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## Day 1

**Saturday 2nd August**

Weather – hot & sunny

We were met at Otopeni Airport, Bucharest, by Daniel and got away by 4.15pm. We had a smooth journey to Zarnesti, arriving at our guesthouse just after 8pm, where welcome refreshments were waiting for us. On the journey we had seen two Crossbills, Honey Buzzard, Red-backed Shrike and Raven amongst others.

## Day 2

**Sunday 3rd August**

Weather – mainly hot & sunny, with an hour of rain in the afternoon

We spent the day exploring the very attractive Zarnesti valley and limestone gorge which was only a few minutes drive from the guesthouse. Here we took a walk up a side track to a hillside meadow with fine Alpine views, many flowers and butterflies including Swallowtail, Scarce Swallowtail, Hungarian Glider, White Admiral, Purple Emperor, Large Skipper, Niobe and Silver-washed Fritillaries. Also in this area we spotted five Chamois on a neighbouring hillside. As we walked alongside the stream in the gorge we found several Grey Wagtails and two Dippers while Alpine Swifts and Crag Martins flew overhead. Other birds seen during the day included Honey and Steppe Buzzards, a Goshawk, Black Redstart, Wood Warbler, Marsh Tit and four Serins.

In the early evening, half the group were taken to a hide deep in the forest where they watched an amazing number of Bears, 17 in total.

## Day 3

Monday 4th August

Weather – hot & sunny all day

We left quite early to visit the beautiful Strimba Valley which had meadows full of flowers, butterflies and many birds, notably, three Lesser Spotted Eagles, one Long-legged Buzzard, one Middle-spotted Woodpecker, two Woodlarks and the only Nutcracker of the trip. In the late afternoon the remainder of the group were taken to a bear hide and saw a Black Stork on the way. From the hide they were able to watch three Bears for about half an hour

## Day 4

Tuesday 5th August

Weather – hot & sunny all day

After breakfast we left Zarnesti and, joining the Prahova River Valley, we headed south and after a coffee stop turned left and travelled east. We had a good picnic stop in the shade of some poplars by a river in the company of Cuckoos, Bee-eaters, Golden Orioles, Red-footed Falcons and a Hobby. At a lakeside we watched several waders including Ruff, Spotted Redshank, Avocet and Black-winged Stilts together with Common and Whiskered Terns. We crossed the River Danube in the late afternoon before arriving in Tulcea to find our boat ready and waiting and a welcome drink before dinner was served.

## Day 5

Wednesday 6th August

Weather – sunny & warm all day

After an early breakfast we left our floating hotel and set off downstream in the launch. Half an hour later we turned off the main channel and made our way along a much narrower arm of the old Danube and were soon seeing our first Delta birds. There were plenty of Little Egrets on the shore with Squacco and Night Herons, Glossy Ibis and Green Sandpipers. In the waterside willows two Grey-headed Woodpeckers were spotted and several Kingfishers were perched on overhanging twigs. As we drifted with the engine off, Spoonbills, Pygmy Cormorants, Purple Herons and a Honey Buzzard were seen flying low overhead and this was all in the first half hour. We went past the entrances to several lakes and on one we watched Whiskered Terns feeding their young which were sitting on the floating leaves of the Fringed Yellow Water Lily. Here we also watched a flock of Gadwall, several Garganey, Shoveler and Greylag Geese. There were many waders, namely Greenshank, Spotted Redshank, Wood Sandpipers, Black-tailed Godwits and Black-winged Stilts. Hobbys and Red-footed Falcons were hunting through the treetops, five White-tailed Eagles soared high above us and five Marsh Harriers quartered the reed beds. As we approached Lake Fortuna, 50 White Pelicans flew up and as the vista opened up we could see another 50 White Pelicans and 13 Dalmatian Pelicans with at least 500 Pygmy Cormorants in the background.

After a late lunch back on the floating hotel (pontoon) we set off, being towed by our own tugboat along the main channel, relaxing and watching Rollers, Bee-eaters and White-winged Black Terns as we passed by. We then had another two hour ride in the launch exploring some very quiet beautiful backwaters before joining the pontoon which had now tied up to a large willow for the night. There was just time for a swim in the clear waters before dinner.

## Day 6

Thursday 7th August

Weather – hot & sunny

We awoke to a lovely sunny morning at our beautiful quiet mooring with Savi's Warbler and Paddyfield Warbler for company. After breakfast we left in the launch down a small channel to visit the village of Letea. This waterway was very quiet and undisturbed with lots of birds to see including Ferruginous Ducks, Night Herons, Hobbys, Reed Warblers, a Lesser Grey Shrike, Bearded and Penduline Tits and an adult male Little Crake feeding two small black chicks. Just after we arrived, a juvenile Levant Sparrowhawk and a Black Stork flew over.

We took a walk around the village of Letea, one of the most remote villages in the Delta and only accessible by boat. It is a most attractive village with sandy streets, single storey wooden houses and a very peaceful, almost medieval atmosphere. At a pond in the village we found Common, Green and Wood Sandpipers, while Red-footed Falcons hunted overhead. On the way back we had a very close view of a juvenile Little Bittern in a small bush at the water's edge. We also found four more Little Crakes on the lily pads and some Purple Herons.

After lunch and a quick swim it was time to leave for our next destination and en route we saw many Rollers, some Caspian Terns on a sandbank and lots of Marsh Harriers and Hobbys. We tied up for the night in another beautiful spot and ate dinner as the sun went down.

## Day 7

Friday 8th August

Weather – hot & sunny

This morning we visited the largest Pygmy Cormorant colony in the world and on the way we watched several groups of Penduline Tits feeding in the reeds. There are about 3,500 pairs of Pygmy Cormorants at this site and although the breeding season was over there were still at least 500 birds in the lakeside trees. Also around in the reed beds and nearby open water were some Gadwall, Great Crested and Little Grebe plus two Little Bittern and three Kingfishers.

Our next stop was at a small lake covered with lilies and here we found a flock of Garganey, Red-necked and Black-necked Grebes, a Dalmatian Pelican and many Whiskered Terns feeding young. On our way back to the pontoon we counted at least 12 Rollers and 60 Bee-eaters plus three Red-footed Falcons, two Hoopoes and two Cuckoos and finally we found what we were looking for - an elusive Black Woodpecker in an ancient willow. After a swim and lunch we took a trip to the beautiful Lake Crulic which was almost completely covered in water chestnuts. Here we found 250 Glossy Ibis plus Snipe, Ruff, Greenshank and many Purple Herons. It was now time to start heading back to Tulcea on the pontoon, birdwatching from the deck as we went. Later we moored at a bank for the night some two hours short of our final destination.

## Day 8

Saturday 9th August

Weather – hot & sunny

We arrived in Tulcea at breakfast time, left our comfortable floating hotel at 8.30am and headed west in the minibus. Our first stop was at Samova overlooking the Danube flood plain where we found some amusing little Susliks (a type of ground squirrel) plus lots of Bee-eaters and Rollers.

We then took a walk on an open hillside with a forest of Oak, Maple and native Pear and were lucky to find the special birds of the area, namely, Levant Sparrowhawk (6), Long-legged Buzzard (2), and Sombre Tits (3) a Booted Eagle, a Lesser Spotted Eagle, a Honey Buzzard, a Middle-spotted Woodpecker, two Steppe Buzzards and two Tawny Pipits. Next we travelled on to the Macin Mountains, a line of low rocky hills which had recently become a National Park. Here we had good views of several Isabelline Wheatears, Syrian Woodpeckers, a juvenile Rock Thrush, three Hawfinches and three Red-rumped Swallows. It was then time to head back to Tulcea and check into the new Ibis Tours Hotel for our last two nights.

## Day 9

Sunday 10th August

Weather - hot & sunny

First we went south to Vadu to get the best light to see the waders around the lagoons and we were not disappointed. The first lagoon was full of waders (at least 22 species) and we had a brilliant view of them. The highlights were Kentish and Little Ringed Plovers, Temminck's and Little Stints, Curlew and Marsh Sandpipers and Red-necked Phalaropes. The next and much larger lagoon held 10 Dalmatian Pelicans, 100 Spoonbills, eight Ruddy Shelduck and 20 Collared Pratincoles plus a Pond Terrapin.

We then had time to visit the Black Sea Coast, spot a few Sandwich Terns and have a swim. It was now time to head back and on the way we noticed a group of Red-footed Falcons feeding over the fields, possibly on grasshoppers being disturbed by a tractor. Our final stop of the day was at the old Roman fort of Enisala where we found the rare *Dianthus Nardiformis*.

## Day 10

Monday 11th August

Weather - hot & sunny

We left Tulcea at 8am for the long drive to Bucharest and our flight back to London. All went well and we landed on time.
