temperatures, rather than wearing everything and braced against howling wind that can sometimes occur! We spent over an hour scouring the bare-looking scree for choice species, of which *Gentiana terglouensis* subsp. *schleicheri, Saxifraga androsacea, Petrocallis pyrenaica, Cerastium latifolium* and *Artemisia genipi* were among several more. In the grassier areas a few Edelweiss were flowering alongside the attractive pea family members *Oxytropis halleri* subsp. *velutina* and *Oxytropis pilosa*.

For the more energetic members, we next made a short and steep climb up towards the summit of Pointe des Lessieres at 3043 metres. Our aim was not to reach the top but to find a further range of high-alpine species tucked in among the rocky overhangs at this altitude. After a little searching, our main target of *Campanula cenisia* was eventually found, with other highlights being *Doronicum grandiflorum*, *Geum reptans*, *Oxytropis fetida*, *Androsace helvetica* and *Galium megalospermum*. We were also fortunate in spotting a trio of Alpine Accentors moving close above us among the rocks. On the descent a trio of White-winged Snowfinches joined us on the path for a very close encounter, birds that were also seen elsewhere by the group members who had remained below.

Our next stop was after a short drive lower down at an area of wet flush by the roadside. Here carpets of Glacier Crowfoot, Ranunculus glacialis, were just beginning to bloom, with several species of butterfly and other flowers growing in this wet and damp habitat.

Continuing our driving descent, we stopped by a ruined building with a splendid view out across the valley with a nearby tumultuous waterfall. We enjoyed our picnic whilst admiring all around us, with a rich range of plants present. Abundant Alpine Pasqueflowers *Anemone alpina* were mixed with several new species. After we had finished eating, we walked the short distance to the waterfall where *Phyteuma hemisphaericum* was found on the rocky shelves. The slope behind the waterfall had a fine colony of Alpine Pasqueflower mixed with *Pulmonaria montana*. We were entertained by a pair of Alpine Chough that appeared to be nesting in the roof of the ruin that we had lunched alongside.

A further move was then taken to walk the track that led beneath the Pointe des Arses. This afforded a fine view of the high peaks and hanging glaciers of the area, whilst also producing numerous stunning plants; most of these we had already encountered, but new at the end of the walk was *Saxifraga biflora*.

Finally, with time to spare we took a gentle level track on the valley floor as the culmination of our exertions! We parked alongside the small river where we found *Gentiana bavarica* in a wet flush, joined by the striking yellow-flowered *Campanula thyrsoides*. An interesting discovery in the tall lush meadows alongside was a late-flowering example of the white *Narcissus poeticus* subsp. *raddiiflora*. Nearby, in a patch of recently melted snow were

numerous *Crocus caeruleus*. Walking back along the central path several species of butterfly had been attracted to the salts brought to the surface by the drying wet mud, while a singing Marsh Warbler remained deep in cover in a patch of willows.

On the homeward drive we could admire the many colonies of both St. Bruno's and St. Bernard's Lilies, *Paradisea liliastrum* and *Anthericum liliago*, on the steep roadside banks. A final highlight was the sighting of a Lammergeier drifting beneath us along the valley towards Lanslevillard and our hotel.

# Day 8

# **Tuesday 2nd July**

Our late afternoon return flight left us with ample time during the morning for one further walk that we took in the hills above the hotel. This was a pleasant level track that produced a vibrant range of flowers, butterflies and birds to provide a fine finale to the trip. One species particularly sought after were the beautiful Orange Lilies, Lilium bulbiferum subsp. croceum that were found at a number of spots along our route. Overhead we enjoyed the spectacle of a family of Short-toed Eagles testing their flight skills and begging for food from their parents. A territorial dispute between a resident male Cuckoo took place as he tried to see off a rival for the affections of a female. Reaching a patch of pine forest, a couple of Red Crossbills flew over and the calls of a Spotted Nutcracker alerted us to its presence. At the furthest point of our walk we found the localized Mt. Cenis Restharrow, Onobrychis cristata, overlooked by the summit of Grand Mont Cenis after which the plant is named.

We then headed back to the hotel to freshen up, change and load the vehicle before heading out to the Lac du Mont Cenis where we stopped to have a gentle walk in the botanical gardens and a snack lunch overlooking the lake. All that remained was the final very long descent back down to the Italian lowlands to the south of the Alps and to pick up the motorway back to Turin and the airport.
