Day 1

Monday 31st March

Arrival Day! We met and transferred to the Canopy Tower Eco-lodge in the afternoon, and prepared for our upcoming days of birding.

Day 2

Tuesday 1st April

Observation Deck, Semaphore Hill Road and Ammo Dump Ponds

This morning we were up with the birds! At dawn we met on the Canopy Tower's top floor observation deck, overlooking the vast tropical rainforest surrounding the tower. The avian activity was just picking up for the morning, and with a nice hot cup of coffee or tea, and the help of our guide, we saw groups of Red-lored and Mealy Parrots heading to their daytime roosts, Scaled Pigeons and Keel-billed Toucans perched in the treetops, as well as Squirrel Cuckoo, Black-breasted Puffbird, Tropical Gnatcatcher, Chestnut-sided Warbler, Plain-coloured, Golden-hooded and Palm Tanagers, Blue Dacnis and Green Honeycreeper at close range! Migrating Turkey Vultures, Mississippi Kites and Broad-winged Hawks flew over on their way back up north, and a Short-tailed Hawk passed by as well.

After a hot breakfast in the canopy-level dining room, we met at the hummingbird feeders, and we were ready to start our walk! As everyone was gathering, we watched the White-necked Jacobins, Long-billed and Stripe-throated Hermits, Blue-chested and Violet-bellied hummingbirds feed vigorously at the nectar feeders. We slowly descended the paved road away from the tower through rich lowland rainforest, and had such great sightings as Gartered, Black-throated and Slaty-tailed Trogons, Rufous Motmot, White-whiskered Puffbird, Cinnamon and Crimson-crested Woodpeckers, Cocoa Woodcreeper, Black-crowned (Western Slaty) Antshrike, Dusky Antbird, Red-capped Manakin, Southern Bentbill, White-shouldered Tanager and a beautiful Slate-coloured Grosbeak. Birds weren't the only thing we saw this morning, we came across a troop of White-faced Capuchin Monkeys, our first Brown-throated Three-toed Sloth, Central American Agouti, Northern Tamandua (Anteater) and even a surprising White-tailed Deer! At the bottom of the hill we had a cold drink and snack and were courteously driven back up the hill in time for lunch at the Canopy Tower. During the hottest part of the day there was some time to relax at the tower, as the birds are not very active at this time of the day anyway. By mid-afternoon we were ready to head out again, this time to the banks of the Panama Canal and in particular, the Ammo Dump Ponds, a large lagoon that attracts a wide variety of bird life.

A great spot for waterbirds, we saw Little Blue Heron, Snowy Egret, Green Heron and the impressive Rufescent Tiger-Heron, waiting patiently to catch an eel. Wattled Jacanas were seen around the water's edge, and Grey-breasted Martins, Mangrove and Southern Rough-winged Swallows swooped over the water. Pale-vented Pigeon, Ruddy Ground-Dove, Orange-chinned Parakeet, Red-crowned Parrot, Black-throated Mango, Collared Aracari, Yellow-bellied Elaenia, Common Tody-Flycatcher, Great Kiskadee, Rusty-margined and Social Flycatchers, Panama Flycatcher, Tropical Kingbird were seen in the area, as were Tropical Mockingbird, Clay-coloured Thrush, Buff-throated and Streaked Saltators, Red-legged Honeycreeper, Crimson-backed and Blue-grey Tanagers. Four species of seedeaters were feeding in the tall grasses between us and the canal. We started off our trip with over 90 species seen and heard - wow! As the light was fading, we headed back to the tower to review our species checklist followed by a delicious dinner.

Day 3

Wednesday 2nd April

Pipeline Road

After an early breakfast, we grabbed our gear and were ready for a full day of birding at the world famous Pipeline Road, one of the best birding locations in all of the Americas, and it definitely did not disappoint... Both Great and Little Tinamous, two rather difficult forest birds to encounter, were seen today. As we walked the road, we had great sightings of such beautiful birds including Purple-crowned Fairy, Black-tailed Trogon, Whooping and Broad-billed Motmots, Pied Puffbird, Black-striped Woodcreeper, Chestnut-backed Antbird, Golden-collared and Blue-crowned Manakins, Song Wren, Rosy Thrush-Tanager, Grey-headed Tanager, Summer Tanager, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Yellow-rumped and Scarlet-rumped Caciques. We came across a mixed flock of Checker-throated, White-flanked and Dot-winged Antwrens, as well as other "ant-things" including Spotted Antbird and the spectacular Streak-chested Antpitta!

We stopped for a picnic lunch and had some time to rest, then resumed more birding further down the road, where we found Rufous Mourner, Bright-rumped Attila, Spot-crowned Antvireo and Brownish Twistwing. We encountered the source of the low bellowing calls we had been hearing around the tower -Mantled Howler Monkeys, and came across a Red-tailed Squirrel. It was a great day at Pipeline Road! We returned back to the tower in time to freshen up for cocktails, dinner and our checklist review.

Day 4

Thursday 3rd April

Observation Deck, Plantation Road and Chagres River

This morning we started up on the observation deck again, and enjoyed the dawn chorus of the forest birds. Grey-headed Kite, Brown-hooded Parrot, Band-rumped Swift, Bay-breasted Warbler and Fulvous-vented Euphonia were new birds in the canopy this morning. After breakfast, we took a short drive down the hill to Plantation Road, one of the national park trails, where we spent the morning birding. We walked the wide trail, and came across Grey-chested Dove, Lineated Woodpecker, Plain Xenops, Black-faced Antthrush, Jet Antbird, Purple-throated Fruitcrow, Ochre-bellied Flycatcher, Olivaceous Flatbill, Golden-crowned Spadebill, Black-bellied Wren, Red-throated Ant-Tanager and Northern Waterthrush. At the stream, we found a nesting Sunbittern! A Black Hawk-Eagle called as it soared over the canopy. A highlight of the morning was coming across an army ant swarm, where Plain-brown, Ruddy and Northern Barred Woodcreepers, as well as Bicolored, Spotted and Ocellated Antbirds attended to feed on the fleeing insects and other invertebrates!

After lunch and some down time, we headed back to the town of Gamboa to explore the Chagres River and the grounds of the Gamboa Rainforest Resort. At the river's edge, we saw Pied-billed Grebe, Anhinga, Cooi Heron, Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Common and Purple Gallinules and American Coot. Yellow-headed Caracara was seen flying over the river! Behind the resort, a great local birding area, we observed White-bellied Antbird, Streaked Flycatcher, White-winged Becard, Plain, Buff-breasted and House Wrens, Yellow Warbler, Flame-rumped Tanager, Black-headed Saltator (with its incredibly loud call) and Yellow-crowned Euphonia, among many. Back at the tower, we reviewed our list of birds for the day and relaxed in the cool evening.

Day 5

Friday 4th April

Panama Rainforest Discovery Centre and Summit Gardens

We were off early this morning to reach the Panama Rainforest Discovery Centre just after dawn. Up on their observation tower overlooking another area of Soberania National Park, we enjoyed the morning bird activity in hopes of lifers and new species for our trip list. Swainson's Hawk, Black-mandibled Toucan, Black-breasted and Pied Puffbirds, Dusky-capped Flycatcher, Lesser Greenlet and a stunning Shining Honeycreeper were seen well this morning! That was just the beginning... down on the trails, we heard a clear, three-note whistle, and Alex quickly got us on a beautiful Pheasant Cuckoo!

A must see at this place are the hummingbirds at the visitor's centre, always buzzing with activity! Here, we added Crowned Woodnymph and White-vented Plumeleeter to our list, in addition to several other species of hummers for the day. Other highlights for the morning was a stunning Great Jacamar singing near the visitor's centre, and a miniscule Black-capped Pygmy-Tyrant, the world's smallest passerine, were found! After this great morning filled with birds, we headed back to the tower for lunch.

This afternoon we visited Summit Municipal Park and Botanical Gardens. We slowly walked the paved trails through the park, looking at anything that caught our eye. Great Black-Hawk, Great Antshrike, Boat-billed and Piratic Flycatchers, migrating Eastern Kingbirds, Cinnamon Becard, Black-chested Jay, Thick-billed Euphonia, Shiny Cowbird, Giant Cowbird and Chestnut-headed Oropendola were seen. We also made a well-worthy stop to see Panama, a resident Harpy Eagle, who lives at the park. She sat and stared right back at us!

After dinner we were eager to see some nocturnal wildlife. From the back of "El Tinamu", the Canopy Tower's birding vehicle, we slowly made our way down Semaphore Hill Road. Alex scanned the trees with a powerful spotlight in search of eye shine. Our efforts paid off, as we saw Common Potoo and Common Pauraque. In addition to night birds, we also had a great show of nocturnal mammals, including Central American Woolly Opossum, Olingo, Rothschild's Porcupine, Nine-banded Armadillo and Hoffmann's Two-toed Sloth!

Day 6

Saturday 5th April

Summit Ponds/Old Gamboa Road and Miraflores Locks at the Panama Canal

This morning we visited yet another great birding site close to the Canopy Tower - Summit Ponds and Old Gamboa Road. From the moment we arrived, there were birds... a great blend of water, forest and open area species! Our first stop was at the Summit Ponds - in these quiet lagoons we found Anhinga, Green Heron, Gray-necked Wood-Rail, Greater Ani, Amazon Kingfisher, Lesser Kiskadee and nesting Boat-billed Herons.

As we walked the overgrown Old Gamboa Road, we had sightings of a well-camouflaged Rufous Nightjar nesting in the leaf litter, Rufous-tailed Hummingbird, Barred Antshrike, Blue Cotinga, Forest Elaenia, Rufous-breasted Wren, Scrub Greenlet and Black-striped Sparrow. A major highlight of our morning was a Spectacled Owl roosting alongside the road!

From the observation deck back at the Tower, a King Vulture was spotted, as well as the usual array of canopy species and migrating raptors. After lunch we headed toward Panama City to visit a must-see attraction in Panama - the Miraflores Locks at the Panama Canal. As we watched giant ocean-liners pass through the century-old locks, we also enjoyed the Brown Pelicans, Magnificent Frigatebirds and Neotropic Cormorants as they glided overhead. Black-necked Stilt, Southern Lapwing, Grey (Black-bellied) Plover, Fork-tailed Flycatcher and White-nosed Coati were also seen this afternoon. After learning about the history of the Panama Canal in the museum, we headed back to the Canopy Tower to review our daily checklist followed by dinner.

Day 7

Sunday 6th April

Cerro Azul & Costa del Este

Today we were up before dawn and set out for a full day of birding in the rolling hills of Chagres National Park, east of Panama City. Up in these highlands, we slowly walked the roads and trails and enjoyed such great birds as Swallow-tailed Kite, the endemic Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker, Spotted Woodcreeper, Long-billed Gnatwren, Black-and-white Warbler, Bananaquit, and a wonderful array of tanagers, including Carmiol's, Hepatic, Summer, Crimson-backed, Plain-colored, Bay-headed and Golden-hooded. Green, Shining and Red-legged Honeycreepers were also seen this morning.

Before lunch, we visited a couple residences with very active hummingbird feeders, and tallied an impressive 14 species of hummingbirds for the day, including Green Hermit, the spectacular Rufous-crested Coquette, Violet-capped, Violet-headed and Snowy-bellied Hummingbirds, White-vented and Bronze-tailed Plumeleeters, Green-crowned Brilliant and Long-billed Starthroat. We had a nice lunch at a lovely residence overlooking the vast national park.

On our way back to the Canopy Tower, we made a stop at the mangroves and mudflats at Costa del Este, along the Pacific coast east of Panama City. Plentiful with shorebirds and waders, we saw Great Egret, Tricolored and Little Blue Herons, a shy Capped Heron lurking in the mangroves, Yellow-crowned Night-Heron, White Ibis, Mangrove Black Hawk, Whimbrel, Willet, Greater Yellowlegs, Spotted Sandpiper, Laughing Gull, Franklin's Gull, Royal and Caspian Terns. A worthy stop to add some water birds to our growing list! We headed back to the tower to rest after a long but exciting day of birding.

Day 8

Monday 7th April

Observation Deck, transfer to Canopy Lodge and Canopy Adventure

Today we enjoyed our final morning on the observation deck. Scaled Pigeon, Red-lored Parrot, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Scarlet Tanager, Green Shrike-Vireo, Blue Dacnis and others were a delight to see as always. After breakfast we packed the van with our gear and travelled two hours west to the Canopy Lodge in El Valle de Anton, the foothills of western Panama. En route we saw a Crested Caracara along the Pan-American Highway.

Upon our arrival at the lodge, we were welcomed by the friendly staff and shown to our rooms. With no time spared, we gathered on the veranda overlooking the garden and platform fruit feeders, where Grey-headed Chachalaca, Swainson's Thrush, Crimson-backed, Flame-rumped, Blue-grey, Palm and Golden-hooded Tanagers were feeding on the ripe bananas and mingling in the treetops. Orange-billed Sparrow was seen lurking around the forest edge beside the lodge. We enjoyed lunch in the open-air dining room at the lodge.

This afternoon we took a leisurely walk along the road and in the trails at the Canopy Adventure, where we found Canada Warbler, Rufous-capped Warbler, Dusky-faced, Tawny-crested and Bay-headed Tanagers, Red-crowned Ant-Tanager and Thick-billed Seed-Finch. A shy Rufous Tree Rat was also spotted in its tree hole! We made it back to the lodge in time to freshen up for cocktails and to review our checklist for the day, followed by a delicious dinner in the cool mountain air.

Day 9

Tuesday 8th April

Valle Chiquito and La Mesa

This morning we were up early to watch the feeding frenzy at the feeders in the garden. After breakfast, we headed to Valle Chiquito to spend the morning birding there - White and Grey-lined Hawks were spotted overhead, as well as Smooth-billed Ani, Garden Emerald, Green Kingfisher, Red-crowned Woodpecker, Southern Beardless-Tyrannulet, Boat-billed Flycatcher, Grey-capped Flycatcher, Masked Tityra, Rufous-and-white Wren, Yellow-crowned Euphonia, Yellow-backed Oriole and Chestnut-headed Oropendola. We headed back to the Canopy Lodge for lunch.

After some time to relax in the afternoon, we headed up the hill to the tablelands of La Mesa, a lovely blend of forest, open field, and scrubby fincas. Here we saw some higher-elevation species of the area, including Scale-crested Pygmy-Tyrant, Northern Schiffornis, Bay Wren, Yellow-green Vireo, Common Yellowthroat, Silver-throated Tanager, Scarlet-thighed Dacnis, Yellow-faced Grassquit and Yellow-billed Cacique! It was a lovely afternoon. After dinner, we retired as we had an early morning ahead!

Day 10

Wednesday 9th April

Altos del Maria

Today we had a great day exploring the highlands of Altos del Maria. We left the lodge early in 4x4 vehicles, to handle the steep roads. In the cloud-covered mountaintops, we found so many great species we hadn't yet seen such as Striped Cuckoo, White-collared Swift, Snowcap, Orange-bellied Trogon, Blue-throated Toucanet, Red-faced Spinetail, Black-crowned Antpitta, White-ruffed Manakin, Lesser Elaenia, Bran-colored Flycatcher, Long-tailed Tyrant, White-winged Becard, Ochraceous Wren, Grey-breasted Wood-Wren, Pale-vented Thrush, Golden-winged and Black-throated Green warblers, Common Bush-Tanager, White-vented and Tawny-capped Euphonias and Black-faced Grosbeak. A surprise for today was a male Elegant Euphonia, a rare species in this area of Panama.

We took a break around noon for a satisfying picnic lunch alongside a picturesque lake, and continued birding for the afternoon until it was time to head back to the lodge.

Day 11

Thursday 10th April

Las Minas and Cara Iguana

This morning we started off the day with a glimpse of a Sunbittern walking along the rocky stream at the lodge, as well as a Louisiana Waterthrush bobbing along the rocks. After breakfast, we headed up the hill once again to Las Minas Road, where we had a nice morning of birding. Highlights of the morning included Muscovy Duck, Paltry Tyrannulet, Mourning Warbler, Hepatic Silver-throated and Bay-headed Tanagers, Chestnut-capped Brush-Finch, Eastern Meadowlark, Baltimore Oriole and we always enjoyed the sights of Chestnut-headed Oropendolas, which were plentiful up here.

After lunch and a siesta, we visited a quiet road called Cara Iguana trail, not far from the lodge on the outskirts of the town. Here we got great views of a family of Spectacled Owls on a private property, and Alexis worked hard to find us a Tody Motmot, one of our main targets for this area, which we saw in the dark thicket near the stream along the road. In fact, we checked off all four species of motmots for the day! Other birds we saw this afternoon included Bat Falcon, Blue-headed Parrot, Wedge-billed Woodcreeper and Black-headed Saltator. We thoroughly enjoyed the afternoon, and returned back to the lodge eager to complete our checklist, followed by a nice dinner and relaxing evening.

Day 12

Friday 11th April

El Chiru and Juan Hombron

For our last full day of birding in Panama, we visited one of the best locations to search for some Pacific lowland species! Today we went down to sea level, and explored the open scrubby areas and dry forest of El Chiru, the Pacific Ocean at Santa Clara and the rice fields at Juan Hombron. At El Chiru, we did very well with our Pacific lowland targets; Crested Bobwhite, Plain-breasted Ground-Dove, Brown-throated Parakeet, Groove-billed Ani, Veraguan Mango (near endemic!), Sapphire-throated Hummingbird, Straight-billed Woodcreeper, Lance-tailed Manakin, Mouse-coloured Tyrannulet, Northern Scrub-Flycatcher, Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, Rufous-browed Peppershrike and Orchard Oriole - among so many birds seen this morning. We were off to a great start!

We stopped at Santa Clara for lunch, where we could dip our feet in the water and watch the seabirds - Magnificent Frigatebird, Brown Pelican and Neotropic Cormorant - fly by. A highlight was an Elegant Tern on the beach. With full stomachs we made one last stop before returning to the lodge, at Juan Hombron, where we were very successful with the raptors! White-tailed Kite, Savanna Hawk, Roadside Hawk, Crested and Yellow-headed Caracaras and Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture were all seen over the rice fields and open areas!

Plus, we could not ignore the array of waders and herons working in the flooded fields, including Wood Stork, Glossy Ibis, Wattled Jacana, Black-necked Stilt, Solitary Sandpiper and others. When the time came, we returned to the Canopy Lodge once again in time for cocktail hour, where we reviewed our extensive list and enjoyed a final dinner together.

Day 13

Saturday 12th April

Departure

Today we moved at a leisurely pace. Breakfast was at a reasonable hour, and we had plenty of time to enjoy the tanagers, euphonias, chachalacas, hummingbirds, toucans, aracaris and oropendolas from the garden. We made sure to fit in a visit to the ever-popular El Valle Market, where many of us picked up souvenirs to take home as memories of Panama. After lunch we loaded our luggage into the bus and said our goodbyes to the Canopy Lodge and Panama, as we headed to the airport for our flight home.

In less than 2 weeks, we saw an impressive total of 322 species of birds, with an additional 1 (one) species heard but not seen (Tawny-faced Gnatwren). In addition to the birds, we saw 17 species of Neotropical mammals and 6 species of reptiles and amphibians. We had a wonderful time, great weather and take with us many great memories of birding in Panama.
