Day 1

Friday 8th May

We arrived at Krakow airport at lunchtime, met up with Martin and our driver Pavel, and began the two-hour journey to the Slovak border. Once clear of the city, we passed through a rolling patchwork of farmland, mixed woodland and picturesque villages. Roadside birds included Rooks, Jackdaws, Starlings, Swallows, Common Buzzards and White Storks. A couple of brief stops either side of the border, with the rugged snow-capped peaks of the High Tatras visible in the distance, added Garden Warbler, Common Whitethroat, Tree Pipit, Black Redstart, White Wagtail and Great Grey Shrike.

We arrived at our hotel in Vitanova in the late afternoon and, after a short break to settle in, we took a stroll up the valley through meadows flanked by Spruce forest. Birds here included two soaring Black Storks, a Cuckoo, two Firecrests, a pair of Grey Wagtails and several Fieldfares – all in all, a reasonable start. Back at the hotel, we enjoyed a good dinner and then retired for the night prepared for an early start in the morning.

Day 2

Saturday 9th May

Away at first light into a grey, rainy dawn, we drove a short distance to a large area of wet meadowland and Spruce forest near Sucha Hora, right by the Polish border. The area was alive with singing Whinchats and Grasshopper Warblers and we also heard Corncrake, Quail and Cuckoo. Additionally we saw Skylarks, Whitethroats, Reed Buntings and a few Roe Deer but, perhaps because of the persistent rain, there was no lekking activity from the local Black Grouse and we had to be content with fairly distant views of a couple of males flying and then perched in a Spruce tree.

After breakfast back at the hotel, we set off again. Our first stop was at a wooded quarry on the outskirts of Trstna where we had fantastic views of an adult Eagle-Owl which flew across the quarry face just after we arrived, and perched in full view in a tree for a few minutes before disappearing into deeper cover. Adjusting our viewing point a little, we were also able to see its nest where two half-sized downy youngsters were happily sitting out the day – lovely!

Next we explored a picturesque area of meadowland, scrub and mixed forest near Jelesna. Highlights here included a male Black Woodpecker, at least two Cuckoos, a distant Hobby, a Lesser Spotted Eagle, a drumming Common Snipe, a singing Lesser Whitethroat, four Red-backed Shrikes and a couple of Yellow-bellied Toads. A little later we stopped for a picnic lunch by Orava Reservoir, overlooking a low grassy island covered in nesting Black-headed and Caspian Gulls, and Common Terns. Some close observation revealed a few Mediterranean Gulls in amongst the Black-heads whilst, out on the water, there were various ducks and some Great-Crested Grebes.

After lunch, we drove up to the end of the reservoir and walked out onto an area of marshy meadows and sedge beds with ditches and areas of willow scrub. Here we enjoyed fabulous views of at least four Citrine Wagtails calling, singing and chasing each other around and also saw several Reed Buntings and fly-over Red-throated

Pipits, a Marsh Harrier, an adult White-tailed Eagle, two Black and two Whiskered Terns, several Great Egrets, a flock of over 40 Ruff and a singing Grasshopper Warbler. All very nice!

We finished the afternoon in high altitude Spruce forest near the summit of Oravska Magura mountain, where we had great views of two Three-toed Woodpeckers and then a Tengmalm's Owl peering out of its nest hole high in a large Beech tree. Fantastic!

Day 3

Sunday 10th May

A rainy early walk at Vitanova saw a few die-hards rewarded with sightings of Black Redstarts, Dippers, Mistle Thrushes, Grey Wagtails and the only Goshawk of the trip, a male, flashing across the valley in front of us.

Post breakfast, we drove across to the Oravsky Podzamok where we spent most of the rest of the morning in an area of steep Beech/Spruce forest that was alive with singing Wood Warblers. Top bird here though, was a male White-backed Woodpecker which we all eventually managed to get good views of. We ate our lunch in the gardens below scenic Oravsky castle where a Spotted Flycatcher, a couple of Dippers and a singing Serin kept the bird interest going then, after another brief stop in the forest where we found some Carpathian Newts, we travelled on through the valleys to Besenova Reservoir near Liptovska Sielnica. We finished the day here with Tufted Ducks and Great Crested Grebes out on the water, a White-tailed Eagle over the adjacent hills and a pair of Wrynecks in the nearby trees.

Day 4

Monday 11th May

We began the day with Garden Warblers, Marsh Tits and white-headed Long-tailed Tits by our hotel at Liptovska Sielnica and then, with breakfast completed, we set off to explore the forest in the nearby Lucanska Valley. We walked up a track through extensive Beech and Spruce forest with nice views of the surrounding limestone crags and encountered a good range of common woodland birds and some nice butterflies including Duke of Burgundy and Dingy and Grizzled Skippers. Highlights overall though, were a pair of Black Woodpeckers involved in a change-over of duties at their nest high up in a slender Beech tree, and then fabulous views of a pair of White-backed Woodpeckers bringing food to their nestlings in a cavity about 40 feet up in a broken off Beech tree, right by the track!

After a picnic lunch in the sun and then coffee in Lucanska town, we drove up to some high mountain meadows above Ruzomberok where we found a couple of Ring Ouzels, a Crossbill, a singing Red-backed Shrike, some lovely flowers and a Fox traversing a high ridge.

Day 5

Tuesday 12th May

We awoke to a lovely, still, sunny morning at Liptovska Sielnica and the early birders were treated to the glorious sight of a male Golden Oriole perched out in the open in the tree-tops. After breakfast, we drove to Dolaya Setrc above Bubrovnik where a short walk up through the forest (with a singing Wood Warbler en route) took us out into a large, grassy clearing with extensive views of the surrounding Spruce-clad hills – a very pleasant place to be in the warming morning sunshine.

We spent a while trying to call in the hoped-for Pygmy Owl, without eliciting a response, and so turned our attention in other directions and amused ourselves with Yellow-bellied Toads in a puddle, Common Lizards in the grass and a range of birds that included a parachuting Tree Pipit, a Willow Tit, a fly-over Bullfinch, a Cuckoo, a female Northern Wheatear and satisfyingly, a Nutcracker that perched in the top of a tree at the edge of the clearing. We were just about to leave when we heard a Pygmy Owl calling way off in the distance. A short search of the tree-tops revealed the bird perched up, being mobbed in classic fashion by a variety of small birds. We all enjoyed good telescope views before the bird moved closer and then closer again, each time perching in the very top of a Spruce tree, and each time attracting the mobbing attentions of Coal Tits, Chaffinches, Siskins and even a Lesser Whitethroat. It continued to call continuously and eventually ended up only about 100 metres away! Wow! What a great little bird!

We were back down to the bus by noon and away shortly afterwards, but then made a hasty impromptu stop in an area of meadows to view a pair of Golden Eagles cruising around the nearby limestone crags – very nice! We ate our picnic lunch in the sunshine back at the hotel, and then began the journey across country to the Zemplinska region in the far south-east. Our route took us along the south side of the spectacular snow-capped High Tatras, past Poprad and so to the dramatically positioned Spissky Castle where we broke the journey for an hour or so and spent a little time watching a colony of Soudliks gambolling around the castle lawns.

We continued the drive through the late afternoon, past Presov, Vranov and Trebisov and noted a few Roe Deer, a couple of Lesser Spotted Eagles, both Marsh and Montagu's Harriers, a few Common Buzzards, a pair of Stock Doves and some Lapwings along the way. We arrived at Vinicky, our destination, right by the Hungarian frontier and the Zemplen Hills in the early evening, in good time to settle in before dinner.

Day 6

Wednesday 13th May

Barred Warblers and Red-backed Shrikes were good early morning birds, before we set off in the bus across a landscape of pleasant rolling farmland, copses, shelterbelts and attractive little villages. We noted a Honey Buzzard and a Montagu's Harrier en route before arriving at our destination, Senne Fishponds.

This rich mosaic of open water, reed and bulrush beds, marshy pools and Willows proved to be a wonderful place and, in a few hours either side of a picnic lunch, we saw a huge range of birds and other wildlife. Marsh Harriers were in view all the time and there were lots of Great Egrets and Grey Herons, a few Night Herons, several Purple Herons and a few Spoonbills. Ducks included Garganey, Ferruginous Ducks and Pochard and among a range of waders we found Temminck's Stints, Wood Sandpipers, a Little Ringed Plover, several Ruff and a couple of Avocet. We also saw all three Marsh Terns, both Black-necked and Red-necked Grebes, masses of Great-crested Grebes, a brief Great Bittern and three Black Storks. Sedge Warblers were singing all around us and we enjoyed lovely views of these, plus both Great Reed and Savi's Warblers. There were Cuckoos too, plus lots of Yellow Wagtails and Reed Buntings, a Hobby and even a flock of migrating Bee-eaters. Especially nice for many of the group were close views of both Bearded and Penduline Tits, and a singing male Bluethroat was an unexpected bonus. This amazing and wonderful feast of birds was supported by pools full of piping Fire-bellied Toads, a brief Muskrat and butterflies including Southern Festoons and a stunning Large Copper.

In the mid-afternoon, we drove across country to an area of farmland near Trebisov where there was a Saker Falcon nest in a specially-constructed box on an electricity pylon. Unfortunately the adults didn't appear whilst

we were there, but through the telescopes we could see the two downy youngsters hunkered down at the back of the box. A distant Imperial Eagle and some Ravens provided some compensation before we called it a day and headed back to Vinicky.

Day 7

Thursday 14th May

We awoke to a cool overcast dawn, and rain set in during breakfast but, undeterred, we duly set off and the morning progressed with a number of short stops. The first notable bird was a River Warbler in a marshy clearing in a field-edge Willow copse. We enjoyed good views of this skulking species as it crept around the bushes and sang, head tilted back and bill open. Next was an adult Imperial Eagle on its nest 50 feet up in a tall field boundary Poplar. The bird was apparently shielding youngsters from the rain and was half standing in the nest, a fierce, powerful and majestic-looking thing. From here, we drove to a sandpit Bee-eater colony where we also found a Hoopoe, some Corn Buntings and a had a brief view of Tawny Pipit.

After a coffee break in Velky Kamenec village, we headed out to a derelict collective farm on an area of steppe grassland where we ate our picnic lunch and enjoyed lovely views of a pair of smart Lesser Grey Shrikes, several pairs of nesting White Storks, a Crested Lark or two, and another Hoopoe.

After lunch we visited a couple of small wetlands near the village of Somotor. The first, a reed- and Willow-fringed pool produced a pair of Black Kites, a few Purple Herons and a Green Woodpecker. The second, a pool with reeds, Willows, Poplars and a scrubby clearing was full of singing Nightingales and, in a short space of time, we here had superb views of a song-fighting Barred Warbler, two pairs of Red-backed Shrikes, a pair of Golden Orioles (at times mobbing a Marsh Harrier), a couple of Turtle Doves, a Wryneck and a male Black Woodpecker – phew!

Late in the afternoon, we drove back though Vinicky (where a Short-toed Eagle was soaring over the vine-clad hills) and out to another Saker site a little north of Trebisov. This time an adult bird (presumably the female) was sitting in the pylon box with a couple of downy youngsters. As we watched, the male appeared out of nowhere streaking across the sky and seeing off a pair of Kestrels in a nearby shelterbelt, then hurtling back across the wide-open landscape with the stiff wind behind him. What a bird!

It had been another great day and things were rounded off perfectly on the way back to Vinicky when a pair of Imperial Eagles appeared right by the roadside flying low in tandem over the fields – wow!

Day 8

Friday 15th May

After breakfast, we left the hotel and spent an hour or so in lovely flood-plain woodland by the village of Borsa. Here we enjoyed a fantastic babel of bird song and some good views of a male Grey-headed Woodpecker, a female Syrian Woodpecker and a couple of Short-toed Treecreepers. From here, we crossed the frontier into Hungary and began the drive to Budapest airport. A Wild Boar and a Short-toed Eagle, shortly after we crossed the border, were good sightings and, as we drove, we noted an extraordinary density of Common Buzzards sitting on roadside posts. We broke the journey at a motorway service area somewhere along the way, where a passing Roller was a fitting last bird, and made it to Budapest airport in good time for our late afternoon flight. Everything went smoothly and we all arrived safely back in the UK a few hours later.
