# The Italian & French Alps

#### Day 1

# **Tuesday 28th June**

Our outbound flight was delayed somewhat, due to the presence of thunderstorms over Turin preventing any flights from landing! After an hour or so we eventually took off to pass through a few sections of turbulence before landing into light rain and overcast skies. Having organised our vehicles we loaded and set off on the motorway, during which we encountered a number of heavy rainstorms. Turning off at Susa we began the long winding ascent into the Alps and the lac Du Mont Cenis. Unfortunately, we were shrouded in thick impenetrable fog only allowing us to make out the roadside a few metres on either side!

We eventually reached our hotel dropping out of the fog as we descended into Lanslebourg, having seen none of the spectacular scenery on our arrival route!

With the weather forecast to be clearer tomorrow we met for dinner and hoped for better conditions ahead.

#### Day 2

# Wednesday 29th June

Good fortune was with us, as the heavy mist and fog of yesterday had cleared to a fine morning so the group were able to appreciate the splendour of the scenery all around. We headed west towards Termignon, where we then turned right and began a long and winding ascent to our stop at the car park and walking trails leading to Plan du Lac. The roadsides during the journey were ablaze with abundant and diverse wildflowers to whet our appetites.

As we began our walk, plants came thick and fast on our first morning in the field. A large rocky outcrop overlooking the small stream at the start of the route had a couple of very obliging White-winged Snowfinches perching at close range with a small flock of Alpine Choughs calling overhead. Our route led past the lake with stunning views of the high peaks and glaciers all around. We amused ourselves with admiring the 'forest' of dwarf Willow tree species growing on the path side, of no more than two centimetres tall! Around us several Water Pipits and Northern Wheatears were singing from the slopes, typical birds of these high Alpine pastures. We passed the refugio, taking a path that led to an area of steep slopes clothed in Alpenrose *Rhododendron ferrugineum*, with a rich understorey of plants. We walked on till we reached what looked a suitable spot to pause for lunch and keep a lookout for the Rock Ptarmigan that frequent this area. With lunch prepared, we were enjoying our al fresco meal with a beautiful mountain backdrop when, right on cue immediately below us, a couple of rival male Rock Ptarmigan flew in. They spent considerable time squaring up to each other and demonstrating how cryptic is their plumage in this habitat when not in flight. Elated with this success we continued to admire the fine Alpine flora before retracing our steps back to the refugio where we stopped for refreshments. A distant Golden Eagle put in an appearance as we drank our coffees.

We then headed out across to the Termignon gorge where we spent some time exploring the rocky outcrops before taking a route back to the tarmac road leading back to the car park. From here we drove part-way back down to take a stop at an area of meadows in the hope of some interesting flora. Unfortunately, this year the area had been well grazed, resulting in a distinctive lack of flowers. We were compensated overhead by a pair of Lammergeiers drifting in to view to quarter the mountainsides.

A further stop was taken a little lower to take a track through some woodland with a fresh range of new plants seen. We reached our objective of a small bridge over the fast-flowing torrent before we were called back by a rather irate Frenchman claiming our minibuses were blocking the road and preventing their coach from getting past. Hurriedly walking back to our parked vehicles, we moved them for the waiting coach (even though we were not even on the road) before loading up and making our way back to the hotel.

#### Day 3

# **Thursday 30th June**

A pre-breakfast walk was taken by some of the group during which all their target bird species were seen in double-quick time exactly as hoped. The main aim was to find the breeding Marsh Warblers in the tall Meadowsweet beds, which was achieved with several birds seen.

Our main day's excursion took us up to the Col de L'Iseran where we stopped in the car park and spent some time exploring the high Alpine scree for several specialist plants with great success. A notable find was several examples of Edelwiess *Leontopodium nivale*. Further White-winged Snowfinches were seen in the area, often perching on the roofs of the buildings. A few more energetic members of the group undertook the steep climb of the nearby peak in search of a number of key species. We were successful in finding several of our targets, most notably Mont Cenis Bellflower *Campanula venisia*. A further success was a singing Alpine Accentor that made a song flight past us, to land on a distant outcrop, followed by another Lammergeier passing overhead.

We then regrouped and drove back to lower levels to make an exploration of an area of wet flushed slope by the roadside. Here we found abundant Glacier Crowfoot, Ranunculus glacialis, among several other plants that thrive in these wet conditions. Dropping lower again, we pulled over near a ruined building alongside a spectacular waterfall overlooking the upper valley below. This was deemed a suitably scenic lunch spot. With the food prepared and enjoying our meal, we scanned the higher slopes around us and managed to pick out a small number of Alpine Chamois unconcernedly grazing. With lunch cleared, we walked up to enjoy the spectacle of the waterfall and several new and notable plants.

A further descent took us to the upper valley floor where had a pleasant level walk alongside the tall lush pastures up towards another waterfall. A Lesser Whitethroat was singing from the riverside that put in an appearance, whilst a little further on an elusive singing Marsh Warbler put on a fine demonstration of its rich repertoire of mimicry in its song, remaining hidden within an area of Willow scrub. Once more numerous interesting plants were seen at the path sides of which the striking Yellow Bellflower, *Campanula thyrsoides*, was the standout. We retraced our route back to the vehicles and back to the hotel at the end of a very enjoyable day.

# Day 4 Friday 1st July

We awoke to more low cloud and mist clothing the upper slopes necessitating a change in schedule. We opted to take a walk on the northern slopes of the valley above Lanslevillard while we waited for the mist and cloud to lift with the warming day. Our timing proved perfect as things cleared as we reached the car park, having driven up the rough mountain track. We were then able to enjoy a lovely level walk overlooking the valley below during which we spotted our first Spotted Nutcracker sharing a treetop perch with a Rock Bunting. Calling Red Crossbills were heard on a couple of occasions with the low cloud making spotting them tricky. We eventually

managed to pick out a few passing birds. Elsewhere along the track a few Red-backed Shrikes showed very well on prominent perches. A diverse range of butterflies were slowly waking and taking wing as the mist cleared and the morning warmed, with the stunning Apollos being favourites.

After a successful morning we returned to our original itinerary and drove up to the Lac du Mont Cenis, taking the narrow road around the lake to reach the refugio. The pastures and meadows were ablaze with flowers demonstrating what a special place this is. With our later arrival we chose to have our lunch first on the refugio benches. The hoped-for Alpine Swifts did not disappoint, putting in a flypast not long after our arrival. Again, whilst relaxing over lunch, we enjoyed a good bird sighting when the alarm calls of a local Kestrel alerted us to a flyover Golden Eagle.

We then undertook a circuit walk out towards the Col du Mont Cenis leading through an attractively varied range of habitats of meadow, rocky outcrops, streams and alpine grassland resulting in a wide range of plants and butterflies seen. It was hard to miss the tall impressive flowering spikes of Spotted Gentian *Gentiana punctata* at the start of the walk, followed by numerous more species. Unfortunately, the very warm and dry weather preceding our trip this year had resulted in a few choice species having flowered already. We were compensated by the best show of Three-veined Pink *Dianthus pavonius* ever seen on this tour! Some of the rocky protrusions and outcrops held fantastic assemblages of 'rockery' plants, positively ablaze with colour. A nearby cave within the undulating grasslands held a pair of Red-billed Choughs giving their characteristic calls as they perched on the entrance. Reaching the edge of the gorge we paused to admire the gentle grazing cattle with their distinctive Alpine bells around their necks in the adjoining pastures. We could see the mobile milking units nearby used to generate the raw material for the famous cheeses produced in the area. The plant list continued to climb during our return walk with the notable local endemic Yellow Soapwort *Saponaria lutea* among them.

Back at the refugio we stopped for a refreshing coffee or beer, depending on preference, before we drove on to the eastern side of the lake where we stopped for a short spell to admire the scenery that we had passed unknowingly through on our arrival day! From here it was back to relax before dinner.

# Day 5 Saturday 2nd July

We packed up and left France for our transfer to Italy this morning. The day would take us through some stunning scenery as we traversed the wonderful winding mountain roads. We made a first stop still within the Vanoise National Park in France a short distance from the Col de L'Iseran. Our walk led us through open grassy slopes, above which were a number of rocky protrusions. Our main aim was to find some Alpine Accentors, as only a few of the group had seen them on our earlier day. As we made our slow progress, we heard the song of a bird and managed to pick it out joined by another couple of individuals making for a successful walk. We discovered a new spot for Mont Cenis Bellflower following abundant Edelweiss flowers.

We next continued over the Col and dropped down into the Isère valley where we called in at the Point St. Charles car park where we set up our picnic on the tables. Right on cue, as we ate, the hoped for Lammergeier put in an appearance. We then undertook a walk up the rocky track alongside the Isère River enjoying the many flowers and butterflies as we went. Our next target was also soon achieved with the sighting of a mother and kid Alpine Ibex on the slope above us making their way down. They became separated but appeared unworried as

they came increasingly close, until we were only 10m from one animal as it stood in the middle of the path and watched us closely, giving us a fantastic view and experience of this iconic mammal of the mountains.

Continuing our journey, we passed through the ski resorts of Val D'Isère and Tigne before climbing once more up the multiple hairpins to arrive in La Rosière where we stopped for a coffee and ice cream. We picked a café with a great view from their terrace alongside their good choice in ice cream flavours! Refreshed we drove on up the last of the ascent to the Col du Petit St-Bernard where we stopped once more to have a short leg-stretch exploration. The building roofs held a couple of White-winged Snowfinches and the nearby grassy meadows held several interesting plants as well as a range of historic and pre-historic human constructions dating from WWII and very much earlier! The enigmatic stone circle still has various interpretations.

We completed the final leg, crossing into Italy and dropping down into the Aosta Valley with Mont Blanc/ Monte Bianco to our rear as we travelled the motorway before turning off towards Cogne and our next comfortable spa hotel.

#### Day 6

## **Sunday 3rd July**

For our first full day in Italy, we drove the short distance to the village of Gimmillan where we walked a trail alongside the river. Fine views were had of the high peaks of the Gran Paradiso NP capped with snow and glaciers. The trail began with a fairly steep initial ascent before levelling off and allowing us all to regain our breath and begin a good examination of the birds and flowers alongside the track. A pair of Red-backed Shrikes were highlights with a Red Crossbill singing from a nearby Spruce and a number of different warblers heard. It was, however, the flowers that were the main highlight with several new species seen including the very localised endemic *Aethionema thomasianum* and *Sempervivum grandiflorum*. The day remained clear and sunny with the result that numerous species of butterflies were seen including a number of choice Alpine species such as Grison's Fritillary and Damon Blue. The trail dropped to the river where we crossed on a wooden bridge among some shade-giving trees. A rest was taken to rehydrate and check through the butterflies coming to the damp soil nearby. The trail then led across an open meadow full of flowers leading to some more shady trees where we chose to relax and have our lunch.

With lunch completed a few of the group opted to begin the walk back taking another bridge a little higher upstream. The majority continued our steady ascent up the valley where a further split in the group occurred with another group taking a route to a waterfall and the final remaining group continuing up the now steeper zigzag path among some rocky outcrops. From here a short further walk was taken in the more level conditions to find the scarce *Androsace septentrionalis*. This took some doing as, once again, the season was somewhat advanced resulting in these small slender plants having finished flowering leaving only the delicate seeding stems remaining, requiring sharp eyes to spot!

With the hot conditions beginning to take effect we all began the return, stopping at a mountain spring water pipe to refill our bottles and have a refreshing drink. As we made our return the group slowly reformed before reaching the vehicles and a sit down after a hot and strenuous day. An ice-cream seemed in order, so we headed down into Cogne and paid a visit to the local gelateria to enjoy our first Italian ice cream.

Day 7

# **Monday 4th July**

We drove to the small hamlet of Valnontey within the Gran Paradiso NP, where we disembarked and took our first walk of the day up the multiple zig-zags of the trail leading up the western side of the valley, leading to an impressive waterfall dropping into the valley. The trail led initially past the botanical gardens where a couple of the group opted to spend their morning. An abundance of butterflies were on the wing in the warm sheltered conditions of the flower-filled open glades of the very steep slopes within the European Larch and Spruce woodland. Many trees were looking in bad shape from an infestation of moth larvae that had defoliated entire trees; hopefully they will recover next year? The endemic Astragalus exscapus had finished flowering already this year, but we did manage to pick out a few leaf rosettes. On reaching the waterfall, we paused awhile to enjoy the cooling spray and take in the views before continuing upward. The tree cover thinned and we were soon passing through open meadow with stunning uninterrupted vistas all around. We again rested for a spell to enjoy our surroundings before we began our return descent. Birds on the return proved a little more obliging with Eurasian Treecreeper and Willow Tit putting in an appearance as highlights.

Back on the valley floor we regrouped with those that had had a pleasant morning admiring the displays in the Botanical Garden. Crossing the river bridge, we picked up a White-throated Dipper feeding in the shallows. We moved the vehicles to take the unsurfaced road to our proposed picnic spot. Unfortunately, new signs had been erected prohibiting vehicles, leading to parking and carrying our provisions the short distance to the picnic grounds with plentiful benches and tables. Our next concern was the rather inclement weather threatening! Luckily only a short shower fell, allowing us to have our meal outdoors as planned, if a little gloomy.

With lunch completed, a few of the group opted to walk back into the village whilst the majority undertook a pleasant walk alongside the fast-flowing river. A stunning highlight were the huge tall flowering spikes of another speciality of the area, *Astragalus alopecurus*, looking at their best. The alarm calls of Fieldfares alerted us to a Eurasian Sparrowhawk shooting past close overhead, clearly on a mission! We crossed the river and began our return on the opposite side passing sections of large tumbled rocks with curious cooling air blowing from within.

Once back at the vehicles we drove back to Cogne where some of the group took the chance of a walk around the sights of this attractive Alpine village, during which we visited the church and the lace-making museum before making our return to the hotel.

### Day 8

# **Tuesday 5th July**

Our final day left us with enough time for a pleasant walk before breakfast alongside the river through the forest and meadows. Things were pretty quiet but enjoyable nonetheless. Back at the hotel we enjoyed a final hearty breakfast before changing clothes, freshening up and completing our packing to load the vehicles. It was then a straightforward journey back to Turin and our homeward flight.
