Day 1 Friday 11th March

#### Overcast and showery in Marrakech

Most of the group arrived in Marrakesh around midday and after a restaurant lunch they went on a guided walk of the bustling and fascinating Jemma el Fna and the adjacent souks. Along the way they opened the bird list with White Storks, Pallid and Little Swifts, Common Bulbuls, House Buntings and a surprise Black-shouldered Kite. The rest of the group arrived in the evening and we finally all met up over dinner. With introductions complete we retired to bed full of anticipation for the days ahead.

### Day 2

# Saturday 12th March

Sunny and warm with scattered cloud and a good deal of snow on the high tops

Common Bulbuls, Spotless Starlings, Serins and a singing Isabelline Warbler greeted us during an early morning exploration of the hotel grounds and then, with breakfast completed, we set off south towards the imposing ramparts of the snow-capped High Atlas. We made a number of stops as we crossed the mountains and against a backdrop of consistently spectacular scenery we noted a range of interesting birds that included Long-legged Buzzard, Black Redstart, Black Wheatear, "Atlas" Coal Tit, African Blue Tit, Red-billed Chough, Common Raven and Rock Bunting. Near the village of Taflaouit we found a pair of Levaillant's Woodpeckers excavating a nest hole in an old olive tree, an unexpected and welcome bonus, and during the course of the morning a significant raptor passage brought us good views of both Booted and Short-toed Eagles.

In the afternoon we descended into the more arid terrain to the south of the mountains. White-crowned Wheatears and Southern Grey Shrikes began to appear at the roadside and one short stop produced a flock of migrant Short-toed Larks, our first Moussier's Redstart and a stunning male Seebohm's Wheatear.

As the evening closed in we drove the last stretch from Ouarzazate, through Skoura and into the Dades Valley and arrived at our comfortable hotel at El Kelaa a little after sunset.

### Day 3

# Sunday 13th March

Sunny, warm and still in the morning; cool and breezy with some scattered cloud in the afternoon

A beautiful, still, sunny morning found us out on the wide-open gravel flats of the Tagdilt Plain in search of some special birds. The action began almost immediately and in the course of a very exciting morning we had good views of Long-legged Buzzard, Crowned and Black-bellied Sandgrouse, Temminck's, Hoopoe and Thekla Larks, Redrumped and Desert Wheatears and dozens of engaging Fat Sand Rats. We finished our morning's exploration at an area of green fields in this otherwise very barren area and found a host of common migrants including a Hoopoe, a male Common Redstart, a Western Bonelli's Warbler and a lone European Bee-eater.

After a break in Boulmane we headed further up the Dades Valley and ate our picnic in beautiful almond and walnut groves with African Blue Tits in the tree-tops and Grey Wagtails and Cetti's Warblers by the river. After lunch we drove to the top of the gorge marvelling at the superb scenery and the remarkable kasbah architecture enroute and took a short walk during which we saw Barbary Ground Squirrels, Crag Martins, Black Redstarts, Black Wheatears, dozens of Rock Doves and two neat little Tristram's Warblers. We finished the afternoon with a glass of mint tea at one of the riverside cafes before we made our way back to El Kelaa.

### Day 4

# **Monday 14th March**

Overcast with sunny breaks, occasional light showers and a fresh, cold, westerly breeze

Another morning visit to the stony wastes of the Tagdilt Plain, this time in rather brisker conditions, produced many of the birds that we had seen during the previous morning plus a few new ones including a superb male Lanner and a pair of Stone Curlews. Happy with our success we continued eastwards through Tinerhir to the dramatic Todra Gorge where we found Desert Larks, Blue Rock Thrushes and Crag Martins and ate a picnic lunch interrupted by a Bonelli's Eagle swooping in to perch on a crag high above us.

In the afternoon we drove on through a constantly changing tapestry of desert scenery punctuated by regular White-crowned Wheatears and occasional Southern Grey Shrikes. A trio of Cream-coloured Coursers prompted one unscheduled stop and at another we enjoyed some lovely views of Trumpeter Finches, the males resplendent with their rosy pink underparts and bright candle-wax red bills.

In the late afternoon we took a brief walk on the wide-open Marrha Plain and found Bar-tailed Larks and Spectacled Warblers and then, as the evening closed in, we drove on through the atmospheric town of Jorf to Erfoud and our hotel.

### Day 5

### **Tuesday 15th March**

Sunny with scattered cloud, a cool westerly breeze and showers in the afternoon

Leaving the hotel well before dawn we set off in our 4x4's towards Merzouga and the golden dunes of the Erg Chebbi. We watched a lovely sunrise over the desert and then set off in the vehicles to explore.

In a satisfying and enjoyable morning which took us through some wonderful desert scenery we saw an impressive range of birds that included Cream-coloured Courser, Crowned Sandgrouse, Bar-tailed Lark, Desert, Black-eared and White-crowned Wheatears, Desert Warbler, Brown-necked Raven and Desert Sparrow. The surprise of the morning came in the form of two roosting Egyptian Nightjars seen by the lucky occupants of one of our vehicles, but the overall highlight for many was a thrilling close encounter with a Hoopoe Lark, one of several seen, who kept us entranced for some time with his wonderfully evocative song and bizarre tumbling display flight.

We returned to Erfoud in the early afternoon and after a brief siesta we drove the short distance out to a stretch of the Oued Ziz where, dodging rain showers and admiring rainbows, we finished the day with sensational views of a flock of over 220 newly arrived Blue-cheeked Bee-eaters. Wow!

### Day 6

# Wednesday 16th March

Sunny, still and warm through to mid-afternoon then cool with a north-westerly breeze

We left Erfoud after breakfast and headed back westwards on the south side of the Anti-Atlas through a spectacular and varied desert landscape. We made a brief stop at an escarpment just west of Rissani where we failed to see the hoped for Pharaoh Eagle Owls but enjoyed some good views of a pair of nesting Lanners, several Brown-necked Ravens, two Desert Larks and a handsome Red Fox. We drank late morning coffee in bustling Alnif, stopped for some roadside Fulvous Babblers a little further on and ate our picnic lunch in an acacia lined oued east of Tazzarine where we found a pair of Barbary Partridges and a range of migrant warblers.

During the afternoon we continued westwards and made a short stop by the lush green corridor of the scenic Draa Valley before we tackled the dramatic Tinifift Pass with its remarkable geology. Dropping down into Ouarzazate, we finished the day with a brief look at the barrage on the edge of town and noted good numbers of birds including over 50 Ruddy Shelduck, five Marsh Harriers, an Osprey and over 1000 Barn Swallows.

# Day 7

# **Thursday 17th March**

Sunny and warm with a gentle breeze

We left the hotel in Ouarzazate after an early breakfast and spent an enjoyable hour back at the barrage in the lovely early morning sunshine. Highlights during this very productive little session included over 100 White Storks, three Squacco Herons, seven Greater Flamingos, 20 Marbled Ducks, two Ospreys, a staggering 325 migrant Black Kites roosting on an area of ploughed ground, a Red-throated Pipit and masses of migrant Yellow Wagtails. Tearing ourselves away we continued our journey towards the coast. Our next stop was at the Oued Iriri some little way out of Ouarzazate where we enjoyed a very pleasant walk and saw a pair of Bonelli's Eagles close overhead, a lovely male Moussier's Redstart and a range of migrants which included Tawny and Tree Pipits, Common Redstart, Nightingale, Common Whitethroat and Subalpine Warbler.

After this we crossed the rugged Tizi n'Bachkoum Pass with its roadside Black Wheatears and Thekla Larks and stopped for coffee in the town of Tazenakht. A pair of roadside Thick-billed Larks enlivened the next stage of the journey before we dropped down through Talouine and into the beautiful Argan parkland of the Upper Sous Valley. A lunch stop here was enjoyed by everyone and a short stroll produced Woodchat Shrikes, Hoopoes, Orphean Warblers, Corn Buntings and an impressive scorpion lurking under a rock.

We continued on down the Sous Valley in the late afternoon, noted two Montagu's Harriers hawking gracefully over the fields en-route and made it to our elegant and comfortable hotel in the city of Taroudant a little before sunset.

Day 8 Friday 18th March

#### Sunny and warm with a gentle breeze

Little Swifts over the hotel started the day well before, with breakfast completed, we left Taroudant and drove on down the Sous Valley, skirted Agadir, and headed north up the coast towards Cap Rhir and Tamri, one of the very last outposts for the critically endangered Northern Bald Ibis. Our mission was clear to us, we were on "Ibis Alert" and fairly soon, as we approached Cap Rhir, we located our quarry, a flock of around 40 on the distant cliff top. With a little care we approached them more closely and were treated to some wonderful views of these strange and remarkable birds as they made their way through the dune scrub. We were able to appreciate every aspect of their extraordinary appearance, from their strange, bald, red heads and untidy ruffs to their iridescent shoulder patches flashing violet or green in the sun. The birds were actively foraging and we saw at least one toss a beetle up in the air and catch it "hornbill style". Eventually the birds were flushed by some passers-by and we took the opportunity to continue on to the estuary at Tamri where we finished the morning with a stroll along the beach and some great views of Audouin's Gulls, Zitting Cisticolas, Sardinian Warblers and a range of waders.

After a tagine lunch in Tamri we returned to Agadir, checked into our hotel and took a brief siesta. In the late afternoon we went down to the nearby Sous and found another satisfying range of waders plus several Spoonbills, some Mediterranean Gulls, a flock of 45 Gull-billed Terns and a surprise Short-eared Owl. As the Sun set and the light faded an eerie chorus of Stone Curlews began, soon followed by the strange jarring calls of Red-necked Nightjars and as we returned to the vehicle we were treated to some quite reasonable views of a pair of these birds sitting on the track and flying around in the gathering darkness – a fitting finale to an enjoyable day.

Day 9 Saturday 19th March

#### Sunny and very warm with a southerly breeze

After breakfast we set off from Agadir and made our way south towards Oued Massa. This picturesque river valley and estuary with its varied mosaic of habitats and decidedly sub-tropical feel was, as usual, hopping with birds and we enjoyed a rich and rewarding walk along the river. Bird highlights included Ruddy Shelduck, Osprey, Montagu's Harrier, Black-winged Stilt, European Bee-eater, Little Owl, Kingfisher, Nightingale, Moussier's Redstart, Olivaceous Warbler, Cirl Bunting and Black-crowned Tchagra. Other animal groups put in good representations too and in the course of the morning we saw a couple of Barbary Ground Squirrels, a Wild Boar with three tiny humbug piglets, an Egyptian Mongoose, a few Spiny-footed Lizards, both Pond and Stripe-necked Terrapins and several impressive Plain Tiger Butterflies.

After a picnic lunch in the shade of the trees at the National Park entrance some of the group elected to return to Agadir. The others, the die-hards, continued up the river in pursuit of further glory and finished the day and the trip on a considerable high with four Purple Herons, a male Little Bittern, several neat little Plain Martins and a surprise female American Wigeon – not bad!

## **Day 10**

### **Sunday 20th March**

#### Sunny, warm and breezy

After a leisurely breakfast we transferred to Agadir Airport for our midday flight back to the UK. Everything went very smoothly and we all arrived safely and on time at Gatwick a few hours later.
