

Romania's Danube Delta and Carpathian Mountains

Naturetrek Tour Report

4 - 13 August 2012

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Day 1

Saturday 4th August

Hot and sunny

We arrived at Bucharest airport on schedule in the late afternoon and after meeting up with our local guide Florin and our bus driver George we drove north across the plains to Ploiesti and then north-west into the mountains. We arrived at our comfortable guest house in Zarnesti a little before sunset and after settling in, enjoyed a first dinner together before retiring full of anticipation for the days ahead.

Day 2

Sunday 5th August

Hot and sunny with some scattered cloud and a gentle breeze

We spent the bulk of the day exploring the Zarnesti Gorge. The scenery was consistently breath-taking and despite the heat we encountered a satisfying range of wildlife. Notable birds included dozens of Alpine Swifts zooming around the high limestone cliffs, several Willow Tits, a Honey Buzzard and two brief Three-toed Woodpeckers. Butterflies were much in evidence too, and included Purple Emperor, Queen of Spain Fritillary, Hungarian Glider and Scarce Copper, whilst a couple of Agile Frogs and some Common Lizards added further interest to a very enjoyable walk.

We finished the afternoon with a brief look at Bran Castle and a few minutes at a viewpoint nearby and then made our way back to Zarnesti noting our first White Storks and Red-backed Shrikes en-route.

Day 3

Monday 6th August

Hot and sunny with some scattered cloud

In the morning we walked through meadows in the Barsa Valley some little distance out of Zarnesti. The flower studded slopes were alive with butterflies and other interesting insects and we saw a few good birds too, including a couple of Goshawks, several Red-backed Shrikes and a few Nutcrackers. In the afternoon we drove to the Strimba Valley and enjoyed a lovely walk during which we had excellent views of a pair of Lesser Spotted Eagles, several Bee-eaters and lots more Red-backed Shrikes.

In the evening we drove further up the valley to a well-positioned hide overlooking a clearing in the forest. We waited quietly for some time and then, as the evening shadows lengthened, we had fantastic views of an adult female Brown Bear that came to eat some of the food put out by a forester for it and other bears in the area. It was quite something to be in such close proximity to this huge and powerful wild animal and it was an excited and satisfied group that returned late to Zarnesti.

Day 4

Tuesday 7th August

Hot and sunny

We left Zarnesti after breakfast and drove out of the mountains, past Ploiesti and then eastwards across the flatlands. We stopped for a picnic lunch in a sweltering poplar plantation a little west of Ciorani and saw a Black Stork, a Honey Buzzard, a couple of juvenile Hobbies, a pair of Red-footed Falcons and several Bee-eaters – not bad! A few kilometres further on, we stopped by a shallow lake and enjoyed the sight of hundreds of Ruff, several Spotted Redshanks, five Avocets and a Marsh Harrier.

We drove on through Urziceni and Slobozia and then late in the afternoon we crossed the mighty Danube itself at Harsova and entered the Dobrugea region. We made a last stop at Lake Hasarluc and spent a happy half hour watching a lively range of wetland birds that included Purple and Squacco Herons, Great Egret, Glossy Ibis, Pygmy Cormorant, Whiskered Tern and Great Reed Warbler – a taste of things to come!

From here it was a relatively short drive to Tulcea where we arrived in good time to settle into our new quarters on our “floating hotel” before eating dinner out on deck with the bright lights of the Tulcea waterfront as a backdrop.

Day 5

Wednesday 8th August

Overcast, cool and breezy with some sunny breaks and occasional thunder and lightning

After breakfast at the Tulcea quayside we boarded a small launch and set off on our first sortie into the Danube Delta. At first we chugged sedately downstream along the canalised Sulina Channel but after an hour or so we turned north-eastwards into a maze of smaller willow-lined channels and lily-covered lakes that took us deep into the heart of the delta. The sheer number and diversity of water-birds was staggering; this was one big and impressive system! Highlights included hundreds of mighty White Pelicans, one Dalmatian Pelican, at least three White-tailed Eagles, lots of Pygmy Cormorants, masses of Whiskered Terns and a distant Red-necked Grebe.

The boat unfortunately broke down a little after midday but all was far from lost. We waited patiently as the boatman stripped to the waist and descended, spanner in hand, into the bilgy depths of the engine room. Some clanking ensued, a few hundred White Pelicans flew overhead, a male Little Bittern made a couple of close fly-pasts and a Grass Snake swam across the channel. Then, as hunger set in, a speed boat miraculously arrived to rescue us and in two shifts we were whisked back at an exhilarating and breakneck pace to the Mothership as it made its way along the Sulina Channel.

We moored at Crisan and in the late afternoon returned to the now-mended launch and set off to explore some channels and creeks to the south. We ended up at Lake Jacob and en-route saw further masses of wetland birds including lots of smart Glossy Ibis and our first Little Crake. We arrived back at Crisan just as it was getting dark and enjoyed a late dinner reflecting on the wonders of our first day in the delta.

Day 6

Thursday 9th August

Hot and sunny

In the early morning our tug towed the hotel up the Old Danube channel to the junction with the Letea Channel. From here we set off in the small launch through vast reed-beds. Along the way we saw masses of Night Herons and Purple Herons, dozens of Ferruginous Ducks and at least three Little Crakes. Kingfishers flashed along the channel head of us, Rollers sat up on bare branches and Penduline Tits wheezed unseen in the willows.

We arrived at Letea in the middle of the morning and took a pleasant stroll along the sandy streets admiring the traditional wattle and daub, reed-thatched houses and generally soaking up the atmosphere of this most traditional of delta villages. The gardens and orchards proved productive for birds too and during the course of our visit we noted three Syrian Woodpeckers, a Wryneck, two Hoopoes and female Red-footed Falcon.

Back in the launch we retraced our route to the Mothership, ate lunch and took a break as the hotel relocated back to Crisan. In the late afternoon we headed out in the launch once more through another circuitous maze of creeks, channels and lakes and continued our "delta experience". Highlights included a swimming Dice Snake, Whiskered Terns mobbing a Marsh Harrier, both species of Pelican in the air together and good views of a couple of Little Bitterns. We re-joined the hotel at Lake Eracle a little before sunset.

Day 7

Friday 10th August

Sunny and very warm with a little scattered cloud in the afternoon

We took to the small boat again this morning for the last time and made our way through yet more channels and lakes. An excellent morning ensued with very many birds seen. Highlights included; lots more White Pelicans (including our first good views of birds on the water feeding), masses of Pygmy Cormorants, Squacco Herons and Purple Herons, three separate White-tailed Eagles, hundreds of Whiskered Terns and dozens of Kingfishers. As we passed along the edge of an agricultural area the more open terrain added Rollers, Bee-eaters and our first Lesser Grey Shrike to the mix and we completed the experience with a Grey-headed Woodpecker and a Wryneck side by side in a creek-side willow. We finally re-joined the hotel by bird-rich Lake Bucanesti.

Two Little Crakes working their way along the water's edge just metres from the boat interrupted and enlivened our lunch and then it was time to weigh anchor and head back to Tulcea. Most of us spent the time up on deck enjoying our last few hours in the delta. We saw lots more of the same, including hundreds of Squacco Herons and Glossy Ibis on one Water Chestnut covered lake, plus a White-tailed Eagle that rose up from the bank just ahead of us, another Little Bittern, two Black Storks and a surprise Black Woodpecker.

Day 8

Saturday 11th August

Overcast with sunny breaks in the morning, becoming warm and sunny with scattered cloud in the afternoon

Leaving the floating hotel and re-uniting with George and a bus, we headed off west out of Tulcea into the rolling Dobrugea countryside. Our first stop was at a beautiful area of wooded steppe near Telistia. The trees seemed to be alive with birds and in a short space of time we saw Honey Buzzard, Roller, Turtle Dove, Hoopoe, Golden Oriole, Middle and Lesser Spotted Woodpeckers, Woodlark and Ortolan Bunting. Additionally we noted a couple of Brown Hares, a Green Toad, a few Green Lizards, several Praying Mantises and two hugely impressive "Armadillo" Crickets.

From here we proceeded west through Macin town to the Macin Hills National Park. We ate lunch under a large shade tree at the base of a rugged rocky ridge. It was hot here and birds were few but we did find a Little Owl, a pair of Syrian Woodpeckers and for some of the group at least, a pair of Rock Thrushes, whilst the entrance track across ploughed fields produced Tawny Pipits, Bee-eaters, Rollers and Lesser Grey Shrikes. We finished the afternoon at a lovely area of steppe grassland in the lee of a wooded ridge. Highlights here were several Isabelline Wheatears, a male Woodchat Shrike and dozens of very engaging Susliks.

Day 9

Sunday 12th August

Overcast, cool and breezy with occasional sunny breaks and some distant lightning

Today we headed south out of Tulcea. Our first stop was by a hill known as Deniz Tepe. Here we found masses of Yellow Wagtails and Northern Wheatears on the surrounding ploughed fields, Lesser Grey Shrikes on the wires, a few Tawny Pipits, a Long-legged Buzzard and a female Hen Harrier. Next we drove on through the Babadag Forest to the edge of the massive Sinoie Lagoon. Our first stop here, in an area of ploughed fields overlooking part of the lagoon produced several Gull-billed Terns hawking gracefully over the turned soil and a number of handsome Collared Pratincoles. We ate our lunch some way further on in an area of grassland and dried out saltmarsh. Here there were more Gull-billed Terns, five Stone Curlews, at least three Hobbies and a passing Black Kite.

After lunch we continued south and made an impromptu stop by the muddy, reed-fringed edge of the lagoon near the village of Sacele where we found dozens of Garganey, a nice little group of White-winged Black Terns and good numbers of waders including both Temminck's and Little Stints side by side. Further on at Vadu we investigated a couple of areas of marsh and found several Marsh Sandpipers, some Spotted Redshanks and hundreds of Black-tailed Godwits. We finished the day by the shore of the Black Sea itself where we saw dozens of Sanderling and a couple of Whimbrel on the beach, some Arctic Skuas chasing Sandwich Terns offshore, an adult Little Gull overhead and a Red-breasted Flycatcher in the scrub.

Day 10

Monday 13th August

Sunny and warm with some scattered cloud and a gentle breeze

We left Tulcea after breakfast bound for Bucharest airport. We made one principal stop at some loess cliffs overlooking a vast stretch of Danube flood meadows near the village of Garliciu a little east of Harsova. A Saker Falcon that appeared out of nowhere and cruised across the road in front of us was an unexpected and outstanding bonus but we also enjoyed great views of a pair of Long-legged Buzzards catching the up-draughts from the cliff, dozens of Bee-eaters hanging around their nests in an exposed bank and a small group of Black Storks that passed close overhead.

White Storks were on the move today too and as we travelled we noted three large flocks totalling over 320 birds in all. At a petrol station stop in Slobozia we saw a fine male Levant Sparrowhawk soaring overhead and we formally finished our Romanian birding some little way short of Bucharest with a ringtail Montagu's Harrier wafting its way over the wheat fields.

We arrived at the airport in perfect time. Our check-in went smoothly, our flight departed on time and we all arrived safely back in the UK a few hours later.
