

Venezuela - Oilbirds, Harpy Eagles & Table Mountains

Naturetrek Tour Report

15 - 29 November 2012

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Day 1

Thursday 15th November

Upon arrival at the international airport of Caracas, the guests transferred to Hotel Ole Caribe in Macuto for an overnight stay.

Day 2

Friday 16th November

Weather: Clear sky

We left at 5:15am to the domestic airport to check in onto our local flight to Cumana town in the east of Venezuela. We had breakfast at the airport before departure at 8:00 am. We arrived at Cumana at 9:30 am. And took off to our destination Chacopata Lagoon, 2 ½ hours away. Driving along the coast toward Chacopata we saw lots of Magnificent Frigatebirds some Royal Terns, and Brown Pelicans. Further ahead, we came close to some small ponds where we saw a group of Common Gallinule (Moorhen), Caribbean Coots, and Least Grebe. On the wire nearby was a Pearl Kite and on a near tree 3 pairs of the semi-endemic (S) and endangered species Yellow-shouldered Parrot!

We arrived at Chacopata and we started enjoying the site. We scanned the lagoon and saw a big flock of American Flamingo, Gull-billed Tern, Greater and Lesser Yellowlegs, Whimbrel, Little-blue Heron and few Scarlet Ibis in the mangroves. In the xerophytic forest behind, Buffy Hummingbird (S) was buzzing around. Also around was Tropical Mockingbird, lots of Bare-eyed Pigeons (S) flying overhead and perched on top of cactus, Tropical Gnatcatcher, amongst others. After a beautiful afternoon, we drove to Finca Vuelta Larga in Guaraunos (3 hours away passing through Carupano City, our next destination for the following 3 days).

Day 3

Saturday 17th November

Weather: Clear sky. Short period of rain in the morning. Clear in the afternoon

We had an early breakfast and around 6:30am we left to another section of this Finca where is a large lagoon surrounded by forest. Upon arrival, around the house near the lake we saw Black-necked Aracari, Lined Woodpecker, Lined Seedeater, and Roadside Hawk. On the house roof were 5 Greater Yellow-headed Vultures and 2 Turkey Vultures and Bicolored Wren.

On the walk around the lake one of the first birds we saw was one of our target ones, the endemic (E) Black-dotted Piculet. Then we saw Little Cuckoo, Red & Green Kingfisher, Short-crested Flycatcher, Black-capped Donacobius, Yellow-chinned Spinetail, Horned Screamer, White-headed Marsh-tyrant, Hoatzin, Black-capped Night-Heron, and White-winged Sallow. Then we saw Cream-colored Woodpecker, Pale-vented Pigeon, Spot-breasted Woodpecker female and male in the scope, and Cinnamon Attila amongst others. We walked back to the house, and drove a short distance to a spot where we got off and walked a few metres inside the forest and called the target bird - one of the specialty birds of this area, the Crimson-hooded Manakin. It came very close and we had great views!

In the afternoon, we went to Caño Amarillo, another section of the Finca, with forest on our right and savannah on our left. We drove and walked several sections of this road which ends at Caño (small river) Amarillo. Along here we saw Rufous-vented Chachalaca, Limpkin, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Red-breasted Blackbird, Maguari Stork, not commonly seen around here, Black-bellied Whistling-Duck, Savanna Hawk, and White-tailed Hawk, amongst others. We got to the end of the dirt road and then a short distance along a stream calling two target birds, Jet Antbird and Silvered Antbird. We heard them, but no luck this time as they didn't show up. On the way back in the dark, we saw several Pauraques on the road.

Day 4

Sunday 18th November

Weather: Clear sky in the morning

We left at 4:30 am to Las Melenas in Cerro Humo arriving at 6:30 am and had breakfast at the spot. While eating, a flock of Venezuelan Parakeets (S) flew over. Around in a near bush were Sooty-headed Tyrannulets and on a huge Ficus. sp tree was a family flock of Bay-headed Tanagers.

We started the trail that goes through a cloud forest in the Paria National Park where we expected to see some of the endemics of this area. The trail produced Black-faced Antthrush, Green Hermit, Striped-breasted Spinetail, Paria-white Start (E), Slaty Antwren female & male, Plain Antvireo male, Handsome Fruiteater (E), Olivaceous Woodcreeper, a female Scissor-tailed Hummingbird, and Wave Woodpecker, amongst others. And for first time since 2007 that we have been coming here in November, we saw White-tipped Quetzal (E)!!!

On the way down we hit a mixed species flock that contained, Bay-header, Speckled, Highland Hepatic, White-winged, and Guira Tanagers, Blackpoll & Cerulean Warbler, Paria White Start, Handsome Fruiteater, Golden-headed Manakin juvenile or a female, Chestnut-crowned Becard, Plain Xenops, Golden-fronted Greenlet, Rufous-breasted Wren and Fork-tailed Woodnymph. Then we went back for a late lunch at Finca Vuelta Larga.

In the afternoon again we went to Caño Amarillo to try again with the antbirds. On the way we saw Capped Heron, Black-faced Whistling-Duck, Black-capped Donacobius, and Limpkin, amongst others. We arrived at the Caño and after a while we succeeded in seeing one Jet Antbird and two Silvered Antbirds. Also around were female & male Lineated Woodpecker, Striped-backed Wren, a Bicolored Wren dust bathing, several flocks of Orange-winged Parrots, and White-eye Parakeets flying overhead.

Day 5

Monday 19th November

Weather: Clear sky in am. Some clouds in pm

After having breakfast at 5:30am, we left for Caño Ajies jetty. While waiting to get onboard, we saw Carib Grackle, Brown-throated Parakeet, Black-necked Aracari, Yellow-crowned Parrot and White-throated Toucan, amongst others. We departed and went straight to the spot to see the Rufous-crab Hawk, the target bird of this morning. Nevertheless, on the way we saw Common Black Hawk, Bat Falcon, Cocoli Heron, Little Blue Heron adults and juvenile, Solitary Sandpiper, Muscovy Duck, Red-bellied Macaw flying overhead, Orange-winged Parrot, but no luck this time with the Rufous-crab Hawk. On the way back, we had several stops that produced Spotted Toddy-flycatcher, Bicolored Conebill, Prothonotary Warbler! (not often seen), Black-chinned Antbird, and Rufous & Green Kingfisher amongst others.

After lunch, we departed to our next destination around 3 hours away, the Guacharo's Cave (Oilbird's Cave). It was a beautiful drive through a hilly area and the afternoon light was beautiful too. We arrived at Posada Campo Claro and set off to the Oilbird Cave. We arrived at the cave at 6:05 pm, the Oilbirds started to come out and bats as well.

Day 6

Tuesday 20th November

Weather: Partly cloudy with light rain

After our early breakfast we departed for Cerro Perú, to see the elusive, endangered and endemic species the Grey-headed Warbler. It's basically a trail that goes through a cloud forest along the ridge of part of Cerro Peru. Initially one walks through some pastures and crop areas, and then you go inside the cloud forest. From the guesthouse, we took a road and after some 25 minutes we arrived at the spot to start the walk. At the parking area we saw Lesser Goldfinch, Rufous-collared Sparrow, Ochre-breasted Brushfinch (S) and we heard a flock of Tepui Parrotlets that flew overhead.

On the walk through the fields we saw the skulker Pale-breasted Spinetail quite well. The forest trail produced Strong-billed and Streak-headed Woodcreeper, Groove-billed Toucanet (S), Glossy-black and Yellow-legged Thrush, Handsome Fruiteater (E), and we heard Green Hermit calling relentlessly inside some dense bamboo patch, and Stripe-headed Brush-finch in the understorey but no Grey-headed Warbler. On the way back we saw a mixed species flock with Speckled, Blue-capped and Bay-headed Tanagers, 4 Handsome Fruiteater (E) female & male, Blue-naped Chlorophonia, White-throated Tyrannulet, Blackburnian Warbler, Venezuelan Sylph (E), and a flock of Lilac-tailed Parrotlets (S) flew low overhead.

After lunch, we went back to the Oilbird Cave to have a look inside. Although it's an optional thing to do, everybody wanted to go inside and also have a closer view of the Oilbirds. We took a guide, as it is mandatory, who guided us in and explained different things about the cave; the different formations, the wildlife inside, the oilbirds, the history. It is fascinating. We saw several the Oilbirds, really close, on their nests up on the ledges and quite a few flying around. We walked just up to 350 m. The entrance mouth has 23 m high x 28 m width. It is the second largest cave of calcium carbonate in Venezuela.

Day 7

Wednesday 21st November

Weather: Clear skies in the morning and partly cloudy in the afternoon

After an early breakfast, we went birding around the garden and the coffee farm, which are shaded by Erythrina and Inga trees, good for the birds. At the bird table we saw Blue-grey Tanager, Inca Jay, Pale-breasted Thrush, and Bananaquit. Around in the garden was Bicolored Wren, White-tipped Dove, Oriole Blackbird, Boat-billed Flycatcher, Great Kiskadee, Orange-crowned Oriole, Copper-rumped Hummingbird (S), Fork-tailed Woodnymph, Burnish-buff Tanager, Orange-crowned Oriole, Speckled Tanager, and Crested Oropendula amongst others.

We left at 7:15 am to our next destination, Taguapire Lodge in El Palmar. We had a long drive ahead of us, which included crossing the largest river of Venezuela, the Orinoco, through the newest and majestic Orinoquia Bridge, which is 3.300 metres long. On the way we saw Blue & White Swallow, Roseate Spoonbill, Great Egrets, an Savanna Hawk. We had our picnic lunch at a lookout spot across the Orinoco River. We continued on our route and arrived at Taguapire and settled in for the following three days. Next day was the main exciting day of the trip, the Harpy Eagle day! The expectations are always high...

Day 8

Thursday 22nd November

Weather: Clear sky.

After a very early breakfast at 3:45 am, we departed in search of the magnificent Harpy Eagle. Our local guide Javier knows where the nest of a 2 week old chick is. In fact, it is the same nest that the crew of the BBC had filmed a couple of years ago now, and the same pair of Harpy Eagles that use the nest. They refurbish the nest after the sub-adult leaves the nest after nearly 2 years. It takes around 2 hours to get to the spot in a 4-wheel drive vehicle. Along the way, we did a few stops to see Purple Gallinule, Savanna & Grey Hawk, Burrowing Owl, Orange-winged & Yellow-crowned Parrot amongst others. Near the forest we saw Green Aracari, Yellow-tufted Woodpecker, Swallow, Long-tailed Tyrant.

We arrived at a clearing with a little house and small crops around. A few metres away is the forest edge. We took the trail that goes to the Harpy Eagle nest, and a big Kapok tree, one of the main tree species the Harpy Eagles use to build their nests. On the way we hit a mixed species flock and saw Wedge-billed, Buff-throated & Chestnut-rumped Woodcreeper, Buff-cheeked Greenlet, White-breasted Woodwren, Grey Antwren (♀ & ♂), Cinereous Antshrike, and Grey-crowned Elaenia, amongst others. A short way away was the spot from where we could see the nest. After a while we saw the female adult from certain angles, and once in a while we could see the head of the chick. We had a great time!!

Retracing our steps we heard a Blue-crowned Motmot but it was impossible to see, but instead we had good views of 2 Ferruginous-back Antbirds! We got out at the clearing behind the house and here we saw 4 species of euphonias feeding on the mistletoes that are in some of the trees around; White-lored, Violaceous, Purple-throated and Plumbeous Euphonia. We walked around the house and took another short trail, which was the first time for me. We walked some 600 m. It was pretty quiet until we heard a bird call...to my astonishment it was Winged-banded Antbird, an adult and a juvenile!!! I hadn't seen one in 20 years!!! It's a beautiful antbird...

We went back to the little house and had our packed lunch. Around here we saw Golden-winged Parakeet, Green Aracari, White-tailed Trogon, and Green-rumped Parrotlet, most of them in the scope too. After this we walked along the dirt road and saw Turquoise Tanager, Red & Green Macaw, Painted Parakeet, Lined Woodpecker, Slate-headed Toddy-tyrant, Yellow & Green Grosbeak, Purple Honeycreeper and Blue Dacnis, American Kestrel, and Mealy Parrot amongst others. It was a great day!!!

Day 9

Friday 23rd November

Weather: Clear sky.

After an early breakfast, we went to Rio Grande Bridge, 45 minutes away. We started to walk around the edge of the river where we saw Crimson Topaz insect feeding, White-necked Jacobin, Neotropical Riverside Warbler after playback, Sungrebe, and in the canopy were 3 Black Nunbirds and Violaceous Euphonia.

Then we walked toward the logging camp, some 700 m away. On this walk, we saw Green-tailed Jacamar, soaring 1 adult and 1 juvenile King Vulture, Greater Yellow-headed Vulture, and also soaring was an Orange-breasted Falcon!!! I haven't seen one in many years... Also found were Yellow-backed Tanager (♀ & ♂), Blue Dacnis, Yellow-throated Flycatcher, Black-spotted Barbet (S), Black-tailed Tityra, and Black-headed Parrot, with many of these seen in the scope too.

We boarded the vehicles and drove past the camp to our next stop, the grid trails inside the forest. After a short while, we heard a mixed species understorey and canopy flock. We identified Fulvous-shrike Tanager, a canopy flock leader, Buff-cheeked Greenlet, Green & Yellow Grosbeak, Golden-spangle Piculet, Wave Woodpecker, Cinereous Antshrike and Buff-throated Woodcreeper. Then after a while walking in the forest we saw Great Jacamar, up high in the canopy. After lunch, we returned to the trails and eventually saw Ruddy-tailed Flycatcher and Thrush-like Schiffornis. Then went back to the dirt road and walked for a while. This produced Purple Honeycreeper, Golden Headed Manakin, White-tailed Trogon, Piratic Flycatcher, Wedge-headed Capuchin Monkey, Green Aracari, White-throated Toucan, Lined & Lesson Seed eater, amongst others, plus we heard a Musician Wren.

Day 10

Saturday 24th November

Weather: Clear skies

After breakfast we drove back to Rio Grande River and worked the area around the river. We heard Black-throated Trogon but couldn't see it, a flock of Cayenne Jays, inside the forest we heard Rufous-capped Antthrush, but it was very elusive. At the forest edge we were able to see a pair of Mouse-coloured Antshrikes, and a few metres inside the forest we saw Dusky Antbird and pair of Rufous-bellied Antwrens!! Quiet a view! We went back to the road and saw Paradise Jacamar and White-shouldered Tanager. Walking past the camp we saw Grey-headed Kite, Black-headed Parrot (scope), Swallow-wing, Black Nunbird, Forest Elaenia and a brief view of Yellow-throated Woodpecker. We went back to the lodge to enjoy lunch in front of the bird feeder, where we saw our national bird, the Venezuelan Troupial (S).

We departed for our next destination, Barquilla de Fresa Lodge at the foothill of La Escalera, around 4 ½ hours away. On the way we stopped at a small lagoon where we saw Ringed & Amazon Kingfisher, White-headed

Marsh Tyrant, Common Moorhen, Wattle Jacana, Striated Heron, Cocoli Heron, Least & Spotted Sandpiper, Osprey and White-tailed Hawk.

Day 11

Sunday 25th November

Weather: Overcast in the morning. Clear in the afternoon

After an early breakfast, we went straight to the area where most of the endemics and semi-endemics are found, at around 1200m a.s.l. (starting from 170 m a.s.l.). We stopped at the bend where several flowering *Clusia* sp. Bushes attract hummingbirds and others. But there wasn't much activity this morning. Here we saw Olive Manakin (S), Blue-fronted Lancebill, lots of Bananaquits, and Black-headed Tanager. A bit further up was a fruiting *Ficus* sp. where we saw Yellow-bellied Tanager, Red-shouldered Tanager, and heard the White-throated Foliage-gleaner (E). Then we went inside the forest on our left and called the sub-endemic Roraiman Barbtail. It showed quite well! We crossed a short patch of forest and at the other side in an open area we saw Tepui Whitestart (S), and Orange-bellied Manakin (S).

We went back to the vehicle and drove some km to the Scarlet-horned Manakin spot. It's normally a good spot as there is usually a mixed species flock that moves around here. But today there was no luck. We only heard McConnell's Spinetail (S). We drove to the top of La Escalera to Soldado Pionero. Then we went for lunch by Apongua River. In the afternoon we back to the top of the La Escalera road and walked down. On this walk we saw Plain Antvireo, Wedge-billed Woodcreeper, Peacock Coquette (S) (male), Amethyst Woodstar (male), heard the White Bellbird, and a Coati crossed the road!

We went back to the guest house to enjoy the hummingbird feeders. Crimson Topaz, Black-throated Mango, Long-billed Starthroat, Grey-breasted Sabrewing, Rufous-breasted Hermit, Fork-tailed Woodnymph, Crimson Topaz, Black-throated Mango, and Grey-breasted Sabrewing were seen. It's a real spectacle!

Day 12

Monday 26th November

Weather: Clear skies in the morning. Overcast and some rain in the afternoon

Today the plan was to start in a lower section of La Escalera road, Piedra de La Virgen at 400m a.s.l. and then we would to the Cock of the Rock lek at around 700 m a.s.l. We would have lunch at Barquilla Guest house, and in the afternoon we would go to the Capuchinbird lek area.

At Piedra de La Virgen we saw Cliff Flycatchers and heard the Blue-crowned Motmot. Then we drove up to the Guianan Cock of the Rock area. This spot is also great because there tends to be a mixed species flock around. After a while a male Cock of the Rock crossed over the road. We went few metres inside the forest and eventually saw 2 females, and around us at a certain moment a Flutist Wren (S) showed up. A short while later the mixed species flock turned up. We were able to identify female & male Fulvous-shrike Tanager (the flock leader), Sharpbill, American Redstart, Purple-throated Euphonia, Grey-crowned Flatbill, heard Spot-tailed and Todd's (S) Antwren, Lemon-chested and Buff-cheeked Greenlets and at below eye level was Roraiman or Two-Banded Warbler.

Walking down the road eventually we saw, a female Amethyst Woodstar, a male Peacock Coquette, and in the scope a Scarlet Horned Manakin (S)! We went to a lookout up on Precambrian granitic rock outcrop, technically

called Inselberg, which is an isolated rocky hill. From the lookout, one can see a vast and magnificent rainforest area lying some hundred metres down. Around the top we saw Helmeted Pygmy-tyrant and White-crowned Manakin.

We went back for lunch at the lodge and enjoyed the hummingbird feeders in the garden. In the afternoon, we went for our next goal, the Capuchinbird. This year this mixed gravel-dirt road was in quite bad condition and especially today with the light rain. It was too slippery for our vehicle, so those most eager to see the Capuchinbird, started to hitchhike, and got a lift! We arrived at the spot where the forest trail is and walked to the lek spot. After a while we managed to get a satisfactory look, but we couldn't stay too long. While walking back we saw Paradise Jacamar, Paradise Tanager, Yellow-tufted Woodpecker and Swallowing Puffbird. We got another ride to our vehicle. The others were excited wanting to know how our adventure was!

Day 13

Tuesday 27th November

Weather: Overcast most of the day with light rain on and off

We went straight to the area where most of the endemics and semi-endemics are found, like the first morning in La Escalera. At the red spikes flowers (*Clusia* sp) we saw Rufous-breasted Sabrewing (S) one of the target birds here, Tepui Whitestart (S), Black-hooded Thrush (S), Black-billed Thrush, Tepui Brush-finch (S), and Yellow-bellied Tanager, amongst others.

Again we went across the short path through the forest. At the other side we saw Ruddy Tody-Flycatcher (S) another target bird around here. We drove a few kilometres and stopped to see a Coraya Wren and Tepui Mountain-Grackle (S). The next stop was at the Scarlet Horned lek area. Around here we saw Chestnut-rumped Woodcreeper, Roraiman Warbler, Plain Antvireo (female & male), Tepui Greenlet (S), Bay-headed Tanager, Olive-backed Tanager, Chestnut Woodpecker (scope), Rufous-browed Solitaire (S), and McConnell's Spinetail (S) and heard Tepui Spinetail (S).

We went for lunch at Kawi. After lunch we drove to the Tepui lookout, El Oso. We were expectant as we never know how the weather is going to be. We got lucky. It was not too cloudy so we enjoyed a great view. The Eastern Tepui chain comprises Uei, Roraima, Kukenán, Yuruaní, Wadakapiapué, Karaurín e Ilú (elevations between 2.730 - 2.500 m a.s.l.), one of the main features of the Gran Sabana and Venezuela. On the way back we made a short stop to see another beautiful waterfall, Kamá. Then we headed back to the lodge.

Day 14

Wednesday 28th November

Weather: Clear early in the morning, light rain after 10:30 am. Clear in the afternoon

This morning we decided to go back to the Capuchinbird. I arranged with the help of our driver Carlos, to hire a 4-wheel drive to take us there. We arrived at the entrance of the trail, walked to the lek area and after a while we all had great views of 3 Capuchinbirds! Besides the Capuchinbird we saw Violaceous Trogon and heard a Scaled-backed Antbird.

The walk back, before our ride arrived, was very productive. We saw a female and male Fulvous-shirred Tanager, Green-tailed Jacamar and in the scope Black-headed Parrots. Further ahead, in some kind of fruiting

tree and one next to it, lots of different kind of birds came and went. Among them were Black-tailed Tityra, Paradise Tanager, Turquoise Tanager, Spotted Tanager, Yellow-green Grosbeak, Tawny-crowned & Lemon-chested Greenlet, Yellow-backed Tanager, Blue Dacnis (female and male), Flame-crested Tanager (male), Golden-collared & Little Woodpecker, Lineated Woodcreeper and Golden-spangled Piculet. Flying by were Red & Green Macaw and a mixed species flock of White-collared, Short-tailed, and another non identified swift. It was a great farewell morning! We had a last look at the feeders, had lunch and departed to Puerto Ordaz for our overnight stay.

Day 14

Wednesday 28th November

Weather: Clear sky

After breakfast, most of group went with our driver Gregorio to the airport to take the flight to Caracas. At Caracas airport they were met for lunch and later checked in for the international flight back to the UK.

The rest of us stayed behind to do the Canaima Extension to visit this majestic part of the National Park Canaima and the famous Angel Falls.

As a final remark I will like to mentioned that, from the six previous trips we have done to this area, this is the one where we saw the most Woodpecker species - 11 species seen out of the 15 possible species!
