#### Day 1

## Wednesday 17th August

The group was in flight to Ulaanbaatar (UB) via Istanbul.

#### Day 2

# **Thursday 18th August**

We arrived in the early morning and were warmly welcomed by local guide Terbish and his crew, but also by some persistent rain and low cloud cover. As we had a few hours to kill before our domestic flight, we opted to go birding in the nearby Bogd National Park. The Fir and Larch forest gave us a nice introduction to Mongolia's birdlife. There were lots of Black Kites overhead and Red-billed Chough, Eurasian Nuthatch, Asian Brown Flycatcher, Northern Wheatear and Common Crossbill were noted, as well as Tarbagan Marmot, Eurasian Red Squirrel (atractive black morphs) and Siberian Chipmunk. A family of cracking Demoiselle Cranes was very much appreciated. In the early afternoon we boarded the flight to the town of Ulgii, located in the far west of this enormous country.

## Day 3

# Friday 19th August

This morning we started to make our way towards the Jargalant range. A stop at an interesting lake gave us a fabulous selection of widespread waterbirds which also included goodies like Whooper Swan, Black-throated Diver, Eurasian Spoonbill and Vega and Pallas's Gulls. We obtained excellent looks at several Pallas's Sandgrouse and flushed a Tolai Hare. We had lunch in the town of Hovd and before driving towards our base we stopped at another lake where more waterbirds and waders were noted. A Wryneck showed brilliantly. In the early evening we arrived at our camp, which offered a magnificent view over the surrounding mountain ranges.

## Day 4

# Saturday 20th August

It rained quite heavily overnight and in the morning we found the Jargalant range totally covered in snow and cloud. We choose to explore a couple of nearby lakes, where we found a nice variety of waders and ducks. Black-tailed Godwits, Spotted Redshanks (in exquisite breeding attire) and Red-necked Phalaropes were much admired. After lunch we made our way into one of the valleys, when suddenly we received word from our spotters that they had located three Snow Leopards. It took a long two hours to reach the spot, but upon arrival the cats were still in place and although they were quite distant (1,5 km) we were able to admire these fabulous creatures for more than 90 minutes. The clear mountain air helped to get really nice views. The mother and her two large cubs were loafing about, sleeping on and off and just relaxing. Much cherished moments. A fabulous and very successful start to our stay. A Bearded Vulture and a beautiful Güldenstädt's Redstart were also seen.

# Day 5

# **Sunday 21st August**

We decided to explore the surrounding endless steppe at the base of the mountains and in the course of the day had great encounters with more than 100 Saiga Antelope. They were quite shy and usually kept their distance, but several times we were able to observe these swift and unusual looking creatures at closer range. A good variety of birds of prey included Cinereous Vulture, Steppe Eagle, Upland Buzzard and Saker Falcon, while

Long-tailed Ground Squirrel represented the mammal department. A brackish steppe lake held Red-crested Pochards (still in non-breeding plumage) and lots of Kentish Plovers.

#### Day 6

# **Monday 22nd August**

We spent most of the day high up in the mountains, scanning the rocky slopes of the wide valley where we had seen the Snow Leopard family two days before. Not a sniff was had of the beautiful cats, but two male Siberian Ibex and great birds of prey like Saker Falcon, Cinereous Vulture, Bearded Vulture, Upland Buzzard and Golden Eagle entertained us at length. Gorgeous Güldenstädt's Redstarts offered good looks as they hopped about on the crags. In late afternoon we walked down through a bushy valley full of salvias and asters where Brown Accentor, Mongolian Finch, Twite and Common Rock Thrush showed. An after dinner night drive produced marvelous Siberian and Northern Three-toed Jerboas.

## Day 7

# **Tuesday 23rd August**

We started the day by exploring a bushy valley in the foothills, where after a bit of intense scanning, we connected with the much-wanted Henderson's (or Mongolian) Ground Jay. This enigmatic speciality gave pretty good views as it perched up in a low bush. The obvious white wing patches flashed brightly as it flew about. A great bird!! We also found several Pied Wheatears here. A stop in the wide open plains gave us several Goitred (or Black-tailed) Gazelles. Our sturdy 4x4 vehicles then took us high up in the mountains to viewpoint N0. 2 where we spent most of the rest of the day scanning the magnificent scenery. No cats were found, but eight Altai Snowcock feeding together was a real bonus. The usual birds of prey performed very nicely too. In late afternoon we returned to our base, picking up several well-behaved Chukar Partridges on the way.

## Day 8

# Wednesday 24th August

On our final day in the Jargalant range we explored another part of the wide valley where, thanks to our spotters, we were able to observe the female Snow Leopard with her two large cubs again. Amazing!! We admired the mostly sleeping cats for at least seven hours, but now and then they got up, yawned, stretched, licked their paws, walked about and slept again. They were rather distant, but the views were definitely much appreciated. A marvelous last day in the mountains.

## Day 9

# **Thursday 25th August**

Today was a travel day with hiccups, as we first drove via Hovd to the town of Ulgii, where we were told that bad weather was disrupting flights. Eventually we had to return to the town of Hovd where we took off in the late evening, after a six hour delay.

# Day 10

# Friday 26th August

After a short night in a hotel at the edge of Ulaanbaatar, we headed west tot he famous Hustai National Park. Several impressive flocks of Demoiselle Cranes enlivened our journey. Upon arrival, we settled in and in the afternoon the local biologist took us on a tour of the rolling hills. We found several families of beautiful Przewalski's Horses and quite a few Red Deer. Tarbagan Marmots were literally everywhere and smart Amur

Falcons and both Black and White-backed Woodpeckers showed very well. An after dinner night drive produced an amazing six Corsac Foxes, several White-tailed (or Mongolian) Gazelle and a cute Siberian Jerboa.

#### **Day 11**

## Saturday 27th August

In the morning we visited another area of the Hustai National Park, where we found a large herd (200+) of White-tailed (or Mongolian) Gazelle running about in the wide open steppe, giving us the impression of being in East Africa. We made an effort to get a bit closer to the lovely Przewalski's Horses and added Brown Shrike to the tally. Different kinds of birds of prey showed all the time. After a scrumptious lunch we waved goodbye to this atractive National Park and returned to the hubbub of Ulaanbataar.

#### **Day 12**

# Sunday 28th August

An early check in at the international airport and off we went to different parts of Europe.
